Criminal Justice and Reproductive Rights Working Groups

Criminal Justice

- Purpose: education and advocacy on criminal justice rooted in core Jewish values
 of Tzedek, Tikkun olam, T'shuvah, Rachamim, and B'tzelem Elohim
- **Guiding principles:** work in concert with community organizations to reduce the harm inflicted by our criminal legal system; seek more effective and just alternatives that address the root causes of crime and increase public safety for everyone
- Activities in first 4 months:
 - Co-sponsored <u>Town Hall</u> with the with the Alameda County District Attorney along with <u>Interfaith Coalition for Justice in our Jails</u> and <u>Faith in Action East</u> <u>Bay</u>.
 - Alerted congregants of opportunities for advocacy on <u>state legislation</u> through the Temple eNews and the Social Action email list

Reproductive Rights Group

- Held Repro Shabbat in February 2023, plan to repeat in February 2024
- 50+ at Yom Kippur Forum about Reproductive Rights in the Post-Roe Era
- Encouraging text banking and postcard writing through the RAC for elections where access to reproductive care is on the ballot (especially Ohio in 2023)

Temple Sinai David Pregerson Preschool Presented by Molly Peritore, Interim Director of Early Childhood Education

Misson:

The preschool is committed to creating loving relationships among children, family and staff. Our respect and honor (*Kavod*) of each individual forms the foundation for our inclusive community (*Kehillah*). We believe that children learn through play. Teachers support the exploration, engagement, and interactions that are the foundation of children's learning. Core Jewish values provide the framework for our teaching and learning.

- -Enrollment of 87 students and 17 teachers
- -Change in enrollment to fit the needs of our community. Increased two-year-old enrollment to 42 students vs. 28 last year
- -Creating more opportunities for families to build community
- -Changes to staffing structures to adjust to turnover in the field

Temple Sinai – Other Financial Highlights

- \$2.75mm Cash Balance ending 6/30 (prior year \$2.4mm)
- \$2.9mm Endowment at JCF (up 15% from prior year)
- \$2.0mm Mortgage balance (of \$3.3mm)

Budget Highlights:

- Membership goal: 861 families, increased by 10 families from prior year
- Expenses generally projected at 3-5% increase over prior
- Budget adopted at \$89k cash deficit

\$1.3 million left to get started on projects before capital campaign



Capital Needs Where We Started (in the previous episode)

January 2020: We started assessing capital needs prepandemic

Objective: Meeting all our building's major capital needs by our 150th anniversary in 2025

Priorities (as presented at last annual meeting)

Priority #1 – continuing safe operation of our 108year-old building

Focus on the Sanctuary

HVAC/electrical systems

Roof

Stained glass windows

Initial assessments except roof were completed

Options were being presented to CNTF for evaluation and recommendation

Spring 2022 ... then reality intervened ...a leak in the Sanctuary dome occurred

Capital Needs Next Projects


Next Sanctuary needs

- New HVAC (heat pump) system recommended to replace gas fired boiler
 - In addition to heating, heat pump will provide air conditioning
 - Still have questions to be answered, including details on cost and design
 - Current estimate is that system cost will be approximately \$1.5M
 - Electrical upgrade will be needed for this system --application in process with PG&E
- Stained glass windows at side of Sanctuary
- Roof repairs
- Review seismic status --- benefit v. cost
- Upgrade Stern Hall interior, to include kitchen and bathrooms, to meet current needs

Priority #1 became repairing the Dome Leak in 2022


Completed on budget at \$1.6M in time for the High Holy Days

The Capital Campaign


We will launch the quiet phase in Spring 2024.

Working goal: \$15 million, which is equal to what we raised 13 years ago through Im Tirzu and later via Yesod.

About half of this will go to improvements to the Sanctuary, Stern Hall, the Kitchen, and the Bathrooms.

The other half will go to our endowment.

We would like to add another 60 life and Legacy Members.

Temple Sinai's People of the Book Literacy Project

After some complicated years in Oakland Schools, there are new principals at our partner schools, and other changes as well, We have worked at communicating with staff to support their efforts and provide tutoring, books and other projects to the staff and students.

Some of our dedicated tutors have returned to work with students at Greenleaf School. Most had been working online these past years so their work now is greatly appreciated. They provide literacy support to many students, some even having worked with students over the summer break.

We are grateful for our dedicated outreach coordinator Rodolfo Perez and his team at Greenleaf who work hard to reach out to families in need and support our volunteers.

We have donated beautiful books to Bella Vista Elementary school to add to their school library and allow students to take home books for their home libraries. We also donate board books to St. Mary's Preschool and Habitot that serve low-income families.

From Greenleaf School

We provided a \$5,000 grant to to Oakland Literacy Coalition's (OLC) **Elaine Wells Books Kids Want to Read grant program**, which helps OUSD libraries stay current by putting brand new, diverse, books into school libraries. From the OLC: "Thank you to all of our donors, and special thanks to the People of the Book program at Temple Sinai, for their support this year. These grants will get brand new, shelf-ready books into the hands of thousands of students this fall."

Although we are not able to accept donations of books at Temple, funds to purchase beautiful books and supply library grants are still needed to support our project.
