

Modern Tools for Modern Rituals

Rena and a close friend, Rabbi Samantha Frank, saw an opportunity to engage with today's younger generation and seized it. Here, Rena tells us how Modern Ritual was born....

I began Modern Ritual with my close friend, Rabbi Samantha Frank, in our third year of rabbinical school. I am looking forward to bringing my work with Modern Ritual as part of my rabbinate. I had been teaching Hebrew school and realized that many of my students weren't growing up with the Jewish home rituals that I knew and loved (both of my parents are rabbis, so I grew up with a lot of Jewish ritual)! I wondered how to teach and inspire people to live Jewishly at home.

One day, I overheard some teenagers talking about how obsessed they were with Instagram. "Would you follow a Jewish Instagram?" I asked. "If it was cool," they replied. Enter Modern Ritual. I started posting about Shabbat, holidays, and Jewish concepts on Instagram and would ask for their feedback. In the process, they learned more about Judaism and I learned how to use social media as an educational tool. Since then, Modern Ritual has grown to over 14,000 followers. Our goal is to empower and inspire people to live Jewishly at home. I am so excited for the ways that my work with Modern Ritual will inform my work at Temple Sholom and vice versa. I am looking forward to bringing what I have learned into this new role, while continuing to learn from all of you.

Orchades A Proud Part of the TEMPLE SHOLOM COMMUNITY

It was 1975. A group of friends – wishing to maintain their Jewish faith and culture at a time when mainstream Judaism was not yet welcoming to the LGBTQ+ community – decided to begin their own congregation, *Or Chadash*. Starting with small social gatherings in living rooms, *Or Chadash* quickly progressed to holding *Shabbat* and holiday services, and eventually moved into rented space at the Second Unitarian Church in Lakeview, which the group would call home for many years.

In that setting, membership eventually grew to several hundred and *Or Chadash* grew into a full-service synagogue where *Shabbat* was celebrated weekly, the full calendar of Jewish Holy Days and Festivals were observed, and life cycle events were held. In 1981, the congregation celebrated the purchase of its first Torah.

With changing times and the support of Rabbi Alan Bregman z"I, the membership of Or Chadash was thrilled to join the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ) in 1984. Throughout the years, while maintaining its focus on LGBTQ+ Jews, the congregation welcomed and included Jews from all backgrounds.

In 1986, Or Chadash achieved the milestone of hiring the first of four rabbis who would serve the community. Or Chadash also took much pride in members who themselves went on to study for the rabbinate and who today serve the Jewish community in a variety of capacities.

By the early 2000s, *Or Chadash* outgrew its space at Second Unitarian Church and moved north to Emanuel Congregation where it rented a chapel and office space for the remainder of its years as an independent synagogue.

Over time, attitudes and understanding shifted, and by 2015 much of the Jewish world had experienced phenomenal growth in its embrace of the LGBTQ+ community. With that growth came the decision to merge with a mainstream congregation. Several options opened, and after exploring each, *Or Chadash* enthusiastically decided to accept the warm embrace of Temple Sholom.

Here, Or Chadash hosts a Shabbat service and dinner on the first Friday of most months to present an inclusive and meaningful service led by Temple Sholom Clergy. Additionally, Or Chadash offers a variety of social and holiday celebrations.

In observance of Pride month each June, Temple Sholom and *Or Chadash* hold a celebratory Pride service. This is followed by a special *Oneg* and the *Am Keshet* award ceremony, which honors organizations and individuals who have worked diligently to help the LGBTQ+ community obtain greater equality in the workplace and in their private lives.

Temple Sholom and Or Chadash look forward to continue providing a spiritual home for the LGBTQ+ community and are excited to partner with synagogues throughout Chicago to further that mission.

Women of Temple Sholom will culminate a dynamic year of programming with its Annual Dinner Wednesday, June 10. The Annual Dinner Francesca's on Bryn Mawr will feature two guest speakers from the Sisterhood of Salaam Shalom (SOSS), a worldwide organization that seeks to change the world, one Jewish woman and one Muslim woman at a time.

Kathie Bender, a Jewish woman and SOSS Regional Coordinator for the Chicago area, and Samira Qureshi, a Muslim member, will share "Ten Ways to Respond to Hate: Islamophobia and Antisemitism from the Perspective of Jewish and Muslim Women." They will also tell us about their grassroots organization and how it develops women and teen girls as influencers to build bridges and fight hate, negative stereotyping and prejudice. Only 10 years old, SOSS recently won the

prestigious Intercultural Innovation Award from the BMW Group in partnership with the United Nations Alliance of Civilizations for projects "aimed at fostering a sustainable and open relationship between different communities."

The event will begin at 6:00 pm with appetizers and a cash bar, followed by a delicious Italian dinner, with vegetarian and gluten-free options. In addition to our guest speakers, we will also honor the outgoing 2019 – 2020 Steering Committee and introduce the one for 2020 - 2021.

Temple Sholom Adopts New Software Platform

There will be a dynamic calendar organized by community and interest groups to help you zero in on the most relevant information for you and your family.

We're confident that embracing new technology will help us move forward and do our best work for the community.

Building Virtual Community Through Online Learning

In early 2020, our Adult Education Committee was considering online learning possibilities. We had formed an Online Learning Task Force. We discussed that it might lower barriers and engage participants who aren't able to attend in person. We planned a poll in our March e-letter to assess interest.

As they say, people make plans and God laughs.

March 15, a week before the official state stay-at-home order went into effect, we went online with Religious School and Adult Education classes after less than a week of planning. We launched adult classes on Zoom and *T'filah* (prayer) on Facebook Live. Days later, we piloted midweek Hebrew classes on Zoom and by Sunday all JK-8th Grade *Beit Sefer Shalom* Religious School classes met via Zoom.

The response has been overwhelming. I receive daily requests to join our ongoing weekday Adult Ed classes like Tuesday Talmud or the Wednesday Morning Study Group. People of all ages are tuning into Tot *Shabbat* and Religious School *T'filah*, and friends

from around the country are asking to "attend" our services. It's heartwarming to see children just being themselves during online classes, tuning in from living rooms around the city (sometimes with backdrops from outer space), clearly happy to see each other. It doesn't hurt that Zoom has a "mute all" feature.

I can see from every interaction how much we are craving our Jewish community, as students of all ages congregate online and we take joy in the gallery view of faces in our online gatherings. Almost every virtual gathering involves some form of "how are you doing?" and "what are you feeling grateful for?" We are all learning from each other as Jewish tradition and technology intertwine in beautiful and unexpected ways during this unusual moment in time.
