Purim and Yom Kippur

One of the most fun and family-friendly holidays we have occurs this month. While the holiday itself falls out on Wednesday evening March 20th with a celebration and reading of the megillah with our religious school and the entire congregation, the Purim carnival will take place on Sunday, March 17th. By far this is one of the celebratory holidays we have on our Jewish calendar. We dress in costume, we sing, we stamp our feet, we eat, some even drink, and generally we party.

One of the most intriguing parts of the holiday is its name. Purim comes from the Hebrew word *Pur* meaning "lots." That is, the day Haman selected to bring about our demise was determined by drawing lots. He picked the day out of a hat. So much of life depends on something random.

Last month I was coming out of a parking lot on Central Avenue and as my light turned green I began

driving out into the intersection. At that same moment another car ran their red light and hit the front of my car. Had I been a little further into the intersection the result could have been a lot worse. Had I not got out into the intersection as far as I had, I would not have been hit at all. I feel I was lucky. But it was random.

Still the name of Purim sounds so much like Kippur, or rather Yom Kippur. In fact, they are so similar sounding that much has been written comparing Purim and Yom Kippur. At first glance, they seem like opposites. For the Rabbis, they seem like yin and yang, opposite sides of a coin. Yom Kippur - complete abstinence, Purim over indulgence. Yom Kippur – totally serious, Purim – just plain fun. Yom Kippur - deals with soul searching and self discovery, Purim - we make believe we are someone else. The Rabbis teach Yom Kippur is a day devoted to God, Purim is a day devoted to celebrating with people, an internal day verses an external day.

But it is the aspect of randomness that strikes me most deeply. It is hard to think of a holiday with so much emphasis on drinking without thinking about those who can never have a drink. One of the mantras of people in recovery is let go and let God. It is the understanding that we only have so much in our control. The holiday of Yom Kippur also centers on an event that seems random. On Yom Kippur we will read the ritual of the scapegoat. Leviticus 16:8 reads "and he shall place lots upon the two goats, one marked for the LORD and the other marked for Azazel." And I wonder which is worse. Being slaughtered quickly or the slow death of wandering the desert but it doesn't matter because neither we nor the goat gets to chose.

The holiday of Purim could not be a more child friendly holiday while Yom Kippur is probably the least child oriented holiday of the year. The lesson is clear. As we grow, we begin to truly understand that there things over which we have control and things over which we do not. Who we are and who we make believe we are is one of them.

PRESIDENT'S COLUMN

Later this month (13 Adar II/March 20) we will celebrate Purim. Like several of our holidays, it's one of those that could be summarized as "they tried to kill us, we won, let's eat," but there are deeper lessons that can be learned from this celebratory holiday.

We know the story: Haman sets out to destroy the Jews after he becomes incensed by Mordechai's refusal to bow down to him. When he lobbies King Ahasuerus for a decree that will endorse this genocidal campaign, Haman employs the anti-Semitic trope of dual loyalty, saying: "There is a certain people ... dispersed among the peoples in all the provinces of thy kingdom; and their laws are diverse from those of every people; neither keep they the king's laws" (*Esther* 3:8). The Jews, Haman asserts, are disloyal to their king because they are loyal to their religion and therefore must be destroyed. This, as we know, is false - Jews throughout history have proven our ability to remain Jewish and loyal to our country.

The celebration of Purim centers on this first explicit instance of anti-Semitism in recorded history invoking the mantra "kill them because they are different." Nearly two thousand years later, anti-Semitism continues to be a significant global phenomenon, with daily acts of anti-Semitism being perpetrated almost everywhere in the Western World as evidenced by incidents throughout Europe, and the huge rise of anti-Semitic incidents in the US. In our own backyard, there have been more than 100 anti-Semitic incidents reported in New York since the Tree of Life Shooting in Pittsburgh.

At a moment in time when our community faces serious threats to its security and well being, we are reminded of the heroic leadership of Esther and of the advice she received from Mordecai. When learning of the assault that was scheduled to take place against her people Esther at first resisted taking action. Mordechai pleaded with her that she would be no safer in the palace than any other Jew in the country. If she keeps silent, Mordecai reminded her, "You and your house will perish." In the end she elected to fast and pray for three days and then approach the king to seek his intervention, despite the law prohibiting her

to appear before him, unless he called for her. She would conclude: "if I perish, I perish."

What should we do today in the face of global anti-Semitism? There are those who still caution a "better to keep quiet and make believe it isn't there" policy. Giving it publicity, they claim, will only fuel the hatred, but like Esther, we need to stand up for ourselves and our beliefs.

Rabbi Jonathan Sacks teaches: Jews cannot fight anti-Semitism alone. The victim cannot cure the crime... Therefore, if we think there is something we alone can do to cure anti-Semitism, we are making a great mistake. We have to stand together to fight hate; not Jews alone, but every single person who cares for the sanctity of life and for a free and just and tolerant society. We must gather allies, because the hatred of Jews is the hatred of difference, which is the hatred of humanity. That is why we must stand together to fight hate in all its forms.

So this year, as we make noise to blot out the name of Haman, let's also remember to make noise and blot out anti-Semitism, xenophobia, and hatred against any people because they are different.



