Rabbi Professor David Golinkin was born and raised in Arlington, Virginia. He made *aliyah* in 1972, earning a B.A. in Jewish History and two teaching certificates from The Hebrew University in Jerusalem. He received an M.A. in Rabbinics and a Ph.D. in Talmud from the Jewish Theological Seminary of America where he was also ordained as Rabbi.

Prof. Golinkin is President of Schechter Institutes, Inc. and President Emeritus of the Schechter Institute of Jewish Studies in Jerusalem, where he also serves as a Professor of Talmud and Jewish Law. For twenty years he served as Chair of the *Va'ad Halakhah* (Law Committee) of the Rabbinical Assembly which writes responsa and gives halakhic guidance to the Masorti (Conservative) Movement in Israel. He is the founder and Director of the Institute of Applied *Halakhah* at The Schechter Institute whose goal is to publish a library of *halakhic* literature for Jews throughout the world. He is the Director of the Center for Women in Jewish Law at the Schechter Institute whose goal is to publish responsa and books by and about women in Jewish law. He is also the founder and Director of the Midrash Project at Schechter whose goal is to publish a series of critical editions of *Midrashim*.

Rabbi Golinkin is the author or editor of 60 books. His current email columns are entitled *Responsa in a Moment* at www. schechter.edu and *Aseh Lekha Rav* at www.schechter.ac.il. He has published over 200 articles, responsa and sermons.

Dr. Isaacs



has written many articles including, "Jewishness: Expression, Identity, and Representation" in Jewish Cultural Studies (2008), "La literature enfantine en Yiddish dans les communautes hassidiques americaines" in Les cahiers du judaisme (2010), "Hebrew-Yiddish Bilingualism Among Israeli Hasidic Children" in Issues in the Acquisition and Teaching of Hebrew (2009) and "Shards" in Second Generation Voices: Reflections by Children of Holocaust Survivors and Perpetrators (2001).

URIEL LIN was born and raised in a small agricultural moshav. Uriel studied in Lod's science high school, where she was exposed to the coexistence between Jews and Arabs. Afterwards, she pursued her education in the Eastern Mediterranean International School. She was drafted to the intelligence unit, and later



worked in the defense ministry for one year. Uriel is interested in cultural and language exchange. She speaks Hebrew, English, Spanish and some Arabic, and enjoys traveling and hiking. She sees herself working in journalism or social entrepreneurship.

JASON LOEWITH grew up in Fairfield, CT, about 60 miles from New York City, and took the train in on weekends with his family to see shows every few months. He went from Brown University in Rhode Island to Santa Barbara, Los Angeles, New York City, Chicago, and finally to the Washington, DC region, where he's been for



more than a decade. Professionally he's worked with a lot of famous and infamous people, directed some forty-odd plays, written a handful, managed or produced hundreds of them, and done just about every job there is to do in a theater. He lives in Carderock Springs with his husband Ned and his dogs Mortimer and Eliza in a mid-century modern home that's majority-owned by Sandy Spring Bank. Jason has been the Artistic Director of Olney Theatre Center since 2013.

CANTOR JOSH C. PERLMAN became the Cantor at B'nai Israel in February 2001. He previously served as the Cantor at Congregation B'nai Israel in Albuquerque, New Mexico, for ten years. Prior to that position, Cantor Josh was the Cantorial Soloist at Temple Shalom in Milton, Massachusetts, and Temple Emanu-El in Providence, Rhode Island. He

Rabbi Schnitzer received a B.A. from Columbia College and then studied at the Jewish Theological Seminary, where he received his Master's Degree and was ordained in 1974. In 2001, the Seminary awarded him an



Honorary Doctor of Divinity. Rabbi Schnitzer has been very active on the local and national Jewish scene. He is currently co-Chair of the Rabbinical Assembly Morasha (Legacy) campaign. A voracious reader, avid traveler and biking enthusiast, Rabbi Schnitzer also has a special passion for Israel.

RABBI MATTHEW H. SIMON has served B'nai Israel as Senior Rabbi and Rabbinic Campaign Consultant for three decades. During his tenure, the Talmud Torah was expanded and consolidated, havurot were added and women were accorded equality. He was ordained by the Jewish Theological Seminary in 1958 and



awarded an Honorary Doctor of Divinity Degree in 1984. He served as a Navy Chaplain and retired as a Captain after 28 years of service. He served as President of the Jewish Federation of Greater Washington for two terms.

RABBI CHERYL STONE has a B.A. in Design and Technical Theatre from Florida State University and worked in costuming for several years in professional theatre. She founded a business that built community among women artists while producing semi-annual exhibitions. She worked as a professional artist and has used



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art in a variety of mediums to engage learners of all ages. Rabbi Stone earned a Masters of Jewish Education from Hebrew College and a Certificate of Advanced Jewish Studies from the Pardes Institute in Jerusalem. She was ordained by the Ziegler School in May 2022.
