RABBI'S MESSAGE by RABBI MITCHELL BERKOWITZ

In the Talmud, Rabbi Hanina says: I have learned much from my teachers, and even more from my colleagues, but from my students I have learned the most (Bavli Ta'anit 7a).

I probably would not have believed Rabbi Hanina if I read this when I was only a student, but having experience now as a student, as a colleague, and as a teacher, I now know that he is absolutely correct. The best teachers give us the resources, skills, and tools that we need to succeed on our own. Supportive colleagues help to fill in the gaps in our learning and experiences, guiding us when we need the hizuk, the strength. And the best students are the ones that challenge us, make us think differently about our approach, and push us to reconsider the assumptions that we bring into the classroom.

I learned a great deal from my teachers over the years, especially the ones with whom I had the privilege of learning at the Jewish Theological Seminary. I have learned even more from the actual experience of working as a rabbi with cherished colleagues and friends. But what I have learned from my students is perhaps the most valuable and meaningful experience of all. (Of course, it is nearly impossible to teach well without the experience of being a student, so these layers build upon one another.)

Now that the High Holiday season has come to an end, the opportunities for learning and teaching at B'nai Israel are truly taking off. Barely a week goes by where there isn't at least one opportunity for meaningful

learning and ongoing education for adults at B'nai Israel. Some of these opportunities come from our L.I.F.E. Lecture Series, some from Hazak, some from the offerings of our Sisterhood and Men's Club, and others come from the Lessans Adult Education Institute. which operates based on a collaborative partnership between our Adult Education Committee and our clergy and staff.

One of my other great privileges is to teach classes in the Institute throughout the year. I teach a weekly Talmud class every Tuesday at 12:30 PM on Zoom. The class has met since I first arrived at B'nai Israel (but back then it was on Shabbat and met in my home), and we have studied two entire tractates of Talmud (Beitzah and Rosh Hashanah), and are now in the middle of a third (Berakhot). We study the text in English, referencing the Hebrew/Aramaic when necessary, and the class is comprised of diverse learners everyone is welcome to join in, whether it is for one week or for one year. There are other reoccurring learning opportunities, such as Rabbi Jonathan Schnitzer's monthly Lunch & Learn and our frequent Shabbat Morning Torah Study group. Both are always open to newcomers, and learners of all backgrounds are welcome.

We offer courses and classes to jumpstart your Jewish learning or refresh you with the basic building blocks of Jewish learning. Our shlicha, Uriel Lin, will teach a Hebrew class for adults beginning on October 22, and B'nai Israel partners with area synagogues and the Haberman Institute to offer a robust "Introduction to Judaism" course. which meets at Temple Beth Ami. Both are excellent opportunities for self-identified beginners to wade into the sea of Jewish learning.

The learning opportunities never cease, with our Scholar in Residence program on October 20-21 featuring Dr. David Zvi Kalman, and various lectures and classes throughout the upcoming months. I encourage you to sift through the offerings and find something that is meaningful for you. If you are having trouble making a decision, call my office or send me an email and I would be more than happy to help you.

I cannot wait to learn from you.



Garden of Miracles and Wonder

The children hovered over the bright green plant, pointing to the leaves and

the small, prickly cucumber hiding under them. "It's a cucumber!" exclaimed one friend. "Can we pick and eat it?" inquired another child.



The Nursery School children and their teachers worked together this spring to design, plant, and care for a bountiful community garden. Each class selected vegetables, herbs and flowers for their own garden bed and planted seeds and seedlings in the spring. They took turns filling brightly colored watering cans and sprinkled the small plants every day, observing the changes as the plants grew. Delicate yellow blossoms suddenly appeared on the tomato plants, and then dropped to the ground to reveal tiny green tomatoes. And the four's children named this new special space, "The Garden of Miracles and Wonder."

Now the children are benefiting from all their work. Harvesting ripe cucumbers, lettuce, tomatoes, carrots, basil, parsley, and zucchini, the children are enjoying the fruits of their labor to the fullest. Building a community garden boasts a myriad of benefits, from the experience of growing some of your own food to understanding the life cycle of plants, as well as the scientific processes of evaporation, metamorphosis, and decomposition.



Lessons in literacy and math are explored as the children write the plants' names on craft sticks and count the number of tomatoes on a vine, and we weave Jewish values into these experiences through exploring how we are celebrating the Miracle of Creation—Ma'aseh B'reishit, by growing food and creating Kesher—connections, through working together to water, weed, and harvest. Composting will be added to the garden curriculum in the coming months to teach the children the importance of reducing food waste as well as how to transform their leftovers into fertilizer for the plants.



