FROM THE RABBI Steven C. Kane



One of the most important concepts in Judaism is the *minyan*, the gathering of ten people to engage in prayer. In the Talmud, this idea is drawn from different verses in the Torah that refer to both community and the idea of holiness. When the verses are put together, the rabbis learn that in order for God to be truly praised, there must be a community that acts together (referred to in Hebrew as *d'varim shebikedusha*). Certain prayers, including the reading of the Torah, are left out if there is no *minyan*. Of course one may pray while alone, but the rabbis understood that the communal nature of prayer and reading Torah is such that it must be done in a community.

It is not only prayer that requires a community. It is impossible for one to be engaged in Jewish life in general without other Jews. Yes, one can observe most of Jewish life on one's own, but it is not the same without community. A *Shabbat* dinner is enhanced when we invite over other people. The idea of guests in the *sukkah* is underscored by inviting the *ushpizim*, figures in Jewish history who are asked to join us in spirit. What would a Pesach *seder* be without someone to ask and answer the Four Questions?

This has been an incredibly difficult time for the Jewish people because of the constraints on community that Covid has put on us. That difficulty has now been multiplied by the act of terrorism in Colleyville, Texas where a rabbi and his congregants were taken hostage. Shall we always gather as a community now with a sense of fear? Will our synagogues become like the synagogues in Europe that have armed guards openly carrying machine guns, and sometimes military vehicles parked outside to dissuade terrorists and antisemites? Should everyone entering a synagogue now have to go through a metal detector?

We need to be safe but we also need community. We need to be open to helping a homeless person in search of food and warmth but we also need to be vigilant about who enters our doors. There is, of course, no easy answer. However we should find courage in the fact that the Jewish community has faced many challenges throughout our long history and somehow we are not only still here, but we are a flourishing, creative and successful people. Long ago the sage Hillel taught, al tifrosh min ha-tzibur, we are not allowed to separate ourselves from the community (Pirke Avot 2:5), because the "minyan" is our lifeblood. It's what gives us strength and vitality. Covid has challenged us to find new ways to gather, such as on Zoom, and having new security measures will also become a part of our lives that we will adapt to. It will, however, take work and vision and hope. I have no doubt that somehow, we will find a way. We always have.

CANTORIAL NOTES Hazzan Jeffrey Shiovitz



It's hard to believe that it has been 11 years since the passing of Jewish musical icon Debbie Friedman. Debbie died at age 59 of pneumonia. If you grew up in the Reform movement—especially if you ever attended a song session at a Reform Jewish camp—you are, I'm sure, familiar with the singer/songwriter's large and gorgeous musical repertoire. Influenced by folk artists like Peter, Paul and Mary, Debbie's music is modern, moving and wide-ranging in styles, from the soothing "Mi Shebeirach" to the upbeat and joyous "Miriam's Song."

Debbie was born in New York and grew up in St. Paul, Minnesota. As a teenager, she noticed that something was wrong with her family congregation's services. She felt that they lacked a way for young people to connect. Debbie wrote her first Jewish song, "V'ahavta" (And You Shalt Love), in 1970 when she was only 19 and first performed it at a Jewish Youth convention. Using both Hebrew and English lyrics, she began to write songs for all ages, and her source material and subjects spanned everything from prayers to Jewish texts to educational songs to children's songs. Debbie's influence extended far beyond the Reform movement. Her music brings comfort and joy to so many.

I was very lucky to have known Debbie, and I had the opportunity to work with her on some projects. She graced our *bima* here at CSI on two occasions as she shared her music and soul with us.

In honor of Debbie's memory, I would like to share with you 10 of her top songs. Listen to them and others from her huge catalogue on Spotify or YouTube.

1. "Mi Shebeirach"

One of Debbie's most popular and frequently-sung melodies, this song offers the Jewish prayer for healing in both Hebrew and English. This song remains relevant and important to us now as always.

2. "Miriam's Song"

This wonderfully upbeat song tells the story of Moses's sister Miriam. The song reminds us of Miriam's fortitude and leadership. It has now become a staple of Passover Seders the world over. My family dances to it!

