K-5th Grade Hebrew | עברית

Hebrew is the sacred language of the Jewish People. The goal of our educational program is to enable each child to engage in prayer with confidence and understanding.

Kindergarten - 2nd Grade

Our youngest students can see Judaism as something that invites their senses coupled
with physical movement to engage with Judaism in a natural inviting way. Hebrew
Through Movement (HTM) introduces Hebrew in a playful and meaningful way,
creating a positive first link between children and Hebrew. Students participate in
Tefillah/Shira (prayer and singing) with our Cantor.

3rd - 5th Grade

 We engage our students in learning the alef-bet and prayers using a variety of digital and print materials, including music and videos and interact through mediums that they enjoy. We strive to enhance learning and help students make meaningful connections. During Religious School they participate in Tefillah/Shira (prayer and singing) with our Cantor.

Home Practice

As is the case with learning any new skill, successful Hebrew learning requires regular practice. To maximize the students' Religious School experience, we offer the following guidelines regarding home practice:

- Studies indicate that brief and frequent review is most effective in leading to success with language learning. Students in 3rd 6th grades should spend at least 15 minutes, 3-4 times per week, on their Hebrew studies.
- Attendance with your child at Friday night or Saturday morning services will also go a long way in reinforcing what your child is learning, as well as put it into context and practice.
- Even if you cannot read Hebrew, you can still listen to your child read and give encouragement. You could even ask your child to help you learn to read Hebrew.

K-5th Grade Jewish Studies

We offer a fresh approach to Jewish education by using technology, short videos, music, texts, stories, and activities to make the learning engaging for our students. Throughout the year students will learn about the holidays, Torah, history, and Israel all through the lens of Jewish values (see below).

Our students will:

- Be empowered to live meaningful Jewish lives by connecting lessons to real-world scenarios, helping them apply Jewish learning to their daily lives.
- Develop a positive Jewish identity, allowing them to explore their own personal connection to our heritage.
- Acquire important tools and develop social-emotional skills that they can apply in all of their interactions.

6th Grade

Wednesdays, 6:00-8:00pm; with pizza dinner; Plus 20 min PREP Online outside of Wednesday nights

Jewish Studies

- The 6th graders spend the majority of their Jewish Studies class learning about the Holocaust.
- In addition, classroom experiences will relate to the life issues of a pre-teen as they prepare for becoming B'nai Mitzvah.

Hebrew

- Students participate in a weekly Hebrew class where they will discover the meaning of prayers and how relatable they are to their lives.
- Tefillah with our Cantor is also part of the 6th grade program on Wednesday nights
- 6th Grade PREP Online (PREP = Prayer Reading Experience Personalized)
 All 6th graders have a 20-minute personalized ONLINE Hebrew lesson weekly to work on reading and chanting prayers. These lessons are in addition to Wednesday nights and help the students:
 - ► Build confidence
 - ► Polish the skills needed to be prepared to work with our Cantor for B'nai Mitzvah lessons
 - Benefit from personalized lessons that meet their learning styles

7th Grade Program

7th Grade

Wednesdays, 6:00-8:00pm; with pizza dinner

Jewish Studies

- The 7th grade program focuses on Israel: the land, the culture, the art, the history and the language.
- In addition, 7th graders focus on the social, spiritual, and emotional elements of becoming a teenager: including, peer pressure, gender norms, self-esteem, and social responsibility. This curriculum integrates Jewish wisdom into lessons specifically designed for the developmental milestones that occur during 7th grade.

Hebrew

- Students continue their Hebrew studies with individual appointments with our Cantor.
- On Wednesday nights, students participate in Tefillah with our Cantor.

Gesher: 8th Grade Program

Wednesdays, 6:00-8:00pm; with pizza dinner

- Gesher (the Hebrew word for bridge)
 As our middle school students bridge from B'nai Mitzvah to High School, we offer them Gesher which meet 15 times a year, approx. twice a month. Most of the time Gesher meets at Temple. On occasion they will meet at a different location.
- The 8th graders may cook some Jewish favorites, work on a Mitzvah or art project together and engage in important conversations around relevant events and issues happening in our world today.
- MADRICHIM: 8th Graders have the opportunity to work as Madrichim Teen Leaders in the Religious School, guiding our younger students toward a positive Religious School experience. The Madrichim provide assistance in the classroom and act as mentors to our younger students. Madrichim can also assist with Tefillah, work in the office or shadow a student with a disability or learning challenge. Leadership training, supervision and resources are provided. Students can be paid or earn community service hours. Madrichim work on Tuesdays 4:00-5:45pm or Wednesdays 4:00-6:00pm.

