FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

The Moral Foundation of Our World

How many times have you done something and then wondered why you did it? How many times have you done something knowing full well why you did it but were unwilling to admit to others why you did it? In the second scenario, were you able to come up with a feasible rationale for your behavior that had nothing to do with why you actually did it? (Have you given up on this article already? If so, please nevertheless stick with me for just a little while longer.)

I never believed that my intuition was stronger than my reasoning. It is the age-old dilemma of whether to follow your heart or your brain. If we choose to follow our heart for completely irrational reasons, we can usually come up with a reason for behaving that way. In *The Righteous Mind*, Jonathan Haidt refers to this phenomenon, stating, "[M]oral reasoning is sometimes a post hoc fabrication." In this important book he lays out many approaches to looking at how we have developed as a society in general and the role individuals play in shaping the values and morals of any given society.

After a long discussion of whether morals are universal or particular to a specific culture and time, and after an even longer discussion about whether morals are something we are born with, i.e., the nativist's approach, or whether they are learned, the empiricist's approach, he gives us what he believes are the six morals that guide society. (If you are going to read this book and want to skip to this part, he lays it out beautifully on page 146.)

Simply put, and in far shorter form, here are the six morals that Haidt asserts are foundational to society. I have taken the liberty of selecting the Jewish language relating to each of the six.

1. Care/Harm

When asked what is the essence of the Torah, Hillel reminded the potential student that "love your neighbor as yourself" is the foundation of our entire tradition; the rest is commentary. Until we learn to get along, to care for each other, conflict will continue to seize the day.

2. Fairness/Cheating

ַלָא־תַעֲנֶה בְרֵעֲךָּ עֵד שֶׁקֶר:

You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor. (Exodus 20:13)

The language we use has power. Lying is one of the great abuses of language. Trust is the basis of an honest and deep relationship, the kind of relationship that serves the greater good.

3. Loyalty/Betrayal

וָ,דַעְתָּּ בִּי־יְהָׁנָה אֱלֹהֶיףּ הָוּא הָאֱלֹהֶים הָאֵל ֹהַנָּאֱמָּׁן שֹׁמֵּר הַבְּּרֵית וְהַחֶּסֶד לְאֹהַבֵּיו וּלְשֹׁמְרֵי מִצְוּתָוּ לְאֵלֵף דְּוֹר:

Know, therefore, that only your God יהוה is God, the steadfast God, who keeps the divine covenant faithfully to the thousandth generation of those who love [God] and keep the divine commandments, (Deuteronomy 7:9)

When we find ourselves connected to others, we recognize that sometimes we must trust them to make good decisions even if we disagree with them. Showing others that we stand by them, that we will not turn on them, strengthens the fabric of our connections to others.

4. Authority/Subversion

But Samuel said: "Does the LORD delight in burnt offerings and sacrifices as much as in obedience to the LORD's command? Surely, obedience is better than sacrifice, compliance than the fat of rams. (I Samuel 15:22)

Recognizing that there is a force greater than we is one of the core elements in Alcoholics Anonymous and found in one of the great conundrums of our tradition. We have control, free will, but we also understand the role God plays in our lives. "The beginning of wisdom is awe of the God." (Proverbs 9:10)

5. Sanctity/Degradation

And one would call to the other, "Holy, holy, holy! The LORD of Hosts! His presence fills all the earth!" (Isaiah 6:3)

Everyone divides up the world. Good and bad. Clean and dirty. Pure and impure. We do it with objects and we do it with people and, for the more enlightened, we do it with behavior. We know people whom we think of as angels and those whom we believe to be demons.

6. Liberty/Oppression

And you shall hallow the fiftieth year. You shall proclaim liberty throughout the land for all its inhabitants. It shall

be a jubilee for you; each of you shall return to your holding and each of you shall return to your family. (Leviticus 25:10)

It is written on the Liberty Bell and may very well be the idea that instigated the founding of America. "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness."

