FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

Find the Space for Balance

Should I come to services on the High Holidays? Or better put, why is the Synagogue making me choose? The Synagogue has made the difficult decision to offer people the opportunity to come to in-person services on the High Holidays or to view it from home. We recognize the qualitative difference between watching from home and being there in person. Yet you have had to make the choice, which is difficult for everyone. There are some who feel this may be their last High Holidays and for many of them coming to services in person could be dangerous. For others coming to services in person is at the core of their Jewish identity and it is where they feel most supported.

But we are not the only people suffering from the dilemmas posed by this unique moment in history.

Representative Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez says it's time "to stop protecting" billionaires and "pass a billionaires' tax." The idea is to make billionaires cover New York State's expected \$13.3 billion Covid-induced budget shortfall.

Governor Andrew Cuomo responded, "A single percent of New York's population pays 50% of the taxes, and they're the most mobile people on the globe." With 118 billionaires, New York's revenues would take a big hit if even just a handful of them were to leave.

One last great debate is raging right now.

In Dallas, Texas, Superintendent of Schools for the Dallas Independent School District, Michael Hinojosa is trying to make plans to reopen his 153,000 student district amid the coronavirus pandemic.

Tawnell D. Hobbs wrote in the Wall Street Journal on Aug. 10, 2020 "They must balance rapidly changing statistics that project the potential loss of learning—and potential loss of lives."

In these troubling and dangerous economic times, it is rare that a single solution will ever emerge. It is not a case of Occam's Razor in which the simplest answer is more likely to be correct. It is why, as I write this article, the triangulated relationship of Republicans, Democrats and the President find themselves locked in a battle about relief that can bring the economy back while not creating long term challenges that are insurmountable.

I know, you haven't come to read the Hamvaser, and certainly not my column, for punditry. However, I do believe in our tradition. Specifically it is the way that it is understood by the Conservative movement that is instructive. We are the natural heirs to our evolving understanding of our place in the world, our sages, as I have become, were and are pragmatic idealists.

There is no simple answer to taxing the super wealthy as there is no straightforward way to open schools safely. To make blanket demands and overly naïve political jabs may stake a claim but they will do little to solve significant challenges. We live in an interconnected world. One part impacts another. Children not attending school creates all sorts of deleterious effects. But at the same time, children going to school generates a host of other potentially dangerous outcomes.

So here are a few principles from our deep and profound tradition that ought to guide us.

1. כי לא על הלחם לבדו יחיה האדם

Not on bread alone do we live (Deuteronomy 8:3)

There is more to life than just having our material needs met. We need ways to nurture our souls and our bodies.

2. אם אין קמח אין תורה אם אין תורה אין קמח

Without bread there is no Torah (Pirkei Avot 3:17)

We must make a living. Money does not grow on trees and to think that simply living ideals will take care of itself is just plain ignorant.

Of all our values walking the middle road is the most important except when it comes to greed and anger, those we must avoid above all else. (Tur Evan Laws of the Foundations of Torah 10:12)

We must find a balance in everything we do; no principle of living is more important than any other.

To these texts, I add my thoughts on living in dangerous economic times and finding balance is harder.

If you can, give more.

If you need help, be willing to accept it.

Find spaces that take our mind off the challenges.

Find spaces that help us focus on the challenges.

HAPPY NEW YEAR!!! CHAG SAMEACH!! SHANAH TOVA UMETUKAH!!!!

As we enter 5781, we reflect on the year past and anticipate the New Year. We are grateful for our family and friends, for our communities and for our synagogue. While the months of Adar, Nissan, Iyar, Tammuz, Av (March through August) proved to be disconcerting, fraught with confusion, illness and isolation, GHC rose to the occasion and pivoted quickly to meet the needs of our congregation. Schools went into virtual mode, Kabbalat Shabbat went on to a Zoom Platform. Shabbat services were live streamed from our sanctuary, with just Rabbi Stein in a sanctuary designed to hold 125. Gradually as the State and CDC eased restrictions, we welcomed 12, then 15, 18, 21 and now 24 individuals into our shul to enjoy Shabbat services with Rabbi Stein and Cantor May in person, as well as, to share the experience with those watching from home.

We selected a new cantor, Anna Chapman May, with full participation of the congregation and bade farewell to Cantor Janet with a dynamic Journal Event Zoomed live to over 100 screens. We hired new full-time and part-time custodians Rene Zayas and Andrew Lewitt and welcomed them into our GHC family. When our Bookkeeper Nalini resigned in July we were fortunate to have Yoko Yamamoto–Furst join Madaline and Jacqui in our office.

