One of the more surprising parts of Seder Nashim, dealing with Jewish family life and practice, is Messechet Nadarim which teaches about making vows and promises. Part of the discussion in the Mishnah and Gemara is how we understand a person's words: Do we take them at face value, i.e. literally, or do we judge them based on the colloquial meaning?

It begs the question of us – how often do we say things that we don't mean? And how often do we say things that aren't meant to be taken literally?

Today we'll explore the words that we use, what we mean, and what they might actually mean.
