During this year of 5784, Temple Sholom will peer into the future with courage and vision. We will do so by gathering strength from the minor prophet Joel. In his own turbulent times, he encouraged the Israelites:

In the future. I (God) will pour out My spirit on everything that breathes; Your children shall prophesize, Your elders shall dream dreams, And your youth shall see visions (Joel 3:1).

You might know this version popularized by the music of Debbie Friedman:

And the old shall dream dreams, and the youth shall see visions, And our hopes shall rise up to the sky. We must live for today; we must build for tomorrow.

Give us time, give us strength, give us life.

By only picking up the last two phrases of Joel's prophecy, Debbie conveniently left out the part that can ruffle our contemporary Jewish sensibilities. What does Joel mean that the "children shall prophesize"? Most of us associate the

idea of prophecy with fortune-telling and crystal balls. However, the point of prophecy in the Hebrew Bible is not to predict, but to change — specifically, to change the actions of a people gone astrav.

Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel wrote in his evergreen book The Prophets:

The prominent theme is exhortation, not mere prediction... To the prophet, God is a challenge, an incessant demand...

As a people who have gone astray in the past year in ways big and small, how do we make the change that God demands of us? Well, our sages had an idea. Every year we gather together our children and youth with our elders. We sing songs and prayers that evoke a distant past that holds within it our ancestors powerful dreams. We think big thoughts about the possibility of our future. Instead of avoiding our greatest fears and sources of guilt, we face them... together. And somehow, we feel a little less afraid, less ashamed, a little more brave... even more hopeful. This is what we'll do together beginning on Rosh Hashanah.

May 5784 be a good year for you and yours— for all of us!

Judaism in a Digital Age

The dramatic changes of recent decades invite us to explore what role Judaism is to play in this new era. As the digital future becomes the present, Danny Schiff makes the case that the period known as "modernity" has come to an end. He marshals the thought of well-known futurists such as Ray Kurzweil and Yuval Noah Harari to forecast the exponentially larger shifts in the human condition that lie ahead, and proposes that a countercultural Judaism could have renewed relevance in addressing some of the pressing issues that confront humanity in the twenty-first century.

This year, the High Holy Days fall before Religious School begins.

New Fruit:

There is a custom of eating new fruits on Rosh Hashanah. Take your child to the grocery store with you and pick out a new fruit together. Technically, it just needs to be a fruit that you have not eaten yet that year, but with such a wide variety of produce available, it is not hard to come up with a fruit that is totally brand new to your child (and maybe to you, too).

- Do you like to try new things? How does it make you feel when you try something new?
- Why do you think we do and try new things on the New Year?
- What other foods do we traditionally eat on Rosh Hashanah? What do they have in common?

Setting the Table:

Have your children help you set the table and incorporate old and new items. Perhaps you could use an antique tablecloth, silverware that was passed down in your family, alongside a new vase or dish. At your meal, you can ask your family to reflect and share something about their year. If they are sitting in front of something new, they could share something they would like to try new in the coming year. If they are sitting in front of something old, they could share a memory about other Rosh Hashanah meals, about something in the past that they would like to change or tell an old family story.

A New Take on Apples and Honey:

To keep children engaged during the meal in a way that is unique and relevant to Rosh Hashanah, you could give each child an apple that has been cut into pieces. They could then work to reconstruct the apple, like a puzzle and put the pieces back together using honey (raw honey is less drippy and works well for this project). Depending on their ages, you could then discuss what it means to change, grow, and build. Compare a whole apple to the one put together with honey. What is similar, what is different? How do we grow and change from year to year? Is it just in appearance or is it also on the inside? What are some ways you would like to change or grow in the coming year?



members meet on the first Thursday of each month for a lively and thoughtful discussion over current popular titles.




