THE TASTE OF FAITH FROM OUR RABBI

I have such distinct, positive memories of celebrating Passover as a child. It is with a great deal of ease that I can close my eyes and visualize it. In an instant, I am in the driveway of my uncle's house in Little Neck, Queens. Then I smile and am transported in my mind to the living room-dining room; clearly seeing the extended long, rectangular arrangement of folding tables and bridge tables pushed together with the dining room table - all at different heights. None of the chairs really matched -some were brought up from the basement and others were borrowed from neighbors; come to think of it-none of the kippot (traditional head covering) matched either, they were an eclectic collection of every bar mitzvah and wedding in our family's history. Then there were the wine-stained books, which still had some matzah crumbs from past years. Boy, I miss those days; 25+ people crammed around the tables for Seder. The food was abundant as if the table was part of the Holy Tabernacle that stood in Jerusalem where my Jewish ancestors would bring their offerings 2000 years earlier. Between the family and friends present, the smell of homemade cooking, the sacred rituals that were to be performed and the laughter mixed with loud voices-there was holiness all around us.

The *seder* was led by Sol Kreitman, who always seemed very old to me. I loved sitting by his side as he chanted the sacred passages. This man embodied *kavanah* (spiritual integrity) as he conducted the age-old rituals. I remember vividly him leaning over to me when I was about 10 years old and whispering for only me and my grandfather to hear: "Boychik- this is YOUR history; told to you through food... *Fress* (Yiddish for "Eat!")... and remember!"



There was real wisdom in that statement. Indeed when I think of Passover, my memories are associated with the foods served. Passover was a holiday that came with unique tastes and smells for me. But what Mr. Kreitman meant was the seder table was a visual drama mixed with liturgy that we got to eat. It started with feelings of renewal but always remembering the bitterness of the past as we ate karpas, parsley dipped in salt water. We recalled the pains of servitude under Pharaoh's reign by eating bitter herbs. We remember the potential and possibilities of freedom by eating Matzah, the unleavened bread. We played with the charoset, the mixture of chopped apples and wine and nuts, which reminded us how our ancestors made bricks and used them for building the stone cities of Pithom and Ramses. We drank 4 glasses of wine to remember the joys of deliverance, but we lessened the joy as we poured out 10 drops to recall the plagues-Mr. Kreitman would stay my hand if I tried to lick my fingers when I did this ritual; "one should not enjoy the plagues inflicted on others..." he would say.

The seder experience spreads Jewish history out before us--from creation to the patriarchs; from slavery to freedom and then into the land of Israel. The meal itself is metaphoric of the korbanot (the sacrifices offered in the Temple years ago; that is why we eat roasted meats!). This is in accordance of the Talmudic sage, Rabbi Yohanan Ben Zakkai who taught that after the Temple, the dining room table became the altar for God. (continued on page 4)

Thus the joys found after the meal center around that moment in history when we as a people, gathered in our own God-given land and were free to embrace God as we were commanded. Thus the rituals after dinner have a strong Messianic overtone. We invite the forerunner of the Messiah, the prophet Elijah to the table by opening the door and inviting him in for a glass of wine. We sing and end our *seder* with the line "L'shanah Habahah b'Yerushaleiyim... Next year, in Jerusalem." Long before Theodor Herzl proclaimed Zionism as Jewish nationalism in the 19th century, Jews have been yearning to return to their homeland that God bestowed upon their ancestors.

Rabbi Aaron Panken *z"l*, the former President of the Hebrew Union College, shared with me his insights that the *seder* was sort of "pep rally for the soul."

Jews who lived in Diaspora after the destruction of the Temple in 70 CE used the seder to hold onto their history and to find the strength to yearn to return to Israel and the way things were. He believed that the message is clear—"God did it once, God can do it again... Keep the faith", he said.

As the Passover season rolls around, my prayer for you is this: May your memories of Passover be sweet and inspire you to create new ones. May the taste of the history inspire you to engage in a commitment to change the world for the better. And may the symbol of Elijah imbue with the confidence and the hope of what tomorrow can bring for all of us, all of Israel and all the world."



The **TZEDEK BOX** is a new ritual supporting us as we pursue justice work as a consistent practice. Like the act of putting coins in a tzedakah box, you add in a slip of paper with a short diary entry every time you make an effort to build a more just world. This year on Yom HaTzedek, **May 5, 2024**, open your Tzedek Box to review what you've done as a form of sacred accountability. Engaging in regular cycles of action and reflection is a beautiful way to pause, take stock of how our actions align with our beliefs, and rededicate ourselves to Tikkun Olam.

