## From the Rabbi's Desk

Dear Friends,

A rabbi noticed a young man – a stranger – enter the sanctuary on Shabbat and sit in the back row. It was apparent to the rabbi that the young man was unfamiliar with the service, and that he did not seem to know anyone else in the sanctuary.

At the beginning of the Torah service, during the processional, the rabbi welcomed the young man; they shook hands, smiling.

Later, during Kiddush, the young man seemed a bit lost. But some congregants approached him, wished him a Shabbat Shalom, and he joined them at their regular table. The rabbi soon joined them too.

As the Kiddush crowd thinned out, the rabbi and some congregants decided to take a walk around a nearby park. The rabbi asked the young man to join them. As they headed out of the social hall, the rabbi asked the group, "What's in your pockets?"

"Key fob." "House keys." "My wallet." "A phone." All the regular stuff.

"How about we all leave our stuff in my office? It'll be safe. Let's walk with empty pockets." So that's what they did.

As they began their circuit of the park, the young man asked the rabbi, "Why did you want to know what was in our pockets? And why did we leave it all behind?"

"On Shabbat," the rabbi answered, "On Shabbat, we remember that our cars, our homes, our money are only what we have; they are not who we are. On Shabbat, we remind ourselves not to be possessed by our possessions. On Shabbat, we realize that we are all equally children before God."

Friends, I pray for a time when a story like this can truly be realized – a time when we can welcome a young man into the midst of our communities without being justifiably anxious; a time when we can be in each other's physical presence without feeling a different sort of anxiety.

And I pray that when we are together again, we can reach a deeper understanding of Shabbat – that it is about *shalom* and *menucha*, peace and a true rest from the constant striving for stuff, and from the petty worries of our lives.

May that day come to us speedily!

# CANTOR'S NOTE

#### "Maoz Tzur" to the tune of...

One of my favorite memories as a camper at Camp Ramah in Canada occurred during a weekday *Shacharit*, or morning service. Toward the end of the service, the *ba'al tefilah* (the prayer leader) sang the closing hymn, *Adon Olam* to the tune of "Come on Baby, Light



My Fire" by Jim Morrison and The Doors. For those of you not of a "certain age", the Doors were a 1970's rock and roll group not particularly noted for their religious piety. While not one of my "favorite" Adon Olam's (I prefer "Rock Around the Clock" or "Both Sides Now" by Joni Mitchell), this memory has stayed with me over the years, and has even acquired some significance beyond its story value.

"Contrafactum" is the term that musicologists use to describe a pre-existing melody set to a new and unrelated text. An example of a contrafactum that we all know is the American hymn "My Country 'Tis Of Thee", which is sung to the melody of the original English anthem "God Save the King". (Today, we might call contrafactum "copyright infringement".)

In the music of the synagogue, the use of "foreign tunes" or contrafactum is much more prevalent than is generally known. In fact, within the Hassidic tradition the adoption of foreign melodies was considered meritorious. The Hassidim believed that even profane tunes contained a "spark" of holiness, and that to use such melodies for sacred purposes was to "rescue" this divine spark within the melody. There is a wonderful Yiddish expression which captures this idea: "Zurickfinden a nign zu seinem shoresh", which means "to return a melody to its origin".

In our synagogues today, there are countless melodies whose origins are from the non-Jewish environment in which Jews have lived for 2,000 years. For example, during the 13<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup> centuries, there was much cultural and social interaction between Franco-German Jews and neighboring Christian communities. As a result of this cultural interchange, many "traditional" Jewish melodies trace their origins back to the German popular song tradition of the time called *minnegesang*. Indeed, many so-called "*mi-Sinai* tunes" (traditional Festival and High Holiday melodies of unknown origin) come from this German secular musical tradition.

In fact, our ancestors did not limit their "cultural borrowings" to secular musical borrowings. According to the Jewish musicologist, Eric Weiner in his classic volume <u>A Voice Still Heard</u>, the popular melody for *Maoz Tzur* was originally composed by none other than Martin Luther for a chorale entitled "Nun freut euch liebe Christen g'mein" — which is still sung in many Lutheran churches today. (I recall a recently converted member of my Alabama congregation, upon hearing "Maoz Tzur" during his first Hanukkah saying to me, "Um, Cantor Gale, what gives? I've sung that melody in church my entire life!") Among many other examples, the haunting melody for *Eli Tzion* sung on Tisha B'Av has been identified as a Gregorian chant belonging to the liturgy of Santiago (St. James) de Compostela.

There is a reason I share this bit of Jewish music history trivia and the story of my "least favorite *Adon Olam*" during the Hanukkah season. Like our ancestors, we struggle to find a balance between Jewish and non-Jewish influences in our lives. What from our secular surroundings is of value to us as Jews? And what must we reject as contrary to Jewish values and tradition? The very songs we sing during services today tell us that our ancestors did not entirely close their ears to the non-Jewish world around them. Rather, they incorporated the best elements from their non-Jewish musical surroundings into their *tefilot* – imbuing these melodies with a new Jewish meaning.

During Hanukkah, we celebrate the Maccabees' victory over the tyrant Antiochus. Yet even the Maccabees recognized that Greek civilization, or Hellenism, had much to offer Judaism. They fought against only those influences that were inconsistent with Judaism's values, and against the inclination by some Jews toward complete assimilation into Greek society and the abandonment of Judaism.

Similarly, we cannot sustain vibrant Jewish life if we close ourselves off from our surroundings. As Jews in America, we engage in a careful and constant balancing of outside influences with those of our tradition. We embrace our country's values. We participate in our country's achievements and are grateful for the opportunities offered by this blessed land. Yet we must retain a sense of judgment and balance - *sechel* - if you will. Like our ancestors, we must be ever watchful that whatever "outside" influences we bring to our lives serve to nurture and enhance our Judaism and our Jewish identity – not undermine and weaken them.

Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel put it well when he said that Judaism survives and adapts best *when it assimilates into it* elements from the surrounding culture -- *but is not assimilated into it*.

Maybe this is what Jim Morrison and The Doors' version of *Adon Olam* can teach us this Hanukkah season: That like the *hazzanim* of old, while we keep our ears and our hearts open to that which is of value in the world around us – not every new tune for *Adon Olam* is a "keeper".

#### From the President's Desk...

On September 18th, at the start of Rosh Hashanah, we were truly saddened to hear of the passing of a true hero, Ruth Bader Ginsburg, a champion of women's equality and justice. According to Jewish tradition, a person who dies at the start of Rosh Hashanah is a true *tzadik*, a person of great righteousness. Because of her relentless efforts, the American legal system views women as equal under the law. She was the first woman and first Jew to lie in state at the U.S. Capitol rotunda for two days. The funeral was held in the Supreme Court building where Rabbi Lauren Holtzblatt spoke. Ruth was buried in Arlington National Cemetery next to her husband, Marty. She was a member of Adas Israel, the largest conservative synagogue in D.C. A few years back she and Rabbi Hotzblatt wrote a feminist play for the synagogue.

Diane Rosenfeld and I were fortunate to attend a program entitled "Circle the Courthouse" on Friday, October 2nd, where we heard three excellent speakers in Harms Woods and then walked to the Skokie Courthouse. Two of the speakers were from NCJW (National Council of Jewish Women), the sponsoring organization, and the third speaker was Rabbi Dana Ruttenberg (who was a guest speaker at one of our Torah Fund events). Rabbi Ruttenberg quoted "Justice, justice, you shall pursue--Zdekeh, Zdekeh, Tirdof." This core of RBG's Jewish conviction is found in Deuteronomy and was proudly displayed in her office. This gathering took place at the end of the Shiva period and the courthouse was used for obvious reasons. The walk around the block is a symbol of our re-entrance into normal life after a death.

RBG was known for her judicial collars (jabot). Tsadee, Daled and Kuf stands for justice and this is written on one of her collars. When asked a few years ago on how she would like to be remembered, she said "As someone who used whatever talent she had to do her work to the very best of her ability. And to help repair tears in her society, to make things a little better through the use of whatever ability she has." May RBG's memory be for a blessing and may we honor her legacy.

#### **EDUCATION CORNER**

#### Our Jewish Calendar

Our Jewish calendar has gone through various changes throughout our long history. If you listened to Torah reading, it is placing Yom Kippur and Sukkot in the 7<sup>th</sup> month; however, when you open a current Jewish calendar, it is showing the word "Tishrei", and it is the first month, so what is going on?

There was an original Jewish calendar during Biblical times for 1,000 years. It was a solar calendar of 364 days. It is not clear who created this calendar, but Moses specifically indicated that the month of Passover will be the first month. This month symbolized the birth of a free nation. The calculation of the calendar was a priestly obligation, especially for the high priest family that were direct decedents of Aaron (Moses' brother, the first High Priest).

Our calendar has gone through changes in several steps:

**Step 1:** The first modification of the calendar happened because of the Babylonian exile (starting at 586 BCE). The elite of the Jewish people were there; they started calling the months by the names that were common throughout the Babylonian empire. The Jewish calendar finally adopted all 12 Babylonian names (Tishrei, Heshvan, Kislev etc.).

Step 2: Was brutal! Judeah came under Greek control, but only the emperor Antiochus Epiphanes dared intervening in Jewish internal affairs, and his decrees shook the nation. He wanted his entire empire to be under the Greek calendar which was a lunar calendar that started in the fall. The last legitimate Cohen Gadol (=High Priest) was Chonyo Ben Shimeon. The priest explained to the emperor that the Hebrew calendar was sacred and could not be changed. But the emperor would not listen; the High Priest was assassinated and his son fled to Egypt. So, the lunar calendar was imposed on Judeah around the year 175 BCE.

Step 3. The lunar calendar did not match the Jewish holidays; especially Passover had to be in the spring, and a lunar year is shorter, so the next Passover would be in the winter. The leadership accepted the lunar calendar, but through calculations, created a 19-year cycle with some leap years, so Jewish holidays can be celebrated in their right season. And that is why our calendar now is lunisolar for about 2,000 years.

There are a few voices in Israel who claim that we should go back to our original Biblical calendar, but "there are bigger fish to fry" both in Israel and in world Jewry. We will continue to use the calendar that starts in Tishrei; aren't we like an old soldier, bruised a little, but carries a lot of medals?



## Kristallnacht Commemoration Monday, November 9 at 7:00 PM (beginning with minyan)

Our annual Kristallnacht Commemoration will begin with minyan followed by music selections by Cantor Daniel Gale, accompanied by Richard Boldrey, and a presentation by Professor Cathy Lesser Mansfield, Senior Instructor at Case Western Reserve University School of Law.

Professor Mansfield is a Distinguished Fellow at The Consortium for the Research and Study of Holocaust and the Law at Chicago-Kent College of Law's Center for National Security and Human Rights Law. She is the composer and librettist of an opera, entitled *The Sparks Fly Upward*, that follow three German families in Berlin, two Jewish and one Christian, through the Holocaust. Professor Mansfield is founder and Executive Director of The Sparks Fly Upward Foundation, a non-profit organization dedicated to educating people about the Holocaust, genocide and tolerance through presentations of Sparks, and ancillary activities.
