COMMUNITY

BUILDING relationships, serving the congregation and effecting positive social change are deeply rooted values of our community.

Our Social Action Committee seeks to be a force for good in the wider community, while our Caring Committee comforts individuals who are ailing or bereaved. Our *Chavurot* bring people of similar interests into friendship groups. The Men's Bagel Club meets monthly to strengthen the bonds of fellowship, while our active seniors participate in all manner of activities.

Volunteering opportunities, both within the congregation and in the community, abound.

LEARNING

SHOMREI TORAH offers learning opportunities for everyone. Babies & Bagels is for parents with their youngest ones. Pre-schoolers meet monthly for *Tot Shabbat* and KIDdish. STaRS, grades K-7, builds Jewish identity by exploring Jewish culture, history, ritual and tradition.

Chaverim challenges middle and high school students to apply Jewish values and teachings to everyday situations.

Lifelong Learning presents a variety of authors, scholars, activists and artists in a lively mix of educational and entertainment programs.

Members also participate in Torah study, adult *B'nei Mitzvah*, Hebrew language instruction, chanting meditation and more.



BABYSITTING

Free Babysitting for Children

FREE BABYSITTING is now available for our Friday night Shabbat services, Saturday morning services when there is a b'nei mitzvah, and other events throughout the year. Childcare costs are underwritten by a generous grant from the Jewish Community Federation San Francisco Jewish Women's Fund. The grant is especially designed to help single mothers integrate into the Jewish community and to greatly enrich our Jewish community. Be sure to check with the office about babysitting availability at the events you plan to attend.

RABBI'S TISCH

2ND FRIDAY OF EVERY Month at 6:15 PM

On the second Friday of each month, join your CST family for a Rabbi's *Tisch* (table) in lieu of regular Friday night *Shabbat* services. All *Tisches* take place at 6:15 PM and include a brief service (including *Mi'Shebeirach* and *Kaddish*), communal dinner and program.

SHOMREI TORAH'S approach to worship combines a deep respect for tradition with a progressive sensibility. Weekly Shabbat services and holy day observances are accessible to those with little formal Jewish experience while satisfying those who seek a more traditional worship experience.

BABY NAMING



WE ARE ELATED to help welcome a new child into your family, our congregational family and the family of the Jewish people! We understand that every family is unique; our rabbis will meet with you to understand your needs, then will create a Jewish ritual to celebrate your new baby. Whether it is a brit milah (circumcision, also known as a bris) or a simchat bat (baby naming for a girl), we will celebrate with you in the synagogue at a Shabbat service or in your home.

HOUSE WARMING

CELEBRATE YOUR NEW HOME with a Chanukat HaBayit (literally, dedication of the house). During this brief ceremony, we will help you to affix a mezuzah to your front door (you can purchase one in our gift shop). It is traditional to fill your new home with blessings, warmth and holiness, so invite family and friends to join you in this lovely ritual. Talk to one of our rabbis about how to make this a meaningful experience.

PROGRAMS FOR CHILDREN AND FAMILIES

Babies and Bagels

It takes a village to raise a child, or in our case, a tribe! Babies and Bagels is a FREE program open to the entire Jewish community that meets once a month, usually on a Sunday morning, in a private home. Meet with other parents for a light nosh and refreshing adult conversation, while children interact with others in their age group. Tot Shabbat

Tot Shabbat is an informal, child-centered Shabbat Service designed

especially for babies, toddlers and preschool children. Everyone is welcome at our free services and programs: members and non-members, Jewish and non-Jewish, partners and spouses.

TÖT , shabbat

Tot *Shabbat* features a kid-friendly service, lively music and movement, exciting stories, art activities and open play. Tot *Shabbat* typically happens on the second Friday of the month at 5:00pm, check the website or call the office for details.

KIDdish 2-5 Year Olds

Welcome to KIDdish, an introduction to Religious School for all Pre-K children 2-5 years old. This is a preschool class where children can meet new friends and build Jewish relationships that can last a lifetime. Classes include hands-on art activi-



ties, spirited movement and music playground time and fun Jewish learning. This program is open to the entire Jewish community. \$180 for the year. Registration form available on the website.

STaRS Religious School K-6th Grade

Shomrei Torah Religious School (STaRS) is a nurturing, joyful and hands-on Jewish education pro-



gram for children in grades K-6. Teachers and staff are committed to each child's experience. From art projects and games, to cooking and dancing, students have the opportunity to study and learn using multiple modalities. More information and registration forms are on the CST website.





