Acting for Tikkun (Repair)

Dear Sisterhood Friends,

At this difficult time Israelis of all backgrounds must know we are with them. They must know we do more than pray and gather in solidarity. They must know that we will materially support them during their times of greatest need.

Hamas has destroyed, damaged, and stolen several MDA ambulances and they are in desperate need of additions to its fleet. EHNTJC has partnered with five other local Conservative congregations to purchase one new ambulance for Magen David Adom—Israel's national emergency medical service. We must raise \$115,000 by December 15th which will cover the cost of one fully outfitted ambulance and its transport to Israel. We hope Sisterhood members will contribute to this effort.

Our synagogues' names will be inscribed on the ambulance's doors, as will the names of individuals and families who contribute \$10,000 or more. There are two ways to contribute. You can send a check to the synagogue made payable to "AFMDA." You can also contribute through www.ehnt.org. Click "Online Payments" and in the "Payment Notes" field, type "AFMDA." (AFMDA stands for American Friends of Magen David Adom.)

When the ambulance is ready, we will hold a ceremony, with the ambulance present. (MDA ambulances are produced in Elkhart, Indiana.)

Education Corner

New Archaeology on King David's Palace

Decades before Indiana Jones was a movie character, I was fascinated with archaeology. I even considered it as a college major, but my more practical side dismissed it as a possibility. A highlight of two visits to Israel was participating in "Dig for a Day" at the Beit Guvrin Archaeological Park. Visitors have the opportunity to climb through candle-lit caves located in the ancient city of Tel Maresha and dig for artifacts. I frequently read about archaeological discoveries. A recent article about the palace of King David particularly caught my attention.

First, a little helpful background information. The existing walls around the old city are relatively new, having been built by the Ottoman ruler, Suleiman the Magnificent between 1535 - 1542. There are other much older walls within the old city that follow a different path; their remnants can be found, if you know where to look for them. The back of the Etz Hayim Chumash provides a diagram of the area and where these walls might have been located. The Old City of Jerusalem is now divided into the Muslim, Armenian, Christian, and Jewish quarters. A fifth area, the Temple Mount, is the site of the Jewish temples built by Kings Solomon and Herod and the current location of the Dome of the Rock and Al-Agsa mosque. On a southeastern hill, below and outside of the Temple Mount, is the City of David archaeological park. This Park includes Gihon Springs, an important ancient water source, the Pool of Siloam, and King Hezekiah's water tunnel.

Classical theory is that King David's Palace is located at the City of David. The fortifications found there were built to protect the water supply and protect Jerusalem, so it would be a logical location for the palace. However, archaeologists have not been able to find pottery or other structures to support this conclusion. Recently, Prof. Na'aman has written about two tablet fragments, containing royal correspondence that was found on the slope below the Temple Mount. He argues that these fragments provide indirect evidence that King David's Palace was located on the Temple Mount and not at the City of David. However, it is likely to be a long time before there is conclusive evidence for this new theory as it will require currently prohibited excavations on the Temple Mount itself.

While everyone is focused on the war, those in Tel Aviv, Jerusalem and more central areas are trying to continue with some of their usual activities. The daughter of one of my close friends has a 14month-old baby. She sends me weekly pictures. One of the recent pictures included a note that read "We are also not forgetting to focus on the important things." That's when I decided to write about both. We will continue to show our support for Israel by raising money, attending rallies and programs and writing letters to our legislators to assure continued government support for Israel. But we will also not forget to focus on the other important things in our lives like being together on Shabbat, celebrating holidays and continuing to just spend time together.

NEXT SISTERHOOD BOOK CLUB


