Recharge group heads for Israel in January

A fairly sizable group of roughly equal numbers of males and females will join an increasing number of graduates of Mizrachi Melbourne's *Recharge* program.

The program, open to Mizrachi and non-Mizrachi young people aged in their 20s, will fly to Israel in early January for the third such program.

Designed to re-engage with young adults, the three-week program includes two weeks in Midreshet Harova (for women) and Yeshivat Eretz Hatzvi (for men) followed by a week of touring run by Jewish Journeys.

Mizrachi Melbourne, through anonymous donors, covers all ground costs including medical insurance during the program but participants must cover their own return airfares.

"Participants must commit to coming to weekly learning the Beit Midrash in the lead up to and for six months following the program", Program Coordinator Rabbi Ronnie Figdor said. "The feedback from the first two groups has been amazing", he said, but he declined to confirm that the program, the initiative of Immediate Past president David Brykman, will run twice a year in the future. "The July program this year was challenging both in terms of finding Yeshivot and Midrashot that were open during July and the heat made some of the touring challenging. It's more than likely that the program will run just in January each year".

Riddle for Vezot HaBracha

In the blessing of which tribe, are there three words whose initials spell the name of a bird?

Riddles for last week (Sukkot)

In the Mitzvot of Sukkah and the Arba Minim, find at least 4 Halachot involving the number 4.

Answer:

There are many Halachot with the number 4 in them, here are six of them:-

One must have all 4 of the Arba Minim to do the Mitzvah of Bentching Lulay.

Whilst a Sukkah with 3 walls is kosher, it is preferable to have a Sukkah Mehudar with 4 walls.

Boards used for Schach, even if kosher for schach, must be less than 4 tefachim (24cm) wide.

If non-kosher Schach, 4 tefachim wide is used lengthwise in the middle of a sukkah's schach, it effectively 'cuts' the sukkah into 2 sukkot.

Non Kosher Schach less than 4 Amot wide, (2.88m) may be used on the edges of the Schach near the walls of the Sukkah, and will be considered as a continuation of the wall (a Dofan Akumah – a bent wall).

The length of the spine of the lulav must be at least 4 tefachim in length.

FROM OUR VICE PRESIDENT

Shemini Atzeret (and Simchat Torah in chutz la'aretz) provides us with an extension of our festive days of Sukkot. What is the nature of this day?

The Gemara in Sukka (55b) teaches that this extra festival provides an additional period for Hashem to spend time solely with Bnei Yisrael as opposed to the other nations of the world. During the festival of Sukkot there are 70



cows offered as sacrifices which corresponds to the 70 nations of the world. On Shemini Atzeret, only one cow is offered which corresponds to Bnei Yisrael alone. The Gemara brings a parable in which Sukkot is compared to a banquet in which the king says to all his servants to make him a big feast. On the last day, he sends all his servants away and says to his close friend to make him a small feast, in order that he may gain benefit from him alone.

If we stretch the parable, we can put further context to this idea when thinking of our own shule. Considering the events of the past week, there has been plenty of opportunity to spend a lot of time at Mizrachi! We have had davening, kiddushim, shiurim, our amazing Simchat Beit Hashoeva celebration, the chol hamoed morning tea all hosted on campus. Now after that week, everyone is invited back for more celebrating with Shemini Atzeret and Simchat Torah.

We are so excited for the array of programs on offer over the chagim this weekend. We thank Rae and Ari in the office for organising the kehilla through the various logistical issues required to host multiple shiurim and kiddushim over yom tov. It is a particular challenge on Simchat Torah, where each minyan will be having supper/dinner at the same time, and then requires a quick turnover for the next day where we will be doing it all again for morning tea, kiddushim and various chattanim/nashei chayil lunches.

Having mentioned the chattanim we are honoured to have both Rabbi Alan Kimche and Rabbi James Kennard as Chattan Torah and Chattan Bereishit respectively. Both Rabbi's Kimche and Kennard contribute so much to our kehilla with their guidance, leadership and Torah tutelage.

In addition we will be honouring Rafi Lamm as our Chatan Kol Hanearim. Rafi has contributed immensely to our Organisation and has held leadership positions both on the Committee and Executive over the years. In addition we are excited to have Belinda Fisher and Karen Franks who are honoured as our Nashei Chayil. TORAH TIDBITS

FROM OUR COMMUNITY

שמיני עצרת Shemini Atzeret

Unlike the *shalosh regalim*, the *torah* does not give a reason for the holiday of Shemini Atzeret. In addition, the commandment of Shemini Atzeret is only an afterthought in the pasuk that starts off regarding Sukkot:

שִׁבְעַת יָמִׁים תַּקְרִיבוּ אָשֶׁה לַיִקֹנֶק בַּיוֹּם הַשְּמִינִי מִקְרָא־קֹדֶשׁ יִהְיֶּה לָכֶּם וְהִקְרַבְתֶּם אָשֶׁה לִיקֹנָק עֲצֶרֶת הָוֹא כָּל־מְלֶאכֶת" עַבֹּדָה לֹא תַעשׁוּ:" (ויקרא כג,לוֹ)

Chizkuni recognizes these peculiarities, and explains the essence of this holiday by quoting a *midrash* found in יוקרא רבה:

This is like the following parable: A king's sons came to visit him. Following the first visit he asks them: 'when will you come back to me?' they said to him: 'In fifty days' and he sent them on their way. Following their second visit he asked them: 'when will you come back?' they told him: 'in four months' and sent them on their way. On the third visit they told him: 'we can't come back until after six months', the king responded: 'if so please stay with me one more day for now it is hard for me to part from you'.

This midrash seemingly beautifully captures the difficult transition we experience from being in Hashem's presence through the High Holidays and Sukkot, to the long routine period that will last until Pesach. However there is one glaring problem with this disconnect from Hashem that the midrash presents- the Torah tells us that every week we have a " $\forall v$ \forall

To answer this question, Rav Ezra Bick makes an amazing distinction between Yom Tov and Shabbat: On Shabbat we focus on blocking out the outside noise we have the entire week, and focus on our spirituality by limiting our interaction with the external world.

Opposed to this are the *chagim*. During our holidays we don't focus internally on ourselves but, quite the opposite. The goal of the each *chag* is to impart a transformative experience: Pesach is a time when we renew our sense of nationhood, during Shavuot we rekindle our connection to the Torah, and on Sukkot we focus on Hashem's kingship of the cosmos and finalizing our process of redemption.

With this explanation the *midrash* acquires a whole new meaning. During the *Tishrei* holidays we try to set a tone for the coming year by accepting Hashem as our king, repenting for our sins and praying for a good and plentiful year. The ending of Sukkot isn't just ending another holiday, it's the start of the renewed day to day life we worked for over the past month and a half.

The six months mentioned in the *midrash* aren't six months that are lacking G-d's presence, but six months that we will be engulfed in a routine where change is nearly impossible. Hashem is aware of this and awards us an extra day to stay in his presence- one last day to finalize the change and process what has been continuous since the beginning of *Elul*, giving us an opportunity to start implementing our newfound spirituality at the start of hopefully a plentiful and special year.

As a new initiative, each week we will have a community member share a dvar Torah in the Mizrachi Matters and online.
