



FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

It takes a while for historic events to come into perspective. The way a society works through its struggle for perspective in the modern world is through film, television and the written word. In the ancient world it was first pictures, then the written word. We do not need to think hard about the variety of films that depict the Russians, Japanese, Chinese, Arabs in a violent and destructive way. We cannot even count the number of books that do the same. The conflicts we as Americans have had over the past 70 years have still not fully been understood and these two mediums-film and print- help us to undergo national psychotherapy as we come to grips with the losses we have sustained and the deep pain we have inflicted.

At first we vilify the enemy as we make sense of conflict and then hopefully we find a more sympathetic voice.

In these two months of March and April we will read two stories that try to make sense of our history, each recalling significant moments of conflict. In both stories, there is a vindictive and angry response to our enemy and in both there is resolution to the conflict. Yet, it is only in the Passover story that we finally find our kinder voice.

In the story of Purim, we graphically depict, through the arrangement of the words and at the very end of the story, the hanging of Haman and his sons. On Passover we use the words of the Jeremiah, then quoted by the Psalmist to conclude our Seder with the phrase:

שָׁפַךְ חַמְתְּךָ עַל-הַגּוֹיִם אֲשֶׁר לֹא-יִדְעוּךָ וְעַל מְשֻׁפְחוֹת אֲשֶׁר
 בְּשִׁמְךָ לֹא קָרְאוּ כִי-אָכְלוּ אֶת-יַעֲקֹב וְאָכְלוּהוּ וַיְכַלְהוּ וְאֶת-נְוֵהוּ
 הַשָּׁמַיִם:

Pour out Your wrath on the nations who have not heeded You, (Jeremiah 10:25)

The last word on the subject in both stories seems to be vengeance. Yet if we dig a little deeper and actually look at the evolution of the Seder, we see a later addition, or rather a later explanation, of one particular custom of the Seder.

Before I get to that, however, I want to share two other ideas about Passover: First, except for the first two days, we only recite half of a Hallel. Second, Sukkot is called the "Time of our Joy" ; Passover is not. Both of these data points seem to indicate, at least according to my colleague, Rabbi Evan Hoffman (with whom I absolutely agree), that our joy is diminished on Passover because of the extraordinary suffering the Egyptians endured, which ultimately resulted in their defeat. As the Midrash points out, when Jewish people were singing and dancing as they watched the Egyptians drown in the sea, God was angry that we rejoiced while some of God's creatures died.


Now back to the custom I was referring to earlier. We have all heard that we pour out (some dip a finger in) wine while we recite the ten plagues. Many of us have heard the reason for that is because we are diminished when others suffer, even if they are our enemy. That explanation was never offered until the mid -19th century.

Until that point, the only explanation that was given is that we are trying to distance ourselves from the plagues in the hopes they would not happen to us. This radically new explanation, which has caught on as the dominant, if not definitive, rationale, seems to indicate we have finally put that moment of Jewish history into perspective.

These two great stories of national survival offer a moment of perspective on coming to terms with both opposing instincts. As the prayer for peace we offer each Shabbat states, "We have not come into being to hate or destroy. We have come into being to praise, to labor and to love."

CANTOR

This month we enter Adar II, the Hebrew month known for bringing with it joy, celebration, and more than a little silliness. It is the month when everything is a little turned around; not what it seems. We dress up in costumes, we eat and drink, and we celebrate that time in Ancient Persia when we were almost wiped out by Human's evil decree, but were saved by the brave Queen Esther and wise Mordechai.

As it says in chapter 8:16 of the Megillah, *Layehudim hayta ora v'simcha v'sason v'ikar, ken tihyeh lanu* - The Jews of old had light, and happiness and joy and love — may it be so for us!

We repeat this line each week as well, as part of havdalah.

It is said that *mi shenichnas Adar marbin b'simcha* - when Adar comes in, our joy increases.

I like the idea of a month bringing with it extra happiness, just as we say that Shabbat brings us each an extra soul for 24 hours. Judaism, is a religion based on time. Different times of the year bring different holidays, and different moods and rituals, based on where in the calendar we are. It is comforting to think of something external to ourselves causing, or encouraging, us to feel happier.

These days, the entire world can use more joy, and more light. These past two years have been exhausting, isolating, and scary. Yet it can be hard to turn on a dime, to let go of the heaviness around us, and suddenly feel the party-like mood that Adar encourages. Just as on the three festivals, Pesach, Shavuot and Sukkot, we are commanded in Deuteronomy 16:14 *v'samachta b'chagecha v'hayita ach sameach* - You shall rejoice on your festivals, and should be fully happy. We are told we must feel not just happy, but "fully happy"!

But how does one actually fulfill the commandment to be happy, if they are not really feeling it?

There are many reasons to be sad in this world. Yet there are also many reasons to be happy. We can find both by just looking around, seeing people suffering, sick and in pain. Maybe we are the ones suffering. We can also look around and see people helping out, friends, family, and community offering support. We can notice the beauty of the natural world, the trees on the Aqueduct, the view of the snow-covered Palisades by the waterfront. It is possible to behold both the suffering and the beauty at the same time. Sometimes our inner scale tips towards one, other times towards the other. It is the balance that we are constantly trying to achieve.

Perhaps Adar tries to teach us to tip our scale, at least for this month, towards the beauty and the joy, the light and love. Chodesh tov!


Religious School

We are so proud of our religious school students and all they continue to accomplish! We will highlight our eldest classes - Vav & Zayin (6th & 7th grade) this month.

