RABBI'S MESSAGE by RABBI MICHAEL SAFRA

Purim is by far the most celebratory of our Jewish holidays. We dress up, get drunk, and otherwise engage in frivolity that belies a theme of "backwardness." It is a day of celebration like no other; and it comes this year during a crisis unlike any other in our generation.

In his book *The Jewish Holidays* (p. 196), Rabbi Michael Strassfeld describes how our holiday cycle moves from the heights and joys of fall to the depths of darkness in winter. Hanukkah, with its theme of everincreasing light, initiates an emergence from these depths, which continues through the planting and rebirth of Tu BiShevat. Purim marks the end of the annual holiday cycle on the highest of notes. Watching my son enjoy prom and the other festivities of Senior Year, I can appreciate how the holiday cycle ends "with a bash rather than a confrontation with a crucial spiritual theme" (Strassfeld's words).

I remember many years ago, during the height of the Oslo Peace Process, when a heinous terrorist attack days before Purim prompted many synagogues to cancel their Purim celebrations. The thought came up this year, too, as Israel continues to prosecute its war in response to the attack of October 7. But I don't want to cancel Purim. On the contrary, I want us to celebrate even more this year.

It is haunting how the trajectory of this war follows the cycle Strassfeld describes. What began on Simchat Torah, the joyful height of the fall holiday season, descended to its nadir around the time of Hanukkah. Since then, we have witnessed important victories and seen the IDF scale back aspects of the operation. At press time, reports suggest

that a negotiated settlement, which includes release of all remaining hostages, may be near. I pray that the rumors prove to be true. And even if they fall short, we might find a certain joy in our Purim celebration that would have seemed familiar in generations past. Through two thousand years of exile, our ancestors found in Purim an opportunity to forget everything else. Purim is National Opposite Day. Whatever challenges a particular community might have faced could be forgotten on this one special day of limitless celebration.

There is an interesting contrast between Purim, the last holiday of the cycle, and Passover, which begins the cycle anew one month later. On Purim, God is all but absent. God's name is not mentioned in the Megillah. Victory depends on Esther taking matters into her own hands. But Passover is the opposite. God who redeems the people from Egypt—"not by an angel, not by a seraph, not by an agent," says the Haggadah—and Moses, the human agent of redemption, is omitted from the story.

Although we generally experience Jewish life through the "Passover lens" of prayer, study, and mitzvot directed towards God, we experience Israel through the Purim lens of humanism. Modern Zionism is a largely secular movement. We pray for peace and security, but we expect the army and politicians—not God—to lead us toward achieving those goals.

As we celebrate the reversal of fortune of Purim this year, we yearn for a reversal of fortune in Israel. We stand with Israel, advocate for Israel, and support the men and women charged with prosecuting a just war and negotiating the settlement that will create a better future for Israel. We pray for the day when God's face will no longer be hidden, when we will experience the redemption not only of Purim, but of Passover and the messianic era as well.

"The holidays are so early this year!" was a common refrain around B'nai Israel this past fall. But hold onto your hats, because next year, the holidays will be almost the latest they can possibly be. Rosh Hashana 2024/5785 begins on the night of October 2. The latest possible date for Rosh Hashana is October 4.

Why are they so late next year? Because this year, 5784, is a Jewish leap year, which means we add an extra month of Adar this spring. (So if you're waiting for a yahrzeit letter for your Adar yahrzeit, it might come later than you're expecting!)

But it's not just any leap year. The Jewish calendar works in a cycle of 19 years, with leap years on years 3, 6, 8, 11, 14, and 17, and 19 (which is the same as year 0). This year is year 8, which is the latest leap year of the cycle. That's because we just had a leap year two years ago, whereas most of the other leap years are separated by three years. So the calendar has been pushed farther ahead than usual, giving us a very late holiday season next year.

A fun personal fact is that I was born in a year 8, so this year I will complete my second 19-year cycle around the sun. That means that my Hebrew and English birthdays this year will be on the same day for the first time in 19 years.

If you'd like to hear more fun Jewish calendar facts, come talk to me any time. The Jewish calendar is endlessly fascinating!

LEADERSHIP **MESSAGE**

This year will be my 27th Purim as a member of B'nai Israel. Much has changed both in my life and at B'nai! Twenty-Seven years ago, my daughter Ilana was an infant, absorbing the world around her and my husband, Wayne and I were new members exploring the wide variety of activities here at B'nai. Ilana has grown up and is now living and working in New York City.

Some things are constant. On Purim our clergy and Talmud Torah teachers remind us about the four Mitzvot of Purim: (1) Mishloah Manot, exchanging food and gifts; (2) giving *Tzedakah* to the poor; (3) *se'udat* Purim, having a celebratory meal; and (4) hearing the reading of Megillat Esther.

