

### **Rabbinic Reflections**

When I meet new people, one of the first questions they invariably ask is why I decided to become a rabbi. The truth, of course, is that when we look behind us we see numerous paths leading us to the one we are currently walking along. When I search along paths previously followed in my own life, I discover many moments, experi-

ences, thoughts and dreams that led me to make the path of the rabbinate my own.

Of all of these, however, one of the strongest "reasons" I recognize as pulling me towards this path is my desire to help others through difficult moments in their lives. As far back as I can remember, I would sit with friends as they talked with me about their issues. In my work as a volunteer firefighter and EMT, and later on as a chaplain with Hospice in New York, I always found myself inspired by the love I most often witnessed amidst tragedy and loss. If I could, in some small way, guide others to sense this love as well, I would certainly feel myself fulfilled.

It has been an incredible blessing to be invited into the lives of so many members of our community. I thank you all for this and wish only to be able to help in some small way when you find yourself in need. In fact, I would imagine that having a rabbi for just these purposes is itself one of the many reasons that have led you to Beth Sholom.

If you ever find yourself in a place where you need somebody to talk to, help you think through your situation, or try and make meaning out of what can appear to be the chaos of real life, please reach out. There have been numerous occasions when I have found out, via a third party, that so-and-so had surgery or has cancer or lost a loved one or lost a job, etc. Our shared tradition recognizes no spiritual difference between me and you; rabbis have no more access to God than anybody else and I can only know about a problem if you reach out to me.

The nine-and-a-half years that I have so far been privileged to serve this wonderful community have been incredibly rewarding, personally and professionally, in so many ways. But it is without a doubt the personal experiences into which I have been invited that are undoubtedly the most meaningful.

Please know that I am always here.

# Message from the President

Dear Beth Sholom Community,

Over the last year we've made tremendous strides in emerging from the pandemic. We've opened up in-person services, returned to in-person Religious School, held in-person adult classes, and had successful, in-person High Holidays in the fall

And, over the last few months, we've made progress in what we hope is the last piece to returning to a pre-pandemic way of life - programming. In December, we held our first Chanukah party since the pandemic began, and followed that up in January with an important program addressing anti-semitism in our community and in our schools. Both were well-attended, and showed the strength of our community even after so much time apart.

Over the next few months we are keeping the momentum going, including a New Members' Weekend in February to welcome members who have joined Beth Sholom since the beginning of the pandemic, and our first post-pandemic Purim Carnival in March.

These events, and the excellent attendance at them, have been a reminder of what a vital part programming plays as we grow as a community, and engage with existing and new members alike. I am so thankful to the many volunteers who have helped make these programs a reality. However, we have reached a point where continuing to rely on volunteers is not a long-term solution for maintaining this level of activity.

As such, the board has discussed the benefit of hiring a **Programming and Engagement Coordinator** to help continue to provide programming for members of all ages. This will be a new, parttime, hourly position that will grow as programming grows. The Coordinator will be working with families, the Religious School, various board committees, current staff, and volunteers to develop and run a programming calendar that gives you many opportunities to come and engage with Beth Sholom and grow our sense of community. While we will be posting this job publicly, if you or someone you know are interested, please contact me or Rob.

With the increased activity at Beth Sholom, I also want to remind you that there are many ways to donate. Donating covers our costs for programming and makes it possible for our members and families who have less disposable income to participate in congregational activities. While our total donations are at about the same level as in past years, many donations are going towards our new Endowment Fund (thank you!) as well as other funds. Therefore, we have received much less direct supplemental support towards our main operating ("General") fund which covers our day-to-day expenses.

There are many reasons to donate to Beth Sholom's General Fund throughout the year. A donation may be made to celebrate life events such as birthdays, engagements, weddings, anniversaries, Bar/Bat Mitzvahs, and the birth of a child. Donations can also be made to honor someone's memory. Your donations help to ensure Beth Sholom continues to provide a welcoming and inclusive presence in the community. Lastly, we are seeking new ways to make sure all congregants are in the loop about everything Beth Sholom. We are looking into texting options to supplement email, social media, and the Bulletin. Stay tuned!

