#### FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

A few years back I wrote an article I called, "A Day in the Life of a Rabbi." Truthfully, it was more of a plea for understanding than anything else. I wanted people to realize how hard I was working, hoping it would engender some sympathy when I fell short of expectations. It was a pathetic attempt to pull on congregants' heartstrings in order to offer some perspective.

Perspective is difficult to come by these days. In the echo chambers in which we live, there is a cacophony of voices and sounds with little reprieve. It is the job of the synagogue to bring a quiet that leads to introspection and the resetting of our systems.

As a community we have made hospital and shiva visits. We have held classes and programs. We have prayed together, marched together, sung and danced together. We have cried and laughed together. Sometimes it happened organically and sometimes we have put in countless hours of planning and evaluating in committee meetings, board meetings and executive committee meetings. We have come together in varied spaces, mostly in our building but sometimes even in the gym. Individually, we have sat together quietly to work through a family issue or to prepare for a lifecycle event. Countless articles have been written and innumerable letters have been composed, all in the hopes of spurring meaningful thought and deeper connection.

Personally, it has been an amazing year for me: signing a six year contract with our congregation, moving into our beautiful new home, the publication of my novel, my youngest being accepted to her college of choice, and most importantly the profound friendships that have emerged from my time here. As the Psalmist said, *Tov L'Hodot La'adonai, U'l'zamer L'Shimcha Elyon. It is wonderful to give thanks to God to sing in joy to the Exalted one on high.* 

Not only is it great to thank God, it is necessary to thank the minions and minyans of people who insure the running of this congregation every day. From the staff to every volunteer, we could not make this work without you.

In a wonderful song, "Seasons of Love", made popular in the Broadway musical Rent, written and composed by Jonathan Larson we learn:

Five hundred twenty-five thousand Six hundred minutes Five hundred twenty-five thousand Moments so dear Five hundred twenty-five thousand Six hundred minutes How do you measure, measure a year?

In daylights, in sunsets
In midnights, in cups of coffee
In inches, in miles



Finally, in addition to our professionals and volunteers, we must thank Pat Conlan who always made sure that our venue was properly set up for the events.



#### **Thank You For the People Who Provide**

#### **Administrative Support**

Throughout the year, as GHC goes about our doing all that we do, there are people working behind the scenes, quietly but effectively providing the administrative support that enables it all to happen.

Records of birthdays, yarhzeits, contact information, and other important information are maintained, so that we can celebrate Simcha Shabbats. commemorate loved ones, and communicate effectively. Mailings and materials are prepared, printed, copied, stuffed into envelopes, and mailed, with appropriate mailing labels. If you have a question and don't know who to ask, you can get help by calling the general GHC phone number. If you make a donation, your check is deposited, the donation is credited to your GHC account, and letters are prepared and mailed thanking you and notifying the honoree of the donation. Dues and fees paid to GHC, and expenses paid by GHC, are recorded in our accounting system, and statements and checks are printed and mailed. The necessary supplies are purchased, and the equipment needed for accomplishing all of these tasks is maintained. And people coming to the GHC building during office hours are buzzed in through our doors locked to maintain security.

Leading the way in all of these administrative support functions are the wonderful, dedicated members of the GHC office staff. And we also have terrific professionals and volunteers who pitch in.

Madaline Bruno, our Director of Office Services, is in her 31<sup>st</sup> year at GHC! Her wisdom and experience are invaluable. She knows the ins and outs, and the little details of how to get things done, and she is dedicated to doing so efficiently and effectively. Her warmth and kindness in all her interactions with the members of our community is always much appreciated. She personally handles many of the administrative tasks that the office does in addition to working on longer term projects.

Jacqueline Walker, Administrative Assistant, has been with GHC for 7 years. We depend on her as our technology maven, and she also contributes immensely with her work on administrative and design-oriented projects with her pleasant, upbeat manner. While usually in the office just one day per week, even when she's not at GHC she's our troubleshooter and go-to person for all sorts of glitches with our

computers, internet service and phone system. This year, her work has included handling the repair (or if needed, replacement) of laptops, and she is hard at work on recommendations for upgrading our phone system and changing our e-mail server.

Nalini Addanki is the newest member of our office staff -- she just became our Bookkeeper in November 2018. She brings not only her financial training and organizational skills to the position, but also her joy in interacting with people. Working three days per week, she responds to all sorts of inquiries and helps where help is needed, in addition to handling accounts payable and accounts receivable, processing payroll, preparing financial statements for the Finance Committee's review, and using our accounting system and main database to generate the letters thanking people for their donations and notifying those in whose honor donations are made.

