Dear Temple Sholom Family,

As we approach the Jewish Calendar Year of 5782, we begin with great intention. We frame our year with the temple's *Shema* Statement: Temple Sholom is a Sacred Community that Embraces, Inspires, and Matters. Whereas last year we focused on *embrace*, this year we will focus on inspire. A line from Psalm 92 will guide us:

How great are your works, Adonai! How profound the thoughts they inspire!

Commanded as we are to make our lives a blessing, we pursue life's greatness, even amidst grave limitations. This pursuit can lead to profound inspiration. Yet, sometimes without noticing it, we close ourselves off from the opportunity to be inspired because we think we know it all—or we believe that we're supposed to know it all. —especially from learning new things. This keeps us from thinking big and learning from others with different viewpoints from our own. As Adam Grant writes in his newest book, Think Again: The Power of Knowing What You Don't Know, "The curse of knowledge

is that it closes our minds to what we don't know. Good judgment depends on having the skill—and the will—to open our minds." And open minds are the place where profound thoughts and inspiration reside.

So, this will be a year of inspired thinking... (and doing and feeling and praying). We'll focus on big questions that will help us think more expansively with full hearts to open our minds. We'll hear from inspiring speakers whose lives and great works have been dedicated to thinking outside of typical boxes, from climate change and environmental conservation to rooting out Antisemitism and Islamophobia. As we get ready for Temple Sholom's Congregational Israel Trip at the end of June (see page 22 for details), we will welcome Israeli and Palestinian business innovators whose joint ventures have shifted their own perspectives on what's possible in the Middle East. This will also be a year of developing Temple Sholom's Strategic Plan as we use ancient Jewish wisdom in innovative ways to engage members and seekers, foster a culture of financial stability and resilience, and create and adapt spaces for our 21st century spiritual needs.

As we embark on 5782, may we have many occasions to exclaim:

How great are your works, Adonai! How profound the thoughts they inspire! May we enter this new year building on the strength of the past, rooted in empathy, and guided by a *Torah* of wonder, innovation, and imagination.

and meaningfully engaging members and seekers through peak spiritual moments and lifelong learning.







Temple Sholom Programs:

Monday Meal Mitzvah

Join us each week as we make sandwiches and assemble to-go meals that we hand out to our guests (those in need of a meal) on our Lake Shore Dr. steps. Additionally, we take meals to Northside Housing to support their residents. This *mitzvah* is great for most ages!

Feed the Hungry

Every 2nd & 5th Sunday of each month, Temple Sholom is responsible for assembling and delivering bag meals to a Greater Bethlehem Healing Temple Church on the West Side for those in need. Families/individuals can sponsor a monthly Sunday to shop for the food, assemble the sandwiches and meals, and deliver them to the church. This *mitzvah* is great for all ages!

Restorative Justice Work

This philosophy and practice help reduce prison populations and recidivism, bringing more health to communities and individuals.

Prison Pen Pal Program

This program connects congregants with a pen pal who is serving time in solitary confinement in the IL Prison system. The goal is to build a connection with someone who may not receive it in their current situation. This *mitzvah* is ideal for adult volunteers!

Blood Drives

Sholom Justice hosts 3 blood drives per year, sponsored by Vitalant (formerly LifeSource), supporting a critical life-saving service.

Advocacy Action Group

Introducing Sholom Justice's newest program! This group is the place for you if you are interested in advocacy and policy. You will come together and discuss/spread the word regarding issues & action items that need immediate attention.

Holiday Volunteer Opportunities

Volunteer & serve at the Bethlehem Healing Center for their Thanksgiving meal, assemble Chanukah Boxes filled with food and holiday treats to be delivered to Chicagoland residents in need, and volunteer on Christmas Day at the People's Church to serve a warm Christmas meal. These mitzvot are great for most ages!

Fresh Eyes



Mah Gadlu! How great is your work Adonai! As we re-enter our building and prepare for in-person Beit Sefer Shalom Religious School classes for all ages this fall, we have the opportunity to look at everything with fresh eyes and a new sense of appreciation.

This year's theme text comes from Mizmor Shir, a song for Shabbat, and for me, Sunday

mornings often bring a sense of Shabbat - the community, the singing, and the special time for sacred learning. Perhaps this is why our sages said that havdalah, the separation ceremony marking the end of Shabbat, can be done until Tuesday; sometimes we need a little more holy time together. That feeling of Shabbat is present in the times we set aside from our daily lives, and sometimes we find those moments at camp, on vacation, or wherever we carve out special time or space for ourselves. This coming year of 5782 is a shmita year, or a sabbatical year - like *Shabbat*, every seventh year is traditionally meant to be a pause for our work, our debts, our possessions. What does this mean as we emerge from a global pandemic and begin to gather again?

I'd like to approach this *shmita* year with fresh eyes. One of the ways I was able to pause this summer was by joining thirty-six (double *chai* - a modern record for us!) Temple Sholom *chanichim* (campers) for a month at our beloved URJ Camp OSRUI, serving on the segel (faculty) for Gesher: Making the Musical with rising 6th-9th graders. I was truly inspired by the creativity of these teens, as well as the strong presence of our community at camp. One of my favorite moments was seeing some of our teens shine in the all-camp talent show, because camp - and our community - are places where we can truly be loved,

accepted and celebrated for being ourselves.

As we recently did a deep cleaning of our Temple Sholom building for the first time in my seven years here, it was an opportunity to reflect upon the things we need and the things we can do without. This year, we are working as a staff to re-envision our educational spaces, and while we will need masks when we meet, we won't need them on Tuesdays anymore, as we move to a Wednesday-only schedule for Midweek Hebrew. We may not meet again in-person weekly for Sunday morning Adult Education classes, as participation increased dramatically when we moved online, and allowed us to host guests from all over the country and Israel.

We are also bringing a new look at how we teach Hebrew and t'filah (prayer) to our Religious School students. Based on our participation in the JUF Education Shifting the Paradigm on Hebrew Learning Cohort, we are redesigning our 4th-6th grade curriculum in partnership with our clergy and faculty. We look forward to welcoming our new Youth Engagement Coordinator, Sam Cohen, as well this fall, and offering new opportunities for families to connect through our Mishpacha Chavurah initiative and B'nai Mitzvah cohorts.

I'm thrilled to treat this shmita year as an opportunity to bring renewed energy and an open mind to how we gather together in learning community to experience the joy and depth of Judaism. Looking forward to seeing you soon!


