





FROM THE RABBI Steven C. Kane



Have you ever heard of the Amalekites? According to the Torah, the Amalekites were a part of the ancient Edomite kingdom, living in the Sinai desert and in the Negev. In Deuteronomy it tells us, "Remember what Amalek did to you on your journey, after you left Egypt--how, undeterred by fear of God, he surprised you on the march, when you were famished and weary, and cut down the stragglers in your rear. Therefore, when Adonai your God grants you safety from all your enemies around you...you shall blot out the memory of Amalek from under heaven. Do not forget! (Deut. 25:17-19)

Their attack on the rear of the Israelites as they left Egypt was against the weak and the elderly who would be found at the rear of the former slaves who were marching through the desert. These people were not soldiers; indeed they were defenseless. The attack of the Amalekites was considered to be particularly reprehensible. Amalek was seen as lacking in even the most elementary decency when it came to other nations..

How did the rabbis understand the command to "blot out the memory of Amalek"? Throughout the ages they creatively reinterpreted this command. Instead of being a religious obligation concerning a flesh and blood enemy that should be destroyed, they saw the Amalekites as representing a senseless hatred of the Jews. So rather than commanding the destruction of an enemy, the rabbis saw this as a command to destroy an idea, to blot out antisemitism.

This is not the only time the Amalekites appear in the Bible. In the Book of Samuel, King Saul engages in battle with them and defeats them. In this battle the Amalekite king is mentioned. His name is Agag. Why is this important? In the book of Esther, Haman, the sworn enemy of the Jews, is identified as an Agagite (a descendant of the Amalekite King Agag), and thus a "hidden" Amalekite. What does Haman say about the Jews to King Ahasuerus? "There is a certain people, scattered and dispersed among the other peoples in all the provinces of your realm,

whose laws are different from those of any other people and who do not obey the king's laws; and it is not in Your majesty's interest to tolerate them." (Esther 3:8) This is of course the classic antisemetic trope-we are not only different from others, we aren't truly loyal to the country in which we reside and because of that we should not be "tolerated", a euphemism for getting rid of us, generally through physical harm and violence.

When we read the *Megilat Esther*, one of the most beloved customs is to make noise every time Haman's name is read. Thus we "blot out the memory of Amalek (Haman)" through noise, not violence. Among Persian (Iranian) Jews the custom is to write the name of Haman on the bottom of their shoes and then stomp on the floor, thus wiping out the name of our enemy. Both seem to me to be a very constructive and creative way to carry out the Torah's command.

Unfortunately, unlike the people of Amalek, antisemitism is still around. While the Amalekites and Hamans of the world may disappear, the idea of senseless hatred of others has not. Perhaps the rabbis were right when they transformed this commandment into and idea. Whether reading the *megillah* or confronting antisemitism in some other form, our tradition asks us to simultaneously blot it out and to never forget that it will always exist. That is how we confront antisemetism, from our very beginnings as a people down to today

CANTORIAL NOTES Hazzan Jeffrey Shiovitz



Some called her arrogant. Others called her a primadona. I called her humble, brilliant, spiritual and a good friend. Debbie Friedman, singer, composer, and spiritual pioneer died 10 years ago. We recently observed her Yahrzeit. Although she had been ill for years, Debbie continued to perform and write new music. In the past month, I have immersed myself in her music. I have been reading everything I can about her life and her music. The more I study about her, the more I am convinced of her brilliance. She had traveled to London to perform and teach and contracted the swine flu. I lost a kindred spirit and the Jewish people lost one of the "greats" of music.

I consider Debbie Friedman to be one of two most important composers of Jewish music of the last 50 years (Shlomo Carlebach being the other). Debbie's music bridged the gap between old world and modern world by composing songs and melodies that spoke to our world and hearts while also honoring the message, customs and traditions of traditional Judaism. Her style was telling and direct in the folk-rock manner. She was often compared to Joan Baez. Debbie recorded 20 albums and appealed not only to Reform Jews, but to Conservative and some Orthodox, too. She was very proud that her music became a crossover kind of music. She appeared on national television and sang her Aleph Bet song with BARNEY! She thought that was the funniest thing! Who doesn't sing her melody for Havdalah? You can go into a modern Orthodox synagogue or to a shtiebl and hear that tune. My almost 3-year-old granddaughter sings it with gusto at the end of every Shabbat! And who doesn't look

forward to hearing her Oseh Shalom on Yom Kippur.

One year Debbie came to speak at a Cantors Assembly in the Catskills on the popularity of her music. Some Cantors were not lovers of her music because she sometimes took liberties with the prayer modes. In her last years, she took it upon herself to study them. Of course, she mastered them! One attendee asked her why Cantors should sing her music since it didn't always adhere to the modes. Politely, she thanked him for his question and began to explain that she was aiming her music at the unaffiliated and those not affected by traditional Judaism and prayer. She felt she was reaching them. With such grace, she then challenged all of those attending the convention to reach out to those same people she was and to use their talents and musical style to bring them into the synagogue and to bring them closer to God. Everyone was blown away!

