

FROM OUR RABBI The Majesty and Magic of Lino

I have a thing for blown glass. It is an art form that I find mesmerizing. During the COVID lock down, it only intensified as I found a glass blowing show on Netflix, called "Blown Away." Now as summer approaches and a new chapter of living with COVID is upon us, I want to take my glass blowing passion to a new level. I think I want to sojourn New York's Mecca of glassblowing—Corning, NY. Maybe I can take a class or two. Maybe I can watch great glass blowers show off their craft at one of the exhibit halls there. Or maybe I will just wander through the museum at a snail's pace, savoring each exhibit in intrinsic detail.

That is the dream—one thing for certain, I will head to Stockbridge, MA to the Schantz Gallery when Lino Tagliapietra, nicknamed the Maestro, will be there. He won't be doing any exhibitions there nor will he do any formal presentation [his English is not that great]. But he will be there showing off his work.

The name of Lino Tagliapietra may not be known by many people on the streets of the Capital District. But to glass blowing aficionados, this man is a true rock star. His work is beautiful; he has such artistry with his craft. The vibrant colors, the unique shapes and layered textures make his glass pricey and much sought after.

The glass pieces were magnificent. As I know that, I will walk the gallery with my hands in my pockets—I dare not come close to knocking something over! The price tags range from \$10,000 to \$125,000 for his glass masterpieces. I will stand at a distance, but still in awe of the patterns, the color and the shapes. Each piece had a majesty all its own.

I met the maestro before—the summer before COVID. He was then 84 years old. He showed secrets to various pieces and the process of bringing the molten glass into vibrancy. Then he told me in a very broken English that every morning when he goes into his shop, he starts his day with a unique ritual. Before he commences on his elaborate vases or bowls, he flexes his talents by blowing a wine goblet. His rationale is simple—making a glass wine chalice includes most of the elements he needs for his work. The wine goblet starts his day and serves as a warm up exercise for him to frame his workday.

This is a perfect metaphor for all of us. Lino's goblet is our *kiddush* cup. On any given Sabbath or at the start of a holy day, it is customary to lift the cup right after the sanctity of the day is proclaimed by the lighting of the candles. It contains most of the elements we need to transform the ordinary into the sacred: the cup is symbolic of the cup of life, the wine is our symbol of joy; it is to be filled good sweet wine [well, the sommeliers among us would question if Manischewitz can be considered good wine!]; the cup is described as the cup of salvation and redemption by the Rabbis—things we seek as we transcend time and enter into a realm of spirituality; the blessings recited over the cup are not just for the content of the *kiddush* cup but for what it symbolizes—God's constant presence in our world; and it is the portal for understanding the sense of Divine providence that is set out on the table before us.

Talking with Mr. Tagliapietra, his eyes conveyed a true love for his art. As he showed me the intrinsic details of his work, his large hands so gently cradled the art work. I would too with a price tag of \$75,000 for that particular piece! But for him, it wasn't out of fear of breaking it, it was out of love. Like caressing the face of an infant, his touch conveyed awareness and sensitivity as well as a deep love. In our own spiritual quest, that is what we should seek when we hold a *kiddush* cup—an awareness of the sanctity and power that can be obtained by a great sense of awe and awareness.

THE RABBI'S MESSAGE CONTINUED

Maimonides wrote in his <u>Mishneh Torah</u> that any drinking vessel can be a <u>kiddush</u> cup. All one has to do is hold it differently, perhaps resting the glass in one's palm as if our hand becomes petals of a flower. It is conscious recognition of an act that transforms the simple and the mundane into the sacred and the blessed.

As the Sabbath appears on the horizon, heed this message as we should aspire to make the wine in our cups sweeter. That is what we want for ourselves and our loved ones in the year ahead. Strive to become an artist of time. Like Lino, realize that your *kiddush* cup contains many of the elements of a sweet life—what is within is a life force, what is around you as you recite are many people with whom you share a sacred bond. In the evening after you light the candles, hold the cup in your hand and make it a conscious choice to turn that goblet/glass/chalice into a *kiddush* cup. Bring your dreams and expectations into your mind as you feel the texture of the cup in your hand. Savor the moment and close your eyes as you recite the blessing. Then sip the wine—Manischewitz or not—the wine will taste sweeter as you approach the new year with joy and a newly found sense of optimism.

One does not need a pricey glass to realize how blessed we are.... But every glass lifted in praise symbolizes an artistic marvel from the most divine Maestro, created just for us! See Lino ---->

Gershon's as Remembered

Gershon's Fine Foods or as we (Ann Cramer and family) called it "The Store" was conceived as a kosher style New York City deli but located in upstate New York. My father hand sliced the lox. Featured smoked fish were sable, sturgeon, white fish, belly lox, and chubs. My mother, who was a wonderful cook, introduced many items. Cheese pies with or without fruit toppings were a popular offering. Many times these were delivered directly from oven to customer! In addition white fish salad, tuna and rings, and a variety of coleslaws were prepared, all using her own recipes.

