From the President's Desk...

There are many different customs and practices that families incorporate into their Passover seders each year. For two consecutive years, my grandchildren, then ages 9 and 10, put on a skit about the seder plate symbols getting ready for the seder. One year, my son-in-law bought cute pillows for each child attending to recline. He also bought blue material that looked like fish swimming in an ocean. This represented the Red Sea. He tacked the material up on both sides of the living room so that we actually felt like we were sitting on dry land in the middle of the sea.

But what about customs in other countries? Many Syrian Jews symbolically act out the Exodus a step further by taking some matzah, placing it in something like a backpack, and throwing it over their shoulders. This is followed by a Hebrew verse about leaving the desert in haste.

At the part in the Haggadah that says, "We were slaves to Pharaoh in Egypt," Jews in Romania fill a pillowcase with heavy objects and carry it around the table, with each person taking a turn.

When chanting *Dayenu*, some Persian and Afghan Jews have the custom of beating each other lightly on the back with scallions or leeks. The tradition symbolizes the whipping that the Israelites endured in Egypt while enslaved.

I look forward to seeing you all upon my return from Israel. Please join us on April 19th for lunch and a program which connects to Yom Hashoah. Local actress Megan Wells will portray Miep Gies who hid the Otto Frank family and found and preserved Anne Frank's diary during the Holocaust.

I wish you all a "Zissin (sweet) Pesach"!

"THE MATCHMAKER'S GIFT" by Lynda Cohen Loigman

Even as a child in 1910, Sara Glickman knows her gift -- she is a seeker of soulmates and a maker of matches. But among the pushcart-crowded street of New York's Lower East Side, Sara's vocation is dominated by devout older men -- men who see a talented female matchmaker as a dangerous threat to their traditions and livelihood. After working in secret for more than a decade, Sara must fight to take her rightful place among her peers, and to demand the recognition she deserves.

Two generations later, Sara's granddaughter, Abby, is a successful Manhattan divorce attorney, representing the city's wealthiest clients. When her beloved Grandma Sara dies, Abby inherits her collection of handwritten journals recording the details Sara's matches. But among the faded volumes, Abby finds more questions than answers. Why did Abby's grandmother leave this library to her, and what did she hope Abby would discover within its pages? Why does the legal work Abby once found so compelling suddenly feel inconsequential and flawed? Is Abby willing to sacrifice the career she worked so hard for in order to keep her grandmother's mysterious promise to a stranger? And is there really such a thing as love at first sight?

Anyone whose life has been touched or inspired by a grandparent will be drawn to *The Matchmaker's Gift* -- its vision of how one generation can affect another through shared stories and connections.



Did You Know?

(Quotes from the Bible in general and about Passover...)

Some relevant quotes from the Bible with my translation into English:

- 1) "Listen my son, to the discipline of your father, and do not forsake the Torah of your mother" (Proverbs 1: 8). Both parents contribute to the child's education, but the mother's role is more important—she transmits the Torah!
- 2) "Seven days you will eat matzah, because in the first day you will eliminate chametz from your home" (Exodus 12: 15). What are the practical implications? You clean your kitchen and dining area from chametz food; turning the whole house upside down is just a tradition, not a requirement. Remember: dust is NOT chametz!
- 3) "This month is going to be for you the first from all months of the year" (Exodus 12: 2). The Bible puts a high importance to the coming out of Egypt, the change from slavery to an independent people. As a result, there was a calendar created by the Israelites (a sun-based of 364 days) where the month of Nisan (April-May) was the first month. This Biblical calendar was used for about 1,000 years, and was replaced later by Rabbis, because of pressure from the Greek Empire that conquered the Middle East. As the Hebrew calendar was changed (to be moon-based) to start from the month of Tishrei (September-October), an additional holiday was created: Rosh Hashanah.
- 4) "And you will observe the feast of unleavened bread, because actually in this day, I delivered your multitude from the land of Egypt, and you will keep this day for generations, a forever constitution" (Exodus 12: 17). Again, Biblical based holidays have more weight in Judaism than holidays that were established after Biblical time.
- 5) Since when do we celebrate the Passover Seder? At least from the 5th century BCE. When was the Haggadah created? Around 1000 CE. RAMBAM included it in his book. The Haggadah was written by Rabbis, and they continued the ideas that were in the Bible: "In every generation each individual is bound to regard himself as if he had gone personally forth from Egypt" (Passover Haggadah).

Fudge Brownies for Passover

Recipe from Francine Schulman

4 eggs
2 cups sugar
1 cup oil for Passover
1/2 cup cake meal
1/2 cup potato starch
1/2 tsp. salt
4 tbsp. cocoa
2 cups pecans chopped (optional)



Beat eggs well, add sugar and beat until creamy. Add oil. Sift dry ingredients together and blend well with the egg and sugar mixture. Fold in pecans. Place into greased 9"x9" pan. Bake at 325 degrees for 30 to 35 minutes.

Cool slightly then cut into squares.
