#### about the cover:

Tisha B'Av, the ninth day of the Hebrew month of Av. begins Wednesday. July 29. It marks the destruction of both of Jerusalem's holy temples in 423 BCE and 70 CE. In 1313 BCE, as noted in the Torah, the spies returned from a mission to the Promised Land on the ninth of Av to report that the land "consumes its inhabitants." On this same day. The Bar Kochba revolt against the Romans in 133 ended in defeat. Also, in 1290, England's Jews were expelled, and in 1492, Jews were banished from Spain. Numerous other tragedies have occurred on Tisha B'Av including the mass deportation from the Warsaw Ghetto, which began on July 23, 1942.

Coincidence or not, this day looms large in Jewish history. Traditionally, Jews give charity and spend much of the day in deep contemplation. These days, we have a lot to contemplate, and Tisha B'Av is an opportunity to slow down and remove oneself from popular culture and the ever-persistent news cycle.

Relax. Breathe deeply and slowly. Try to let go of the meaningless things you've been carrying around. Think about the sanctity of life, family, and what is important to you. While it may not change your life, it could be a reminder that we do not control everything and that we live amid an infinite universe that is more than just our thoughts. Perhaps you can reach a point where you understand that there are not always answers to everything, and that the only thing you can control is your actions.

# **BOARD BRIEFS**

The Temple Sinai Board of Trustees meeting was held on May 13, 2020 via Zoom teleconference. Incoming President Ellyn Bender opened the meeting by welcoming the new board members, and thanking the board members who have finished their term. The Rabbi and Chazzan shared their busy workday activities. The synagogue is still going full steam ahead working for our congregation and community. Clergy, staff, teachers, lay leaders, and congregants are getting great work accomplished. There is a lot to be proud of at Temple Sinai.

Ellyn thanked the Board for their support and input. She is looking forward to working with the new Board. There will be some difficult decisions ahead due to the unexpected Coronavirus situation and its ramifications. A Budget and Finance Committee has been re-established to look at finances as they develop on an ongoing basis. An Advisory Council has also been appointed to look at all the issues involved with re-opening the synagogue. The Council had its first meeting and will discuss how to phase in, and plan for, the re-opening.

The board reported that efforts to reduce the outstanding amount owed for the Building Maintenance fund have been successful. To date, 25 households have responded and either paid their outstanding amount or reduced the amount owed.

The security bill of \$150.00 per household for this year will shortly be sent out to members. Temple Sinai's ongoing security is of primary importance. Due to a loan from the Federal Payroll Protection Plan, employee health insurance payments have been continued through May. Gary Kravitz will be overseeing utilization and tracking of funds received from the Payroll Protection Program. On April 16<sup>th</sup>, Temple Sinai received \$213,000 from this program to be used in an eight-week window for allowed expenses such as payroll, mortgage and utilities. The loan money will pay for expenses through June 11<sup>th</sup>.

Ellyn reported that to date there are 235 households who have not logged on to ShulCloud. The board discussed ways to encourage members to utilize the new system. The board would just like to remind everyone that ShulCloud is a tool that makes it simpler to pay dues, yahrzeit notices, event registrations, and much more. There was a question as to the security of congregants using their checking accounts on ShulCloud for financial transactions. It was explained that the checking account and credit card information is not stored on

Temple Sinai or ShulCloud servers. The information goes to a separate Gateway system serving many other online and in store businesses.

Ellyn reported that the congregation is donating ten Shabbat-in-a-Box meals each week to Jewish Family and Child Services for needy families. We expect to increase that number to 20.

It is important to remember that we may be physically distant but that we need to work on remaining socially connected.

# FROM YOUR CLERGY



This is the perfect time to consider the difficult task of stepping back from a situation, pausing and taking a breath and to consider taking action when Jewish values are at the very center of the events of the day.

As we begin the long, hot summer, we need moral, ethical and practical strategy to help solve problems rather than to become part of them. I must preface this with a mindset that has kept the Jewish People thriving through good times and bad, and most of all, change.

Dr. Rabbi Michael Murmur, a rabbinic scholar, lecturer and Provost at Hebrew Union College came up with a profound conclusion about change: "The most traditional thing a Jew can do is change". Our very prayer book is a result of a crisis. When the second temple was destroyed and we were exiled to Babylonia, the decision to use words as a service to god, rather than the sacrifice of animals and grain came from the elders and students in the study academies of *Tzura* and *Pampadita*. This was a change of enormous proportion for its time and is an example of how we survive.

