

about the cover:

Rosh Chodesh



(Beginning of the Month; literally Head of the Month) is the name for the first day of every month in the Hebrew calendar, marked by the birth of a new moon.

Female-centered *Rosh Chodesh* observances are centered on small gatherings of women, where there is often a particular interest in the *Shekinah*, considered by the *kabbalah* to be a feminine aspect of God. These groups engage programs that center around issues important to Jewish women, exploring spirituality, religious education, ritual, health issues, music, history, art, etc.

<u>Miriam's Cup</u> (for the prophet Miriam) originated in the 1980s in a Boston *Rosh Chodesh* group. It was invented by Stephanie Loo, who filled it with mayim hayim (living waters) and used it in a feminist ceremony of guided meditation. Some seders (including the original Women's Seder, but not limited to women-only seders) now set Miriam's Cup as well as the traditional cup for the prophet Elijah. Miriam's cup is linked to Miriam's well, which "is a rabbinic legend that tells of a miraculous well that accompanied the Israelites during their 40 years in the desert at the Exodus from Egypt".

Despite the existence of a fixed calendar, *Rosh Chodesh* is still announced in synagogues on the preceding Shabbat (blessing the new month). The announcement is made after the reading of the Torah, before returning it to the ark in a prayer beginning "May it be Your will... that You renew this month for us for good and for blessing". The name of the new month, and the day of the week on which it falls, is given during the prayer. Some synagogues precede the prayer by an announcement of the exact date and time of the new moon. **Rosh Chodesh Tishrei** (which is also **Rosh Hashana**) is never announced.

FROM YOUR CLERGY



Cantor David Berger retells a classic Talmudic story, writing:

"Elijah the prophet felt conflicted about his job that day. He just knew that it would not go well, so he tried everything to get away from it. 'It's been 12 years',

said God, 'Genug! (enough!) We have to tell him he can come out'. Elijah disagreed. Bar Yochai made him nervous. So much power in such a temperamental vessel was just dangerous. Still, maybe God was right. Twelve years in a cave is a long time and maybe people really can change. Or maybe not.

Shimon ben Yochai, or just "Bar Yochai" as most people called him, could not hold his peace. Whatever came to him – a curse or a blessing – he would just say it. He had no filter and that got him in trouble. One day he opened his big mouth to rail against the Romans and (surprise, surprise), they sentenced him to death. He may not have known when to keep his mouth shut, but he did know when to run, and run he did, into that cave.

Bar Yochai and his son had been praying and learning there, alone, for 12 years. Since they were fed by a miraculous carob tree and a spring of water, Elijah thought they ought to be physically healthy. But he wondered, what was he walking into? He decided to not go into the cave at all. Instead, he pretended to be walking by and got just close enough to the cave's entrance to say in his best stage whisper, 'Who's going to tell Bar Yocḥai that the emperor died and his decree has been nullified'? And that worked – well, it sort of worked.

Bar Yochai and his son did come out, but those 12 years had done nothing to soften the Sage's foul temper. Seeing men working in the fields, he so was furious that they had abandoned Torah study that fire shot from his eyes and burned everything he saw. God cried out, 'If you go on like this there will be no world left! Get back to your cave!' And back they went. Elijah wanted to shout out "' told you so!" but thought better of it and kept silent.

A year passed – a vastly different year from the 12 that had preceded it. This time there were no Romans chasing him; his life was no longer at risk. What had been shelter started to feel like jail. Bar Yochai understood that de-isolating was not as easy as just walking out of the cave. He needed to change himself first

The day came to try again, and this time Elijah just refused to get involved. God had to do it God-self.

'Emerge from your cave' boomed the Divine Voice, and emerge they did. Everyone was nervous – was Bar Yochai different? Would he need to go back again?

At first, he tried to find a sense of equilibrium. His son still went around destroying things, but Bar Yochai followed and repaired the damage. Then, Bar Yochai stopped long enough to really look at people. He saw an old man preparing for Shabbat and putting in extra effort to make it beautiful. Seeing the care that man took for the sake of Shabbat, Bar Yochai calmed his troubled mind. Still difficult and ornery, nevertheless, Bar Yochai, the destroyer, became Bar Yochai, the illuminator, a man whose brilliance would light the way for generations to come."

There is so much to learn from Bar Yochai, his journey teaches us lessons that are important for living a meaningful life. This year though, as I read Cantor Berger's telling of this ancient story, it occurred to me that our tradition has actually taught us about the difficulty of coming out of isolation. In this story, we watch as the cave, his home, moves from feeling like a sanctuary to feeling like a prison. And, we watch how we can look at the world around us and choose to see everything that is wrong instead of everything that's right and improved. The story reminds us that sometimes when we emerge into the world too soon, we need to return to our safe places. We learn not to try again until some time has passed and the world, along with ourselves, has changed.

