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## IPM statement

It is the goal of Shalom School to implement IPM by focusing on long-term prevention or suppression of pests through accurate pest identification, by frequent monitoring for pest presence, by applying appropriate action levels, and by making the habitat less conducive to pests using sanitation and mechanical and physical controls. Pesticides that are effective will be used in a manner that minimizes risks to people, property, and the environment, and only after other options have been shown ineffective.

Our pest management objectives are to focus on long-term pest prevention and rid the school of ongoing pest problems.

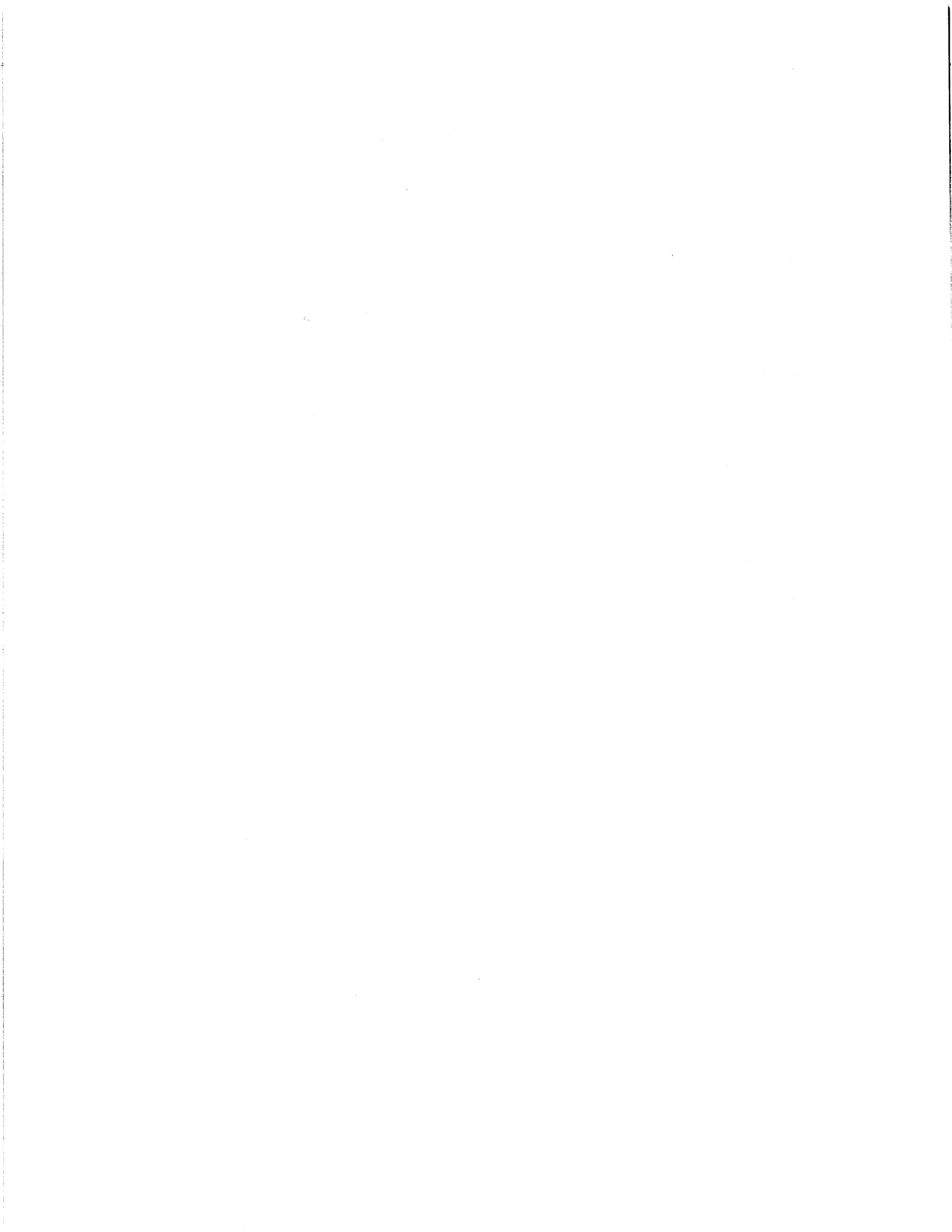

This school has identified the following pests and routinely uses the following non-chemical practices to prevent pests from reaching the action level:

