FROM THE RABBI Steven C. Kane



Knowing that the December bulletin is coming out on the third day/fourth night of Chanukah, I wanted to mention the parts of the holiday that I love. Of course, at the top, is the lighting of the Chanukah candles, especially on the 8th night (Sunday, December 5th) when all of the candles are lit. I always go outside our house so I can see the fullness of the candles shining brightly in the window. Next up-I absolutely love latkes! When my children were growing up we used to take the recipe from a different children's book each night. Today I still make "Malka's Secret Recipe," which comes from a book of the same name. (Among other interesting ingredients it includes scallions instead of regulars onions.) Over the years, this became the best-liked latke, although the competition was tough! I also have a collection of dreidels, and each Chanukah I bring them out. This year I added a dreidel that bounces (I kid you not) to the many other unique ones that spin.

Last but not least, I love the collection of Chanukah songs we traditionally sing. Some are in Hebrew, others in Yiddish and still others are in English. Each one carries with it memories of singing it as a child, and later as an adult with my own children. Yet, of all the Chanukah songs I know, I find one to be particularly inspiring. It was first performed on Saturday Night Live during the 7th night of Chanukah 5755 (December 3rd, 1994). It is called "The Chanukah Song" written (and performed) by comedian Adam Sandler.

When Sandler first performed the song, he introduced it by telling the audience that "when I was a kid, this time of year always made me feel a little left out because in school there were so many Christmas songs, and all us Jewish kids had was the song 'Dreidel, Dreidel, Dreidel,' and so I wrote a brand new Chanukah song for you Jewish kids to sing..." Then Sandler begins singing "Put on your yarmulke, here comes Chanukah, so much funikah to celebrate Chanukah...but when you feel like the only kid in town without a Christmas tree, here's a list of people who are Jewish, just like you and me."

The verses are filled with references to famous Jewish people, from rock singers and actors to world renowned scientists and all-star athletes. Sandler also makes references to Jewish observances, especially ,of course, lighting the Menorah.

Throughout the years, I have seen many attempts to integrate Chanukah into the "holiday season." Most, however, take a part of Christmas and attempt to make it acceptably Jewish. I have seen Chanukah bushes and heard of someone called "Hanukkah Harry" (spelled of course with an H). There is a children's book that begins with the words "Twas the night before Chanukah and all through the house...," based on the famous 19th century Christmas poem. Sandler will have none of that. His song is a unique composition and features a catchy chorus ("Put on your yarmulke, here comes Chanukah"), one that is known not only to his fans, but a generation of Jewish children who grew up in the 2000's. More than that, Sandler wants children to express their pride in being Jewish, and let them know that they have plenty of famous Jewish heroes (including himself) that they can justifiably be proud of.

I have heard from religious Jews in my parent's generation that they would never have worn a kippah in public because it might have meant trouble for them. Yet when I was in college I "put on my yarmulke" and started wearing a kippah full time. For me, it was as much a symbol of pride in my Judaism as it was a religious act. Today, Jewish children also express their pride in who they are through singing Adam Sandler's song each Chanukah. Lighting candles, eating latkes, spinning (or bouncing) dreidels, and singing songs are what defines Chanukah for me. "The Chanukah Song" has now become another part of the holiday I love.

FROM THE PRESIDENT Clare Rosen



As Jews we are reminded over and over to "welcome the stranger." A couple of weeks ago, we held an informational meeting to learn how we can be a host organization for Afghan refugees. More than 55,000 people have been evacuated from Afghanistan and need to be resettled in the US. HIAS (founded as the Hebrew Immigration Aid Society) has a long history of helping refugees and immigrants resettle in our country. HIAS reminds us of what Hillel wrote: "If I am not for myself, who will be for me? But if I am only for myself, who am I? If not now, when?" (Ethics of our Fathers, 1:14)

