FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

Preparation Leads to Success Rabbi Jay M. Stein

In 1995, just two years after I was ordained and started my first full-time job as a rabbi, I decided it was time to truly grow up and see an opera. In order to fully experience this great opportunity, I decided preparation was needed. I believed at the time that opera was like beer, an acquired taste. The opera was *Il Trovatore*, a "hot-blooded tale of love, jealousy, and retribution, Verdi-created music that truly bursts with excitement" wrote the Lyric Opera house at the time.

I went to the library and took out the libretto. Being the first opera I had ever truly encountered, I quickly realized the simple reading of the libretto would not be sufficient. Next I took out a series of cassette tapes that explained the varied themes and motifs of the music and how that amplified the drama. These instructional tapes taught me what to listen for in the music while the tale unfolded, how certain themes would be developed and how certain motifs would be revisited.

Then came the night of the performance. I dressed in my best suit and arrived early for what was going to be a long night. Determined to make the most of the experience I wanted to arrive in the right mindset, not hassled by traffic or parking, trying to minimize any frustration I might have felt. The evening went off without a hitch. My enjoyment of opera was born. However, you will never hear me listening to opera. I have only a few selected arias on my phone and the reason is pretty simple. I don't under-

stand the language in which most operas were written. For me the sounds, as beautiful as they are, only go so far without my understanding of what is being said.

That must be the case with many people who come to our regular and High Holy Day services. The melodies and the choreography can only take you so far. I imagine that is why many people stay for the sermon, not for the content, (although I work hard to make sure it is worthwhile) but because it is in English. It is also the reason the Mahzor, the High Holy Day prayer book we use is wildly popular. The English supplemental material is extraordinarily well curated.

The point is that simple preparation for the experience of the High Holy Days can lead to the birth of new found positive spiritual experiences, to which I offer three ways to begin to get ready. Our sages have always encouraged our people to get ready beginning with the month of Elul. The Hebrew month of Elul has just begun. The month of Elul traditionally serves as an intense preparation period leading up to the High Holy Days. The rabbis, understanding how hard it is to be successful at anything without proper preparation, remind us we have a month to get ready for days of awe.

Taken from the one of the most famous prayers of the Mahzor, I offer a path towards a better High Holy Days experience. In a part referred to as the Unitaneh Tokef, in which the number of ways in which we might die in the coming year are enumerated, the author proposes a way to survive. Through *Teshuva*, repentance, *Tzedakah*, acts of righteousness, and *Tefillah*, prayer we can avert the evil decree. So too, through *Teshuva*, *Tzedakah* and *Tefillah* can we get ready for the season of change.

CANTOR'S COLUMN

Try and add each of these three to your next month. Here at GHC we will provide you an opportunity to do each of them.

1. Prayer – come to minyan. As you know we have struggled to make a minyan. Coming on a Monday or Thursday morning would mean a tremendous amount to our community and would get you in the mindset of prayer and meditation, skills necessary for our powerful services on the High Holy Days. Your ear will begin to develop an appreciation for the sounds of worship and shofar. Motifs and themes will be introduced that recur in the liturgy of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Come often. We need you.

- 2. Repentance the act of looking inward and deciding to make a change. This is not merely an emotional act; it is an intellectual one as well. Come to a class and learn what our tradition says about this process. Every Shabbat in the month of Elul I will be teaching after services (around 1:00) a different aspect of *teshuva*. Make it a point to be with us. Put it in your calendar and join us for what is likely to be a lively discussion.
- 3. Acts of righteousness make it a point this month give back or to just give. One of the important programs of GHC is our Midnight Run project where we go into the Manhattan and give food to the homeless. You can come on a trip or just prepare food to be distributed. You can become involved in our shul stitchers project that knits and crochets blankets and other items that bring a little warmth to those who need it. You can volunteer to join our Caring Community group (see article by Shelia Greenwald in this edition of the Hamvaser). You can be part of the Green Team helping to create a more environmentally sustainable and friendly synagogue. Or you can bring us a new idea about social justice to initiate in our synagogue.

Often, before doing a mitzvah we find a prayer that asks for greater focus on the act so that our intentions are pure in its execution. That simple act of taking a moment before we do something can actually change how we feel about that activity. Before you launch into any or all of these suggestions say this phrase:

May my engagement with this mitzvah breathe life's spirit into me. May my body and soul be delivered from external impediments. May this act in which I now endeavor be considered before You as holy. I do this with an open mind and an open heart.

Tears may linger for a night, but joy comes in the morning. - Psalm 30

This is one of my favorite Jewish texts, and it's chanted daily in our morning service. It's one I go to not just in the morning, but whenever I need a lift, reminding me that "this too shall pass." Of course in life there are some immutable problems that will never pass, unfortunately. But in this case the psalm speaks to our attitude about themwe can meet the situation with acceptance and perhaps gratitude for what we still do have. I have heard, or heard of, gratitude expressed by people one would never expect to have any. So the situation might not change but our inner state can. Joy might wait a few days (or months or years) to arrive; we might have to work to shift our perspective. But reciting this psalm regularly, in my experience, brings hope and a bit of healing distance.

