FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

Faster Alone But Farther Together

Ilan Ramon was an Israeli fighter pilot and the first and only Israeli astronaut. Ramon was the space shuttle payload specialist of STS-107, the fatal mission of Columbia, in which he and six other crew members were killed in the re-entry accident. But despite his tragic death he ignited the imagination of our entire people. He gave us the space bug.

Just a few weeks ago *Beresheet* lifted off from Cape Canaveral, catching a ride on one of Elon Musk's SpaceX commercial space launches in an attempt to touchdown on the Sea of Tranquility on April 11. This \$100 million project, paid for mostly by Jewish donors such as Morris Kahn, Miriam and Sheldon Adelson, and Lynn Schusterman, would have made Israel the 4th country to land a craft on the moon. Previously, Russia (as the Soviet Union) and the United States had landed on the moon. China landed an unmanned spacecraft on the far side of the moon in 2013.

Despite the fact that the landing was not successful, it is once again a great example of the United States and Israel working together to achieve other worldly accomplishments while teaching us what Theodore Herzl once famously said, "If you will it, it is no dream."

At the AIPAC policy conference two months ago, Morris Kahn, the 89 year-old president of SpaceIL,said, "It is a small country with big dreams." While I sat listening to the presentation by Morris Kahn I could not help but think of our community here on the Hudson. It affirmed for me what I have always believed about our synagogue.

CANTOR'S COLUMN

I've been fretting about the recent Israeli elections, like some of you (I recognize we at GHC have a range of views here). Israel's rightward tilt is profoundly disturbing to me. Meanwhile, I've been reading Ta-Nehisi Coates recent book, We Were Eight Years in Power, for my book club. This book puts my Jewish conundrum into an illuminating perspective that I would like to share.

A young, well-known African-American intellectual, Coates is a staff writer for The Atlantic magazine, who writes about race in America. His previous book, *Between the World and Me*, won the 2015 National Book Award for non-fiction. His current book is a collection of eight of his Atlantic essays—one for each year President Obama was in office—that he's gathered and evaluated in hindsight.

Coates is a gifted writer and the essays plus selfreview make for fascinating reading—particularly as Jew in the modern world. The tension he articulates is a variation of our tension as well. Coates posits two persistent and opposing strains of black thought about the ideal relationship of black people too the larger American community since the end of slavery. One is integrationist, focusing on playing down difference, striving for civil rights, and taking one's rightful place side-byside with whites and others. The second is an emphasis on strengthening the black community economically, educationally and spiritually, growing out of a recognition that acceptance can never be totally achieved. The important thing in this more separatist vision is the maintaining of cultural integrity and a healthy community.

Sound familiar? Any Jew who cares about both Jewish identity and the larger world must resonate with the tension Coates describes—I certainly do. All of you, by virtue of your membership at GHC, are committed to a vision of a strong Jewish community with a definable cultural identity. To what extent, then, do we care about and commit ourselves

to our country's ideal of equal rights for all under the law—which is the foundation of Western democracy since the Enlightenment? The ultra-Orthodox wing of world Jewry, particularly in Israel, has decided in favor of Judaism over democracy and Enlightenment ideals. The government of Israel, and a large chunk of its Jewish population - as we have seen in the last election—is tilted even more now toward collective survival (in its definition) at the expense of equal rights for non-Orthodox Jews, women and Arabs, particularly those living on the West Bank.

This is a conundrum for me and many Jews worldwide. Our own congregation's members have diverse views. I support the state of Israel for two overriding reasons: as the arguably most important cultural center of the Jewish people, and as the ultimate guarantor of our safety as Jews in this world. Those of us who think Israel can and should be a majority-Jewish country AND a democracy are challenged to figure out how to position ourselves with regard to American support for Israel and our own support for This is why I belong to like-minded Israelis. T'ruah—the Rabbinic and Cantorial Network for Human Rights, and support J Street, the New Israel Fund, and the Arava Institue of Environmental Studies, as well as UJA-Federation. If you share my concerns, I urge you to seek out these types of groups, who are doing the important work of strengthening democratic values and Jewish-Arab dialogue on the ground.



We shared readings and songs by Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg, Debbie Friedman, Rabbi Angela Buchdahl, Rabbi Rebecca Alpert, Judy Chicago and other notable women. From Cantor Janet we learned about some pioneering women who lived in the early 1900's. Our Cantor joyfully and seamlessly led some of the prayers and all of the songs. And as with any enjoyable seder, we had the chance to eat, meet new people and catch up with friends.

Many people have asked me for the charoset recipe: we put big pieces of <u>unpeeled</u> big red "Envy" apples (from Costco), seedless dates, and grape juice in the food processor, processed the mixture a little and then combined the chunky mixture with raisins (2 colors) and cinnamon. We refrigerated the charoset for 2 days until the Seder. Very simple! Thank you Ellen Lebofsky for your help with the charoset and eggs. The delicious dinner came from Corner Café in Riverdale.

Council of the European Union Adopts Declaration on Fight Against Antisemitism and Security of Jewish Communities

The declaration agreed to by ministers of interior from the 28 EU Member States at a meeting of the Council of the European Union in December, calls on EU member States to take steps to ensure security for Jewish communities, institutions and citizens; to emphasize the importance of Holocaust commemoration and educations; calls on all EU member states that have not already done so to endorse the international Holocaust Remembrance Alliance's working definition of antisemitism in the fields of law enforcement, education and training; and calls on the European Commission and Europol to pay particular attention to online antisemitism and content advocating antisemitic terrorist offenses.

