# FROM THE RABBI Steven C. Kane



Not many people have a copy of my Installation Program when I became the rabbi at CSI, but if you had one it would tell you that the rabbi who installed me was Rabbi Gordon Tucker, Dean of the Rabbinical School, Jewish Theological Seminary. During my last two years of Rabbinical School and for the first few years afterward (when I worked at JTS), Judy and I lived in the Bronx (Riverdale) as did Rabbi Tucker and his family. We were part of a group that formed a chavurah minyan that became a part of CSIAR, the Conservative Synagogue of Riverdale. I knew Rabbi Tucker as a teacher, colleague and friend. Two years after I came to CSI, I was pleasantly surprised that Rabbi Tucker had left full time academic life to become the rabbi of Temple Israel Center in White Plains. Over the years, although White Plains has a very close community of different synagogues, Rabbi Tucker has reached out to me when he thought CSI might add to or benefit from a group initiative. Thus when the second Intifada was making life in Israel miserable and severely curtailing tourism, a number of us at CSI joined with Rabbi Tucker and four other synagogues in Southern Westchester to travel on a very important mission to Israel.

Rabbi Tucker is now the Rabbi Emeritus at Temple Israel Center, leaving to return to a life in academia. He is currently a Senior Fellow of the Shalom Hartman Institute, North America and served as the Scholar in Residence at my own Hartman Institute Rabbinic Leadership winter retreat this past year. He continues to be on the faculty at JTS, serving as an Adjunct Assistant Professor of Jewish Philosophy and most recently wrote a commentary on Pikei Avot; The Wisdom of Our Sages (Lev Shalem edition, 2018), parts of which many of us studied last year on Shabbat. He served for many years on the Rabbin- L'hitraot, ical Assembly's Committee on Jewish Law and Standards, and also translated (with notes) Abraham Joshua Heschel's monumental work Heavenly Torah as Refracted through the Generations.

As a PhD in Philosophy and a rabbi, Rabbi Tucker looks at Jewish texts and teachings through the eyes of a philosopher, showing their depth and creativity. Knowing that Rabbi Tucker was leaving his pulpit, I immediately invited him to be our Scholar in Residence this year (January 24-25; see later in the bulletin for a flier about his talks and to make a reservation for the Shabbat dinner).

The overall theme of what he will be teaching is what it means to be a part of a living tradition that confronts its texts and keeps their teachings both alive and renewed. As he wrote in his introduction to his commentary on Pirkei Avot, "A living literature invites an ongoing process of cultural renewal and a literary people is one that embraces the invitation, engaging in a re-definition of its values and goals in response to the ever-changing circumstances of life." (Pirkei Avot Lev Shalem Introduction pg. xxii)

Having had the opportunity to study with him on many different occasions, I wanted to bring him here so others could have the enlightening experience of learning from his scholarship and I was so pleased that he accepted my invitation. The topics for his talks include his thoughts on revelation, ethics and the revolution of Rabbinic thought, especially as found in his commentary to *Pirkei Avot*. He is a Jewish writer, scholar and teacher par excellence. I have no doubt that everyone who comes to his sessions will leave feeling they have learned something new or seen an idea in a different light. I hope you will be able to join us in this wonderful opportunity to learn from one of the leading Jewish thinkers today.

# CANTORIAL NOTES Hazzan Jeffrey Shiovitz



Few Jews can sit still or resist tapping their feet when they hear the familiar blend of clarinet and violin that characterizes the music of the *klezmer* band. Even in our synagogues we regularly let ourselves go as we belt out the final verses of *Adon Olam* or *Ein Keiloheinu*.

The Jew's love of music is an ancient phenomenon. Indeed, so important is music to Jewish life that we are told in Psalm 147:7, "Sing unto the Lord with thanksgiving, sing praises with the harp to God." Throughout the Talmud we find references to song as a way to serve God.

Before the destruction of the Second Temple in 70 C.E., both vocal and instrumental music were an important part of Temple worship. After the destruction of the Temple, as a sign of mourning, the Rabbis attempted to discourage the use of music in the synagogue service. With the ban on instrumental music on Shabbat and Yom Tov, which continues in some synagogues today, vocal music became the primary musical component of prayer and Scripture reading.

The rabbis also attempted to ban non-religious music. However, this was not terribly successful and it proved virtually impossible to eliminate music from events such as weddings. In the words of the late Professor Boaz Cohen, the ban apparently "ran counter to human nature."