Judaism is full of wise words, and one does not need to look far to find them. I spent some time this past summer with friends of my youth. Having them to talk with was comforting and rewarding. Friendship was praised and encouraged as far back as the Sayings of the Fathers (Pirkei Avot), one of the six books that make up the first biblical commentary, the Mishna, compiled in 200 CE. Pirkei Avot is traditionally recited and studied on Shabbat afternoon between Pesach and Shavuot, and it's full of words of wisdom. Avot 1:6 includes the words "acquire for yourself a friend." While in context this is meant for the purpose of studying together, by extension a friend is one through whom discussing a situation can lead to much needed comfort and perspective. It's a great piece of advice.

As you read these words, we'll be in the month of Elul, preparing ourselves for the Days of Awe, of reckoning, once again. If I have offended anyone in this community, I hope that you'll let me know so I can try to set it right. This is the month we search ourselves and ask our friends for forgiveness. It's good to be in a community which takes interpersonal relations seriously, and I am grateful to be with you all.

To the Greenburgh Hebrew Center Congregation,

For some time now, GHC has been struggling to provide a daily morning minyan for our congregants. It is becoming increasingly difficult to gather ten people and this has left many feeling frustrated. Therefore, for the summer. beginning on August 1st, we will be providing a minyan on an "appointment only" basis. Anyone wanting a minyan can request one by calling the office at 693-4260 or contacting Dr. Andrew Goldstein at VPreligious@g-h-c.org, three days in advance of the requested day.

Our intention is, in the fall, beginning on September 3rd, in addition to regular Kabbalat Shabbat services on Friday evenings and Shabbat morning services to offer minyanim on Sunday, Monday and Thursday mornings. We will continue to offer requested minyanim on Tuesdays and Wednesdays. It is of course, always recommended that if you are observing a Yarhzeit and are coming to say Kaddish to contact the office or Andrew Goldstein, regardless of the day.

Kabbalat Shabbat services are on Friday evenings at 6:30 pm and Shabbat mornings at 9:30 am. Sunday morning services are at 8:30 am and will move to 9:30 am during the school year. Monday and Thursday services are at 6:45 am; Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday morning services are at 7:00 am. These times are subject to change if there is a holiday or a Rosh Chodesh observance.

GHC SCHOOLS - RELIGIOUS SCHOOL & ECC

We are delighted to announce that GHC's Religious School has won the prestigious 2019 Solomon Schechter Award. This award is given by USCJ (United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism), an international organization. As described by USCJ, "The Solomon Schechter Awards recognize extraordinary congregation achievement in various aspects of kehilla (community) life. Given biennially at USCJ's convention, they shine a light on programs and initiatives that shape an authentic and dynamic Judaism." Almost 200 programs are submitted for consideration, and a panel of 15 judges carefully reviews the entries to select winners. GHC will present our initiative at this year's USCJ convention in Boston, MA in December.

GHC's Religious School won in the category of "Prophetic Voice" (Repairing the World). We are honored that our mitz-vah project program, initiated two years ago, has been recognized for the impact it has on our GHC family, local area and wider community.

Each grade in our Religious School has a mitzvah (commandment from the Torah) that they learn about and implement throughout the school year. This begins on day one, Opening Day of Religious School, when every class is given a piece of a world puzzle, with their mitzvah written in Hebrew and in English. The idea from Pirkei Avot is, as Rabbi Tarfon taught, "It is not your responsibility to finish the work (of perfecting the world), but you are not free to desist from it either." Through this program our students see that their little hands can make a big difference!

Rabbi Stein goes into every classroom to speak about the mitzvah, where it is written in our Torah, and the importance of the Jewish value it supports. The mitzvot include respecting the aged, caring for the earth, welcoming the stranger, feeding the hungry, Torah study and learning, and taking care of animals. After brainstorming, the students come up with activities they will do throughout the year to realize their mitzvah. These projects have included visiting a nursing home, assisting with recycling at GHC, collecting tzedakah and shopping for a food pantry, bake sales to purchase goods for a local animal shelter, and welcoming guests to our Shabbat services.

