

EDUCATION CORNER

Tu B'Shvat or Hamishah Asar BiShvat, the fifteenth day of Shvat, is also known as Rosh HaShanah Lallanot, the New Year for Trees. The holiday marks the first day of spring in Eretz Yisrael and occurs six weeks after Chanukah. Since ancient times, the Jewish people have observed by eating fruit grown in Eretz Yisrael. After the Romans destroyed the Holy Temple in 70 CE, the people were no longer able to bring tithes to the Temple. Scattered to the four corners of the earth, Jews began eating dried fruit on Tu B'Shvat in remembrance of tithing and the free, independent life which they had led in Israel.

Since the restoration of the Jewish homeland, *Tu B'Shvat* has gained new significance as Arbor Day, observed by planting trees. In Israel, trees are regarded as a special gift of God. There are many allusions to trees in the Bible, especially to the olive tree, which sends up new shoots to continue to the life of the old day that dies, and the almond tree, which is the first to bloom in the spring.

Trees are represented as symbols of goodness and nobility. The upright person is compared to a tree planted near a stream that bears fruit in due season with leaves that never fade (Psalm 1:3). "The righteous will flourish like a palm tree, they will grow mighty like a cedar in Lebanon." (Psalm 93 13-14).

On *Tu B'Shvat*, we celebrate the untreatable bonds between Jews everywhere and the land of Israel. And we must remember that God gave us a world, but it is our job to preserve it for future generations.
