We needed a place of quiet to collect our thoughts, process our feelings, and become lifted in prayer. In short, we needed a sanctuary of shalom, our sanctuary of Temple Sholom. It's here that we can feel ourselves seen, where we are invited to be heard.

Even in the grandeur of our sanctuary, the evening felt intimate and personal. Our high school seniors reflected on their time spent at Temple Sholom. For them, our synagogue has been one of openness to explore life's big questions; a place in which God's energy is felt in community; a safe haven to come after crashing into some of life's obstacles; a congregation that invites us to

change ourselves for the better so that we can change the world.

Seeing our community through their eyes gives us hope and inspiration. Soon, we will all gather again in the sanctuary for our High Holy Days. Some will join in person. Some will join from home. All will feel the embrace of our open, energetic, and transformational congregation. Inside this issue, you will find details about how we will celebrate these High Holy Days. I leave you with this New Year Prayer based on a hymn by Rabbi David Einhorn (1809-1879):

God of years, God of eternity,
Bless us now and always.
Bless our homes and our families.

As we search our souls within
And see the lasting shelter
Of Your Sholom.


me and I remember being comforted by the woman sitting next to me-who I later learned was Roberta Schwartz, Rabbi Schwartz's wife

As our new membership year begins on July 1st and we look ahead to the High Holy Days (5782), we want our members to know about what we expect worship to look like during the upcoming holiday season:

- In-person services will be available this year to current members (those who renew their membership for the 2021 - 2022 membership year).
- Digitally streamed services will once again be a available. These services will be of the same high quality as they were last year.
- Those who plan to attend High Holy Day Services inperson will be asked to complete a Health & Safety Questionnaire, which will include a question regarding vaccination status.
- Those who attend in-person services will be required to wear a facemask, irrespective of vaccine status.

A Year in Review

2020/21 was certainly a memorable year for Women of Temple Sholom, in many ways for a lot of terrible things brought about by the global pandemic, but also for how our group learned to adapt to find community and meaning in new and positive ways to help us all get through such a difficult, unprecedented time. Our tagline "Stronger Together" was never truer.

Whether virtual or in-person, WTS plans all of our programs and events to be informative, meaningful, spiritually engaging, entertaining, and all with components of social justice and the opportunity to connect with the fabulous women in our temple community.

Last July, Rabbi Rena Singer "zoomed" into Temple Sholom figuratively and literally as both Assistant Rabbi and as the clergy liaison to WTS. She ably led our August 2020 virtual Rosh Hashanah holiday cooking program, Two Kitchens, Two Traditions, showcasing Israeli/Sephardic and American/Ashkenazi dishes with two guest chefs. She also combined social justice and honey in an interview with Daphne Williams of Beelove, the social enterprise of the North Lawndale Employment Network. This program led to the creation of a WTS online cookbook of favorite holiday dishes that is given to all WTS members.

WTS presented a Pink Shabbat in October during Breast Cancer Awareness Month to honor and remember those in our temple community who have been impacted by this disease. Women read words of meaning and wisdom during the service, and we presented an informative speaker from the Sharsheret support organization.

We kicked off our Hot Topics series in December with Rabbi Singer's great discussion on Modern Jewish Feminism. We had a huge virtual attendance and lively breakout room conversations on Jewish feminism today and "back in the day." This was so popular that we followed up with a Part II in April. We also presented our first Women's Night at the Movies, discussing Ma Rainey's Black Bottom with a professional film critic, again so popular that we held another movie night last month, talking about Promising Young Woman with a professional female film critic.

After having to cancel our annual Women's Seder last year because the pandemic had just started, we were able to reimagine this beloved WTS event in a virtual format. It was a beautiful evening – warm, festive, spiritual, and filled with song, dance, and delicious food from the Hearty Boys. Though we missed being physically together, longtime Seder Chair Marilyn Oskin and her team made this a very special and memorable event.

WTS held a fascinating Book Discussion in May with award-winning author Fern Schumer Chapman on her mother-daughter memoir Motherland: Beyond the Holocaust- a Mother-Daughter Journey to Reclaim the Past. It was a spellbinding story of loss, trauma, love and reconciliation presented by a master storyteller.

In addition to all of our own WTS programs, we also partnered with other temple community groups this past year to be part of several special events: two dynamic speakers from the Israel Religious Action Center with Adult Education, and a tour of the "Notorious RBG" exhibit at the Illinois Holocaust Center plus a panel discussion with local RBG colleagues, with Sholom Justice and Adult Education.

We have many new programs planned for the rest of 2021 and beyond, both live and virtual. Watch for the next *D'var*, eBlasts and other temple information so you can be part of this dynamic group!

LOTS OF PLANS FOR 2021/22



Exciting Recent News

It's been another successful year for Sholom Justice, and while we couldn't be in person for most of it, we accomplished a lot. We kicked off a busy year by joining forces with RAC & RAC-IL for their Every Voice, Every Vote Campaign. This campaign aimed to maximize voter turnout by mobilizing voters, combat voter suppression and engage student voters in the November election. Following a historic election, we continued our annual Chanukah Box event, providing Chanukah meals to those in the community in need. Thank you to all our drivers! We started 2021 with a very busy January. We welcomed Sol Anderson (former Executive Director of I Grow Chicago) to our **Sholom** Justice Shabbat as he helped Temple Sholom understand how I Grow's grassroots healing justice model works at the intersection of individual healing and collective change. In partnership with Eco

Chavura, we hosted the first annual Tu Bishvat Seder. Sholom Justice also showed our support for frontline workers and donated over 100 meals to the healthcare workers at Mount Sinai Hospital. To close out the busy month, the Pretrial Fairness Act was passed in both houses of the IL General Assembly as a part of a criminal justice reform package. This act will reduce mass incarceration in our state and have a major impact on ensuring that no one is held captive pretrial or presumed guilty because of their inability to pay for their freedom. In February, we cosponsored a virtual visit to the Ruth **Bader Ginsburg Museum exhibit and** panel discussion with Adult Ed and Women of Temple Sholom. The Panel featured Cook County Judge Abbey Romanek, Retired Judge Carole Kamin Bellows and Dean Nina Appel where they discussed their personal experiences with the late Justice. In March, we signed the #InvestInUs

solidarity letter for U.S. leaders to fund community solutions to end gun violence. In April, we were able to host our blood drive in the temple parking lot after a long hiatus without one. Vitalant was able to collect 16 units and we will certainly collect more at our future drives. In May, through lots of effort, the **BIO** Bill & Fix the FOID Bill passed out of the committee!

While all the above was going on, we still passed out our Monday Meal to-go bags each week, provided meals to Northside Housing, redesigned our **Feed the Hungry** program which has been extremely successful, and we keep growing our Prison Pen Pal Program! We can't thank everyone enough for all the hard work you continue to do for our various programs, projects and advocacy work. Get ready for another busy year ahead!