Australia Ends Direct Aid To Palestinian Authority

As reported by the *Jewish Telegraphic Agency*. Australia has stopped giving direct aid to the Palestinian Authority due to concerns that the money is being used to pay Palestinian terrorists and their families.

Australian Foreign Minister Julie Bishop said that the country would redirect the \$10 million in Australian currency (\$7.4 million U.S.) from the World Bank to the UN Humanitarian Fund, which supplies Palestinians with health care, food, water and shelter.

"I am confident that previous Australian funding to the PA through the World Bank has been used as intended," she wrote. "However, I am concerned that in providing funds for this aspect of the PA's operations there is an opportunity for it to use its own budget for activities that Australia would never support.

"Any assistance provided by the PLO to those convicted of politically motivated violence is an affront to Australian values and undermines the prospect of meaningful peace between Israel and the Palestinians," she said.

Mexico City Elects First Jewish Mayor, and First Woman

Claudia Sheinbaum Pardo, a scientist who holds a doctorat in engineering and physics, was elected mayor in July 2018. She is the first woman, and first Jew, to be publicly elected to the office. She previously served as secretary of the environment.

Sheinbaum, 55, is the granddaughter of Jewish immigrants from Lithuania and Bulgaria. She is a member of the leftist National Regeneration Movement party and has close ties to Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador, the party's leader and Mexico's newly elected president.

Mexico City is home to around 50,000 Jews

REMEMBERING JEWISH HISTORY

November 13, 1856 -Birthday of Louis D. Brandeis

Nominated to the Supreme Court by President Woodrow Wilson, Brandeiss was confirmed as the first Jewish Supreme Court Justice in a Senate vote of 47-22 on June 1, 1916. Louis Dembitz Brandeis was an associate justice on the U.S. Supreme Court from 1916 to 1939. He died in Washington D.C. in 1941.

New Drug Shows Promise For Treatment of Crohn's Disease

As published by *The Times of Israel*, RedHill Biopharma Ltd. has claimed that a late stage clinical trial of its oral drug, RHB-104, has shown positive safety and efficacy results in the treatment of Crohn's disease, a severe inflammatory affliction of the gastrointestinal tract with no known cure.

The biopharmaceutical firm said in a statement that the results "demonstrated the superiority of RHB-104 over a placebo in achieving remission at week 26.

The development of RHB-104, which combines three kinds of antibiotics, is based on the hypothesis that Crohn's is caused by a bacterial infection called the mycobacterium avium subspecies paratuberculosis (MAP) bacteria, which has been found in patients suffering from the disease.

Mercury Rising

No, I haven't lost my mind and taken up Astrology. Mercury pollution will be rising if a rule change proposed by the current EPA takes effect. Mercury is bad news for brains and nerves, and is the reason people, especially young children and pregnant women, should avoid or limit tuna and a few other species of fish. It's the problem with the Mad Hatter, as mercury was used in felting hats, back then. Rather than straightforwardly eliminating the mercury restrictions, the EPA decided not to count a whole class of health benefits, with the result that the estimated costs of the rule now far outweigh the benefits, whereas previously the EPA had calculated benefits vastly greater than the costs. That practically begs for a lawsuit from coal mining companies to overturn the entire rule. With Alice-in-Wonderland logic, the rule change is just gratuitously perverse, as it wouldn't even save industry much money. Here's a quote:

Yet the E.P.A. move also had its detractors within the industry. The vast majority of utility companies have said the proposed changes are now of little benefit to them, because they have already spent the billions of dollars needed to come into compliance, and have urged the Trump administration to leave the mercury measure in place.


Given the lack of logic one can only speculate wildly as to motive. Reversing the existing restrictions after industry has spent the money to comply does educate industry to disregard and lobby against new rules rather than hasten to comply. It is perhaps a coincidence that the head of the EPA is a former coal lobbyist.

While we're on the subject of mercury, it's worth noting that the fears of the anti-vaxxers seemed largely based on the minuscule and harmless amount of a mercury-based preservative that was used in some vaccines. Childhood vaccines have not contained any mercury since 2001.

If you break an old mercury thermometer or thermostat, do NOT try to vacuum or sweep it up. Enter "cdc mercury cleanup" in your search engine.

The "mercury" is rising for the planet as well. 2018 has gone into the record books as the fourth-warmest globally, behind only 2016, 2017 and 2015. The latest five years have been the warmest such period ever, and 18 of the 19 warmest years have been since 2001. No natural variation or periodic cycle can come close to explaining that. We're doing this to ourselves, and none of us will escape the consequences. Each of us can decide to be part of the solution or remain part of the problem. There is no mythical "other" to blame or to count on to save us. We must change our own lives, educate our children, and work through the political system to change national and global policy. If your own representatives are doing the right thing there are plenty of organizations working to change minds or politicians elsewhere. Failure is always an option. Many species have gone extinct in the past, with or without our help, and many more will die out in the future. On balance, I think it would be a shame if we joined them. God promised Noah not to again destroy the world, but made no such promise to stop us from doing it to ourselves.