I feel so blessed to have been able to work with you all during these past 3-years of pandemic, and as we emerge to realize that our community truly is strong and resilient. This is all very exciting, and I look forward to seeing everyone more often.

### From the Executive Director - Feb. Shabbat Dates in History

#### February 4 / 13 Shevat

While the concept of Sunday schools in America got off the ground in 1790, it took almost another 50 years for the first Jewish Sunday school to come into being. And, on **February 4**, **1838**, America's first Jewish Sunday school opened in Philadelphia through the efforts of a dedicated group of Philadelphia Jewish women, under the leadership of Jewish philan-

thropist Rebecca Gratz (pictured). With their devotion to the cause

of religion and education, these women founded the Hebrew Sunday School Society of Philadelphia (HSSS), in the belief that all Jewish children should receive basic religious instruction and education, regardless of financial standing or synagogue affiliation. Gratz believed that Jewish education needed to include three fundamental things; hear-



ing the word of God, learning the commandments and receiving instruction in how to observe Judaism. HSSS went on to become part of an increasingly strong network of cultural, spiritual, and social organizations built by and for Jews in the Philadelphia area. Gratz served as HSSS President until she turned 80.

#### February 11 / 20 Shevat



There has probably been no musical phenomenon in my lifetime larger than The Beatles, and it was on February 11, 1964, that the group held its first live concert right in our area, at the Coliseum in Washington, DC. And the Jewish connection? Contrary to popular

belief, it's not the myth that Beatles' drummer Ringo Starr is Jewish (because he ISN'T). But as the group rose to legendary musical fame, it became clear that much of their success was due to their Jewish manager, Brian Epstein, with whom I just happen to share cousins in common. In the above picture, he's the one standing between Ringo and John. Epstein was one of the most well-known managers in the history of pop music and was involved with many aspects of The Beatles' career in the mid-1960s, from booking tour dates to launching their careers as movie stars. However, The Beatles found they didn't really require his talents quite so much after they stopped touring in 1966. Epstein became lonely and started abusing alcohol and drugs. He died of a drug overdose in 1967 at age 33, three months following the release of the Beatles' album, Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band. The Beatles would continue releasing music until 1970, years after Epstein's death. However, by John's own admission, Epstein's death sowed the seeds of The Beatles' eventual breakup in April of that year.

#### February 18 / 27 Shevat

It was 5:30 pm on February 18, 1969, when Israel's El Al Airlines flight 432 was lined up on a snowy Zurich runway, about to take off for Tel Aviv. Suddenly, two armed Palestinian militants jumped out of a VW car parked near a fence



on the outskirts of the runway (pictured above), and fired an automatic weapon at the plane's flight deck. The pilot was shot in the stomach and died several weeks later in a Zurich hospital, and six passengers were injured. After the shots rang out, an armed Israeli security officer who was on board the plane jumped off, climbed over the fence and shot and killed one of four militants. The Swiss government, not wanting to be involved in any acts of terrorism on Swiss soil, arrested the Israeli officer and all of the Palestinian attackers. In December of 1969, the three remaining Palestinians were given 12-year sentences and the Israeli security officer was acquitted, but the event would result in a long-lasting effect on future Swiss foreign policy in the middle east.

#### February 25 / 4 Adar



In a historic display of support for Jews and defiance of Nazism during World War II, a general strike took place in the city of Amsterdam in the German-occupied Netherlands on February 25, 1941. Organized by the outlawed Communist Party of the Netherlands, it was considered to be Europe's first public protest against the Nazis and the only mass protest against the deportation of Jews to be organized by non-Jews. The strike lasted for two days, and by its second day, more

than 300,000 Amsterdam citizens had joined it, including tram drivers, school workers and other city service employees, bringing Amsterdam to a virtual standstill. German police were caught completely off guard by the strike and took harsh measures to suppress it, which they managed to do after three intense days. Although the strike was ultimately unsuccessful in its effort to quell the actions of the Nazi's, the fact that it was the first of its kind and the scale of it made it noteworthy. The strike is commemorated in Amsterdam every year on February 25th with a march past the De Dokwerker memorial statue (pictured above) made for the strike in 1951 and first unveiled in December 1952.


