

BEING AWARE AS A PREREQUISITE FOR REPENTANCE

FROM OUR RABBI





Reb Zusya was one of the earliest of these masters. He lived in the 1700's in Poland and Ukraine. He came from a prestigious Chasidic family; his older brother was a Chasidic icon, Rabbi Elimelech of Lizhensk. He taught that the Hebrew word for repentance, teshuvah, was an acronym for the five biblical verses associated with transforming repentance into a preemptive model for more righteous behavior.

ת – "You shall be earnest (תַּמִים) with Adonai, vour God."

ש ויתי) Adonai before me always."

ו – "And you shall love (ואהבת) your fellow as vourself."

ב - "In all your ways (בכל), you shall know God."

ה – "Walk humbly (הַצְנֵעַ) with your God."

View these verses as an iceberg of sorts. Only one verse is "above the water" and thus is visible. It is the actions we take that manifest with that axiom "love your fellow as yourself." The other verses reflect a faith in God. Why? Because if one has true faith, then God is a constant Presence in life and we are not likely to transgress.



Another Chasidic sage, known as the Degel Machane Efraim, spoke of letting God into our world. He pondered the question of why injustice exists. He recalled a teaching from the Lurianic mystical tradition that Justice is in the realm of the Shechinah [a mothering allencompassing presence of God], but when we don't acknowledge the sovereignty of The Holy One, then justice will be allusive. Faith in God, acknowledging the Presence of God, and acting accordingly are the building blocks for righteous behavior. Cognitive ability to discern right from wrong is secondary.

Wow! That is something to truly ponder. Want to be a better person? Want to act more lovingly to your family? Want to be more ethical in your day-to-day life? The secret is an introspection of the faithfulness in your soul. The Kotzker Rebbe stated: "Where does God dwell? The answer is where we let God in." And from that, true righteousness can flourish. Just like it says in Psalm 92: "The righteous shall flourish like a palm tree, he shall grow like a cedar in Lebanon. Those who are planted in the house of the LORD shall flourish in the courts of our God. They shall still bear fruit in old age; they shall be fresh and flourishing."

Look inward and let God in!!