I ask each of you to examine the question of how do we adapt to these difficult times without giving up the very character of who we are? Whether we are talking about dealing with the Covid Virus or civil rights, our tradition (yes, the one that says change is how we survive) gives us some practical insight.

Rabbi Jonathan Sacks, the former Chief Rabbi of Great Brittan, speaks about leadership at the time of the Torah: "Rulers often had absolute power of life and death over their subjects. Not only were kings and pharaohs heads of state, they also held the highest religious rank as children of the gods or demigods themselves. Their power had nothing to do with the consent of the governed... Not just kings but all of us, regardless of color, culture, creed or class, are in the image and likeness of God. In the Torah, God summons His special people, Israel, to take the first steps to what might eventually become a truly egalitarian society – or to put it more precisely, a society in which dignity, *kavod*, does not depend on power or wealth or an accident of birth."

What does this mean for us today? Rabbi Sacks' commentary is not a political one; it is a Jewish one. In speaking with many of you in these last many months, I have come to realize that for us, the biblical king that Rabbi Sacks refers to is not a person; it is *fear*. No matter what side of the fence you live on, fear has begun to affect us and is beginning to take

the life out of our life and the *kavod* out of our souls. What do we do now?

Rabbi Moffic writes in *Building Bridges/Deepening Faith* that "Judaism has the idea of *sacred argument*. We best discern God's truth when we discuss it from different perspectives. This idea can make some uncomfortable. Shouldn't God's truth be clear and easy to discern? Well, life is complicated, as is leadership. The answers aren't always clear. We need to invite different voices into our conversations.

And so, we must learn to agree to disagree about all that we fear.. It is a good and important first step to regaining the hope that has kept us alive for generations. During times of duress, we often lose sight of what our ultimate goal is as a community of committed Jews.

Whether we are talking about the necessity of wearing masks or the deaths of people whose lives ended unjustly, the overarching principle, that needs to guide us all is *Pikuach nefesh*, saving a life. This is the paramount Jewish value. For the sake of saving a life, we are instructed to do anything necessary, even to break Shabbat. It has been said that when we save one life, we save the world. That may very well be our road to *Tikkun Olam*, one life at a time.

Some of you may be asking yourself why our cantor is addressing such large non-musical issues. The answer is simple. There are many kinds of harmony, and there are many kinds of music. All of it is derived from the juxtaposition of sound and silence. Right now, that balance is off, and I know that we can bring things back into balance soon.

I miss you all and look forward to seeing your faces in person so we can sing a new song together.

website by clicking on the circular rainbow icon on our home page.

Look closely at these seven tenets of Judaism. Do they not apply to all human beings and our interactions with each other?

As I write this, we are feeling deeply the anger and unrest of the Black Lives Matter movement. Are the issues that LGBTQ people suffer under the same as black people? As brown people? As other ethnic and racial minorities? No, of course not. Injustice and bias spreads itself across the spectrum of humanity in particularly singular ways, targeting each group with a special brand of prejudice. And as Jews, we know this as well as anyone.

Yet, we all have something in common – we all suffer from these divides, these cruelties, these injustices. It seems so obvious to me that these seven values, so clearly and beautifully delineated by Keshet, would and should and could heal these divides. We need to take these tenets to heart - remind ourselves daily that individually and collectively, we have the power to fight prejudice and hate.

As members of our Temple Sinai community, we can be proud of our efforts to be inclusive and diverse. Let us continue our efforts to fight racial and ethnic injustice, and to wear these seven values on our sleeves, pulling at these sleeves when we hesitate or falter in our in pursuit of any one of them.

# Seven Jewish Values Guidelines for inclusive Jewish community

# Respect

Judaism teaches us to treat ourselves and others with respect; even the stranger is to be treated with respect. Kavod is a feeling of regard for the rights, dignity, feelings, wishes, and abilities of others. Teasing and name-calling disrespect and hurt everyone, so learn to respect people's differences.

#### shalom Bayit: Peace in the Home

Our community centers, synagogues, youth groups, and camps are often our second homes. Everyone needs to feel comfortable, safe, and respected at home. Don't ostracize those who seem different. Strive to settle disagreements in peaceful and respectful ways that allow all community members to maintain their dignity.

