This last year, Chanukah may have surprised us by being just two days after Thanksgiving! When Chanukah comes so early on the Gregorian calendar, we can be pretty sure that we are in a leap year on the Hebrew calendar. A Hebrew leap year is more distinctive than one extra day in February. Rather, on March 4th 2022, we will begin the extra special Hebrew month of Adar II. In order to keep the Hebrew calendar from eventually giving us Chanukah in the summer, an extra month of Adar is added before the "regular Adar," thus giving us Adar I and Adar II. This month is even more joyful because it contains the holy day of Purim. Adar II is viewed as the most joyous month of the year and even comes with its own motto: Mi-shenikhnas adar, marbim be-simcha or "When Adar arrives, joy increases." We take that joy and spread it around, sending gifts to our friends, family,

and those in need. Our joy is lifted even higher as we celebrate Queens Vashti and Esther and all the women in our lives who show such tremendous bravery.

One month after Purim, we gather to recall and relive the story of the exodus from Egypt; from slavery to freedom. In the time leading up to Pesach (Passover) we partake in a search in our homes to remove chametz, any food that contains a leavening agent, which we try not to consume during Passover. Beyond what we eat, we can also use this as an opportunity for a personal cleansing of the metaphorical "crumbs" that crowd our lives. We evaluate our relationships with people and things as we examine ourselves and our egos. We take the month between Purim and Passover to move from joyous celebration of our peoples' resilience, to a more reflective joy of freedom.

In this season of celebration, we hope you find new and meaningful ways to experience joy.



On Missing a Place and a Language: **Yiddish Poetry in Translation** with Efrat Bloom SUNDAY | MAR. 6 | 10:45 AM

We will think about the relationship between language, memory, and nostalgia in immigration—another Jewish theme through reading translations of Yiddish poems by Jacob Glatshteyn and Moyshe-Leyb Halpern, and a nonfiction piece by Gary Shteyngart. As the evolution of these debates over the past 50 years has changed the position of Israel's allies in progressive spaces on the left, promoted an alignment with a new "Judeo-Christian" establishment on the right, and created profound polarization over Israel ever since, we will try to draw some conclusions about how this may affect American Jews in the future.

Today, as Zionism seems increasingly incompatible with other forms of identity politics, this session seeks to trace these developments over the past five decades since the 1967 Six-Day War based on Dr. Hirschhorn's new book project. The study begins in the summer of 1967 with the earliest confrontations between two dueling transnational movements, "Jewish Power" and "Black Power," following these clashes over the next decade, culminating in the 'Zionism is Racism' debates of the mid-1970s. We will then juxtapose this heady chapter of history with contemporary issues (Are we seeing a new iteration of old debates?) analyzing a resurgence of these conflicts today.

WTS and Crown Family High School (CFHS) Collaborate on Unique Teen Author Program

Women of Temple Sholom is joining forces with CFHS to bring a teen author to talk about the new book she wrote on the intersectionality of having two ethnicities – Chinese and Jewish. Amelie Liu, a 16-year-old student at the University of Chicago Lab School, will discuss her book Matzo Ball-Wonton Thanksgiving in person during CFHS on Wednesday, April 27. Amelie felt she lost half her identity when her Chinese father tragically died when she was seven. She processed a lot of her feelings with her Jewish bubbe during the pandemic year.

Together, they wrote a book that speaks to young people who are also grappling with growing up with any mixed identities.

The students will have a chance to talk with Amelie among themselves, and the program will also open on Zoom for a short time to parents, members of the temple's *Shalem* diversity community, and interested temple members.

To honor her late father, Amelie is donating proceeds from the book to the National Alliance for Grieving Children, a nonprofit centered on education and resources for childhood bereavement.

WTS is delighted to present this program to support Amelie's work and to introduce Women of Temple Sholom to a new and wider temple audience. More details will follow.
