FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

Cell division, the process by which one cell divides to form two new cells, is part of the life cycle of virtually all cells. Most prokaryotic cells divide by the process of binary fission. In eukaryotes, cell division occurs in two major steps: mitosis and cytokinesis.

(Don't panic! This little science lesson is merely an introduction.)

The Jewish people are the "ever-dividing" people. It is my response to the idea introduced by Simon Rawidowicz, who said we are the "ever-dying" people. Like cells we have been doing it since we began. It is not a new phenomenon. We have been dividing and subdividing since we left Egypt. Kohen, Levi, Yisrael. Pharasee, Saducee, Essene, Zealot. School of Hillel and the School of Shammai. Hasidic, Enlightened. Scholars and students. Orthodox, Conservative, Reform, Reconstructionist, New Age. Sephardic and Ashkenazy. Prophet and sinner.

While this is part of the natural course, not only of Judaism but all religions that survive time, it is a particularly painful process. Just because it may be the way we have always done it doesn't mean it is the best way to live. That is why our rabbis caution, "do not separate yourself from the community." It is too easy to walk away. To quit, to permit a disagreement to turn into a permanent fissure, to give up on the other, to claim absolute truth and label the other a sinner and degrade. The leap from disagreement to complete disconnect is far too common an occurrence in our country.

At the most emotional time of the High Holidays we offer an incredible statement.

By the authority of the court on high and by the authority of the court below, with divine consent and with the

consent of this congregation, we grant permission to pray with those who have transgressed. (Kol Nidre)

It is a prayer we must work hard to understand. It is not saying I believe myself to be perfect, while others are sinners. It is a prayer asking that we not think of ourselves as so great that we can't be among people who we perceive of as less. The idea that we are better than others is incredibly divisive and will ultimately undermine our efforts to better ourselves and our world. We must reject that instinct and that tactic for living.

In a piece of Talmud that I believe is commenting on this text the rabbis explain we need to surround ourselves with all types of people in order to have a fully transformative high holiday experience.

Rabbi Shimon Hisda says: Any fast that does not include the participation of some of the sinners of the Jewish people is not a fast... Abaye [explains this idea by quoting the prophet Amos] "It is God Who builds God's upper chamber in the heavens and established God's bundle on the earth." [That means] when the people are united as a bundle, including their sinners, they are established on earth. (Keratot 6b)

If we are ever to going to emerge from the divisiveness that grips our country, we are going to have make room for the possibility that we may be wrong. We must invite people in rather than push them out.

Who by Fire, Who by Water Barney Wolff

We say it every year: "On Rosh Hashanah it is written and on Yom Kippur it is sealed," followed by a list, mostly, of ways to die. "But penitence, prayer and good deeds can annul the severity of the decree." As I write, the Amazon is burning and Dorian is storming. Are these "Acts of God?" That phrase seems to me rather unfair to God, because it's only used for negative surprises, never for lucky breaks. Still, we can ask, are the fires and the floods solely the result of natural forces, beyond our influence?

For the Amazon (and central Africa, and Indonesia) fires the answer is clearly no, they've been deliberately set, to clear land for growing crops or pasturing. And if sometimes those fires get out of control, that's no surprise. Burning down rainforest is doubly awful: Not only does it produce a big pulse of CO₂, it takes that area out of the business of absorbing it, probably for a very long time. Some recent studies also raise the possibility of a tipping point, where areas that have not been burned start dying because of reduced rainfall. As with all the other potentially disastrous tipping points, we don't know enough to say how close we are to the edge. Before we blame the Brazilians, Africans and Indonesians, we should note that the cleared land will not even be used to feed their own populations, but to produce beef, palm oil and other stuff for export. So much of the real fault seems to lie with China, Europe and us. Earth's atmosphere is very well mixed, so CO2 emitted anywhere has effects everywhere.

Closer to home, fire season in the western continental US has been relatively quiet this year, after two terrible summers, but Alaska is burning. Wildfires in the US are not usually set, but result from carelessness, accidents or overloaded powerlines that sag into overgrown brush. Warming dries out the ground and vegetation, making every spark a likely disaster. Again, the impact from human activity is clear.

No human effort can produce (or stop) a hurricane. Climate scientists are working to better understand the effect of global warming on hurricanes. Current consensus is that overall frequency is not affected but there are likely to be more severe storms. Our president claimed never to have heard of a category 5 hurricane, but in fact Dorian is the fourth such storm since he took office. There have been 13 cat 5 hurricanes in the last 20 years; only 5 in the 20 years before that. According to NOAA, five of the ten strongest Atlantic storms have occurred since 2016. That's all suggestive but by no means definitive. If the theory is correct though, fire does lead, indirectly, to flood.

Penitence and good deeds seem appropriate. And prayer surely would not hurt. We might also remember a very old adage that does not actually appear in the Bible: God helps those who help themselves.


Sabeeha Rehman on "Being Muslim in America"