8th Graders can also participate in many of the J*Connect programs, see below.

J*Connect: 9th-12th Grade

J*Connect, a teen Jewish Experience for 9th Grade-12th Grade

Meets on a variety of days/Times (depending on the program)

J*Connect, is TSWE's teen Jewish experience focused around the values of Leadership, Social Action, Education, and Community.

- Teens have the choice to participate in a variety of programs offered throughout the year.
- Programs, classes, and events will take place both inside and outside of the temple and online.
- CONFIRMATION FOR 12TH GRADERS Seniors will spend time preparing for college as a
 Jewish student. Class meets Dec-March for approx. 15 weeks. They will learn about
 Zionism, the creation of Israel and some of the major issues Israel faces. They will look
 at the meaning of Jewish prayer and how they relate to prayer as they prepare to lead
 Confirmation Shabbat services in the spring.
- MADRICHIM: J*Connect teens have the opportunity to work as Madrichim in the Religious School guiding our younger students toward a positive Religious School

experience. The Madrichim assist in the classroom and act as mentors to our younger students. Madrichim can also assist with Tefillah, work in the office, or shadow a student with a disability or learning challenge. Leadership training, supervision, and resources are provided. Students can be paid or earn community service hours. Madrichim work on Tuesdays 4:00-5:45pm or Wednesdays 4:00-6:00pm.

A *Madrich (male), Madricha (female)*, or *Madricheh (non-binary)* is a student who guides younger students toward a positive religious school experience by demonstrating their involvement, their skills and their initiative. The *Madrichim* provide assistance in the classroom or online and act as mentors to our younger students. In addition to working in a classroom, *Madrichim* can assist with Tefillah, work in the office or shadow a student with a disability or learning challenge. Leadership training, supervision and resources are provided. Students can be paid or volunteer for community service hours.

Jewish Summer Camp

Temple Sholom of West Essex is affiliated with the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ). The URJ has regional and specialty summer overnight camps. B'nai Mitzvah Meeting for 6th Grade Families

6th grade families are invited to join the Saturday morning service twice a year. The Saturday morning service begins promptly at 10:00am. Following the service, families will meet with Rabbi Groffman and Cantor Wright to further understand the meaning of Bar/Bat Mitzvah.

Please remember you will be attending a service, and therefore, should be properly attired. The program should conclude by 12:30pm.

A reminder: these programs are a required part of the B'nai Mitzvah preparation.

Parents and students are expected to attend together. Dates will be announced during the school year.

Tzedakah | צָדָקה

One of the many *mitzvot* (commandments) we are commanded to fulfill is *tzedakah*. *Tzedakah* means "justice" and it is the collection of money or goods for charity that we regard as an important Jewish obligation to the community. The Religious School has the privilege of collecting donations to many different organizations. When Religious School is in person, we collect *tzedakah* weekly in Religious School.

Pasta Dinners

Several times a year, families join their child(ren) for a complimentary pasta dinner, immediately following K-5th Grade Religious School. This dinner, sponsored by the TSWE Brotherhood, gives everyone a change to enjoy a meal together and socialize so we can enjoy the opportunity to be a community that gets to know each other and hear about each other's lives. You have the option of sponsoring a dinner for a special occasion, such as your child's birthday, etc. For 6th grade and up it is in place of pizza dinner. Dates will be included in our weekly email.

Hang Out @Home Shabbat

A chance to share Shabbat and a meal in the comfort of our homes! Families volunteer to host other families in their home for Shabbat. Together we sing Shabbat blessings, enjoy a pizza dinner, and get to know one another.

