The moment I came to interview at Temple Sholom and saw the name of our building etched in stone – "The Frankenstein Memorial Building" - I knew I was home. As a lover of horror movies and thrillers, it tickles me every time I enter the synagogue. This is on my mind as we head into the two important holidays of Purim and Pesach in the months of March & April, or as I like to think of them "Persian Horror Story" and "Passover Horror Story". I have come to think of them that way as a fan of all Ryan Murphy shows, like "American Horror Story".

It has always fascinated me how intense self-preservation becomes when one is being chased, targeted, attacked or even just disliked. That happens for groups of people too. When we are fighting for our rights and lives, we tend to hold tighter to who we are and our beliefs. For thousands of years, the Jewish people have been living through these real life scary movies. Our Temples have been destroyed, people like Haman have plotted our demise, Pharoah enslaved us, we have endured mass murder and still today, we face antisemitism. All this adversity has brought us closer, made us feel vulnerable and turned us into a fight or flight kind of tribe.

My concern has always been that our pride as a people comes from this place of fear and survival. We can easily forget who we are, our purpose, our traditions and the beauty of Judaism without any outside forces working against us. For many, the horror of the Holocaust solidified our need to grow back as a people both emotionally and physically. But,

perhaps in our desperation to thrive again and build ourselves back up, we have missed the essence of what our faith is all about. We easily lose sight of the rituals, the lifestyle and wisdom that the Torah provides us; that is who we are – not just a persecuted tribe fighting for survival. As we get ready for another wild masquerade of Purim and a Passover Seder that illuminates our salvation this season, let us not forget that our oppressors do not define us. We are blessed with such a rich heritage and history and it stands on its own, worthy of devotion, whether we have evil after us or not. Let's celebrate, let's never foraet, but let's hold tight to what really makes us the Jewish people. Chag Sameach!

### Recipe for a Great Teen Weekend

One cup of Torah, two teaspoons Community, and a dash of Music. At the Orr Shalom High School Retreat, I had the privilege to travel to the Union for Reform Judaism's (URJ) Olin-Sang-Ruby Union

Institute (OSRUI) with our teen leaders as they spent the weekend building their 'Jewish Recipe' - what 'ingredients' make them Jewish? How do their 'ingredients' fit into the larger 'recipe?'

After a long hiatus, our community has returned to camp in the best way. When I think of camp, I think of the countless memories I've made there as a camper, counselor, and unit head since 2011. To be able to create memories in Oconomowoc with our teens in the dead of winter at the first retreat in over three years, was an incredible addition to my lifelong story at OSRUI and in the historical tie between Temple Sholom and the URJ's flagship camp.

Our weekend – planned almost entirely by our teen leaders - included decorating and baking our own Challah each loaf as unique as its creator. Our teens created and participated in a scavenger hunt throughout OSRUI's campground, where we worked together to solve a wordpuzzle. In the end, we came to the understanding that no one could have completed the scavenger hunt alone – we all have different understandings and knowledge of the campgrounds, and needed everyone to complete the goal. Unsurprisingly, wandering around (for what felt like 40 years) with fellow Jews is a great way to connect with one another.

In 1943, Bulgaria complied with German demands and deported nearly 11,400 Jews from occupied territories in northern Greece and Yugoslavia (Macedonia). At the same time, Bulgaria successfully resisted German pressures to deport the 50,000 Jews living in Bulgaria. Dr. Benatov will offer an overview of the facts surrounding these historical events and will focus on the conflicting opinions about the role played by King Boris III, church officials, and politicians in the rescue of Bulgaria's Jewish population. Dr. Benatov will also discuss the international debate over the way in which this historical moment should be interpreted, remembered, and commemorated.



The Bible in Opera With Roger Pines SUNDAY | APR. 30 10:45 AM

The Bible has attracted and inspired many important

figures in operatic composition, from Charpentier in the Baroque era to Schoenberg and Britten in the twentieth century. After two previous talks for Temple Sholom, writer/lecturer Roger Pines (a panelist on the Metropolitan Opera broadcasts' "Opera Quiz" since 2006) returns to explore this exciting repertoire. Come enjoy highlights from justly celebrated operas such as Verdi's Nabucco and Saint-Saëns's Samson and Delilah, while also getting to know neglected works that deserve greater familiarity among audiences, including Charpentier's David and Jonathan, Rossini's Moses in Egypt, and Goldmark'sThe Queen of Sheba.

Rabbi Priesand will speak on Reflections of My Life as a Rabbi, telling her own story and that of Regina Jonas of Berlin, who in 1935 became the first woman to be ordained as a Reform rabbi and was later murdered in the Holocaust.

While I love the High Holy Days for their grandeur and depth, a potent mixture of introspection and ceremonial pomp, spectacle and self-exploration, my favorite time of the Jewish year is the span between Purim and Passover. As an artist and educator working in the world of theatre and performance, I admire the dramatic structure of the Hebrew calendar and the ritual storytelling of our holidays, a framing device that lets us revisit

and newly inhabit familiar narratives, traditions, stories, and songs. Purim and Passover are both stories of the survival of the Jewish people. Whether we are recounting how we were delivered out of Egypt by the wonders of HaShem or saved from the slaughter by the bravery and heart of Queen Esther, we are honoring those who came before us, in whose name we continue to practice our Jewish way of life. This attachment to history, to our ancestors, is very salient to many folks in the LGBTQ community. Gay, lesbian, and transgender narratives and lives have, so often, been hidden from view, edited, or simply erased.

History is a practice of discovering and uncovering the truth, but, especially for those of us who are gay and lesbian, queer and trans, it's a practice of love. It's with a deep sense of love & gratitude with which I approach the celebration of these holidays, whether attending a Purim party or singing late into the night at a friend's Seder table. As Jews, as LGBTQ folks, we've experienced the powers-that-be trying to erase us. But we're still here, honoring those on whose shoulders we stand.

### Refugee Family Update

In June 2022, a family from Afghanistan settled in Chicago, overcoming the challenges of communication, finding adequate housing, and securing employment. All this is thanks to the generosity of Temple Sholom and eight temple volunteers, each donating their experience and expertise to create a home for the family. The family includes parents and four children - ages 8, 7, 3, and 18-months.

The kindness of the sponsors, led by the congregation and clergy of Temple Sholom, HIAS and JCFS, cannot be overstated. The family nourishes the volunteers with food, love and appreciation, telling them often that "We are family."

Temple volunteers have helped the family access social services and translator assistance. They provide a link between teachers at the local elementary school and help the family navigate the school system and manage expectations for the two older boys. They have planned for and provided transportation to medical and dental appointments, assisted in filling out citizenship paperwork and enrolled parents in English classes. During school vacations, they shepherded the children to the Lincoln Park Zoo, Millennium Park, Kohl Children's Museum, and The Nature Museum. In addition to special trips, volunteers have helped with everyday tasks such as shopping for groceries and household needs at Aldi, Walmart, Target and Burlington Factory.

Volunteers will now focus on independent skills, using public transportation and budgeting for their needs. Thank you, Temple Sholom, for letting us be inspired by this incredible family.