JuSTY 3rd-5th Grade

Third, fourth and fifth graders are invited to join Junior Shomrei Torah Youth (JuSTY), a social youth group that allows younger students to have fun together in a Jewish setting.

miniSHORTY 6th-8th Grade



Sixth, seventh

and eighth graders are invited to join miniSHORTY, CST's chapter of NFTY-678, the Reform Movement's junior youth network of middle school-aged kids. This social group allows members to enjoy Jewish life in a whole new way and attend Camp Newman events where their community can grow.

GESHER 7th Grade



GESHER (Bridge) takes the place of our traditional 7th grade religious school. The program's exciting speakers and engaging activities encourage youth to explore their own thoughts and opinions as they progress towards Jewish adulthood. Seventh graders participate in field trips, overnights and a Camp Newman retreat during the year.



B'NEI MITZUAH TRAINING PROGRAM

B'nei Mitzvah Training Program

The time of a child's coming of age is one of the most meaningful experiences in a family's Jewish life. During this program, children begin the process of becoming Jewish adults and developing their own relationships with our ancient tradition. CST has structured our training program to ensure each child an engaging and spiritual learning experience. During the *B'nei Mitzvah* training, children receive one-on-one tutoring and work directly with a rabbi.

The culminating service is a liminal moment along the way, rather than an end-point. Our process is successful if it instills a desire to continue with education and involvement in Jewish community into adulthood. CST students are extremely successful and feel a deep sense of pride and accomplishment.

POST B'NEI MITZUAH PROGRAMS

SHoRTY 9th –12th Grade

Shomrei Torah's Reform Temple Youth Group (SHoRTY), part of the North American Federation of Temple Youth (NFTY), the Reform Movement's national teen group. SHORTY is open to all 9th-12th graders to enrich their connection to Judaism, socialize with other Jewish teens, attend local and regional events and enhance their leadership skills. NFTY strives to provide meaningful and engaging youth experiences for teens and fosters leadership at the national, regional and congregational level.

Madrichim Program 8th – 12th Grade

Shomrei Torah's Madrichim Program welcomes 8th-12th graders into our religious school to serve as Jewish role models. Madrichim serve as teaching assistants in STaRS classrooms, sharing their passions, knowledge and positive energy while assisting in the overall process of the religious school day. Madrichim learn skills vital to becoming Jewish educators in the future.

L'Taken 9th – 12th Grade

Are you ready to change the world? Every year, nearly 2,000 high school-aged students participate in the Religious Action Center's *L'Taken* Seminar in Washington, D.C. The program is designed to expose students to a variety of public policy issues, explore the Jewish values surrounding these issues and teach the skills of an effective advocacy. Throughout the weekend, participants gain the knowledge and tools to write an effective, persuasive and passionate speech on a topic of their choice to present to the offices of their senators and representatives during the trip. At the same time, students meet and mingle with hundreds of Reform Jews from across the United States, all of whom are in D.C. for the same reason—to pursue *tikkun olam*.

The group will also take advantage of the opportunities available in our nation's capital by visiting the National Holocaust Memorial Museum, the Smithsonian National Mall and celebrating *Havdallah*



at the Jefferson Memorial. CST sends the majority of our high school students on this program. It is a transformational experience for our teens to connect Judaism to Social Justice. Contact Rabbi Kramer for more information. Space is limited.

Jewish LA Teen Trip 7th, 8th, and 9th Graders

Discover Jewish Los Angeles during this fun, educational weekend. Participate in a unique *Shabbat* service, learn the history of Boyle Heights and other historically Jewish neighborhoods and attend a Jewish-Muslim dialogue.

Visit *Beit T'shuvah*, a Jewish rehabilitation center and participate in a program led by their prevention program. Eat a deli lunch and tour Pico Robertson with an expert. This is a trip that is not to be missed!

FUNERALS & MEMORIAL SERVICES & YAHRZEITS

It is a *mitzvah* (a commandment) to comfort the mourner, and Judaism offers a number of rituals to help the mourner cope with the grief of losing a loved one.

Our rabbis are available day or night-it's never too early or too late to call when death touches your home.

Whether planning a funeral, officiating at a memorial service or performing a headstone unveiling or *yahrzeit* ritual, our rabbis are here to assist you. After the funeral, we typically have a short service called a *minyan* at the home of the deceased.

The Caring Committee is available to provide food for mourning families. Our rabbis welcome any inquiry about mourning practices in Jewish tradition and at Shomrei Torah.

Social Action Committee: Looking Toward the Future...

Shomrei Torah's Social Action Committee (SAC) has been at work for more than 25 years using the principles of social justice and *tikkun olam* to create programs and events supporting the mission of the congregation. Our programs have gained wide recognition in Sonoma County which has increased Shomrei Torah's visibility and place within the larger community.

