If I am not for myself, who will be for me? But if I am only for myself, what am I? And if not now, when? (Pirkei Avot 1:14)

This quote from Hillel the Elder sets the stage for our year ahead. Each of the last two years, we have emphasized an aspect of our Shema statement: Temple Sholom is a sacred community that embraces, inspires, and matters. We found unique ways to embrace and inspire one another through our beloved Temple.

As we embark on the Hebrew year of 5783, we see how much the world needs this big-hearted and clear-minded community. Harvard professor Marshall Ganz frames his theory of social change with Hillel's three questions. The Story of Self, The Story of Us, and The Story of Now.

The Story of Self: If I am not for myself, who will be for me?

Temple Sholom is a place where we learn the story of ourselves— our roots are exposed, our passions evoked. We learn what wisdom our faith offers on the issues of our day and the guidance it offers for how to make good decisions in our lives.

The Story of Us: But if I am only for myself, what am I?

We are no mere bystanders in our world. From access to healthcare (including reproductive healthcare), to gun violence, to climate change, we understand that our faith requires action. And we know we are measured by how we treat each other, even during times of disagreement. We model civility and friendship in the way we listen across lines of difference as we take stands with moral clarity.

The Story of Now: And if not now, when?

Soon, we will hear the shofar blasts, our people's alarm clock, urging us: "Wake up!" There is no better time-to be a good friend to those who depend on us;

to volunteer with Temple Sholom; to return to the wisdom of our faith that reminds us how much we matter to each other and our world.



We had a fabulous summer at Camp Gan Shalom!



What Matters Most



A quote widely attributed to John Wesley (1703-1791) goes as follows:

Do all the good you can, By all the means you can, In all the ways you can, In all the places you can, At all the times you can, To all the people you can, As long as ever you can.

This summer, I spent two weeks at our URJ Camp OSRUI serving as the first Yetzirah Segel (Creative Arts Faculty), a new position that allowed me to spend time supporting arts programming with all age groups at camp. I got to see many of our Temple Sholom campers shine, as one of our Gesher middle school campers starred in "Jewsical the Musical," while one of our older teens helped out around camp as part of the Avodah service learning group. I watched our younger Kallah campers launch rockets with their friends, and spent time leading a sicha (conversation) about gratitude with teens in the Chalutzim Hebrew Immersion program, including one of our Crown Family High School students, who shared the concept of a "good talking circle" with me - when she and her friends would sit by the pool and exchange compliments to lift each other up. It was wonderful to see our students making a positive impact in their camp community.

This year at *Beit Sefer Shalom* Religious School, we will focus on what matters most. We want our students to feel seen and known, and to be present and engaged in the experience of growing up in

our Jewish learning community. We will begin the school year with a new Curriculum Night for parents, followed by two special opening days, focusing on building community among students on Sunday, September 11 and engaging in a day of off-site Family Social Justice projects on Sunday, September 18.

I am grateful to have our returning team of Rachel Lipson (Religious School Administrator) and Sam Cohen (Youth Engagement Coordinator), as we bring back many of our pre-pandemic offerings, including our retreats at URJ Camp OSRUI, our Midweek Hebrew "Kef" (Fun) Club, and the L'taken Teen Social Justice Seminar at the Religious Action Center in Washington D.C. We are excited for new opportunities including our expanded Yom Horim (Parents' Day) series, now open to all families in the congregation, increased small group Midweek Hebrew support, and occasional in-person Mishpacha events on-site on Sundays.

This year, our teen *Madrichim* will train alongside our Religious School faculty at our fall orientation, and our *Orr Shalom* High School Youth Group Executive Board members will lead our congregational *Yom Kippur* afternoon service, which is sure to be a treat! We have an exciting Adult Education lineup of clergy-led classes and guest scholars, planned with our wonderful committee and incorporating great suggestions from our congregants. In these ways, and many more throughout the year, we will focus on learning what it means to matter in our own lives, to each other, and to the world.



Adult B'nai Mitzvah

Technically, a Jew becomes B'nai Mitzvah simply by turning 13 (traditionally, 12 for girls). Nevertheless, the thrill of being called to the Torah for the first time as a B'nai Mitzvah is a right that anyone can earn any time with guided preparation and a commitment to study. We offer the opportunity to acquire the skills necessary to read from the Torah, write a D'var Torah and reflect on the Torah portion as an adult.

Our program is tailored to the needs of the individual, but consists of the following components:

- An Introduction to Judaism or other Adult Education Course
- Hebrew Training
- One-On-One Study with a clergy member
- Periodic seminars with other adult "B'nai Mitzvah" with our clergy

The bill included changes to electronic

monitoring policy as well as the elimination of cash bail which unfairly impacts incarcerated defendants because they often cannot raise the money required for bail.



The mission of Shalem, Temple Sholom's Embracing Racial and Ethnic Diversity Committee, is to promote an inclusive environment where a cross-section of racial and cultural identities can thrive through the Jewish experience. Shalem means "wholeness" in Hebrew, as we seek to welcome our community's whole selves--the intersection of racial, ethnic, and religious identities that help create a whole person.

Shalem is focused on lifting up the voices of Jews of Color in our community, expanding our community's knowledge of racially diverse Jewish experiences, and building our skills as a congregational community so we can continue to live our values and be a synagogue that embraces all people. We strive to create distinct spaces for Jews of Color to support one another and engage the wider Temple community through awareness and educational opportunities