Attentive Listening

Shalom everyone, "How is everybody doing?" This gentle inquiry reflects the kindness inherent in the *Middah*, *Sh'miat Haozen*, which means "A Listening Ear" and is **the pay attention Middah** or virtue. First, a quick lesson: the Hebrew word "*Mussar*" refers to moral conduct. The Mussar Movement arose in the 1800's in Lithuania and encompasses a range of spiritual practices, focusing on personal characteristics, traits, or virtues which are called *Middot* (in Hebrew, singular: a "*Middah*").

"How is everybody doing?" is a kind question, which was recently asked by a very compassionate Elmo on January 29th. Originally shared on Twitter/X, this simple question quickly traversed the globe, eliciting responses ranging from frustration "The world is in turmoil, Elmo"... to caution "How much time do you have?". Yet, amidst the surplus of angry, sad, or distressed replies—a virtual outpouring mirroring a dumpster fire—lay a profound lesson in communal dialogue.

Despite the prevailing snarkiness online, there exists a poignant takeaway from this exchange: the importance of genuinely checking in with others. Sometimes, you really do need to ask how folks are doing,...ask about someone's wellbeing, and regardless of their response, simply listen. The act of attentive listening takes intention and work on the part of the listener.

"If you have the emotional capacity, can you ask someone how they are today and hold space for their answer?"

This query, posed by Ali Hall in a piece about Elmo for the positivity and happiness-centric publication, "Spread the Ripple" on Medium, resonates deeply with the lesson of Sh'miat Haozen. While the response may overwhelming, providing a safe space for someone to express their truth could serve as a significant act of kindness, enriching both the individual and the community at large. And given all the factors that continually add up in all our lives today, it is nice to have someone to talk to, and someone who will listen.

President's Column

Over 150 days have passed since October 7, 2023. There is no question that with one significant city remaining- the IDF is approaching a strategic military success in the removal of the physical infrastructure developed over 30 years by Hamas, Islamic Jihad, the PFLP, and similar terror groups. Most certainly Israel will be safer. What remains unclear however, will be how "safe" will be quantified.

Hamas and its brethren are not, sadly, going to be truly eliminated. The ideas, energy, philosophy that created them cannot be defeated. Rather, the popularity and acceptability of ideas and concepts rise and fall over time based on varying factors. Support for the idea of a Palestinian state remains as popular as it has ever been, and that idea is one that is a reasonable aspiration for a people seeking self-determination.

This past summer, I had a rare opportunity to meet with the top leadership of the Israeli Histadrut, the equivalent of the AFL-CIO. While we focused on the general strike that occurred last spring in relation to the Judicial laws, the conversation did include discussion efforts. Arnon-Bar peace David, on leader, Histadrut's reminded everyone present that the idea of a Palestinian statehood is not something to oppose. He reminded us that Yitzhak Rabin gave his life to pursue this cause and that it's incumbent on all to keep that goal alive. He clarified that there is a difference between having a goal and achieving that goal, as achievement requires levels of smaller goals, strategic planning, and mechanisms for enforcement and mutual accountability.

The impact of the ever-intensifying calls for "peace", "ceasefire," etc. which are thoughtful, compassionate calls for humanitarianism are interwoven with those advocating the same for far less noble reasons. We see calls for "peace" used as fronts for hate speech. In an increasing amount of utter disregard for the events of October 7, 2023, We are seeing the center of both political parties being eroded bit-by-bit with "fringe" ideas that are transforming the parties into something new.

While it's healthy and reasonable to engage in review and analysis of institutions governments in Israel, the US and elsewhere, we must resist the urge to allow that otherwise healthy discourse to be used as a distraction. The events of October 7 are being whitewashed into something other than what it was: a total unprovoked massacre of innocent civiliansinfants, seniors, children, men, women, even pets, simply because they existed and because Hamas could do it. Further, Hamas has made it clear that it has no regrets and would do the same repeatedly. Hamas' goal is not a strategic one. It is not seeking Palestinian statehood and self-determination of a people. Hamas seeks only the eradication of Jews from Eretz Yisrael. That is Hamas' goal and the goal of those calling "from the River to the Sea."

The IDF's fight is there. Our battle here is the concern of ideas. We need to be vigilant in fighting against hate for hate's sake; that is the only way to achieve a meaningful, lasting peace.
