# FROM OUR VICE PRESIDENT YEHUDA GOTTLIEB



Parshat Pekudei begins with an accounting of all the materials that were donated to the Mishkan and its utensils.

אֵלֶה פְקוּדֵי הַמִּשְׁכַּן מִשְׁכַּן הַעֲדָׁת אֲשֵׁר פַּקָד עַל־פִּי מֹשֵׁה...

"These (Aileh) are the accounts of the Tabernacle, the Tabernacle of testimony, that were accounted through Moshe. [Shemot 38:22]"

The Torah goes to great lengths to describe the exact number and weights of all these materials which seems to be a repetition or summary of what we have already read in the previous weeks parshiot.

However, the Or HaChaim has an interesting explanation for this accounting. He states that there are times when the Torah uses the the word "Ve-Aileh" (and these) and there are other times when the word "Aileh" (these) is used. The difference is that the former term is meant to be additive, that is to be connected to what was previously described. The latter term (Aileh) is meant to be a standalone, that is, to refer to this accounting and this alone.

The lesson from the Or HaChaim, is that the only thing that lasts is the donation to the Mishkan. This is precisely because it was a donation that was provided for the benefit of the kehilla in the service of Hashem. As it was with this donation, so it is with our contributions in future that we provide for the benefit of our communities.

Last week in the Mizrachi Matters, Benji announced the newly launched annual fundraiser for our own Mizrachi Organisation. By assisting us with your own personal contribution you will allow our own Organisation to continue to flourish and provide for the benefit of the whole kehillah.

# TORAH TIDBITS REBBETZIN SHIRA BRULL

Parashot Vayakhel and Pekudei are usually read together. However, this year being a leap year they are read separately. Parashat Pekudei seems to be a continuation of the previous Parasha, a mere summarisation of the building of the Mishkan by Betzalel, which includes the כלים and the בגדי הכהונה.



There is, however, a small but very clear difference between ויקהל פרשת and פקודי פרשת – a new phrase which appears continuously throughout this week's Parasha. The phrase, "הי את משה צוה כאשר", appears throughout our Parasha 14 times, and does not feature once in the previous Parasha. It occurs each time Betzalel or Moshe finish a phase in the building of the Mishkan: after completing the חושן, the placing of each vessel in its correct place, and on many more occasions.

When a phrase or word occurs in a Parasha or a Perek in multiples of 5 or 7, as it does in our Parasha, it is referred to by Tanach scholars as a "מילה מנחה" (key word), an effective literary tool used to convey a message, and examples of such are common throughout Tanach. The phrase "הי את משה צוה כאשר" is brought 14 times. We should therefore ask ourselves: what lesson is the Torah trying to teach us by emphasizing this phrase?

Before the construction of the Mishkan and its כלים commenced, Bnei Yisrael were asked to make donations of gold, silver and copper for the Mishkan. The construction of מלאכת המשכן only started once all the donations were given and they knew that a sufficient amount of money had been donated. That donated money was defined as לספי ציבור, public funds. Herein the Torah provides us with an important message. Money which is deemed as מספי ציבור must be utilized extremely carefully; it must only be spent for the purpose for which it was donated. Moshe, and the artisans working on the Mishkan, needed to be careful to only construct what was commanded by Hashem. This was true not only in the realm of ח-למקו בין אדם לחברו – the status of the money as public funds meant that it was allocated for a specific purpose, and to add to the Mishkan in any way would be – quite literally – at the expense of Bnei Yisrael. Thus, the Torah emphasizes, the workers were sensitive to the public nature of the funds entrusted to them and were careful not to waste any of it. They did only – and precisely – "הי את משה צוה כאשר".

# ACHDUT WITHIN MIZRACHI ISSER FEIGLIN

"We must stand united. The main factor for resilience is to feel that after experiencing the atrocities of 7 Oct, you are not alone. When we feel alone, that's when we feel trauma."

"You – the Jewish community of Australia – were there for us after 7 Oct, and we did not feel alone. Thank you."

Michal Uziyahu, from Eshkol Community Centre on the border of Gaza and Egypt, gave this message to almost 4000 Australian Jews last week at the UIA round of fundraisers for 2024. I was privileged to sing the Tefillah l'Shlom Hamedinah and the Misheberach for Tzahal alongside her and survivors of 7 Oct.

Standing in unity was also the theme of Rav Himelstein's emotional speech on Shabbat Parshat Ki Tisa in Beit Yehudah, where he talked about his own experiences living in Jerusalem through the current times.

Times like these, when the world seems to have turned upside-down, when famous Jews disavow their community at Oscar ceremonies for the claps and those who champion "lived experience" seem hell-bent on ignoring our viewpoint, we naturally turn inwards for the support and comfort of our compact communities.

Mizrachi Melbourne is one of the strongest Jewish communities in the world, part of a broader local community that punches way above its weight internationally – in resources, talent, influence and contribution where it's needed.

Community at its core is not made up of initiatives, events, programming (although all these are important, and Mizrachi has a great leadership team and hosts of incredible volunteers).

