RABBI'S MESSAGE by RABBI MITCHELL BERKOWITZ

One of the first things that people notice at B'nai Israel is the sheer size of our building and its operations: the building seems to go on forever in all directions, and there is so much going on each and every day. What is less often recognized, however, are the incredible efforts made by our volunteers and lay leaders who partner closely with staff and clergy to make B'nai Israel the incredible home for Jewish life that it is today. In the coming weeks, we will honor and recognize the people who make B'nai Israel the synagogue we are all proud to call home.

Beginning with Hazak Shabbat back on December 23, B'nai Israel hosts annually a series of special Shabbatot in which we honor and celebrate the various segments of our congregation and all that they do to sustain our community. We will celebrate Teen Shabbat, Social Action and Social Justice Shabbat, Men's Club Shabbat, Refugee Shabbat, Sisterhood Shabbat, Repro Shabbat, Inclusion Shabbat, and Volunteer Shabbat. (Read page 8 to learn more about each of these special Shabbatot.)

One could look at this list and ask, "How about we just have a Shabbat-themed Shabbat?" After all, each Shabbat is already infused with meaning from the weekly Torah reading, the *haftaroth*, the festival calendar, and the many s'mahot that we celebrate each week at B'nai Israel. But these specially designated Shabbatot give us an opportunity to celebrate individuals who are not always sufficiently recognized, and to proudly affirm our values as a synagogue community.

For example, Jewish Disabilities Awareness, Acceptance, and Inclusion Month wasestablished in 2009 by the Jewish Special Education International Consortium. For decades already, our congregation has been at the forefront of inclusion efforts not only for people with physical disabilities but also for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities. This sacred work is part of the fabric of our congregation. We are always trying to enhance our efforts by identifying new areas of need and working to fill any gaps in our approaches. Celebrating Inclusion Shabbat gives us an opportunity to recognize those who are most involved with these efforts, and showcase some of the advancements we have made in inclusion efforts this year.

One of those advancements is the installation of the RightHear system. B'nai Israel is the first synagogue in North America to offer this assistive technology, which transforms spaces into accessible environments for people with low-vision or orientation challenges. Small beacons are placed throughout the building, and they interact with a free application that anyone can download on their phones to better navigate our building. I hope that you will give it a try, and that it will enable those with low-vision or orientation challenges to better navigate around B'nai Israel.

All of our upcoming special Shabbatot provides us with an opportunity to demonstrate gratitude to our volunteers, affirm our values as Conservative Jews, and celebrate the achievements of our congregation. I hope that you will join us for these celebrations, that you will find meaningful ways to connect with the work of these committees and affiliates, and that you will help us to continue building this sacred community for many years to come.

EARLY CHILDHOOD

"Make a bubble with your breath. Breathe in, and breathe out, rounding out your arms like this." And another yoga class at BISNS begins. Lilach Cohen-Holden, owner of



"ShalOMaste," is our nursery school's yoga teacher. Lilach is originally from Israel and moved to Maryland in 2011 with her family.

Lilach infuses Jewish values into each of her sessions. "I invite the children to use their imagination to tell a story with their body and expand their Hebrew vocabulary and learn universal values such as friendship, listening, respect, kindness. By practicing yoga, children improve their social-emotional development, flexibility, strength, coordination, balance, selfesteem, concentration, release tension, learn to follow directions and collaborate while using their imagination. Yoga storytelling also strengthens preliteracy skills."

Lilach focuses on a different intention each week. Recently, the focus was on what it means to be brave. She read the book, "The Lion in Me," which was a story about a mouse who discovers that even the smallest creatures can have the heart of a lion.

Lilach's yoga sessions are differentiated by age level, with the two's exploring sounds and practicing yoga poses that make us feel strong and brave, such as Warrior, Tree,

and Airplane, while adding breath to our movement.



The three's and four's classes shared what we do when we feel scared and what we do to calm down, such as taking deep breaths, counting to five, giving ourselves space from others, and getting a grownup to help. We also practiced yoga poses that made us feel brave and played a yoga game with movement and songs. All the sessions end with Savasana and sharing the message, "Peace begins with me."



