

Talmud Torah 6th Grade (Vav) Curriculum Guide

In *Kitah Vav* (Sixth Grade), students increasingly take ownership of their learning by partnering with teachers and clergy to deepen their knowledge and understanding as they begin their transition from students to active participants and leaders of the Jewish community.

Hebrew

At the beginning of the year, students review all the prayers they have learned, and teachers assess students' Hebrew knowledge. Students are assessed regularly in order to target learning and document student progress throughout the year. In addition, new prayers will be introduced with a focus on finding the *Kavanah* (meaning) of each new prayer while learning how to read and chant them accurately. As the year progresses, they complete their study of *tefillot* (prayers) by mastering the Torah service, Aliyah blessings, Haftarah blessings, and they develop their ability to write and present a D'var Torah. As students progress in learning prayers, we encourage them to take part in our tefillah-based Gold Kippah program which follows the framework the prayers teach. Regular attendance of classes at Talmud Torah is critical to the advancement of your child's Hebrew. Engaging in Class Dojo and Enrichment Opportunities as provided by teachers, attending Shabbat services and practicing prayers and rituals at home will further strengthen your child's fluency and ability to recite prayers.

Hebrew & Tefillah Goals & Objectives

Each student will complete a thorough refresher in the fall and by the end of the school year be able to:

- Read with improved fluency and accuracy
- Gain increased familiarity and knowledge of prayers learned in earlier grades
- Read and chant new prayers with proficiency
- Identify a connection between the *Kavanah* and *Avodah*, the meaning and the prayer
- Enrich their Torah service Hebrew prayer vocabulary
- Mastery of Torah Trope

- Engage in the study of *Contemporary Jewish Life* with a focus on components of B'nai Mitzvah, Jewish wedding ceremonies, and the *mitzvot* of divorce.
- Experience the modern land of *Israel* by studying prayer, music, and celebrations through the lens of Israeli Pop culture.
- Delve into the learning of *History* with a focus on American Jewish history.
- Develop a rich, personal relationship with *Prayer, God,* and *Spirituality* through learning and discussion.