The difficulty of this list is not who came up with the list (though I think you know where I stand on this). The trickiness of this list is not in deciding whether it is comprehensive or would you add other items to it. The challenge is to live lives of integrity, lives that better our world.

CANTOR

I am not really a morning person. I love sleep too much. When my alarm goes off in the morning, all I want to do is stay in bed, just another 15 minutes...30 minutes...an hour. Every week, after Kiddush on Shabbat, I go home and take a long nap, sometimes for three or four hours.

Yet when I do get up early, I am always glad that I did. I like the cool, crisp air of the morning, the rituals of getting up, making coffee and starting the day, and the feeling of possibility that the morning brings. As it says in Psalm 30, ba-erev yalin bechi v'laboker rinah - one may lie down crying at night, but wake in the morning with joyful song.

The morning prayers of Shabbat are also my favorite. I enjoy the prayers of pesukei d'zimra and shaharit, when we prepare ourselves to pray, and warm up our voices and our souls. We need to get ready as we move towards the Amidah, the central prayer of the service, when we speak to God personally (or use the time for silent contemplation).

One prayer that always stands out for me is El Adon, which is part of the Yotzer Or blessing, the first blessing before the Shema. El Adon literally means "God, the Master" and is an ancient pityut (liturgical poem) believed to have been written between the second and fourth centuries in Israel. It is one of the oldest prayers that we still use today. It is an homage to God for creating the celestial bodies - the sun, moon and stars. Its third paragraph reads:

How good are the lights that our God created Fashioned with understanding, intelligence and insight;
Endowed with the strength and power
To have dominion over earthly realms

Fully luminous, they gleam brightly radiating splendor throughout the world Happy as they go forth, joyous on their return, they accomplish, with awe, the will of their creator

The heavenly lights not only do the will of their Creator, but they also offer praise and glorify God through song and through the shining of their light.

Like Ashrei, El Adon is an alphabetic acrostic, with the beginning letter of each line moving from Alef to Tav. It is attributed to a group of ancient Jewish mystics, who predated Kabbalah by 500 years. They are known as the *yordei merkavah*, the riders on the chariot. The focus of this group, which are also the major themes of El Adon, are the story of creation, and the story of Ezekiel's vision of God's chariot, carried in the air by four celestial beings.

According to Rabbi Jeffrey Hoffman, a professor of liturgy at Hebrew Union College, "El Adon is the reaction of a poetic soul to the daily rising of the sun, extolling God's creative power, and celebrating the heavenly lights and angels". What I like most about El Adon is the beautiful poetry and depth of the words. They paint a vivid picture of the divine order of the universe, personifying the sun, moon and stars so that we can imagine them almost as human beings, praising God just as we do when we pray.

CARING COMMUNITY

Whether you are new to GHC or have been a member for a long time, there are probably some people you know better than others, and some people you do not know at all. You may have times when you're super busy, times when you are busy but could help out with something that does not take much time, and times when you would really welcome an opportunity to do something new or worthwhile. All of the above describes me. If it describes you too, I hope you will join me in being a Caring Community volunteer.

Different people participate in GHC's Caring Community in different ways. The way that I participate is mostly by being on the list of Caring Community volunteers and responding from time to time when our wonderful chairperson, Sheila Greenwald, sends out an email explaining a need and asking for someone to help with it.

Most of the time when I am helping, it is by bringing someone a soup and challah. When someone in the GHC community experiences the death of a loved one, the Caring Community is there to provide support in several different ways. I volunteer in the weeks after the Shiva period is over. We want people to know that we are still thinking of them and still here for them as their mourning process continues.

Sheila sends an email telling the volunteers the identity of the bereaved, where the person lives, and asking for someone to bring that person a soup and challah. When I can do it, I email Sheila back and let her know. If someone else has not already offered to do it, Sheila gives me the bereaved's contact information, and I call. I explain who I am, that I am calling for the GHC Caring Community and why, offer condolences, and offer to bring them a soup and challah. If they accept, we agree on a time that works

Scarsdale (and am later reimbursed by GHC, from donations to the Caring Community), put them in a gift bag with a card from the Caring Community, and bring it to the person.