What does this mean in June of 2020? As I write this, and our nation begins to ease our requirements for isolation, I cannot predict if June will find more freedom or a surge in new cases of Covid-19and a return to our quarantine. I wonder if you'll be reading this happily thinking back on how the worst of it has passed, or if you'll be right in the middle of the worst you've seen. What I do know is that Bar Yochai teaches us to move carefully.

The story reminds us that remerging too quickly can be dangerous to those we encounter. So while we have begun the process of creating a committee to look at all the CDC requirements and local advisories and begin to plan for our return to physical gatherings, we are not moving too quickly. We are taking great care to evaluate when and how we will gather again. While I know it is certain that we will ultimately come together again, this Talmudic story reminds me we need to move slowly.

As I sit down on May 1 to write my June *Tablet* article, I am amazed how the world has changed in the past 6 months. In December 2019, I had the fantastic experience of celebrating Shabbat with 5000 people at the URJ Biennial in

Chicago. The *ruach* in the huge room was unbelievable; it was a most memorable experience. Tonight's Shabbat service will be in the comfort of my home, streamed on YouTube on our tv. I am so grateful that Rabbi Kahn and Chazzan Abramson have managed to keep us all connected for our ritual services on multiple platforms. They have both done an outstanding job. Yes, it has been a learning curve for which we had no preparation; certainly there were many challenges along the way. Whether it's on Facebook, YouTube, Zoom, or our new website, we can still join together virtually as a community and pray together.

As I prepare this article, it is not known when we will be together as a congregation in our beautiful sanctuary. We will most likely be together virtually for Shavuot, confirmation, Shabbat, and yizkor in May. The safety of everyone is our number one concern. I am sure you miss everyone as do I and look forward to being together again in person as a community.

Thank goodness for the technology that keeps our Temple Sinai family united in prayer, study, song, and education. Stay safe and have a good summer.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



T'FILAT HADEREKH – PRAYER FOR YOUR JOURNEY

The Eternal One shall guard your going and coming from now and forever. (Psalm 121:8)

May it be Your will, our God, and the God of our ancestors, that You lead

us in peace and help us reach our destination safely, joyfully, and peacefully.

May you protect us on our leaving and on our return, and rescue us from any harm, and may you bless the work of our hands, and may our deeds merit honor for You.

Perhaps you are familiar with the prayer above – the "Traveler's Prayer". The likely reality is that even as you read this, there is little travel for most of us. So why start off my very first *Tablet* article as President with this prayer? This prayer resonates with me as I step into this fearfully awesome role when we are all experiencing the other worldly impact of a pandemic. Nothing has prepared us for this journey into uncharted territory. We have few answers to the questions that swirl around us – in our heads, in our responses to our children, in planning for next week or next month or even next year.

We are definitely on a journey. And, although sometimes it may be ideal to travel alone, being alone right now is far less appealing. Social distancing is strange. It prevents us from much of the familiar: hugging a friend, playing with our grandchildren, sharing a Shabbat dinner with a glass of wine and family or friends, and, of course, gathering to welcome Shabbat at Temple Sinai. Yes, we have Zoom. It surprises me how many of us have come to accept this new way of interacting as normal. But we do. Why? Because we need each other. Because social distancing is not normal. Because we still need and want to be connected. We need the nourishment that relationships provide us.

We were not prepared properly for this journey. We had not packed our bags with resources - physical, technological, mental - to face the many challenges of COVID-19. **Zoom** is now a household word as are **Facebook** and **YouTube**. The *Tablet* is now a timely digital version even more alive with bright and clear messages and photos. We created Sinai Virtual Connections, a weekly newsletter with the latest in programming for the Gan, the Religious School, Youth group, Torah Study, Clergy Coffee Talk, Shabbat services, Music classes and so much

more. We have even added a beautiful Havdallah service to bid goodbye to Shabbat and shavua tov to the new week. All these offerings were created out of the need and desire to connect us to our Temple Sinai community. We have traveled into the unknown and we continue to monitor and assess what we need to do to keep us all safe and yet together.

Our new website and the introduction of ShulCloud with its new member portal could not have been planned with better timing! I hope that you have logged into your member account, uploaded a Directory picture, updated your personal information, if needed, and see how easy it is to enroll in religious school, order Shabbat in a Box, pay outstanding balances, make a donation, and more.

Most importantly, I want to reassure you that Temple Sinai is doing everything possible to address the safety and security of our members and our staff. If you pass by the temple, you will notice that our hurricane shutters are in place to provide further protection against any type of intrusion. Although the building is closed for all events and meetings, Tina and Marian are working in the office and there is one custodian on duty each day. Adam and Liz work in the kitchen to prepare *Shabbat in a Box* meals. We are adhering to CDC Guidelines to sanitize the facility and to maintain social distancing for the few people who must enter the building.