One of the aspects of GHC's Religious School mitzvah program that was highlighted for our Solomon Schechter award was the far reaching impact that it has had on our GHC community. Teachers, students and their families, the clergy, and many congregants and committees at GHC have volunteered to make the mitzvah projects successful. Barney Wolff and his committee members have visited our classrooms to discuss changes the Green Team has made at GHC. Phil Karmel taught our students about tefillin bright and early on a Sunday morning. Robin Rosenberg and GHC's Sisterhood, as well as the clergy, welcomed our children as both ushers and presenters at Shabbat services. Parents have volunteered in every aspect of the program: from donating and gathering supplies

to decorating bags for the Midnight Run and shopping for items to donate to a food pantry. Families have manned the bake sale tables while students were in class (and donated the baked goods too). Parents have accompanied their children on trips to sort medical supplies and to a nursing home. Families have donated tzedakah and have supported their children's many big ideas of how to help make this earth a better place! The children have worked together, laughed together, problem -solved together, built stronger relationships, and internalized that they can have a tremendous positive impact on this world. As we know, children learn best through not just what is said, but what is also experienced!

Thank you to everyone in our GHC family who continues to encourage and empower our Religious School to grow and improve. Thank you to our amazing Religious School teachers, who took our pilot idea for a mitzvah program, were creative, ran with it, supported their students in realizing their visions for projects, to make this an award winning endeavor. Thank you to Rabbi Stein and Cantor Janet, who are so involved and so invested in GHC's schools. Last, but not least thank you to our GHC families, our GHC Religious School Board, and our GHC Religious School PTA. Without their ideas, suggestions, financial support, and jumping in and getting their hands dirty, none of this would be possible. And now... onward to the new 2019-2020 school year, and an expanded and even more impactful mitzvah project program!

We can provide yarn or you can use/buy your own. We'll let you know when we have our schedule to work with the students at Mann.

In response to several members who have asked about a beginners conversational Hebrew class, we're hoping to have something in place for the spring. What better way to prepare for the GHC trip to Israel next summer! Please let us know if you're interested in a six session **Introduction to Conversational Hebrew**. We can consider a longer course if there is demand. Also let us know if you know anyone who is qualified and might want to teach the class.

GREEN TEAM

Think Globally. Act.

"Think globally, act locally" is an old slogan, adopted by the environmental movement half a century ago. Easy to say, but what does it mean? You probably have a globe at home, and surely had one at school. Those globes are somewhat misleading, because they show just the surface of the earth, so in a sense are two dimensional. Our real planet of course includes the third dimension, height and depth. To really understand the state of the earth we need to think about the atmosphere, which if displayed on a globe would increase its diameter by perhaps 3%. Under our feet lie the aguifers that many of us depend on for drinking water and irrigation, and that in many places are being drawn down much faster than they can be replenished by rain. The oceans are warming, both on the surface and further down, reducing dissolved oxygen on which sea creatures depend and affecting ocean currents that may have grave implications for weather patterns.

As an old physics major I can't resist pointing out that in relativity time is treated like a fourth dimension - just multiply by the speed of light to turn time into distance. True global thinking includes understanding what our planet was like decades, centuries, millennia and millions of years ago, and doing our best to predict what it will be like for future generations, depending on what we do today. As I write I happen to be reading *Underland* by Robert Macfarlane, which includes this: "At its best, a deep time awareness might help us see ourselves as part of a web of gift, inheritance and legacy stretching over millions of years past and millions of years to come, bringing us to consider what we are leaving behind for the epochs and beings that will follow us."

Global thinking is all very well, but nature does not respond to our thoughts and intentions, only to our acts. A sentient and sensible species interested in its own survival would be responding as one with the sense of urgency and resolve that the situation demands. A sensible nation would in its own self interest be working on all fronts to avert catastrophe, and as a global leader inspiring others to similar efforts. The world is moving, but with less vigor than required. As for the USA, the federal government has failed to lead.

The situation is much better at the state and local levels. As this summer began New York State enacted a really aggressive plan to combat global warming, requiring power generation to be 85% renewable by 2030 and 100% by 2040¹. Transportation, housing and agriculture have targets too. California

reached an agreement with some of the big auto manufacturers to maintain aggressive gas mileage targets, which should have great influence nationally. Some of the red states are actually leaders in wind power, because despite political beliefs it makes economic sense. My village has a Green Policy Task Force, and I'd bet your local government has some equivalent. So does this mean that there's nothing to worry about? Alas, no political victory is ever final, and we must be vigilant to ensure that momentum is not lost, or reversed.

At the most local level, what you do in your own life and household does matter. As just one of over 7 billion, each of us has only a tiny share of humanity's total impact, but that's no excuse to be a wastrel. As your parents or guardians surely told you, what if everybody acted that way? Because homo sapiens is a social species, each of us does have influence on those around us, and we should use it wisely. What we drive and how much, what we eat and what we waste, what we buy and what we throw out, how we heat and cool and light our houses, collectively, determine the fate of future generations. We can contribute to environmental organizations that are working to keep our planet a livable place for our species, and become politically active. Those of us who are in a position to influence the behavior of a corporation can have an outsize impact well beyond that of their own family.

Global warming really is an all-hands-on-deck emergency. Nobody can do everything but everybody can do something. Act.