Other things have changed. This is my second time over the years as Vice President of Religious Affairs. The number of committees in my portfolio has grown and reflects our changing world. These include:

- The Ritual Committee meets several times a year and, under clergy guidance, makes recommendations on the rituals that we adhere to. Also, the committee chooses who will receive the honor of the first and last Alivah of the Torah at Simhat Torah.
- The *Tzedakah* Committee is currently just one person! His role is to work with the clergy to decide how the Tzedakah collected at Daily Minyan is distributed.
- The High Holiday Committee plays a role in deciding Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur programming.

- The B'nai Mitzvah Committee reviews and helps update the information packets given to the families with upcoming b'nai
- The Bereavement Committee assists families with recent losses by sending cards, food, serving as shomers (staying in the room with a deceased person and reciting psalms) and tahara. Tahara is the ritual cleansing of the body after death (We currently only have women trained to do this. It is Jewish custom that men perform this ritual for men and women perform it for women).
- The Fighting Antisemitism committee is our newest committee. Unfortunately, antisemitism is on the rise both in Montgomery County and around the country. Check our B'nai website to see all the important work this committee is accomplishing.

Community involvement has never been more important. If you would like to join any of these committees, please let me or one of the clergy know. We always welcome new committee members!



EARLY CHILDHOOD

Our BISNS teachers work to ignite the spark that excites our children and makes them enthusiastic about their learning. They take the students' interests and skillfully weave them through and into the curriculum. This is especially apparent in our Fours classrooms as we work to help them feel confident in their skills before they leave our BISNS community for their next big journey: kindergarten.

Over the past three years, our fours children have become masterful artists when using loose parts, items such as buttons, wood pieces, noodles, and more. Whether they are creating self-portraits or envisioning landscapes, whenever a tray of loose parts is set in front of the children, they know how to express themselves through their artwork. To elevate their level of learning, our fours were presented with an idea: to create an alphabet picture book.

The children were invited to construct a letter of the alphabet, using loose parts, inside empty picture frames. Their teachers then asked them to think about a word that begins with that letter. After constructing the letter, the children continued to create a picture of their word. For example, Remy constructed the letter A, and then used loose parts to make an apple. Brody constructed the B and then chose pieces to make a picture of balloons. Once their letter and picture were complete, they also had the opportunity to practice their writing skills by forming the letters of the word, either by sounding it out themselves, or copying a model written by the teachers.

When asked about why this was an important project for the fours to create, the children had many ideas to discuss and share with their peers. Ruby declared, "So we can learn to do our letters. Everybody can learn from our book." "You have to learn your letters in kindergarten," Audrey added. "My brother can learn his letters from our book!" Liora explained. "It can help us remember the alphabet," chimed in Jake. "We can show it to other classes, and they will read it and they can learn about ABCs," tacked on Rani. "If we know it [the alphabet], we can teach others to know it," Brody shared.

The children were not only thinking about learning the alphabet and letter sounds themselves, but also thinking about the importance of teaching others! As we continue to teach our fours and help them prepare for the next steps in their education, asking them thoughtful questions and having them expand upon their ideas will only help strengthen their understanding of who they are, what they believe is important, and how they want to share their ideas and knowledge with others.

Before the *Shema*, the siddur includes the blessing "*Ahavah Rabbah*," in which we give thanks to God and ask, "Put into our hearts the ability to understand, to comprehend, to listen, to study, to teach, to keep, to do, and to uphold all the words of Your Torah with love." It is this *bracha* that we see our children embody as they take on projects and think of others learning. My hope for all of our children at BISNS is that they will learn with us, think of others, and take that knowledge, understanding, and love, with them throughout their learning and into the world that waits for them.

YOUTH & EDUCATION

Our Purim story imparts profound lessons on how we navigate the contemporary challenges confronting our world. The climactic moment in the Megillat Esther unfolds when Mordechai, the uncle of Queen Esther, having recently unveiled Haman's nefarious plot to annihilate the Jewish people, approaches the queen. He entreats her to intercede on behalf of her people. Despite her elevated position, Queen Esther hesitates to confront King Achashverosh on behalf of the Jews, aware that approaching the king without a summons carries the penalty of death. Mordechai, with unambiguous candor, states plainly, מֵי יוֹדֶע ' אָם־לְעָת לָּמַלְכְוּת - Mi yodea im la'et kazot higa 'at la 'malchut?' (Who knows if it wasn't for just such a moment that you became queen?) This eloquent plea underscores Esther's role, urging her to recognize the pivotal nature of her position in the broader context of history.