#### tzelem Elohim: In God's Image

The Torah tells us that we are all created "b'Tzelem Elohim" (Bereshit 1:26), in the image of God. This is a simple and profound idea that should guide our interactions with all people. If we see each person as created in the image of God, we can see humanity and dignity in all people. True inclusion is built upon this foundation.

#### ol Yisrael Arevim Zeh Bazeh: Communal Responsibility

#### כל ישראל ערבים זה בזה

The Jewish principle that "All Israel is responsible for one another" (Shavuot 39a) means each of us must take action and inspire others to create a community in which we can all take pride.

#### Sh'mirat Halashon: Guarding One's Use of Language

The Talmud warns us that we must take care in how we use language. Talking about others behind their backs, even if what we are saying is true, is prohibited. The guidelines for "sh'mirat halashon" remind us that what we say about others affects them in ways we can never predict. Words can hurt or heal depending on how we use them.

#### V'ahavta L'reiacha Kamocha: Love your neighbor as yourself

Commenting on Leviticus 19:18, "Love your neighbor as yourself," Rabbi Hillel once stated that this is the foundational value of the Torah. It begins with loving ourselves. We must love and accept our whole selves, and in doing so create the capacity for extending that love and acceptance to others.

#### A Tifrosh Min Hatsibur: Solidarity

#### אל תפרוש מן הציבור

"Don't separate yourself from the community" (Pirke Avot 2:5). When you feel different from others in your community, don't isolate yourself. Find allies and supporters who you can talk to. If you know someone who is feeling isolated, reach out; be an ally and a friend.

# RITUAL



During the past 5 months, we have not had the opportunity to join together in our beautiful sanctuary. In this Covid world, we are joining virtually for services, and are still able to have a beautiful and meaningful worship experience.

This has been a new and exciting challenge for our clergy and our congregation. In the past few months, Rabbi Kahn and Chazzan Abramson have introduced us to the online **Visual T'filah for Mishkan T'filah**. According to the CCAR, Visual T'filah is "a way to enhance prayer and help worshippers find a new or deeper meaning in prayers."

Before I attended the URJ Biennial in Chicago this past December, I was very skeptical about **Visual T'filah**. I had heard a presentation about it several years before, and it just didn't excite or interest me. Then I attended Shabbat services at the Biennial with 5000 people. I can remember sitting in the huge auditorium, barely being able to see the bimah, and thinking, how will I ever participate in this Shabbat service. There were no prayer books distributed. Then I got to see **Visual T'filah** at its finest, projected on massive screens that enabled all 5000 of us to see the prayers and have an amazing worship experience.

The CCAR goes on to say, "It utilizes contemporary technology such as projectors and screens to display liturgy for the community with art and other visual imagery. Visual T'filah is more than just a 'power point service', it draws forth elements from Jewish history and traditions such as art and visual awe in worship spaces, as well as liturgical creativity and dynamic prayer." It can also be used as a creative teaching tool in our school and other activities. Students (both children and adults) can see the prayer projected before they learn and study it in books.

So, while we are apart, we can enjoy **Visual T'filah for the Mishkan T'filah** online. Once we can gather again in person, we are fortunate to have many brand new *Mishkan T'filah* and *Mishkan HaNefesh* prayer books from a very generous donation from one of our congregants. We are also exploring using Visual T'filah for our services in the sanctuary too. While nothing will ever replace having a prayer book in your hands, we are fortunate that we have an alternative in these social distancing times.

#### **High Holy Day Update**

Many of you have been asking what the plans are for our upcoming High Holy Day services. Please be assured that the clergy, ritual committee, and Board of Directors have been working endlessly to ensure that we will continue to have a beautiful and meaningful experience. Right now, all signs are leaning towards having our services virtually. We will make sure that the services are easily accessible to our members and guests. Even though we cannot be together physically, technology has made it possible for us to have a wonderful spiritual experience as we welcome in the New Year.

We are exploring being able to gather together for Tashlich, since this is an outdoor ritual that can be done in an open area. Because of the nature of Covid 19, we are unable at this point to give a definite location for Tashlich. We are also exploring having a "Break Fast in a Box" that will be offered to our members. Another change is the Book of Remembrance will be produced online. Please look out for the letter with instructions on how to participate in this new and enhanced publication to honor our loved ones that we have lost. Letters will be mailed the beginning of August.

We will keep you updated once everything is set. Look for the High Holy Day edition of the *Tablet* which will be published the end of August. It will contain everything you need to know about all of our services to welcome in the year 5781.