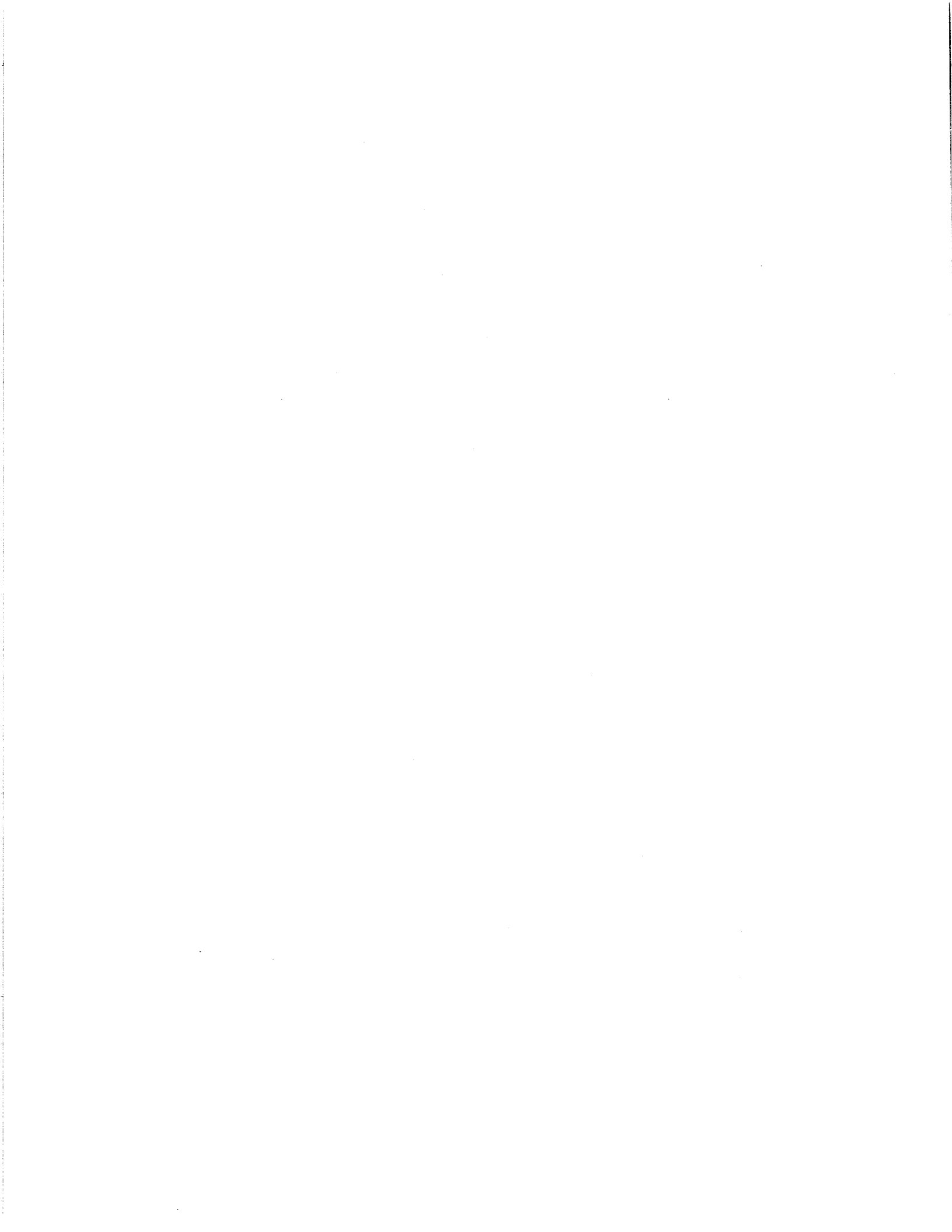

## Chemical pest management practices

If non-chemical methods are ineffective, the school will consider pesticides only after careful monitoring indicates that they are needed according to pre-established action levels and will use pesticides that pose the least possible hazard and are effective in a manner that minimizes risks to people, property and the environment.

This school expects the following pesticides (pesticide products and active ingredients) to be applied during the year. (This list includes pesticides that will be applied by staff or licensed pest control businesses.):

Name of Pesticide (Common Name)	Active Ingredient(s)
Orange Guard Inc.	d-Limonene
Monterey Ant Control	Iron phosphate, spinosad
Avenger Weed Killer	d-Limonene, castor oil, emulsifiers
Roundup Weed Killer	Glyphosate, isopropylamine salt

- ✓ Reports of all pesticides applied by center staff during the calendar year, except pesticides exempt from HAS recordkeeping, are submitted to the Department of Pesticide Regulation at least annually, by January 30 of the following year, using the form provided at [www.cdpr.ca.gov/schoolipm](http://www.cdpr.ca.gov/schoolipm). (Education Code Section 16711)