Administrative work is also done by all of our professionals, Rabbi Jay Stein, Cantor Janet Leuchter, and Amy Kessler, who write their own correspondence, prepare a lot of their own materials, and frequently make their own copies. Amy usually opens the doors for our ECC and Religious School and at other times this year when office staff scheduled to work needed to be out during business hours. Rabbi Stein answered the phones and buzzed the doors open for people coming to GHC. Everyone pitches in to help as needed. Our teachers and officers also frequently make their own copies, and the members of many committees make copies, stuff envelopes and affix labels. Pat Conlan and Jake Mendez keep the office clean and, along with Brian Conlan and Andrew Brown, keep the rest of the building clean and well-maintained as well. Schaps (Stephanie Luftig's father) donated phone equipment that will help immensely with our upgrading of GHC's phone system. #### **GREEN TEAM**

#### Only Ten Plagues? We Should Be So Lucky

Every year we recite the names of the ten plagues, and spill a drop of wine for each to signify that we don't rejoice at the suffering of our oppressors, no matter how richly deserved. Who will do the same for us? We have to hope that there will be children of the survivors of global warming, and they will have wine. It's by no means a sure thing.

Human extinction is not even the worst-case scenario. That honor goes to a Venus-level runaway greenhouse effect, leaving Earth totally devoid of all life. I'll ignore that one, because it's quite unlikely and because we wouldn't be around to witness it. It's been reported that a common mantra among climate scientists is "The earth will survive; it's the humans that might not." The long term odds are not that reassuring, There have been five mass extinctions over Earth's history, and many scientists believe we are in the midst of a sixth. The End-Permian was the worst, with an estimated 90-96% of all species vanishing. The others were not much fun either, with species loss rates of 60-75% in each. For only the last has a "dinosaur-killer" meteor been associated with the cause. In all of them the pattern seems to have been like a modestly famous Hemingway quote: "gradually and then suddenly." Yes, climate change has been considered a possible cause for all of them, but this is certainly not proven so far.

We can hope that before the trends leading to human extinction become irreversible the opposition to mounting a robust worldwide effort to limit warming melts away. It's impossible to predict with any confidence how much hotter it will get, for two quite distinct reasons. The smaller uncertainly is in how much warming will result from a given level of CO<sub>2</sub>. Much larger is the uncertainty in how long humanity will wait before getting serious and how high the level of greenhouse gases will get. Ever-improving climate models can help with the so-called climate sensitivity, but there is no hope for precise forecasts of political trends in each nation of the world. Even assuming political will, the rate at which all the infrastructure associated with energy, transportation and food can be replaced with climate-friendly alternatives is also uncertain. What we do know is that the expected magnitude of the loss of human life, health and welfare rises sharply with temperature, and the same is true for the other species of animals and plants that share our world. We're already at one degree Celsius above pre -industrial levels. There is a huge difference between 1.5 degrees and 2 degrees, and even if all the

pledges made at the Paris accords are kept we're on track for a warming of 3.5 degrees or more.

At the higher levels the magnitude of the catastrophe facing us is unprecedented in all of human history. We can enumerate the disasters that would befall us: Heat waves leading to mass death from heatstroke; Starvation resulting from crop failures and reduced productivity; Flooding from sea level rise and river overflow, with many world cities uninhabitable; Wildfires; Storms of fury beyond prior experience; Exhaustion of fresh water supplies; Oceans no longer with enough oxygen to support marine life; Air with pollution types both old and new; Literal plagues, as tropical perils spread to temperate populations lacking all immunity and new forms appear; Economic collapse; Perhaps a billion involuntary climate migrants; Civil disorder; War over diminished resources: Failed states with nuclear weapons; Unknown unknowns, effects we cannot yet imagine. The Egyptians only had to face one plague at a time. We would be faced with all of them at once, over and over. We would be extraordinarily lucky if only the first-born died. An article in the January 2019 issue of Scientific American has an almost offhand estimate: "... cascading effects could lead to a world capable of supporting just one billion human beings, down from 7.5 billion today." Please do not imagine that such a reduction would be accomplished by several generations of a voluntary one-child policy. The deaths would be untimely, unpleasant, unavoidable, unmarked, unmourned and undeserved. To get a feel for what that would be like, think of the Shoah. Now multiply by 1,000. Outraged by the comparison? What sort of power structures do you think would emerge, if civilization collapses and there's not enough food to go around?

Today's Germans can claim with fair legitimacy to be free of the guilt that attaches to their grandparents; we have no such out. "In fact, more than half of the carbon exhaled into the atmosphere by the burning of fossil fuels has been emitted in just the past three decades. Which means we have done as much damage to the fate of the planet and its ability to sustain human life and civilization since Al Gore published his first book on climate than in all the centuries—all the millennia—that came before."

The last thing in Pandora's Box was Hope. All the necessary technologies to combat global warming already exist. R&D will keep improving their economics and pay for itself many times




