Time to Hit a Restart

My January article is usually about how we recommit ourselves to the New Year's resolution we made on Rosh Hashanah. Instead of making a new New Year's resolution along with the rest of the world on January first, this is great opportunity to check in and see how we are doing with the resolutions we made during services on the High Holidays. Which of those commitments have we discarded and which have we altered a bit.

Some years, I have suggested that maybe we can make two different kinds of resolutions. One set of resolutions for the Jewish New Year and one set for the secular. Maybe one series of promises may be to oneself and one series of promises to others. Maybe one group could be things we promise to do and one group those things we promise not to do. No matter, I have always tried to make

this article about strengthening our

dedication to that which we have chosen ourselves, not something put on us by someone else. After all, we made those pledges willingly, without coercion – so what is standing in our way?

I think the answer is simple. We just get tired. Rabbi Nachman of Braslav calls it spiritual despair. And his remedy is to pray, "open my eyes and my heart that I might always merit to see the good in the world and the good that you have bestowed on me even as I experience difficulties and am troubled." For Rav Nachman the way to reenergize yourself is to find gratitude. Make a habit of being grateful.

When you feel like you cannot stick to the kindness you promised, be grateful and you will discover kindness. When you want to stop yourself from speaking about someone behind their back, uncover something you are so blessed to have, for example friendship, and you will be released from the urge to gossip. When you are in too much of a rush to help a fellow human being, discover how fortunate you are that you can walk, that you can hear, that you

can see.

After the shooting at Tree of Life Or I'simcha Congregation in Pittsburgh, I have found myself tired. I suffer from what the profession calls compassion fatigue. The cure is not a vacation. It is not crawling under the covers. It is an extra dose of kindness and gratitude. It does incredibly invigorating things.

This month we are highlighting one Religious School class and one Early Childhood class, so you can read about what our amazing students and teachers are accomplishing!

Religious School – What We’re Doing in Gan (Kindergarten)

The Gan students have been focusing on Chanukah, the Festival of Lights! We have discussed the concept of bravery and courage. We discussed how Judea Maccabee was the brave leader of the Jewish people defending their belief in worshipping one G-d. Each student had the opportunity to share when he/she had been brave and then illustrate it. Through stories, songs, and art activities the Gan classroom was filled with the spirit of Chanukah. We even decorated our own dreidels with the four Hebrew symbols and made Chanukah placemats. The students learned that the letters on the dreidel symbolize the saying “Nes Gadol Haya Sham” - a great miracle happened there (in Israel.)

Early Childhood Center – What We’re Doing in the Twos

The Twos most recent focus has been Chanukah. We made beautiful menorahs to bring home, spun dreidels, sang hits such as The Dreidel Song, Maccabee March, and I’m a Little Latke. We also lit our menorah and chanted the blessings each day. Everyone had a wonderful time at our school Chanukah party, where the Twos did a great job spinning around pretending to be dreidels while Cantor Janet sang and played her guitar.

Next we will turn our attention to winter. We will create several kinds of snow pictures using materials such as white paint, shaving cream, glue, and glitter. We will read books about winter, and even bring snow into our classroom to play with (assuming it’s available!). We’re looking forward to a lot more fun this year!

Sacrificing Isaac, or Sacrificing For Isaac

The *Akedah*, the story of the binding of Isaac, is perhaps the most problematic of all the stories in the Bible. We have been puzzling over it and inventing excuses for God and for Abraham over all the thousands of years since. It raises some very difficult issues: Is an act moral *because* God tells us to perform it, or is there an independent morality and God will only tell us to do things that are moral? Were God and Abraham testing each other, in an ancient game of Chicken? Speaking strictly for myself, if I ever hear a voice in my head telling me to kill my child (or anyone else), I hope I retain just enough sanity to realize that it's probably not God speaking to me.

Ask any parents and they will assure you that they would risk certain death to save one of their children.

Fortunately, few of us are ever put to the ultimate test. On a less existential level we do sacrifice for our children, saving for college, sending them to summer camp or living in a high cost area for the sake of better schools. If resources are scarce parents will go

hungry to feed their children, or work two jobs.

When the stakes are high enough, though, we do sacrifice our children, symbolically and statistically. We send troops into battle, knowing beyond doubt that not all of them will return home alive and intact. Almost always, nowadays, the people doing the sending are of an older generation than the people being sent. Back in the day that was not so. It was expected of kings that they would lead their armies into battle personally. Remember Shakespeare's Richard III? He's portrayed, probably quite unfairly, as the epitome of evil. Yet he did not use his very real bone abnormalities as an excuse to stay out of harm's way. I imagine a king gave some thought to whether a war was truly necessary, knowing that he was going to be at significant risk himself.

Sometimes there really is no choice: Think of Pearl Harbor, or the Yom Kippur War.

But what would we think of parents who expose their children to grave risks simply for the sake of their own ease and comfort, or profit? Posed that way the answer is easy, and in fact modern societies often remove children from parents who so neglect or abuse them. But what exactly do we think we are doing when we fail, collectively and individually, to rise to the challenge of global warming? The risks to our children and theirs are no less real than the neglect of an addicted single parent. In truth, those of us who have not yet reached advanced old age will get to experience those risks ourselves. We're seeing some of them already.

It's time to decide what kind of parents we want to be. And really, the technologies of efficiency and renewable energy, solar and wind and so on, are sufficiently advanced and cost-effective that switching to them with all deliberate speed can hardly be called a sacrifice.

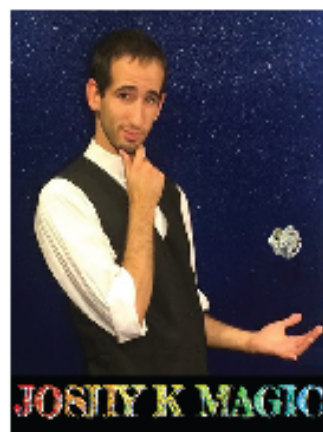