Community is the ties between us, the relationships built over years of sharing smachot and aveilut, the good times and the bad.

There are simple things each of us can do to strengthen the achdut within Mizrachi, and for Am Yisrael generally. First – attend a different minyan. Mix it up. Sit next to someone new (younger? Older?) and introduce yourself.

Second – do you know someone who you used to see regularly in Shul but has dropped away? Reach out to them. Find out what's happening in their lives.

Third – when you invite friends for Friday night meal, make Kabbalat Shabbat at Mizrachi the first part of the night. Arrange to meet your guests at Shul. Hosting guests is a beautiful feeling, and our kehillah would benefit as much as your guests would enjoy themselves.

To quote Michal again: "To be united does not mean that we agree. My son in law is a leftie and my husband is a rightie. Over Friday night Shabbat meal they fight and yell and argue, every time. And then after the screaming goes a bit quiet they turn to each other and ask, 'who's turn is it to make the coffee?'"

# FROM THE GUSH RAV MOSHE TARAGIN

#### **Pikudei: Four Testimonies**

The mishkan was an ambitious project designed to craft a house of Hashem on Earth. The mishkan hosted daily korbanot, was the scene of national assembly, and was the epicenter for the devar Hashem and divine communication.



It also voiced a testimony. The Torah designates the mishkan as a mishkan ha'eidut, or a house of testimony. Beyond enabling religious rites, it testified to truths which, previously, had been unclear or under dispute.

We were selected by Hashem to represent Him in a dark and confused world. After two centuries of brutal slavery and merciless persecution we were liberated through supernatural miracles. A few weeks later, we stood beneath a blazing mountain, receiving His word, and pledged to live by His will.

Shockingly, just a few weeks later we betrayed our faith and fashioned an egel. After months of tefillah and teshuvah Hashem forgave us and requisitioned the construction of His house. The mishkan testified to the possibility of forgiveness. We take this concept for granted, but ancient Man could not imagine divine forgiveness. The sanctuary confirmed that Hashem desired penitence and accepts human apology. It testified to Mankind that Hashem would forgive their failures.

Furthermore, the mishkan produced testimony about Jewish history. It announced that Hashem had not forsaken His people and that we were still chosen, despite our horrible misconduct. The mishkan testified that Jewish selection is enduring and capable of outlasting our moral betrayals.

#### **Historical Testimony**

Often, epic events reshape the arc of history, irreversibly affecting the human condition. Some events, however, aren't just dramatic and historically impactful but are also testimonial. These moments don't just relandscape history but also message humanity and message history. They aren't merely historical shifts but are historical testimonies which discredit popular perspectives and introduce new paradigms.

Legal testimony is registered in court and alters our prior perceptions of innocence or guilt. Historical testimony is registered in the human imagination and refutes faulty historical assumptions. At several crucial junctures, events in Jewish history testified against preconceived ideas. The sanctuary was the first historical testimony and it signaled that even after moral collapse we were still chosen.

### **The Second Testimony**

950 years later the Purim episode provided a second historical testimony. A student of history, Haman understood that we were chosen by Hashem and had been privileged to extraordinary divine providence. He took a brave gamble, though, wagering that, after our first exile, we had forfeited that chosen status and were now similar to other nations. As he described it: [The Jews are] a nation "scattered and divided", living *amongst* other nations. His genocidal plan fed off the popular conception that the Jews had surrendered their chosen status and had abandoned their destiny. Yerushalayim had been ransacked, the Mikdash had been incinerated, and we had been exiled from the land. Haman assumed that, at his stage of history, we had been discarded by Hashem and had become just as vulnerable as any other nation. With enough hatred and enough money, we could be erased from the map of humanity.

The Purim miracle debunked his malicious assumptions. Not only were we *once* chosen but we were *still* chosen. Despite our severe moral breakdowns and despite the trauma of being evicted from our homeland, Jewish

destiny was still intact. Our chosen status could not only outlast sin, but could also survive exile.

### **The Third Testimony**

Twenty-five hundred years later a third testimony became necessary. The holocaust was the most horrific atrocity in history. Never before had genocide been launched against an entire nation. Tragically, wars and natural disasters often devastated local populations, but never before was there a concerted and wholesale attempt to eradicate an entire race of people living in different countries and of vastly different ideological opinions. By launching his genocide, Hitler declared that the Jewish people didn't have the right to inhabit this Earth. Two millennia of Jewish suffering coupled with contemporary social and racial theories, appeared to support his murderous claim.

In the dismal aftermath of the Holocaust Jewish future seemed bleak. The Holocaust accredited the contention that we were a forsaken people condemned to slowly disappear or to gradually become assimilated into the general population. The Holocaust raised severe existential questions for which many people had no answers. After a lengthy exile and unspeakable suffering during the Holocaust, it appeared that Jewish history was cursed.