3. "Oseh Shalom"

The Prayer for peace recited after the *Amidah*. It is such a beautiful melody.

4. "V'ahavta"

Debbie's first original song is sentimental and spiritual.

5. "Birchot Havdalah"

There are so many reasons to love *Havdalah*. My favorite reason is that I love to sing this beautiful melody. Her refrain of *yai-lai-lai* will send you into the new week on a great note.

6. "Not By Might"

Another very upbeat song that features a lot of clapping. "Not By Might" celebrates the spiritual resolve of the Jewish people and also of the Maccabees in the *Hanukkah* story. If you like to dance off your anxiety, this is a great song for you!

7. "L'chi Lach"

Back on the sentimental side, this song tells the story of Abraham and Sarah's journey to Canaan, which eventually becomes Israel. "Lechi lach, to a place that I will show you, Lech I'cha, to a place you do not know. And you shall be a blessing."

8. "Devorah's Song"

Similar to "Miriam's Song." This buoyant tune celebrates a woman prophet from the Book of Judges. It is really quite nice and off the beaten track.

9. "Alef Bet"

This song is a staple that many people don't realize was written by Debbie. It's such a catchy version of the Hebrew alphabet that it has become a mainstay at Hebrew Schools across generations and denominations. If you want to teach your children some Hebrew, this one's the perfect place to start!

10. "Light These Lights"

Last but not least, one of my favorite *Hanukkah* songs. You will love it!

(11. "Happy Thanksgiving"—A wonderful bonus choice; great for the kids!)

FROM THE PRESIDENT Clare Rosen



Each month as I sit to write my next bulletin article, I look back at my earlier written ones. This month, I caught my breath as I reread February 2021's article. So here we are nearly two years since the New Rochelle case of Covid-19 "locked" the doors to most public and private establishments and made "social distancing" and mask-wearing a way of life.

February 2021 Bulletin Article

Since the COVID pandemic struck nearly a year ago so many of our CSI community have struggled. Some have lost their jobs; many others are isolated, and others are trying to juggle their children's education while having their own full-time jobs in person or remotely. And so many have had to bury their loved ones with only a small group of people. A year ago, we would have been horrified to think that we could not have the traditional shiva. And all of us have been challenged by the disruption in our daily routines. Helping others is a win-win; you will get as much as those being helped. Here are some relatively easy ideas:

- A heartfelt handwritten note, card, or postcard goes a long way.
- If you like to bake, make brownies, cake or cookies.
- Organize a meal drop off with other members of our community.
- Pick up a flower or plants for others.

Whatever you can do, be it small or large, it will make our community stronger. These acts will bring us together and amplify our cooperative efforts.

In February 2021, we were glued to the daily TV reports coming from Dr. Fauci and Governor Cuomo. Now, in February 2022, we are exhausted and skeptical of the confusing reports about the Omicron variant. The Omicron variant

transmission rate is much higher than the other variants, but for fully vaccinated people the presentation is much milder. Wearing masks is a way of life as is avoiding indoor dining and other "risky" situations.

What does this all mean to our congregation; young families, empty nesters, and seniors? Most are yearning to return to the "good old days." Yet we have to adapt to the "new normal." CSI has remained steadfast throughout the pandemic and very flexible as we respond to the ups and downs of the infection rate. Everything you need is here, but possibly has a different look. Morning minyan (both in person and remote) is held every Sunday, Monday, and Thursday morning. Kabbalat Shabbat is an addition that brings us together for a pre-service schmooze via Zoom. You can attend Shabbat services on Friday evening via Zoom or in person and Saturday morning via livestream or in person. We also offer a number of classes each week, and several book clubs sponsored by the Men's Club, Sisterhood and the Rabbi's Circle. We remain committed to educating our preschoolers at the CSI Nursery School and provide a robust Jewish education at our religious school.

Some of you may not have participated in anything the past couple of years. If so, what "value" are you redeeming from CSI? We would like to listen to you and find ways for you to feel connected to the CSI community.

