

Talmud Torah 2nd Grade (Bet) Curriculum Guide

Hebrew & Tefillah

In *Kitah Bet* (Second Grade), students focus on the foundations of Hebrew reading and *tefillah* (prayer). Students will learn the Hebrew alphabet, the sounds each letter represents, and vowel sounds. They will use this knowledge to begin decoding the letter/vowel combinations that form written words. Students build on their knowledge of Hebrew vocabulary and increase their ability to listen, understand, and respond to spoken Hebrew through the *Hebrew Through Movement* curriculum. In addition, students learn key Hebrew words connected to prayer, Jewish holidays, and daily activities. Each student actively participates in Hebrew *tefillah*, and they will add to their knowledge of prayers and keywords as the year progresses.

Hebrew & Tefillah Goals and Objectives

Each student will:

- Read and write Hebrew letters and vowels and decode letter/vowel combinations through games and activities.
- Understand select words and phrases in spoken Hebrew.
- Learn Shabbat morning prayers and melodies by taking part in an age-appropriate weekly service led by our music teacher and clergy.
- Recite selected Shabbat blessings and blessings over food.

Judaics

Our Judaics curriculum, the Beverly Goldstick Curriculum for 21st Century Jewish Learning, is based on the principles of knowledge, flexibility, diversity, and community.