When... you are now thinking, when will we be back in the building all together. The answer is we simply do not know. Like you, we wait and watch for guidance from the CDC and for Governor DeSantis' orders...and we closely monitor and assess the situation "on the ground". An Advisory Council for the Re-opening of Temple Sinai, composed of members with responsibilities for the facility administration, is being charged with making recommendations to the Clergy, President Elect Alan Chalfin and myself on the phased-in re-opening of the temple. They will be meeting weekly; you will know as soon as any decisions are made.

Last, but not least, are the many questions about the High Holy Days. Will the Clergy be in the Sanctuary? Will we be able to attend these services in the Sanctuary? The answer is we we simply do not know. I can assure you that our Clergy and Ritual Committee have been exploring options to ensure that each of us will feel embraced and connected during these holy days.

BOARD BRIEFS

The Temple Sinai Board of Trustees meeting was held on **April 15**, **2020** via Zoom teleconference. President Gary Kravitz was pleased to announce that Temple Sinai has received \$213,000 from the Federal Paycheck Protection Program. This payment will enable the synagogue to hire back 100% of the staff at full pay and pay for health insurance benefits for eight weeks. Thank you to Herb Krasow for his help and assistance with our application.

The finalized version of the 2020-2021 budget was presented and approved by the board. Due to the current circumstances and the uncertain financial picture going forward, the budget will need to be closely monitored and revised as needed.

The board approved a change to the Standing Rules increasing the minimum donation required for acknowledgment to the recipient and publication in the Tablet. The amount was revised from \$6.00 to \$9.00.

The board also approved the following diversity inclusion statement as an introductory values statement to the Standing Rules:

"Today we are all Jews by Choice, regardless of how we were raised. We welcome Jews from all backgrounds and denominations, singles and families, Jews of all races, cultures, and sexual orientations, as well as interfaith families. Our Temple Sinai congregation includes the voices and faces of Jews, families and friends of all backgrounds and from all places: geographically, emotionally, politically and spiritually. We embrace our diversity in experience, opinion and level of observance, yet come together in study, prayer, work, and community engagement. We welcome the participation of all our members and encourage their involvement in our many congregational activities."

The annual meeting will be held on May 3 at 11 a.m. via Zoom teleconference. The Vice Presidents will give brief yearly overview reports. A quorum of 8% of the membership in attendance is required by

Description: Day camp for children ages 2-5 years old can enjoy fun filled days of music and movement, stories, outdoor play, experiments, discovery with their peers all in the theme of Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math (STEAM).

In order to have fun, CDC guidelines have been instituted to ensure safety for everyone:

Parent/Guardian will be required to sign a Release of Liability/Waiver Form as provided in our camp forms.

- **★** Teacher's temperatures and symptoms will be screened upon arrival. Teachers will be required to wear a mask during the camp day.
- * Camper Drop-off will be conducted in the school car loop. Campers will be screened with a questionnaire to the parent regarding symptoms and exposure, as well as, forehead touchless temperature taken before entering the school. Parents will not be entering the building unless there is an emergency.
- ▶ Guidelines state that there cannot be more than 10 people in a group. Therefore, there will be no more than 9 children with one teacher in each group. We will, of course, continue with our teacher/student ratios also. It also states that there cannot be mixing of groups or teachers with groups. So, children will not be regrouped for aftercare, enrichments, Shabbat, Havdallah or any other large grouping. Our children remain in their own rooms for snack and lunch, so we will not have to change any cafeteria grouping. The children will bring their own food from home, so there will not be any sharing or communal feeding.
- * As always, the children and staff will wash hands upon entering the classroom, before eating, after play-ground, and throughout the day as needed. Children are taught and encouraged to use a paper towel to turn off the faucet after washing with soap and water and singing the ABC's.
- **★** To avoid mixing of groups, each class will have their own playground time. The age groups of 3-5 year olds will have a second visit to the playground for those staying after 1:00. Again, no mixing of groups.
- * Cleaning procedures will include a morning wipe down of each classroom including door handles and other "high touch" spots. All plush toys will be removed from rooms. Teachers will monitor children as to when to remind to wash their hands and when to remove toys that may have been "mouthed." Between class visits to the playground, the custodian on duty will wipe down the equipment. Throughout the day, trash will be emptied by custodial staff. Teachers will wipe down all tables before and after eating and creating projects, as always. Custodial staff will thoroughly clean each room after dismissal every day.
- * Camper pick-up will take place in the car loop with parents remaining outside the school doors in their vehicles.

So, let's make memories this summer. If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to reach out. Temple Sinai wants your child's summer to be filled with love, light and happiness.