These words resonate in our ears. We often feel that we are living within an oppressive atmosphere that casts a shadow over all that we do. We feel as if there is nothing we can do. The interconnected challenges of global politics, the war we as Jews are fighting on all fronts, economic disparities, and global crises contribute to an overwhelming sense of uncertainty and vulnerability. Israel is currently engaged in a struggle for its existential survival, coinciding with a surge in global antisemitism. Economic inequality deepens, amplifying the struggles of marginalized communities and fostering a sense of disenchantment. Environmental

crises, exacerbated by human activities, add another layer of apprehension as the planet faces unprecedented threats. The digital age, while offering unprecedented connectivity, also introduces new dimensions of isolation and despondency. The list seems interminable, brimming with seemingly insurmountable challenges.

There is a pervasive weariness. You can see it in each other's eyes as we greet one another. The acute pain felt on October 7 and in the immediate days that followed has turned into a chronic condition. It is a pain we have learned to 'live with' on top of the pressures that we were already managing.

Yet, the Jewish people are resilient. We are, by our nature, optimistic. Our traditions teach us how to overcome hopelessness. In addition to the tool of faith, which can feel amorphous and sometimes challenging, we are given concrete instructions on how to battle the oppression we feel as the world burns around us. No place is this clearer than in the instructions that come as we complete the Book of Esther.

At Purim, we are obligated to fulfill four mitzvot, the most well-known being מקרא מגילה – Mikrah Megillah, reading of the Megillah. Recounting the story then, as now, helps us to 'never forget', not simply to recount those atrocities that have befallen us, because we are irrepressible. There are, in addition, three other mitzvot: משלוח מנות איש לרעהו – Mishloah Manot Ish l'Re-ehu, an act of goodwill involving the sending of treats to friends and neighbors; מתנות לאביונים Matanot l'evyonim, the benevolent act of bestowing gifts upon the less fortunate; and the culminating celebration, משתה ושמחה – Mishteh v'Simcha, the Se'udat Purim, a festive gathering that involves the communal sharing of a Purim feast with cherished individuals in our lives. Each of these forces us out of our protective shell, our barriers of isolation either literal or figurative, and brings us in connection with our community.

Mordechai's words resonate today for each of us as they did for Esther. 'מָי יּוֹדְּעֵׁ אַמּר־לְּצָּחֹת -Mi yodea im la'et kazot?' Who knows if it wasn't for this exact moment that you were put on this planet? It is our responsibility to step up and act. Purim reminds us of the necessity of being in a supportive community, a vital network of understanding and shared experiences. Participating in communal life,

sharing a meal, giving to others even as we ourselves feel less than whole, serves as a balm for the soul, offering solace and companionship during challenging times. Amid a world in turmoil, the bonds forged within a community act as a powerful antidote to depression, lifting individuals out of despair through shared connection, empathy, and a collective journey toward healing.

After everything that happened if you are still able to hear the blackbird the lark that chirps in the morning and the nightingale and the sunbird do not be surprised that joy is to see clouds carried by the wind to drink the morning coffee, to know how to fulfill all the needs of the body To walk the paths without a cane and to see the fiery colors after sunset. As a country often stricken with grief, Purim is an island of joy that is sacred to us as a nation. Most renowned is *Adloyada*—a festive colorful procession that fills the streets with art exhibits, spectacular costumes, and cheerful chants.

Traditionally, Adloyada is celebrated

mainly in Tel Aviv and the neighboring city of Holon. This year, however, Davidson Theatre is aspiring to organize the first *Adloyada* to take place on Shushan Purim, celebrated on the 15th of Adar in ancient walled cities, including the city of Jerusalem.

The Train Theater is a children's puppet theater that fosters creative freedom and professional artist excellence. The theater is unique in Israel's children's theater scene, and it is a leader in its industry.

It began with a train car being transported to Jerusalem's Liberty Bell Park. The train car was transformed into a locomotive, which served as a key creative force and source of inspiration for Israeli puppet theater. The theater is heavily involved in the community, allocating a considerable percentage of its resources to community programs in a variety of areas, including special education communities.

Jerusalem's first *Adloyada* will shine a light on the little heroes who are in the lives of all of us, our children and girls, who face these times of war and escalation with bravery and resilience. The theatre hopes to create cherished childhood memories amid all the challenges and grief, in the heart of Israel's capital.

Considering the war, preparations for the holiday remain quiet. I am curious to see whether this upcoming Purim will be a celebration of life, and how it may adapt to our new reality.

Purim itself is a celebration around the idea of redemption—defeating the evil that threatened to exterminate the Jews at a faraway point in history. Celebrating Purim this year reminds us to focus on the idea that our nation is eternal, enduring history's unsuccessful attempts to exterminate us. And we will endure again, and great joy will envelop us.

As we like to say in Israel, Am Hanetzach Lo Mefached MiDerech Aruka, "The Eternal Nation is not afraid of the long journey." Purim Sameah!