I know I can count on you to follow our Jewish tradition of showing kindness and generosity to immigrants. Many of our parents and grandparents were immigrants, people who benefited from the opportunities given to them. There are many references in the Torah that remind us to treat the "stranger" as our own. "You shall have one standard for stranger and citizen alike, for I the LORD am your G-d." (Leviticus 24:22)

Additionally we are commanded to stand up for the widow, the poor, and the orphan as well as the stranger, and I am confident that our CSI community will continue to demonstrate these values repeatedly. There are those in our greater Briarcliff/Ossining community who don't have enough food or warm clothing. While it seems inconceivable to us that there are children who go to bed hungry or don't have clean clothes to wear to school, these are real situations. Each year we generously collect food for the food pantries, donate warm coats for those in need, and provide Thanksgiving and Christmas meals to the hungry, to name a few of the ways our congregations stands up.

Helping Afghan refugees cannot wait. We need to step up now. Besides raising the necessary funds to house a refugee in our community, there are many non-monetary in-kind ways to help. The goal is to slowly encourage independence as we provide the necessary resources.



The sprinkler system is shut down and the tomato stakes are pulled and stacked for next year. The wood chip piles seem to ebb and flow as we spread them where needed and a new load gets delivered.

We have a few months of quiet outside on the farm but we hope to be busy inside. We need to plan for next year. Will you be part of our group? What varieties should we try to plant for next year? New ideas are welcome! And opportunities to help abound.

Opportunity Shop reopened by CSI

Fred Schulman, an active member and officer of Congregation Sons of Israel, Briarcliff Manor, is dedicated to helping his greater community. He is also a man of action.

After the building housing the Opportunity Shop at 61 North Greeley Avenue in Chappaqua was sold--coinciding with the expiration of the lease held on the thrift shop's quarters—Mr. Schulman approached CSI's Board of Trustees with a proposal to take on and operate the shop. The new owner/landlord offered a long-term lease, and each of the parties enthusiastically embraced the re-opening.

The Opportunity Shop had been operated for decades by the Sisterhood at Beth El Synagogue in Chappaqua. Over the years some of the original volunteers moved--or passed away. As well, the staff of volunteers changed to include some non-members of Beth El, including Lois Schulman, Mr. Schulman's wife and a fellow member of CSI who had elevated to a management position at the shop.

All of the committed women who ran the shop over the years enjoyed the camaraderie, the pleasant social environment, the satisfaction of operating a successful business (even without pay) and the knowledge that the profits were all going to a charitable cause.

The Opportunity Shop closed in March 2020, the same month COVID-19 struck in Westchester County and many businesses were required to suspend their operations. The combination of the prospect of higher rent and the onslaught of COVID led to Beth El's decision to not renew the lease.

After almost a year and a half of seeing the space had not been leased by the new owner/landlord, Mrs. Schulman and her husband reached out to the old crew. All clearly missed the fun and satisfaction of working there and were ready to go back to work.

The lease was signed as of August 1, and since then the shop has been thoroughly cleaned, painted and re-fixtured (with all work performed or supervised by Jogn Chambal, another member of CSI). Donations began being accepted on September 1, and the official reopening was September 13.

In addition to the roster of past volunteers and contributors, members of CSI have volunteered to work as well as donate merchandise.

Mrs. Schulman continues to manage the shop.

"Even after a year and a half, I saw how much Lois and her fellow staff missed the good works done at 'The Opp Shop' and I reached out to the new landlord to try to recreate this longstanding institution of charity and fun," Mr. Schulman explained. "It's a place where valued but unused possessions can be put to good use and committed people can find an enjoyable workplace to fulfill worthy goals."

"Since its closing, not a week went by without all of the volunteers hoping for a way to reopen," Mrs. Schulman said. "It's unusual to have a place where workers, givers, and buyers all feel a sense of satisfaction."