GHC committees continued to function, Boards continued to meet, Task Forces were created and fun activities under CAMP GHC were offered. We played Bingo, Asked the Rabbi, baked challah, discussed book selections, all on-line. Our youth group met several times, for fun activities and to socialize. Our TOT Shabbat program flourished with our 0-6-year olds. We practiced self defense in the parking lot and four of our young people celebrated their B'nai Mitzvah.

As we look forward to the New Year, we know that it will be like no other. We know that the High Holidays are more than just a religious service. It is the time we catch up with old friends and make new ones. It is time when we bring our children back into the fold, many of them bringing the next generation with them. It is a time to connect with friends, with family and with our Judaism. Yes, this year will be different, but it will not be without content and not without spirituality.

The Task Force created a safe environment with multiple services for those who wish to worship in person. All services will be live streamed for those who prefer to participate from home. The Rabbi and Cantor have created abridged, yet meaningful holiday experiences for all. Throughout the month of Elul, the Rabbi and Cantor will be sharing with the congregation weekly videos they developed, just to get us in the holiday mood.

Our ECC is fully subscribed and will be having in-person classes for our 2-4 year olds. Classes will start outside and will be gradually moved indoors as weather dictates. Once inside, each class will be separated and housed in different rooms throughout the building. Religious School will be virtual and as protocols change, so will the classes. The office has opened, but appointments must be made beforehand and protocols followed.

Our 5781 GHC calendar is full, many of the programs originally designed as in-person events, may go virtual and that's ok. Our community is strong, vital and engaged. The leadership, lay and professional are committed to making our synagogue work for you and meet your individual needs, as best as we can. However, we need your commitment too. If you have not paid your dues as yet, please do so. If you can "Pay It Forward", by adding a bit more to your annual dues to help those in need, please do so. If you usually purchase guest tickets and are not doing it this year, consider sending that amount to GHC as donation. If you were planning on sending a Kol Nidre donation, please do so. If this is a difficult time and you cannot meet your current obligation, please let us know, we can help. With your continued support GHC will continue to thrive as the only full-service Conservative Synagogue in the Rivertowns and beyond.

Yes, the world is changing, evolving, morphing into something else, but we at the Greenburgh Hebrew Center are steadfast in our mission to embrace our traditions, educate our children, engage with the changing world and provide for our future.


The High Holy Days and the month leading up to them bring up strong feelings. There is excitement and anticipation, yet also anxiety and even dread. This is a time when we are asked to look deeply at ourselves in an honest way, which is not always comfortable. We must wake up from our slumber and strive to make the coming year better and more meaningful than the last one which is a daunting task.

The High Holy Day season has always been a challenging one particularly for clergy as it is one of the busiest times of the year, and the most pressure-filled. As a relatively new member of the clergy, this year brings like even more pressure, to help make these High Holidays especially meaningful, comforting, and inspiring, while also condensing the service so that people need not spend too long inside the sanctuary.

At the same time, the circumstances we are living through have made it harder to focus on the work of preparation. For me, spending so much time working at home brings so many distractions. Just thinking about everything going on in the world right now has made it hard for many, including myself, to focus for long periods of time. I've found that I want to distract myself by checking Facebook, watching Netflix, searching for apartments online, and playing with my cat.

But I remind myself that while this season does bring its pressures, the High Holidays are not about perfection. While they are about accounting for ourselves and our actions over the past year, they are not about trying to meet an impossible standard. They are about forgiving ourselves, making amends when necessary, and moving towards change.

Each year that I have led High Holy Day services, I have felt like I would not be ready, yet somehow each year by the time Erev Rosh Hashanah arrived, I was. While this year will be different in many ways, I know I will be ready, and our community will be ready. It may not look or feel like it did in the past and it may not be what we expect the High Holy Days to be, but it is the spirit that we bring to it is what is important. It is our intention to come together in prayer - to sing, to learn and to be moved is what matters most, this year more than ever.

EARLY CHILDHOOD CENTER

Dear GHC Religious School & Early Childhood Center Families,

We want to thank you for your patience and understanding as we took the time necessary to evaluate options and plan for the upcoming school year. Over the summer our incredible faculty, clergy and GHC leadership have been hard at work imagining what the fall will look like.