A few years later these gloomy predictions were rebutted. Our return to Israel and to Jewish sovereignty repudiated any notions that Jewish history had ended. Despite the confusion of exile and the chaos of the Holocaust, it was obvious that Hashem still cared for us, and that His ancient promises hadn't expired. In 1965, the Church officially reconciled with Judaism, recognizing us as the people of G-d and condemning any form of anti-Semitism. After thousands of years of persecution and after the disaster of the Holocaust, our return to Israel testified to our fiercest enemies that our people had an enduring role in the fate of Mankind. Not only would Jews survive but they would continue to shape civilization.

#### The Fourth Testimony

75 years after the third testimony, we are listening to the sound of the gradually emerging fourth testimony. It is obvious that this war is much more than a local geopolitical skirmish. It is also painfully obvious that the war isn't just being waged with a terrorist group or with a seething Arab world. A broad coalition of Israel haters lines up to protest our just and moral war. Many of these fuming protesters are just anti-Semitic opportunists using the current conflict as an excuse to spew hatred and death threats at us. Many are even explicit about their desire to rid the world of our people. They still haven't "received the message" of previous testimonies.

Many of the anti-Israel protestors though, do not contest our rights as a people, but are staunchly opposed to our rights to our land. To them this country never belonged to us, and we are nothing more than exploitative colonial invaders. The current cultural environment which has broadly condemned colonialism and has championed the rights of the oppressed appears to lend credibility to Israel haters. They naively and simplistically apply policies and viewpoints to our struggle to live peacefully in our homeland.

This is the first time since the formation of Israel that its right to exist is being broadly challenged. The phrase "from the River to the Sea" explicitly denies us any rights to our ancient homeland. Of course, the claim that Jews have the right to exist, but the state of Israel does not, is disingenuous. History has proven that without a Jewish homeland Jewish survival is tenuous, at best. However, Israel has the right to exist independent of its role in preserving Jewish survival. This is our ancient homeland which Hashem delivered to us. We are not exploitative colonizers but a peaceful nation returning home, seeking goodwill, and aspiring to share prosperity with our neighbors.

This outcome of this struggle will provide the fourth testimony of history. The mishkan testimony reaffirmed Jewish selection even after our national sin. The Purim testimony reinforced Jewish selection even after exile. The State of Israel testimony verified Jewish destiny even after it had appeared to have faded through time and violently wrecked during the holocaust. The fourth testimony will affirm that not only are we Hashem's chosen, and not only is our destiny eternal, but that we have the right to live in our ancient homeland awarded to us by Hashem. The fourth testimony, like previous testimonies, will be entered into the annals of history. Like previous testimonies it will be violntly opposed, until its opponents fade away and it enters collective human consciousness.

#### **Answer:**

There were several correct answers for this question such as:-

רַשַּׁבָּת : זַיּאֹמֶר	35: 3-4
חַפָּאוֹר וְאֶת	35: 14
חַכִּיֹר וְאֶת	35:16
הָּחָצֵר וְאֶת	35:18

The pair of words that attracted commentary from **Baal HaTurim** was the first one, in which the word הָשַּׁבָּת appears .

Baal HaTurim notes the significance of the word תּוֹרָה that can be formed from the first and final letters of this word pair as follows. It alludes to the day of Shabbat as being the most appropriate time for Torah study as it is the day when a person is free from his weekday endeavours.

In Tanna Dvei Eliyahu 1, it states that Hashem told Bnei Yisrael, "I wrote regarding my Torah

(Yehoshua 1:8) " לֹא־יָמוּשׁ סֵפֶּר הַתּוֹרָה הַזֶּה מִפְּיד This Sefer Torah shall not depart from your mouth"

"Therefore, even though you labour for six days, you shall use the Shabbat entirely for Torah".

In line with this, Chazal instituted that a person should awake early on Shabbat, study some Torah, then go to shule and from there to the Beit haMidrash. He should read first from Torah then from the Neviim. After that he should return home and eat and drink etc".

The **Zohar (Shelach 174a)** states "The portion of those who delve into Torah on the Shabbat is more worthy than that of the other days".

### MATANOT LE'EVYONIM

The mitzvah of Matanot L'Evyonim – providing the equivalent of a Purim meal for two individuals on Purim day was always understood by the poskim as being even more important in priority than the monies spent on mishloach manot and personal seudot.

Therefore, one should spend less money on mishlo'ach manot and more on matanot l'evyonim.

Each person above the age of Bar/Bat Mitzvah is supposed to contribute this amount.

As has been the practice for years, Mizrachi will distribute Matanot L'Evyonim on Purim day to Aniyei Ha'Ir (local needy people) and to Aniyei Eretz Yisroel (needy people in Israel).

Please bring your monies to the office as soon as possible or ring through your credit card details on 8317 2504, so that funds can be distributed on Purim day itself, as per the Halachic requirement.

As always, baskets will be available on the bimah in all minyanim on Purim night and morning for monies not arranged ahead of time. Please understand, however, that remitting the monies earlier than the morning of Purim enables us to distribute appropriately with greater pre-thought and ease.