Sometimes when I bring someone a soup and challah, our interaction is short. The person thanks me, I offer my condolences personally on behalf of GHC and leave, knowing that I have helped by showing our community's ongoing support and sympathy.

Other times, the person invites me into his or her home, and we sit and talk for a bit. It does not have to be someone whom I knew well before. In fact, it is usually someone whose home I have never been to before. When we are sitting and talking, I get to know the person better. Even though the occasion for our conversation is sad, it feels good to be making this kind of connection, getting to know another member of our community.

GREEN TEAM RECIPE

Pumpkin-Vegetable Stew with Couscous

Source: Adeena Sussman, Sababa, Fresh Sunny Flavors From My Israeli Kitchen

Serves 8 to 10 Active time: 1 hour 30 minutes

Total Time: 14 hours (including chickpea soaking time)

% cup of dried chickpeas or one 15-ounce can chickpeas, drained and rinsed

7 cups low-sodium vegetable broth

⅓ cup grapeseed oil

3 medium carrots, peeled, trimmed, halved lengthwise and crosswise

2 medium onions, peeled, furry ends trimmed, quartered through the root

1 medium celery root, peeled and cut into 8 wedges

3 large celery stalks, outer layers peeled, cut into large chunks

2 tablespoons dark brown sugar

6 sprigs fresh dill

6 sprigs fresh parsley

6 sprigs fresh cilantro

3 tablespoons sweet paprika

4 teaspoons kosher salt, plus more to taste

1 tablespoon freshly ground black pepper

1 1/4 teaspoons ground cinnamon

1 teaspoon ground mace or ½ teaspoon ground nutmeg

1/4 teaspoon ground turmeric

1/4 cup tomato paste

1 $\frac{1}{2}$ pounds seeded pumpkin or kabocha squash, rind on and cut into 4-inch chunks

3 small zucchini (or 2 medium) trimmed but left whole (halved if medium)

½ very small green cabbage, cut into 4 wedges

2 medium ripe tomatoes, cored and quartered

3 small potatoes, halved

Soak the chickpeas: Place the chickpeas in a bowl, cover with 4 inches of water, cover and soak on the counter for 10 to 12 hours, in the refrigerator for 24 hours. Drain and rinse the chickpeas.

Make the stew: In a medium saucepan, keep the broth at a simmer, covered, over very low heat until ready to use. In a large (6- or 8-quart), wide-bottomed soup pot with a tight-fitting lid, heat the grapeseed oil over medium heat. Add the carrots and onions and cook, turning occasionally, until the outer parts of the carrots and the onions caramelize, 6 minutes total. Add the celery root and celery and cook until the vegetables soften, 5 minutes. Add the chickpeas, stir in the brown sugar, cover and cook until the vegetables release liquid, 5 minutes. While the vegetables cook, tie the dill, parsley, and cilantro into a bundle with kitchen twine.

Stir in the paprika, salt, pepper, cinnamon, mace and turmeric. Cook for 1 minute. Add the tomato paste and cook, stirring, until absorbed, 2 minutes. Add the pumpkin, zucchini and herb bundle. Add 3 cups of the simmering broth just to cover. Bring to a boil over medium high heat, reduce the heat to a medium-low, cover and simmer until the vegetables soften slightly, 15 minutes.

Uncover, then add the rest of the broth to the pot. Nestle the cabbage, tomatoes and potatoes into the pot; return to a vigorous boil; reduce the heat to a simmer again; cover; and cook until the potatoes are tender, 40 minutes.

While the soup is cooking, make the couscous. To serve, remove and discard the herb bundle, mound the couscous into bowls, and top with some of the vegetables and broth.

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