Our Vav and Zayin students have been learning from Rabbi Stein about the relationship between the Oral Law (Mishna) and written law (Torah). They are learning how to utilize the Etz Hayim Humash we use in the sanctuary on Shabbat. They also work as separate classes with Cantor May, and delve into tefillah and B'nei Mitzvah prep in creative and fun ways. Vav learned about Birkat Hamazon with Cantor May, while our Zayin students are practicing the blessings after the Haftarah, and learning some basic conversational Hebrew. They also learned about the important role of Jews in the Civil Rights Movement during January and February. They grappled with ethical questions from a Jewish perspective, using the "You Be the Judge" book series, and started the Moving Traditions curriculum.

Our Vav and Zayin students participated in a special cooking class just for them, sponsored by GHC's Green Team and the Hazon grant! Revived GHC Recipe Column / Green Recipe of the Month

VEGETABLE TAGINE

2 tablespoons olive oil

2 medium yellow onions, thinly sliced

4 garlic cloves, finely chopped

1/4 teaspoon saffron threads, crushed (optional)

1 1/2 teaspoons ground ginger

1/2 teaspoon turmeric

1 cinnamon stick (or 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon)

Salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste pounds

2 mixed winter vegetables, such as sweet potato, carrot, turnips, beets, parsnips, peeled and cut into bite-sized pieces

2 cups light vegetable stock

3/4 cup soft dried prunes

1 cup green olives, pitted

1 large lemon, skin peeled into strips using a vegetable peeler, and juiced

1 can chickpeas, drained

1 tablespoon butter (or olive oil or butter substitute)

1 tablespoon chopped flat-leaf parsley

Heat oil in a large, heavy-bottomed, saucepan over medium heat. Add onions to pan and cook over medium-low heat, about 15 minutes, until soft and lightly browned. Add the garlic, saffron, ground ginger, turmeric, cinnamon stick or ground cinnamon, salt, and pepper to the pan and continue to cook an additional minute, until aromatic.

Add the prepared vegetables to the pan and then stir in the vegetable stock, scraping down the sides and bottom of the pan. Add the prunes, lemon skin, olives, and the juice of half the lemon and bring to a simmer. Cover the pan, reduce the heat to low and simmer for 30 minutes, until the vegetables are soft.

Add the chickpeas and butter and simmer, about 5 minutes. Discard the cinnamon stick. Season with salt, pepper, and additional lemon juice, if necessary. Scatter parsley on top and serve.

Yield: Serves 4 to 6.

3/4 cup onion, thinly sliced

1/2 cup raisins

1 tablespoon honey

1/4 teaspoon pepper

COUS COUS TFAYA

1/4 teaspoon turmeric

1/4 teaspoon crumbled saffron, optional

3 tablespoons butter (olive oil or butter substitute), divided

3 cups water or light vegetable broth

1/2 teaspoon coarse salt

1 1/2 cups uncooked Cous Cous (can be substituted with brown rice, white rice, quinoa, gluten-free Israeli cous-cous, or gluten-free orzo, however, follow the cooking instructions on the package for these substitutes)

1/2 cup sliced almonds, toasted

1 tablespoon chopped fresh parsley

1/4 cup pomegranate seeds

Add the sliced onions, raisins, honey, pepper, cinnamon, ginger, turmeric, and saffron to a medium saucepan. Add 2 tablespoons butter and 1/2 cup water. Cover and bring to a simmer. Continue simmering for 30 minutes over low heat, stirring occasionally, until the onions are very soft and golden. Add more water only if the liquids evaporate before the onions are cooked. The onions should be thick and syrupy.

In a medium saucepan, bring the water or broth, salt, and 1 tablespoons butter to a boil. Stir in the couscous, cover tightly with a lid, and remove from heat. Let the couscous steam for 5 to 10 minutes, until the couscous has absorbed the liquid. Use a fork to fluff the couscous and break up any clumps.

Transfer the couscous to a large bowl and add the onion mixture and the almonds. Toss until well mixed. Serve with fresh parsley and pomegranate seeds.

All GHC member children who attend a Jewish non-profit sleep away camp or any Ramah Camp for a partial or full summer may be entitled to a stipend from one of two funds. The **Jewish Education Fund** supports GHC member children who attend **any** Ramah Camp or **any** USY Summer program or trip, including Encampment. A second fund, **The Julia B. Chazen Camp Fund**, supports GHC member children attending Jewish non-profit sleep-away camps, other than Ramah camps, such as camps sponsored by other Jewish denominations, Zionist organizations, Young Judea, B'nai B'rith, JCC's, etc. If you want to know if your sleepaway camp is covered by the Chazen Fund, please check the Foundation for Jewish Camp website, <https://jewishcamp.org/one-happy-camper/find-a-camp-overnight/>, for a comprehensive list of Jewish non-profit camps.

All of the Ramah Camps (including Ramah Sports Academy in Connecticut, Ramah in the Rockies, Ramah in Israel) and USY Summer programs are incredibly well run and offer enriching experiences. The USY Summer experiences include, but are not limited to, the following: USY Pilgrimage to Israel/Europe, USY on Wheels (region-based trips in North America), DreamUSY (Dominican Republic service trip), TivnUSY-Building Justice and USY/Kadima Encampment (one week long, takes place in late August about one and a half hours away). We fully endorse them and they provide an educational and spirited component that you cannot find anywhere else! Even if your teen has not participated in the GHC Youth Group, he or she is still eligible to join a USY trip or program during the summer.

If your teen wants to spend the summer, a semester or a year in Israel, please let us know! The trip can take place during high school, as a gap year, or even during college. A third fund, the **Harry and Anna Singer Scholarship Fund**, supports GHC member teens and young adults going to Israel to study or tour with a non-profit organization, such as USY or Young Judea. If you need help picking a program, let us know! Thank you to Fran and Saul (z"l) Singer for initiating this fund.