These past two weeks, Lilach has been teaching the children about Hanukkah in a creative and engaging way, and about the value of courage and being thoughtful to others. She began the lesson by ringing a chime and passing around a "breathing ball," then practiced "latke breath." She asked the children, "What do you know about Hanukkah?" The children shared what they love most about Hanukkah, then practiced Hanukkah poses of Sufganiot (jelly donuts), Levivot (latkes), Candles and Dreidels. They read, "Simon and the Bear," acting out scenes with yoga poses and discussing ways we can be brave and thoughtful of others. They learned to dance to Hanukkah songs with scarves.

Our yoga program enriches our children's curriculum experience here at BISNS, and Lilach has deepened the practice through her knowledge of Judaism and Hebrew. We look forward to the meaningful lessons that Lilach has planned for us in the weeks and months ahead.

As our days grew shorter and winter set in, the importance and symbolism of light during a time of increased darkness became evident. In December, the tiny lights on our Hanukkah menorahs took on a profound significance, and its impact felt outsized this year. Our journey through these past few months was marked by the exceptional ability of our Talmud Torah teachers, students, staff, and parents to be beacons of light for our school community and beyond. Students of all ages proved their power to bring sparks of joy, learning, and caring to others.

Joy permeated our classrooms as students participated in learning activities and games. Laughter rang out in classrooms as the students jumped into activities and showcased their knowledge of Hebrew language, Judaic studies, and Israel. Students grappled with increasingly complex texts and concepts, and they shared their ideas in lively discussions with their classmates.

Our community grew closer over the past few months as we fostered connections within our school and with others here and in Israel. Talmud Torah students learned with Uriel Lin, our shlicha (emissary) from Israel, exploring different facets of Israel's geography, people, art, and pop culture. With guidance from their teachers, Uriel, and our art specialist, Nechama Fellner, students demonstrated their commitment to supporting Israel through age-appropriate activities, discussions, and collaborative projects.

As an integral part of our *Mitzvot* & Values curriculum, students focused on mitzvot (good deeds) and shared values. Beginning in kindergarten, students learned to be a mensch (good person) and care for those closest to them. As the grades progressed, their focus expanded to helping others in our community and beyond.

On Mitzvah Day, students participated in projects that demonstrated care for others. From creating snack bags for immigrant children to crafting "no-sew" blankets for medical centers and Healing Arts Kits for Israeli trauma survivors, our students embodied the spirit of caring. A special thank you goes out to the Talmud Torah Education Committee, Diana Mayer, Lexi Robbins, and Morgan Muchnick for their guidance and assistance.

Talmud Torah has been illuminated by the collective efforts of our community to be sources of joy, learning, and caring. After 53 days in captivity, Gili's sister was released, and the moment the news broke, tears of relief and joy streamed down my cheeks —a testament to the profound impact hope can have in the darkest of times.



As a community, let us draw strength from Gili's journey and the stories of resilience echoing globally. In our shared pursuit of hope, we find the collective power to overcome adversity, bridge divides, and build a world where compassion, understanding, and unity prevail.





Service to B'nai Israel & Community **Strengthening Jewish Values**

With incidents of antisemitism rising since the Hamas attack against Israel, we are very pleased to present a special program with Alan Ronkin, regional director of the American Jewish Committee, on Sunday, January 28. The program begins at 7:30 PM. and dessert will be served. His topic will be Antisemitism in All of Its Manifestations.

Ronkin last spoke at B'nai Israel in November 2022 on the state of antisemitism in America, and the problem has gotten worse since then.

From October 7 to November 7, the first month after Hamas' attack on Israel, antisemitic incidents in the U.S. rose by 316%, from 200 in during the same period in 2022 to 832 this year, according to the Anti-Defamation League.

Earlier in January, Jay Silberg, a lawyer and expert in the nuclear industry field will appear at a breakfast event beginning after minyan at 10:00 AM Sunday, January 7. Silberg will discuss the prospects of a deal between the U.S. and Saudi Arabia that will give the kingdom access to nuclear power while putting an end to hostilities with Israel. Some experts say the reason Hamas attacked Israel at this time was to try to kill the prospect of such an agreement.

Rabbi Mitch Berkowitz will lead our next Jews and Brews, scheduled for 7:30 PM Thursday, January 18, at the Lakewood Country Club. He can expect some questions about Israel, just as Rabbi Safra did when he spoke at the last Jews and Brews in November. Unlike most of our programs, Jews and Brews are reserved for men only.

On Saturday, February 3, we will mark Men's Club Shabbat. Members of the club will help lead services. We'll also hand out our third annual Shamash Award, given to the congregant or congregants who go beyond the call of duty to help the synagogue or community.