In keeping Congregation Sons of Israel's history of helping those in need in the greater community, each month CSI will earmark a charity to which it will donate some of the earnings. Given the current situation in Afghanistan, which necessitates urgent resettlement of many thousands people, they have chosen HIAS (Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society) as the first charity. In future months, CSI will identify other charities to help victims of Hurricane Ida, raise funds senior citizens to buy food, buy taxi vouchers for medical appointments and support local food pantries.

be a lot of excitement There can when two holidays happen around the same time. For adults, holidays that blend into one another can also be stressful and make our lives feel hectic, but for most children, more opportunities to be with friends and family, eat delicious food, and—of course—receive presents equals more fun and joy. Thanksgiving and Hanukkah are different holidays, but as an educator, I like to think about the values related to each holiday and in this case, they are very similar.

Thanksgiving and Hanukkah are both holidays to focus on gratitude and generosity. Most families in our community are fortunate to have abundant holiday meals and enough presents to fill multiple playrooms. We can talk to our children about being thankful for our

blessings and should couple those conversations with teachings about the responsibility of sharing our good fortune with others.

Teaching young children the true stories of Thanksgiving and Hanukkah can be tricky. Whatever truly happened hundreds of years ago that now lead us to eat turkey and latkes is mostly not relevant in young children's lives, but the values surrounding the stories are. Hanukkah and Thanksgiving are both holidays where we can focus on the value of respecting and celebrating each other's differences. This year, as our school students eniov nursery Thanksgiving singalong, Hanukkah puppet show and parties, we will also be teaching them the values of gratitude, generosity, and appreciation of each other's differences.



FROM THE RELIGIOUS SCHOOL DIRECTOR Wendy Segal



In the Talmud, a discussion about lost items and when the original owner must be found can sidetrack homeless? Do you have to be Jewish to be an into a discussion about how to deal with local non-Jewish officials, whether wine barrels are meant to be strong enough to stand on, and what the best way encourage young people to reduce, reuse, and is to steal a sheep. In the adult education class I teach via Zoom, we also get sidetracked. Recently, in actions something we would expect of all decent the middle of a discussion about something entirely different, we wound up debating whether it's appropriate to spend so much time in religious school teaching Hebrew when we might be engaging the kids in acts of tikkun olam, repairing the world. Everything from protesting racism to committing to a vegetarian or a vegan diet might fall under the umbrella of tikkun olam, which generally demands active participation in some behavior meant to right a social or environmental wrong. One of the class attendees suggested our religious school perhaps should spend more time engaging our students in acts of tikkun olam - much like our Reform friends do – and less time on Hebrew. I used to agree. The more I have considered the question over the past 20 years or so, the more strongly I feel that we're on the right track. Of course, our Torah demands advocating for the rights of those with less privilege when it reminds us to care for the widow and the orphan and the stranger among us, because we were strangers once in Egypt. Of course, our Torah demands we take care of the earth even during times of war, when it forbids Jewish armies from destroying the fruit trees of our enemies. Of course, our Torah demands that we consider the ethical treatment of animals when it decrees that we not even remove an egg from a nest without shooing the mother bird away first or when it requires us to guide a lost animal home.

But do you have to be Jewish to care for the environmental activist? Don't they preach against bullying in nearly every school? Don't they recycle in almost every classroom? Aren't these people?

On the other hand, do they teach the sound of the shema in public school? Do they sing "Am Yisroel" Chai" with gusto in public school classrooms? Do they instill a sense of pride in the accomplishments of Jewish scientists, authors, lawmakers, musicians, philosophers? Do they show you how to find your way around a *siddur* or a *chumash*? Do they explain the ethical, moral, historical, and even environmental lessons of the seder plate? Do they teach you that prayer in Hebrew is tefillah, which really means self-judgment? Do they ask you to reflect on a time when you felt awe and thought, "Maybe Gd really did make this world?" Do they tell you that Jacob is renamed Yisrael, literally "struggled with Gd," and wonder whether we are called the Children of Israel because it's expected that we also will struggle with Gd?