In 1999, I served as Chair of the Cantors
Assembly Convention. I asked Debbie to
compose a setting for the Psalm for Shabbat
that we could all learn to sing. Shyly, she said
ok. Several weeks before the convention, she
calls my home and asks if she could sing it for
me and ask for my thoughts. I said of course,
but asked if she could hold on for a second.
Covering the receiver, I yelled to Robyn and
the kids to get on the phone as Debbie
Friedman was going to sing for us! It was quite
exciting to say the least. We loved the song.
She changed a few things and it has become
very popular.

Thinking back on her legacy, I know the Jewish world suffered a tremendous loss. What we learned from Debbie was great. I know that every time we sing her Mi Shebeirach for those who are ill, we will think of her and her memory will live on with us. I miss Debbie still 10 years after her passing. I continue to listen to her music. She was a light that gave Jewish "spiritual music "a sense of holiness every day. May her memory continue to be for a blessing.

The next Jewish Music Through The Ages program, now in its 33rd year, will take place on Saturday evening, February 6th at 8pm. We will continue an exploration of Debbie's music. I hope you can join me.

FROM THE PRESIDENT Clare Rosen



As Jews we have two New Years to look back and look forward. On Rosh Hashanah, the "head of the year" is when we ask G-d for forgiveness for our past misdeeds and remind ourselves not to repeat these mistakes in the coming year (s). It's an opportunity to improve ourselves. In the secular new year, January 1st, we also look back at the previous year and traditionally make New Year resolutions, promises to ourselves that we will enter the new year, with new goals in mind. Inherent in resolutions is that they are positive.

For *Tu B'Shvat* this year, each Religious School family was sent an envelope containing an activity sheet and an informational sheet all about *Tu B'shvat*. Included in the envelope was also a packet of parsley seeds for one of the activities families could do at home. Below is some of the text that was written and a picture of what arrived in CSI RS families' mailboxes on or around *Tu B'Shvat*!

What is the significance of this date, *Tu B'Shvat*?

Tu B'Shvat is the official beginning of spring in the land of Israel. Right now the first shoots of plants are peeking up from the ground, and some of the fruit trees, in particular almond trees (which have beautiful white flowers), are beginning to bloom.

Tu B'Shvat is often called the birthday of the trees (or in Hebrew, Rosh Hashanah l'ilanot). That's because according to the Torah one was not supposed to eat from a fruit tree until it is four years old (in ancient times the fruit of the fourth year was given to the Temple in Jerusalem as a gift of thanks). Instead of keeping track of when every single tree in an orchard was planted, any tree already growing by Tu B'shvat would be considered one year old on that date.



February at the farm may seem like a quiet month. The field is dormant, the fig tree is wrapped with burlap and the tomato stakes are neatly stacked off to the side. A day of winter tree work will be done for health and safety purposes. Farm shed organization and repair work as well as ongoing chicken care are the other main outdoor activities for the month. One day of grape vine pruning to prepare for the new growing season is also planned. There is a quiet beauty on the farm at this time of year. Stop by and walk around to enjoy our peaceful jewel.


We are hoping to broaden our committee membership to help spread good cheer within our community. The time commitment is small, but the rewards are great. Join us!



All proceeds raised from the World Wide Wrap go towards purchasing *tefillin* for a South American Jewish community.



OUR FEBRUARY BAT MITZVAH

FEBRUARY 6th: MIA BENJAMIN

Hi, my name is Mia Benjamin. I live with my mom, Lauren, my dad, Robert, and my dog, Cookie in Briarcliff Manor, New York. My *Bat Mitzvah* is coming up on February 6, 2021. My Torah portion is called *Yitro*. *Yitro* describes Moses going to Mount Sinai and receiving the Ten Commandments from Gd. This is a very important time in Jewish history considering these are the original Jewish laws received from Gd.

For my *Bat Mitzvah* project, I took one of the Jewish values of *Tikun Olam* to benefit a real-life situation I saw unfolding in our community. A couple of weeks ago, the Gullotta House was forced to stop offering free hot meals to our Ossining neighbors facing financial hardship and food insecurity. The Gullotta House no longer had enough funding to continue the program. I raised over \$2,600, which was enough money to sponsor two "grab and go" hot meal events at the Ossining Stop and Shop. Not only did I volunteer at those events, but also several of my friends joined me. This is particularly important during a pandemic, as many of our neighbors lack the means to obtain a hot meal. Through the generosity of my friends and family, I was able to raise enough money to sponsor one event in fewer than twelve hours! As an added benefit, food was purchased locally, supporting local businesses in need. After completing my project, I felt good to know that I helped to make a difference in people's lives.

I currently am a competitive swimmer and swim for the Rivertown Rays. I have been on the team for a little over seven years and wouldn't trade it for the world. One thing I learned as a swimmer is to always try and improve myself, no matter what obstacles might be in my way. This has helped me so much while preparing for my *Bat Mitzvah* during Covid. I would like to thank all of my Hebrew School teachers, Rabbi Kane, and especially Cantor Shiovitz for all their help and support.