Protecting human life exceeds all other Jewish values. At Greenburgh Hebrew Center, the well-being and health of both our students and our staff is always our first priority. With safety at the forefront of every decision, we are excited about our plans for September and the amazing, high quality educational experiences we have created!

Our Early Childhood Center (which is full, with wait lists for every class) will open in person and on time, September 8th. GHC has invested the time, energy and support to create outdoor classrooms, which will be utilized for as long as possible for our small ECC. We have Covid-19 safety protocols in place that far exceed what the CDC, Department of Health, and Office of Children and Family Services require.

We made the decision to begin religious education virtually for the fall, in line with WHAT other synagogues throughout Westchester and greater New York are doing. We will be evaluating the situation every four weeks to determine when it will be safe to come together inperson as a community. This was a difficult decision and many other options were considered. However, after consulting experts and families, we felt that the safety risks of bringing our much larger religious school physically together at the beginning of the school year outweighed the benefits. Our religious school classes will meet virtually as whole grades on Sundays. Our Hebrew learning will be online in pairs or small groups of 3 students. These groups will be carefully created to ensure your child gets the most out of their Hebrew language instruction.

We may have small, in-person, meet and greets at the beginning of the school year. This is TBD, based on local infection rates, safety guidelines, etc.

Please register for our religious school, so that we will be able to ensure that your child has the best experience possible this year! **Please also consider supporting our religious school through a donation. We know that our**

religious school is at the heart of our synagogue, that G-d willing this crisis will be over soon, and that in order to sustain our school, we need to continue our support of it now.

This fee is necessitated due to the fee that the credit card processor charges GHC. To avoid the fee, you can always send in a check like you have in the past.

As far as making a donation is concerned, the 3.5% Convenience Fee is **STRICTLY OP-TIONAL**. While we would very much appreciate it if you can cover this expense, more importantly, we thank you for your donation and thus this fee is not required. It will ON-LY be added to your donation, if you click the box under the convenience fee per instructions.

ONCE YOU GO TO "SUBMIT PAYMENT" you will be directed to our processor, which is PAY-PAL. IF you have an account with PayPal, you can enter it and pay that way. **IF YOU DO NOT HAVE AN ACCOUNT WITH PAYPAL** (you do NOT have to have a PayPal account), **just click on the tab that asks "Pay by Debit or Credit Card".** Once you enter your information and submit, you will be asked if you are **FINISHED.** YOU **MUST CLICK ON THAT TAB** or your payment will not be processed. Once done, you will get a receipt from PayPal AND a confirmation thank you from GHC.

Please Note: The OFFICE WILL NOT UNDER ANY CIRCUMSTANCES take credit card information. To submit payment, you MUST make it through our website. For legal reasons, there can be NO EXCEPTIONS!



GREEN TEAM



Five years ago, the Green Team established a compost bin behind the GHC building, next to the parking lot, thanks in large part to the efforts of Rabbi Emeritus and GreenFaith Fellow Barry Kenter and former Green Team Chair Barney Wolff. Subsequently, on most Shabbats, the Kiddish Committee collected food scraps during their lunch preparations, and the scraps were deposited in the compost bin. Paper from our office shredder was also added to the compost bin.

This past Spring, I contacted the Chief Gardener at Untermyer Park and Gardens on North Broadway in Yonkers to inquire about whether they could make use of the compost. Untermyer Park and Gardens agreed, and in July, gardeners from Untermyer came to GHC with their dump truck and shovels. We were gratified to see how our food scraps and shredded paper had been transformed into beautiful, rich soil. Share in GHC's success by viewing the photographs included in this issue of Hamvaser! A special thanks goes to Roy Kushner, the Management Committee representative to the Green Team, for managing the compost removal.

The Green Team has planned a virtual garden tour for GHC gardeners to show off their green thumbs and their successful, summer gardens. We expect eight GHC gardeners to demonstrate the relationship between cultivating the land and the fruits of their labor. This will take place on Sunday, September 13th at 8 PM on Zoom. Rabbi Stein will lead off with a Dvar Torah about our stewardship of the Earth. See the flyer in this issue for complete details including Zoom information.

We have applied for a Seal of Sustainability for GHC through the Jewish environmental organization Hazon. Hazon's mission is to weave environmental sustainability and education into the fabric of Jewish life, and provide programming resources and leadership support to Jewish institutions.