SAC produces the film series, SAC Goes to the Movies, which has focused on a variety of topics including mental health, LGBTQ aging, immigration, Israeli-Palestinian peacemaking, domestic violence, restorative justice, Muslim-Jewish relations, PTSD, teen suicide and masculinity. The series was recognized by the Union for Reform



Judaism's Religious Action Center with an Honorable Mention award presented at their annual meeting in Washington, D.C.

Other SAC programs include Elisha's Pantry, which feeds about 180 men, women and children every Thursday of the

year; Winter Clothing Drive, the Catholic Charities' Soup Brigade, annual *Yom Hashoah* Day of Remembrance, Posada Toy Drive, immigration reform, LGBTQ, Living Wage Coalition and the annual Rabbi Michael Robinson Memorial Lecture series.

SAC has partnered with many key organizations in Sonoma County on projects and special events. An ongoing effort involves the North Bay Organizing Project. Other partners include the YWCA, Family Justice Center Sonoma County, Restorative Resources, Jewish Family and Children's Services, the Press Democrat, St. Joseph's Health, Kaiser Permanente, and Sutter Health. Others include various local congregations of many faith traditions including several Protestant denominations, Unitarian Universalists, Congregations Beth Ami, Ner Shalom, and B'nai Israel.

By the way, you do NOT have to be a SAC member to work on a particular project. For more information, contact the office to be put in touch with the committee chairs.

Men's Bagel Club

Waste Management Program

Ma nishtana ha zevel ha ze me kol ha-ashpa? Why is this trash different from all other trash?

Because it is 'food-related waste' and it is all compostable!

As *Shomrei Torah* (guardians of the Torah) we are also *shomrei adamah* (guardians of the earth) and our waste management program is an opportunity to express this important Jewish value.

More than 90% of what had been considered trash is now compostable! We no longer have a trash dumpster and we are now on our way to becoming a zero waste synagogue!

CST is the first religious organization in Sonoma County to become part of North Bay Corporation's commercial 'green' program.



Women's Retreat

The Women's Retreat, offering a chance for women to get back to their roots, is a biennial event open to all adult women members of CST. The retreats feature contemplative *Shabbat* services, breakout sessions featuring Jewish teaching, art projects, yoga and other topics of particular interest to women, along with the opportunity to relax and rejuvenate. There will, of course, be food, wine, time for reflection and a chance to unwind from our everyday lives. We will have time to truly enjoy the beauty that surrounds us in the company of good friends.

Men's Retreat

CST Men's Retreat is an opportunity for the men of CST to build camaraderie, contemplate, play and enjoy great food. The CST weekend long Men's Retreat happens every other year, and on the off years there is typically a day long Men's Retreat. The Retreat Center offers a beautiful setting with hiking, sports, swimming and connecting with fellow men.

Caring Committee

The Caring Committee expands the outreach of our clergy in performing the *mitzvah* of *Bikur Cholim*, visiting the sick.

We make phone calls, hospital and home visits, and provide food after surgery or during serious illness. We also sponsor an annual brunch with Rabbi George for those who are bereaved, and deliver High Holy Day baskets with apples and honey and a *yizkor* candle to those who lost loved ones in the previous year.

All members of CST form a Caring Community. We invite everyone to help out occasionally. We welcome new members, but you don't need to officially join the committee to do acts of loving kindness. Please let us know if you can, on occasion, provide a meal or offer a ride to services to someone who no longer drives. And don't forget to call the office to let us know if you are ever in need.

DONOR OPPPORTUNITIES

Yahrzeit Wall

In keeping with tradition, Congregation Shomrei Torah provides opportunities honor the names of our loved ones (may they be remembered for a blessing). Our Yahrzeit wall and memorial plaques can be seen on the western wall within our Sanctuary. Both members and non-members are invited to contact our office to obtain donation information and to reserve a memorial plaque. Plagues are \$360 for members and \$720 for non-members.

Kir HaTruMah (The Builder's Honor Wall)

To build a Jewish sanctuary and home is to build the future of the Jewish people. On the Kir HaTruMah wall we recognize extraordinarily generous donors. Each donor recognized is also invited to write their personal story and dedication to a loved one in our enduring HaBonim (Builders) Book, maintained and displayed in our Heritage Display Cabinet at the main entrance to our sanctuary building. Various donor naming and recognition opportunities start at \$18,000 and are further explained in a brochure available through our office.

Kir HaKavod (Tree of Honor and Recognition Wall)

Congregation Shomrei Torah provides an opportunity to honor and celebrate friends, family or a special event (simcha) by adding a leaf or a pomegranate with an inscription on our Kir HaKavod (Tree of Honor).