Songs are an important ingredient of the Jewish home, not only enhancing our enjoyment of Shabbat and Festival meals but transmitting to us, in a warm and beautiful way, the liturgical and cultural heritage of our people. We can sing *z'mirot*, religious songs, to countless melodies or snap our fingers to the beat of Psalms adapted to modern melodies.

Over the years, Jewish music has borrowed a great deal from outside sources, blending new melodies into the tradition and enriching our musical heritage. Further, our music has varied according to the countries where Jews have lived. Particularly marked are differences in tonal style between music sung in the Ashkenazic and Sephardic traditions.

If you would like some suggestions as to recordings or performers to listen to as we get more into the winter, please call me. There is nothing more that I like to do than talk about Jewish music.

#### January 2020 Update

Winter is here! Planting beds in both the main and community garden fields were hilled, seeded with oat and pea as a cover crop, and a coating of fresh wood chips was added to the paths in preparation for winter.

The large pile of logs we had onsite has been split and the resulting firewood (all hardwood at various states of seasoning) is available to members for \$18 per 21 pieces of generously-sized logs. You are welcome to mix and match from the stacks in front of the shed. Payment may be made in the office.

We will be pruning and retraining the grape vines so that they grow on the top cordon wire. Volunteers will be welcome and no experience necessary -- will try to arrange this for a Sunday morning when the weather cooperates. Stay tuned!

The Daffodil Project is an initiative of Am Yisrael Chai, a nonprofit Holocaust Education and Genocide Awareness organization that aspires to build a worldwide Living Holocaust Memorial by planting 1.5 million daffodils in memory of the children who perished in the Holocaust and in support of children suffering in humanitarian

crises in the world today. Caron coordinated with Roni Shapiro so that all of the different grades of our school could participate. She was generous with her time and also worked with the farm to arrange a proper planting location and technique. #### THE HOMELESS SHELTER PROGRAM BEGINS JANUARY 19th

Did you see the Sign Up Genius we sent? Here is what it says:

CSI is joining other local religious organizations to provide safe, warm shelter and meals for those in our community who are homeless. For one week in January (1/19 - 1/26), we will host a supervised group of adults from 9pm - 7am. Transportation, bedding and all night supervision are already furnished.

HERE'S WHERE OUR VOLUNTEERS COME IN: In order for this to be successful, volunteers are needed to cook, set up, serve, clean up and, most importantly, visit with our guests. In addition to our sign up sheet for meals, we have provided an attachment with important details.

Ideally, volunteers should be at CSI at 8pm to warm up food, set up tables, serve, visit and clean up. Of course, if you cannot be here to serve the evening meal, we will make arrangements for that to be taken are of. Don't let that keep you from offering to cook!

We are proud to participate in this Emergency Shelter Partnership to assist those who are literally out in the cold. If you wish, you can support the program at CSI with a monetary donation. All assistance is very much appreciated.

Food guidelines for the Homeless Shelter Program at CSI.

Our guests arrive at 9pm, so we start each volunteer slot with Dinner.

#### Dinner:

At this time we advise prepping food for 12 people. Fish, chicken, pot roast, meatloaf, pasta, hearty soup, rice and beans. Dessert should be low sugar, although fruit and fruit salad are good choices.

In order to adhere to CSI's rules of kashruth, all dinner food must be kosher **and** cooked in the CSI kitchens. You are welcome to cook and freeze (at CSI) ahead of time and re-heat the evening of. Please speak to Ellen about kitchen us – we will make it work!

Breakfast: This should be at the synagogue the night before, please.

Cereal is NOT popular.

For 12: Juice, fruit, milk, eggs (which the supervisor will prepare in the morning), frozen vegetarian breakfast burritos, are appreciated. Muffins & Bagels are ok in addition to other foods.

Lunch: This should be at the synagogue the night before, please.

12 bagged lunches with: Fruit, water, tortilla wraps or sandwiches with meat (kosher only, please) or cheese or tuna. Healthy soups in well-sealed containers which can be microwaved are also appreciated. We are told that our guests ae often allowed to use microwaves at some local fast food restaurants.

\$5.00 gift cards to McDonalds or Dunkin are also good choices.

CSI will provide paper goods, water, coffee & tea.



and Masada Octet, Adam Rudolph Go: Organic Orchestra, JD Parran, Fernando Otero, Jen Shyu, Pablo Ziegler and Joan Baez in different venues and festivals, to mention a few. Since 2007, Iván has been an artist- in-residence at Central Synagogue and since 2008 part-time faculty at the Debbie Friedman School of Sacred Music. Iván is currently working on a conceptual solo project based on a series of meditations for clarinet focusing on the question of what is Jewish sound.




