It [Torah] is not in heaven...but its word is very close to you: In your mouth and in your heart.

(Deuteronomy 30:12-14)

Shavuot is that time during which we celebrate *matan Torah*, or God's giving of the Torah to the Jewish people at Mt. Sinai. The Torah, as our tradition understands it, is not merely a written text which relays the stories of our ancestors and provides a legal framework for engaging with society and the world around us. The rabbis of old describe God looking into the Torah prior to creating the world in the same way an architect builds a structure only after studying its blueprint. The Torah offers a window into the very foundation of Creation itself; a glimpse into the depths of wisdom and understanding that can be made available to us if we choose to observe.

Of course, wisdom and understanding cannot exist independent of the human mind. It is our search for meaning that provides context to our world and it is at the intersection between understanding and meaning where wisdom can be found. And so it is amongst humanity that Torah, which serves as a bridge between all three, must reside. For this reason it was given over to the Jewish people who were subsequently tasked with shining its light throughout the world.

Torah is not simply an object like an instruction manual which we are meant to read and apply, but it is very much a living document; it is a subject with which we are to enter into a relationship. As with any relationship, both parties must necessarily experience change and development as a result of the relational experience.

This is precisely the message that has consistently been taught by the rabbis throughout Jewish history when they tell us that though the Torah was given once, it must be received anew in every generation. Each generation must look into the Torah with its own eyes, from the context of its own world and extract from it meaning and understanding. The wisdom which results will be speak differently to each generation and will add new layers to the tapestry of Torah.

What therefore is *our* Torah? How is the timelessness of the Torah being filtered through the lens of the 21st century within which we reside?

One way we can answer this question is to encounter the Torah emanating from the hearts of our movement's most gifted rabbis and scholars. Conservative Judaism is an approach to Jewish living which was born out of and is reflective of the modern experience and therefore offers a unique voice into the Torah of our generation.

This Shavuot we will spend our annual Tikkun Leil Shavuot engaging with some of the more recent attempts to discern how Torah is best reflected within the issues of our time. Through this we will achieve a renewed appreciation for how the Torah speaks to us in our unique day and age.

I look forward to joining together at 8pm on May 25th in receiving Torah anew this Shavuot.

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From the Executive Director - May Shabbat Dates in History

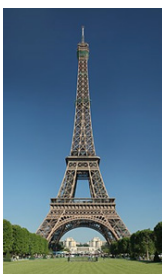

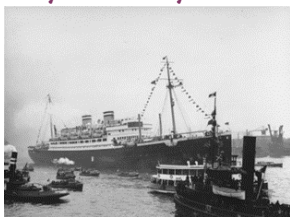
May 6 / 15 Iyar

As one of the world's most iconic structures, the public got its first up-close look at the Eiffel Tower on **May 6, 1889**, as it served as the entrance arch to the World's Fair in Paris which opened on that date. What is not necessarily widely known is that Alexandre Gustave Eiffel, who engineered the tower and whose company designed and built it, was Jewish.

Eiffel was born in France to Jewish parents who emigrated from Germany at the beginning of the 19th century. The family adopted the name Eiffel (changed from Bonickhausen) as a reference to the Eiffel mountains in the region of Germany from which they had come. Gustave spent his childhood living with his grandmother, and after earning degrees in humanities and science, ultimately entered one of France's most prestigious engineering colleges. It took just over two years to construct the Eiffel Tower and until 1930, was the world's tallest man-made structure. As one of the most visited attractions in the world, it is estimated that more than 302,848,000 (including ME!) have climbed the tower since its opening day.



May 13 / 22 Iyar



On **May 13, 1939**, the German liner SS St. Louis departed Hamburg for Cuba with 937 Jewish refugees on board. After arriving in Havana, the passengers learned that the Cuban government had canceled their landing permits. When negotia-

tions with the Cuban government by the American Jewish Joint Distribution, acting on behalf of the passengers, failed, the ship was forced by Cuba to leave the harbor. With the lights of Florida in the distance as the ship sailed past, the US government did not allow the doomed passengers to land without US immigration visas and security screening. The St. Louis was forced to return to Europe, arriving in June of 1939. Ultimately, a number of passengers were admitted into Great Britain, France, Belgium and the Netherlands, with some passengers able to obtain immigration visas and leave for the United States before the German invasion of western Europe the following May. But, 254 passengers unfortunately lost their lives in the Holocaust. This tragic episode in Jewish history was portrayed in the book and film, "Voyage of the Damned."

May 20 / 29 Iyar

This "riveting" event took place on **May 20, 1873**, when Jewish dry goods businessman Levi Strauss and his business partner, Jacob Davis, received the patent to begin marketing their work pants with copper rivets. The rivets were added to strengthen the pants and improve fastening the pocket openings, with the end result being the creation of what we now know as "blue jeans." Strauss was born to a Jewish family in Buttenheim, Bavaria, and came

to the United States with his mother and two sisters when he was 18. He joined his brothers, who had arrived in the US some years earlier, in their wholesale dry goods business in New York. The family eventually decided to open a West Coast branch of their business in San Francisco during the California Gold Rush, calling the new business Levi Strauss & Company. During his lifetime in California, Strauss helped establish the first Jewish synagogue in San Francisco, Congregation Emanu-El, and started the Levi Strauss Foundation at the University of California at Berkeley, which, among other causes, provides scholarships each year to 28 students. By the way, the red Levi's tab came along in 1936.



May 27 / 7 Sivan



I'm either stuck on four subjects this month (things made of steel, construction, San Francisco and the name Strauss), or it's a strange coincidence, but it was on **May 27, 1937**, that the

world-famous Golden Gate Bridge opened to the public after four years of construction, linking the San Francisco Peninsula to Marin County and points north. The chief designer and engineer of the Golden Gate was Jewish engineer and architect Joseph Baerman Strauss (no relation to Levi), born in Cincinnati to German-Jewish parents. His mother was a pianist and his father was a writer and painter. Strauss had many hobbies, including a passion for poetry, but it was during a hospital stay, when his hospital room overlooked Cincinnati's Roebling Suspension Bridge, that his interest in bridges was sparked. The Golden Gate carries 6 lanes of traffic (US Highway 101) spanning 1.7 miles and is considered a California Historical Landmark. It was always one of my favorite drives when I lived in San Francisco, despite the expense. As a former San Franciscan, I have a couple of personal ties to the bridge, not including the many times I drove across it in the days when it didn't cost almost \$9.00 like it does now. One of my uncles used to direct traffic on the Golden Gate when he was in the Marines, and I have another relative who is unfortunately one of the 1800 people who ended their lives by jumping off (35 people have survived!).

Summer is just around the corner, bringing warmer and longer days, more sunshine, the occasional rain showers and in my house, lots of talk about baseball. As the school year winds down, Beth Sholom's Religious School is also preparing for its final month of classes and end-of-year celebrations. We invite you to join us for our last Religious School Shabbat on Friday, May 5th at 7

pm. And mark your calendars for our end-of-the-year celebration on Friday, May 26th, when we will honor our teachers and families for a wonderful year while also celebrating Shavuot, which begins the previous evening.

Shavuot commemorates the receiving of the Torah by the Israelites on Mt. Sinai and the beginning of the agricultural season. Although there are no specific requirements or symbols for Shavuot, there are two customs that are easy to incorporate into your family's celebration: dairy and study.

Let's start with study. It is a tradition to attend a Tikkun Leil Shavuot, where one stays up all night on Erev Shavuot studying Torah.

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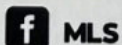