The garden is a living vessel of our curriculum work to develop social/emotional skills such as empathy through caring for the plants, and cognitive skills are flexed as the children ask questions, form theories, and make predictions about what might happen next in the garden. And the hands-on activity of gardening is a concrete way to make the Jewish holidays come alive. Growing parsley

and horseradish and harvesting vegetables tangibly connect children to Passover and Sukkot.



We are actively working to develop a garden curriculum that incorporates Jewish values into the garden through lessons and activities. One such activity is finding and observing insects in the garden. The values to be taught through this exercise include *Bal Taschit*—Do Not Destroy and *Hoda'ah*—Appreciation. Other values like *Hiddur Mitzvah*—Beautifying a *Mitzvah* and *Sever Panim Yafot*—Cheerfulness or Pleasant Demeanor, can be explored through children observing flowers, discussing what their purpose is and how they lift people's spirits when they are given to loved ones as presents.

The garden demonstrates our preschool's philosophy of "process over product" because raising vegetables, herbs and flowers extends over the course of several months. with the children observing the plants' life cycle over time. Even after harvesting the produce in the garden, the children witness continued growth and change throughout the summer months and into autumn. For three seasons of the year, spring, summer, and fall, the community garden actively enhances our children's nursery school experience. And in the winter while the garden rests, the children will have time to dream, imagine, and plan the renewal of this special space for the upcoming year.






Creation and New Beginnings







For me, as the new Talmud Torah Principal, everything at Talmud Torah was new, and I was not alone. In addition to welcoming new students, families, and teachers, we created new lessons, structures, and curricula.

In Judaic Studies, we implemented a dynamic new curriculum, the Beverly

Goldstick Curriculum for 21st-Century Jewish Learning. Our Judaics teachers modeled their creative spirit and vision of learning in the first weeks of school by crafting original and meaningful lessons for our students as they set out on a shared learning journey. In addition, our Hebrew teachers brought their positive energy and creativity to their teaching, and they sought new ways to engage the students in learning and develop their love of Hebrew.

In Breishit, we see the meticulous order and structure in the creation story and how space and time are divided into parts and organized with care. Similarly, in the first lessons of the year, Talmud Torah staff, teachers, and students partnered to establish new schedules, routines, and class rules to provide structure and facilitate learning.

We recognized that along with an organized learning environment, students benefitted from a welcoming and inclusive classroom culture with flexibility and differentiation to maximize learning. As teachers created lessons and provided structures, they also modified what and how students learned so the children could actively engage in their learning and participate in enrichment opportunities.



Just as God recognized that it was not good for a person to be alone and provided Adam with a partner, our Talmud Torah teachers focused on building connections between students. The teachers promoted community building throughout the day, and they partnered with the children to create a warm classroom environment. Great cognitive growth occurs through social interactions, and student collaboration is an important component of learning at Talmud Torah. To nurture both academic learning and social skills, students will continue to work in hevruta (partnership) and in small groups as they deepen their knowledge of Hebrew, Judaics, and Prayer.



As I consider the importance of new beginnings, I look forward to the opportunity to build connections and partner with our school community and congregation to create, nurture, and learn together!



The last couple of months were (and continue to be) turbulent and chaotic back home in Israel. Between ongoing protests that become increasingly violent, an outrageous wave of bloodshed as assassinations and murders within the Arab community leave the police helpless, and yet another escalation of terror attacks, it is painful to stay updated and connected to what is happening in Israel.

And together with those complicated and challenging realities, I also hold the excitement of my family as we are prepare to welcome the first baby girl in our extended family, after 5 little boys!

And so, in that bittersweet period, I like to resort to good old escapism and introduce you to one of every Israeli child's most nostalgic pieces of newspaper (drum roll, please): "The Weekly Drawing for the Children" -Hatziyur Hashvui'i Layeled.

The Weekly Drawing for the Children was a permanent weekly section in the Yedioth Achronot newspaper, where each week a busy, mesmerizing sketch would be presented, bearing a riddle: Will you be able to find the character hiding within the scene? And every week we would wait for the adults to get the newspaper so we can quickly leaf through the busy pages until our eyes rested on these pictures, depicting strange worlds where the impossible occurs, and off we went for the mission of spotting Nachum the lost dog, Dafna the crying girl, and more and more.

This section has been a permanent part of the newspaper since 1962, and so entire generations of Israeli children grew up recognizing the unique style of Jackie (Yehuda Jackson).

Jackie passed away on July 3, 2023, and so this article is in his honor. And for all of you who made it to this point, here is a dose of The Weekly Drawing for the Children, especially for you:

"Dr. Maya and Eran Gas from Tel Aviv, together with Grandpa Moshe and grandchildren Naama and Itamar, went for a Shabbat stroll when they suddenly encountered an enormous duck! As the kids climbed on his back, Grandpa suddenly vanished. Please help the family find him!"