World Jewish Congress and UNESCO Team up for important Holocaust Education Initiative

At a recent unprecedented gathering at the headquarters of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) in Paris, the Governing Board of the World Jewish Congress, comprising nearly150 presidents of Jewish Communities worldwide, signed a commitment to the preservation of Holocaust memory and to fighting antisemitism worldwide.

A website was unveiled by WJC President Ambassador Ronald S. Lauder and UNESCO Director Audrey Azoulay.

"It is astounding and saddening that 75 years after the Holocaust, more than 46 percent of people worldwide have never even heard of the Nazi attempt to obliterate European Jewry, and some 32 percent believe that it is either myth or greatly exaggerated," said Amb. Lauder in his address. "As we face a world without survivors or witnesses, it becomes more critical than ever to ensure that the greatest atrocity the world has ever seen never forgotten lest history repeat itself. We must pass this

knowledge on to our children, and their children, because by knowing the past, we can protect our future."

REMEMBERING JEWISH HISTORY

February 11,1986 - Natan Sharansky Arrives in Israel

The former Soviet refusnik, Israeli politician, author and human rights activist was arrested in 1977 and convicted of treason and spying for the United States. He was sentenced to thirteen years imprisonment in a Siberian forced labor camp. A campaign for his release waged by his wife, Avital, and intense diplomatic efforts and public outcries were unsuccessful until 1986, when Sharansky was released as part of an East-West prisoner exchange. Sharansky became the first political prisoner ever released by Mikhail Gorbachev.

New FBI Report : Hate Crimes Against U.S. Jews Up 37%

A Jewish Telegraphic Agency article highlighting data recently released by the FBI noted that hate crimes against Jews in America rose by more than a third in 2017 and accounted for 58 percent of all religion-based hate crimes.

The FBI report covered jurisdictions in 49 states and the District of Columbia. The data showed that overall, hate rimies increased by 17percent in 2017, with a total of 7,175 hate crimes reported, up from 6,121 in 2016. It noted that some of the increase over the previous year may be attributed to the fact that there was a 6 percent increase in police departments reporting their hate crimes data to the FBI.

GREEN TEAM

How To Pronounce "Green New Deal"

Is the accent on "Green" "New" or "Deal"? What does it mean, and is it good, bad or irrelevant? As in the parable of the blind men and the elephant, it's hard to pin down just what is being proposed. Since the blind men still have all their body parts it's probably not the alligator that some opponents describe. But it is a quantum elephant whose shape is genuinely uncertain. And it won't actually exist until 2021 at the earliest, when a new Congress takes office.

As I understand it, the GND is a set of goals, to solve multiple ongoing problems together, although not necessarily all in one bill. Climate change, inequality, jobs for all, injustice, infrastructure decay - all of these are real problems that do need to be addressed. Some of them are interrelated, and I certainly agree with the sense of urgency implied, although not necessarily with the aspirational timetables proposed.

I'd much prefer the accent to be on "Green." Climate change is the problem that keeps getting harder to solve with each passing year. I fear that if we fail on that front solving all the others will be the equivalent of upgrading the staterooms on the Titanic. Fighting climate change is partly a set of technical issues: How do we supply energy, food, water, transportation and so on without cooking or otherwise degrading our one and only planet? But it's also a political issue: How do we actually implement these solutions in a democracy where philosopher-kings cannot simply rule by decree? While it is the birthright of every American to believe that he or she knows better than our elected officials how to run the country, I myself have a realistically humble opinion of my own political acumen and more trust in the instincts of some of the long-term officeholders.

What's "New" in the GND? The focus on jobs seems new, and welcome. It's clear that replacing fossil fuels with renewables and other non-greenhouse-gas producing sources will cause an enormous turnover in what jobs are

available, especially to those with less than a four -year degree. Not job losses, on balance - there will be plenty of jobs building wind and solar farms, installing rooftop solar, retrofitting housing for better insulation, fixing, replacing and improving our infrastructure. Retraining will often be necessary, and the new jobs may not be in the same places as the lost jobs. America has traditionally been woefully inadequate at supporting people through major economic transitions. But jobs aplenty there will be, if we're serious about a rapid transition away from fossil fuels. Finding enough workers to maintain the pace we need may be more of a problem. I'm less convinced of the necessity and practicality of a government guaranteed job for anyone who wants one, close to where that person currently resides. I'd rather see support for moving to where the jobs are, despite the emotional toll involved.

It's vitally important to make a "Deal" that persists. We can't march and countermarch, reversing direction every four years. That's a recipe for zero progress. What's not clear, at least to me, is what sort of deal can be made that will stick. There are two critical audiences which pass judgment on any proposal: The American people at large, and the Senate. Any proposal may find favor with one or the other, but to persist the Deal has to appeal to both. Senators do respond to overwhelming public opinion, some of the time. Whether the GND will find sufficient favor to compel acceptance by a filibuster-proof majority of the Senate is yet to be seen. A more modest proposal might get Republican buy-in, or the GND approach of a Christmas tree with something for everyone may be more effective. All I'm sure of is that I don't know which will work. Something must. The longer we wait the bigger the disruption. Even if 2020 is a super-wave election, we've seen with Obamacare that a program passed by one party can be sabotaged when the other party takes over. Earth's climate is indifferent to our political turmoil. It responds only to the level of greenhouse gases in the atmosphere.