These were foods we ate at home. The kosher meat came from Isaac Gellis Provisions in New York City. One of their products was rolled beef. This was literally pieces of beef rolled with pastrami spices. Today it is not easily found. Dill pickles were delivered from Brooklyn by Irving the Pickle Man.





"The Store" was the first in the area to offer rotisserie chickens cooked on a spit. Gershon's was built upon hard work, innovation, friendly service, and dedication to providing the best possible product.

THE HISTORY: FROM THE WEBSITE--- PICTURES AND BACKGROUND

Gershon's Deli was established in 1954 (see Grand Opening newspaper advertisement) by Irv and Lena Gershon. They quickly outgrew their original storefront and in 1956, moved across the street to the present-day location.











In 1973, Irv and Lena sold the business to their nephew Bob Lessner who in turn, sold it to his adopted son and long-time employee Tony Lauria.

For the next 31 years with his business partner Lou Gregory (who retired in 2009), Tony (see above- smiling) presided over this legendary eatery with unwavering attention to every detail, unrivaled commitment to quality and an ever-present, thousand-watt smile.

Gershon's Today

The Gershon's tradition continues with Tony's daughters, Antonia "Toni" Nelson and Bridget Battease, at the helm. They remain true to the mission of Gershon's founders and the legacy of their beloved father...fresh food, freshly prepared and courteously served. Time honored recipes still prevail and continue to delight customers - young and old - through the decades.



Spring of 2022 marks the ten-year anniversary of the Temple Community Gardens we call *Gan Chaim*. Since the beginning, this project has expanded to include 14 raised, 4x8 foot garden beds on the lawn at Gates of Heaven. *Gan Chaim* members paid an entry fee and helped each other to construct all 14 beds. We filled them with nutrient rich soils and the real fun began. Each bed is worked by a family or friend group. The gardening team decides what they wish to plant and how, in their assigned beds. After purchasing their plants, seeds, fertilizer, and other gardening essentials, the teams plant and tend their beds throughout the summer. Gardens take advantage of a water-saving, drip irrigation system designed and installed by Victor Friedman and other founding members, to keep plants sufficiently watered and growing throughout the entire growing season.

Gardeners grow a wide variety of vegetables, fruits, and flowers. Peppers, onions, tomatoes, garlic, cucumbers, beans, potatoes, Kale, Swiss chard, eggplants, zucchini, marigolds, and giant sunflowers have all been products of the gardens. *Gan Chaim* members keep the produce they grow. Many of the growers choose to donate a portion of their produce to the SICM food bank in Schenectady. One special bed is tended by the whole group. That bed is called the *Tzedakah* bed. All of its produce is also donated to SICM's food pantry. In an average growing season, *Gan Chaim* donates between 100 and 110 lbs. of fresh vegetables to the food pantry and have done so for nearly 10 years! That's a lot of veg!! Members love to share their produce with each other too. We are looking forward to the time when we can resume our annual pot-luck dinner gathering where members share their vegetable creations, as well as their recipes.

REFLECTIONS ON TORAH STUDY

Ever since I was young, when reciting the verses from Proverbs as the Torah is returned to the Ark, I have felt a sense of comfort, if only momentarily. It is a tree of life to those who hold fast to it and those who support it are fulfilled and happy. Its ways are ways of pleasantness and all its paths are peace.

Following my joining our congregation's Torah Study more than a decade ago, that sense of peace, that calm born of comfort, gained staying power, and a quiet joy has settled within me.

Learning Torah gives me a way to think about God, provides me with a language that brings clarity and coherence to my inner dialogues, and offers me an opportunity to celebrate the Jewish imagination. The multiple genres that comprise the Torah – stories, history, law, poetry, song, and teachings –are distinct yet connected paths that enable me to experience the extraordinarily rich wholeness of Judaism. With the Torah's insistence on faith, perseverance, hope, and that conscious pause in all that we do (to be just and moral), I have deepened my understanding of what it means to lead a Jewish life.

We are urged – commanded—to choose life, to <u>not</u> be indifferent in the presence of injustice, to positively keep our tents open and embrace the stranger, the widow, the orphan, and in the midst of the unfairness and brevity of life, to celebrate weekly, to celebrate the Sabbath.

In Torah Study, I participate in arguably the oldest Book Club in the world, one constrained neither by time nor place. I am part of the past, the history of the first people of Israel as described in the Torah itself. I am part of the generations upon generations who have held the Torah dear and pondered the meaning of its words. I am part of the present, my friends in Torah Study of varying ages and backgrounds who come together to discuss with genuine concern (and with good humor) what is meant by the Torah. I am part of the future, our children and our children's children as the Torah describes the joy of children and our duty to teach and protect them with the hope that the Torah will inform their lives long after ours.

The words of Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel, whose faith compelled him to actively seek social justice, describe how I have come to understand my life: "the ultimate meaning of existence is to be a religious witness". I take to heart another verse in Proverbs we say when returning the Torah to the Ark: "For I have given you good instruction, do not forsake my Torah." When I study Torah, I pause and wonder, and that's when I feel true and not alone.