I think we're on the right track. It's hard to teach a foreign language in four hours a week, especially one that uses different letters. It's harder since we have to teach Jewish holidays and Jewish heroes and Jewish texts and Jewish history and Torah and Tanakh and love of Israel. Yes, we do encourage our students to perform acts of charity, but we also teach Hebrew, the language which binds Jews into one family. And bringing Jewish families together is tikkun olam, too.





CHANUKAH

Chanukah commemorates the victory of the Jewish forces, led by Judah Maccabee, over the Syrian forces (often called Syrian-Greeks because they had come under the influence of Greek culture) lead by Antiochus Epiphanes in the year 167 BCE. Antiochus had outlawed circumcision, Shabbat observance and other customs basic to Judaism. He then desecrated the Holy Temple in Jerusalem by placing the statue of a Greek god in the Holy of Holies, and conducting sacrifices of unclean animals.

After three years of fighting, the forces led by Judah recaptured the Temple on the 25th of *Kislev*. They found it in ruins. As they began to repair and rebuild it, crowds of Jews congregated to celebrate and bring proper sacrifices to God. One version of the story tells us that the Jews celebrated the rededication of the Temple for eight days since they had been denied access to the Temple for the eight days of *Sukkot*. Of course, we are all familiar with the legend in the Talmud that recounts one cruse of oil found with the seal of the *Cohen Gadol* (High Priest). It was sufficient for one day, but a great miracle happened and the oil burned for eight days.

KINDLING THE LIGHTS

This year the first *Chanukah* candle is lit on **Sunday, November 28th.** One candle is lit on the first night, two the second night and so on, adding a candle each subsequent night. The *"Shamash"* candle is lit first and used to light the others. On the first night the candle is placed on the far right of the *menorah* (as it faces you). Each night a candle is added to the left and candles are lit left to right, so that the newest candle is always lit first, the second newest second, and so on.

People often use larger candles on Friday night because these candles must burn for a period of time after complete darkness sets in.

On Friday night, December 3rd, *Chanukah* candles are lit before *Shabbat* candles.

Matanah, the gift shop at CSI, has a wonderful selection of candles, menorahs and gifts for Chanukah and all year.

While kindling the lights, say the following blessings:

Baruch attah Adonai Eloheinu melekh ha-olam, asher kid shanu b'mitzvotav v'tzivanu l'haldlik ner shel Hanukkah.

On the first night only add the following benediction:

Baruch attah Adonai, Eloheinu melekh ha-olam shehecheyanu vekiamanu vehigianu lazman hazeh.

After lighting the candles:

These lights we kindle to recall the wondrous triumphs and the miraculous victories wrought through Your holy *kohanim* for our ancestors in ancient days at this season. These lights are sacred through all the eight days of *Chanukah*. We may not put them to ordinary use, but are to look upon them and thus be reminded to thank You and praise You for the wondrous miracle of our deliverance.

STOCK: Giving appreciated stock that you have owned for at least a year provides a double tax benefit. You can qualify for a charitable income tax deduction and avoid capital gains tax you would owe if you sold the stock yourself.

CASH (SPECIAL 2021 TAX BENEFITS): If you itemize, you may claim a charitable income tax deduction of up to 100 percent of adjusted gross income for cash gifts. Non-itemizers may claim a tax benefit for cash gifts up to \$300 for individuals and up to \$600 for joint filers.

IRA QUALIFIED CHARITABLE DISTRIBUTION (QCD): If you are at least 70 1/2 years old, you can make a gift directly from your IRA, up to \$100,000 each calendar year, and exclude the amount of the QCD from your gross income for federal tax purposes.

DONOR ADVISED FUND (DAF): If you have a DAF, you qualified for a charitable income tax deduction when you made your gift to your DAF. Now put your gift into action. Consider establishing a DAF for your charitable contributions.