The CSI Farm is about to begin our sixth growing season.

Prior to our first growing season we worked on preparing the site and improving the infrastructure: removing invasive species, installing the fence, digging the well, installing the irrigation system, creating the mounded growing beds, and insuring the safety of our congregants by countless days of health and safety pruning (tree work) in our beautiful oak grove. There have been numerous side projects including the spreading of hundreds of yards of wood chips to create the outdoor gathering spaces and the wood chip walking path through the woods, the building of the mini greenhouse, and multiple rounds of organizing of the farm shed (including sacred book burial) and more.

In the meantime....

We learned of other like-minded organizations across the country that are involved in the Jewish Farming Community. The Jewish Farmer Network is one of them and on Sunday, February 6th, they are offering a "Virtual Gathering of Jewish Farmers." Aside from the interesting programming at this two-day event, I was amazed by the bios of the Teachers and Facilitators. This is a new face of Judaism in the U.S. (storytelling, culinary arts, youth education, food justice, herbalism, advocacy, etc.) and I urge you to check them out at the link above.

Should We Be Celebrating Purim This Year?

Purim, celebrated in the middle of the Hebrew month I'm not sure I'm as enthusiastic about it this year. This year, Adar begins on Wednesday, February 2nd. There's a well-known saying from the Talmud, "When Adar comes, joy increases." (Ta'anit 29a) This happens to be a leap year in the Hebrew calendar, which means we add an entire month rather than just one day. That extra month is added right before Passover, so this year we have two months in a row called Adar: Adar I and Adar II. When that happens, we celebrate Purim during Adar II. So why am I not as excited about Purim coming as I am most years? For one thing, Purim is not for another 8 weeks or so. Like Chanukah and Passover, Purim is rarely "on time," it is always early or late. This year, because of the extra month, it's late. It seems difficult, maybe foolish, to plan too far ahead these days. Just as we were beginning to exhale came another variant. Just when that wave began to recede came another, with more cautions, less decorative and more serious masks, boosters.

And there are tragedies. Events make the news to remind us that we're not everyone's favorite minority. It's not a new phenomenon. It's difficult to be Jewish. From the days of Pharaoh, we were a distinct people. On our way to Sinai, we were attacked by the Amalekites. Our sages tell us that Haman was a descendant of those very Amalekites. As a nation with unique ways and unique laws, we make some people uncomfortable and even suspicious. In the Book of Esther, Haman takes the king aside and tells him, "There is a certain people, scattered and dispersed among the other peoples in all the provinces of your realm, whose laws are different from those of any other people...." (Esther 3:8) That's how Haman prefaces his suggestion that the Jews of the realm be eliminated. In light of the frightening occurrence at Beth Israel Congregation in Texas, is this really the time to party?

Actually, yes. Yes, it is. Over these last two years, the pandemic has made me shy away from others, just when I need the companionship and support from my of Adar, is coming. I'm usually crazy about Purim, but friends and family most. Now I'm trying to watch for hopeful numbers. I take sensible precautions by being fully vaccinated, wearing the recommended mask, and avoiding indoor crowds. But now that I've taken steps to safeguard my physical health, I need to safeguard my mental health by beginning to resume some of the activities I miss most.

> And when it feels like perhaps the safest thing to do is to hide our Jewishness so we don't stand out as too distinctive or become too visible to those who wish us harm, perhaps that's the time to proclaim our uniqueness even more proudly. This may be just the right time to plan a child's Bar or Bat Mitzvah or add a new mitzvah to your life or watch a Jewish movie with our kids. We can allow antisemites to dictate how we express our Judaism, or we can embrace what Haman called us, "a certain people...different from ...any other people."

One of our primary goals in Religious School is to instill in our children a fierce pride in their heritage and history, a strong sense of why we do that which makes us different. We teach your children about our Torah, about our prayers, about Israel, about our values, about our history, about our calendar, and about our holidays. So yes, this really is the time to get ready to read the Megillah and get silly. This really is the time to party. It's time to come out of our cocoons. Happy Adar!