Shabbat & Shabbat Attendance

The first Friday of the month is our Family Shabbat Service which begins at 6:30pm. Each grade will participate in leading services with the Rabbi and the Cantor during the year. There will be a Congregational Dinner following each of these monthly Shabbat services. Our other Shabbat evening services begin at 7:30pm the rest of the month.

At Temple Sholom, we want our students to be comfortable at services and increase their appreciation for meaningful worship. As part of our Religious Education program, students are expected to attend *Shabbat* worship services either on a Friday night or a Saturday morning. Attending services helps to reinforce the prayer curriculum in our school by allowing the children to practice what they are learning, as well as provide an opportunity for students to join in as part of our Jewish community. Please see below for grade-specific attendance expectations:

High Holiday services & Hang Out @Home Shabbat do not count towards the completion of this expectation.

When you attend services, students/parents should fill out a Shabbat Attendance Form using the QR Code to get credit for attending the services.

Inclusion

We strive to create an inclusive learning environment within our mainstream Religious School classrooms. In-class support and additional help outside of class is available to our students who need alternative accommodations. *Madrichim*, teen teaching assistants, serve as one-on-one support as needed for individual students, and our Inclusion Coordinator will work with parents to provide modified instruction whenever possible.

Handheld Electronic Devices

Cellular phones, iPods, etc. must be turned off or silenced, and in some cases, placed in a basket on the teacher's desk until dismissal. The use of cell phones may be permitted if a teacher instructs the students to use them during class as part of their learning experience.

Text & Supplies

Your child may be given textbooks at the beginning of the year. If your child needs to bring them home for home practice, please be sure to return them to class the next meeting. If a textbook is lost, a fee will be charged. Students should come to class ready to work—this means that they should come with a pen, pencil, and notebook if necessary, and any other materials the teacher has requested.

Attendance Expectations

We look forward to seeing each student at every session. Class attendance is a vital element to learning and creating a sense of community. Students who do not attend regularly will have difficulty keeping up with the curriculum and the social component.

Please help us by notifying the <u>Religious School</u> via email, in advance if you anticipate an absence and notifying the <u>Religious School</u> via email as soon as possible of any anticipated absence, such as an illness.

Arrival & Dismissal

Arrival/Dismissal

All families are encouraged to park and come into the building to drop off and pick up their children. Please be aware that the only access into the building is through the front, main door.

Late arrival and early dismissal

While we realize that there may be times when it is necessary for your child to arrive late, or to leave early, please understand that this can be disruptive for the rest of the class. Whenever possible, please try to make other arrangements.

<u>If your child must leave early</u>, we ask that you send a note to the teacher or email the office indicating the time that you will be picking up your child. Please park your car and come to the office to sign your child out. For safety and security purposes, it is necessary that adults come into the building when picking up early.

Please help us ensure your child's safety:

- We request that parents park in the designated parking spaces in the parking lot.
- Please do not leave children in the car when coming in or out of the building.
- Please supervise your children on their way to and from the cars.
- Children should not be in the parking lot without an adult.
- Please REDUCE SPEED coming in and out of the parking lot.

Behavior Expectations

Philosophy

We believe that each individual has:

- 1. The right to learn without interference from others.
- 2. The right to work with students and teachers in an atmosphere of mutual respect and understanding.
- 3. The right to have one's personal property respected by others.
- 4. The right to be protected from physical harm.

Expectations of Behavior

"Do not unto another that which is hateful to yourself," taught Rabbi Hillel as noted in the Talmud, Shabbat 31a. As this is the basis of our discipline policy, we ask all of our parents, students and teachers to work together to support these expectations:

- 1. Students will be ready to participate in class activities.
- 2. Students will not disrupt any other student's participation in class activities.
- 3. Students will not touch other students in a manner that could be considered offensive or disruptive or use language that could be considered offensive or disruptive.
- 4. Students will not abuse the property of Temple Sholom or the facility, itself.
- 5. Students will behave in accordance with the spirituality of our sanctuary at all times.
- Students will remain in the building at all times, from the time they are dropped off, until the time they are picked up. This means they cannot leave the school grounds at any time. If a student is discovered leaving the campus, parents will be notified immediately.
- 7. The following are prohibited: rudeness, stealing, vandalism, dishonesty, profanity and vulgarity, and fighting.