Purim is coming. Here are a few fun facts about Purim:

Librarian

- Did you know that Purim is a Persian word meaning "lots." The holiday aka the feast of Lots got its name because the evil Haman had thrown lots to determine when he would conduct his diabolical scheme to kill the jews.
- Purim is the jolliest day of the year on the Hebrew Calendar.
- The Book of Esther was handwritten on parchment per Esther's request. This scroll, called the Megillah, is read every year on Purim.
- There are four Purim mitzvahs—the reading of the Megillah; Giving money to at least two poor people; sending Shalach Manot ("sending of portions") baskets with two or more types of food and having a Purim feast (a Seudat Purim), where, according to the sages "a person is obligated to drink until he does not know the difference between 'blessed is Mordechai and cursed is Haman."
- It is customary to observe the "fast of Esther" the day before Purim to commemorate Esther's fasting and praying to God that He save His people.
- Hamantaschen (meaning Haman's pocket) and meat-filled kreplach, both having three corners, are foods that are eaten at the Seudat Purim.
- Purim is always a month and a day before Passover.
- Joseph Stalin of the U.S.S.R. had bloody plans for dealing with the "Jewish problem" but in 1953. as things were reaching a crisis point, he suddenly fell ill on Purim and died shortly thereafter.

 In 1990, Saddam Hussein of Iraq invaded Kuwait and also began firing SCUD missiles into Israel. After the U.S.-led forces attacked Iraq, they were quickly victorious, and the hostilities ended . . . on Purim!



Service to B'nai Israel & Community Strengthening Jewish Values

By the time you read this, Men's Club Shabbat will be over and we will have award our third annual Shamash Award to Dr. Stuart Lessans and Alan Lipschultz.

Dr. Lessans was honored for his support of children's education. His personal involvement and support for children's education carries our values and principles to the world for generations to come. His generosity to the synagogue is also recognized as the B'nai Talmud Torah bears his name.

Mr. Lipschultz is an active member of the Social Action Committee. He routinely provides an item or two for the monthly delivery of meals to a shelter, and volunteers to deliver the meals. He also is quick to volunteer to usher at Shabbat services, sometimes more than once a month, and to help out at other synagogue.

The award was the brainchild of Men's Club member David Sotsky to recognize the congregant or congregants for the work they have done within the synagogue or the surrounding community. They light the way to *tikkun olam*, the way the *shamash* lights the Hanukkah menorah.

Thank you to David and his committee, comprised of Men's Club members Leon Pomerance and David Streeter, and Craig Strent, a member of the Social Action Committee and a previous recipient of the Shamash Award.

Besides its main task of recommending the winners to the full Men's Club membership, the committee also serves the club as a way to try to get more members. The outgoing president of the National Press Club got her start by serving on a committee to award scholarships to journalism students, and it is our hope that the members of the Shamash Award Committee, who change from year to year, will play a more active role in the Men's Club in future years.

February also was the annual World Wide Wrap, where we joined men's clubs across

the country in highlighting the *mitzvah* of putting on *tefillin*.

In January, we held what will be one of our most important programs of the year. The Hamas attack on Israel and the Jewish state's attempt to fight back has led to an explosion of antisemitism. College students and others are vandalizing monuments and disrupting events while chanting the Hamas slogan calling for the eradication of the State of Israel.

Our speaker was Alan Ronkin, regional director of the American Jewish Committee, who talked about the rise in antisemitism. He has spoken here before, but never under these circumstances.

There are certain things that we as a Men's Club are uniquely qualified to do at times like this, and one of them is to highlight the difficulties we face as Jews and raise awareness by using our forum to discuss the problem.

Looking ahead, we are offering two chances to tour the Smithsonian American History Museum, on both Monday, March 4 and Thursday, March 14, with B'nai member Sylvia Rosenthal, a museum docent. She will highlight the museum's Jewish connections.

And our third annual Day at the Ballpark will take place on Sunday, May 5, against the Toronto Blue Jays. Game time is 1:35 PM. The Men's Club will pay half the ticket cost, meaning you pay just \$35 and get a \$25 food and beverage credit. Register on our website.

I've shared several articles over the years about Hayman Chapel, and some notable plaques. But have you popped by Hayman Chapel lately? Have you noticed that people are just "dying to get in there," as Cantor Josh often jokes? After filling up Board D, the board in the back next to the glass doors, we needed more space in Hayman Chapel for memorial plaques. Enter our new memorial boards, which I have designated the Q and R boards. (Each memorial board is labeled with a letter, but they are not in alphabetical order. There is a directory available in the chapel to help you find a plaque—current count is 2,199!) Our new boards were custom made and can each hold 172 memorial plaques. I estimate we sell about forty plaques a year, so in eight more years we will have to find more room.
