FROM THE RABBI Dina S. Rosenberg



This past month, 40 CSI members saw the Broadway show, Prayer for the French Republic. This play spans five generations of a French Jewish family in Paris. The show begins at the height of World War II in 1944 when a family must decide whether to leave Paris to escape the uncertainty of the oncoming occupation of the Nazis or to remain in Paris because they are as Parisian as their neighbors and feel that Paris will protect the Jews. One branch of the family obtain Visas and leave France, some of the family is taken by the SS to Poland to be murdered and others to the Concentration Camps, and the elder branch remains and survives living in Paris through the war. Fast forward to 2018, the family has lived on the same land for generations and is shocked to find themselves asking the same questions in the year 2018 as was asked in 1944. Are we safe? Is it time to leave? How do we respond to Jew-hatred and why does everyone hate the Jews?

As I watched with horror my biggest fears being acted out on stage, I was overcome with profound sadness and anger that Jews have been forced throughout our existence to hide our identity to remain safe. This theme of hiddenness is prominent in our supposedly *joyous* holiday celebrated in the month of March. Purim masquerades as a joyous holiday because Haman's plot to kill the Jews was foiled – but does our celebration mute the genocidal attempt to destroy the Jewish people in the first place?

Ancient Hebrew texts love a good play on words! According to the story of Purim, Esther's given name was "Hadassah." The name "Esther," which she took to conceal her identity as a Jew before marrying the King, may be related to the Hebrew word ahs-teer, "I will hide." The rabbis of the Talmud see this as a description of Esther's act of self-preservation. To be a heroine; to save the Jewish people; Esther was forced to hide her Jewish identity to remain safe. Because of the hatred of one individual, Esther changed her

name and לְא־הְגִּידָה אֶסְתֵּׁר אֶת־עַמָּה Esther did not reveal her nationality or her lineage (Megillat Esther 2:10). As so many generations to follow, Jews have to decide do they change their names so they are less easily identified as Jewish. Jews are again finding themselves asking the questions: do we stop wearing kippot? Should we tuck our Jewish themed jewelry under our clothes? Should we remove our mezuzot?

Fortunately, the Book of Esther concludes with Esther revealing her identity and the Jewish people being saved from genocide. For many Jews around the world today, we read from the Book of Esther and grasp on to the hope that Jews will no longer need to wear a mask to feel safe. We hope that our world's leadership will ally with the Jewish people and ensure our security. We pray that we won't need to make the decision to leave our home and journey to Israel, our Jewish homeland, for protection.

May we be like the Esther at the end of the story: bold and courageous enough to stand for the truth, to voice our opinion, and to fight for our people.

The Megillah of Esther is undoubtedly the most interesting and diversified of all of the books of the Bible from the standpoint of music. In ancient times. The Megillah was read in fast "parlando" style with the musical interpretation. The Mizrachi which describes, in moving passages, the Jews still read the *Megillah* in this fashion. Among Western Jews, however, there has evolved more elaborate chant. Within this mode, various characteristic music phrases or themes are repeated and arranged in several different combinations. The result is a colorful tapestry of the Megillah reading.

The *Megillah* receives added luster and interest in that throughout the reading there are interwoven other modes and scales, in addition to actual popular song snatches, which highlight certain dramatic incidents and moods of the Megillah narrative. Thus, for example, the opening blessing for the reading is chanted in a style suggesting trumpets announcing the reading of a royal proclamation. It is also the same melody used to introduce the blowing of the Shofar on Rosh Hashanah. This joyful and expectant feeling is heard again (during the reading) when we read of Mordecai's optimistic expression that "help will surely come.

Heard often throughout the reading is the "Lamentation Theme." This theme, which is expressive of tragic and sad events, is the traditional chant for the Book of Lamentations, destruction of Jerusalem and the Temple. Whenever a passage suggests tragedy or grief, this Lamentations or *Eicha* theme is used. The music thus effects often rapid changes of mood during the reading. There are as many as three "mood" changes in one verse.

An awareness of the musical elements of the Megillah reading certainly adds to the appreciation of the ancient-modern story of Israel's triumph over its enemies.

FROM THE PRESIDENT Mark J. Rosenberg



I recently came across some commentary on the moment when Moses, who was raised in Pharoah's royal family apart from the Israelites, recognized that he was part of the Jewish people. At Exodus 2:11, it is written that "when Moses had grown, he went out to his kinsfolk and witnessed their labors. He saw an Egyptian beating a Hebrew, one of his kinsmen."

The commentator focused on the word "grown" noting that in Hebrew, the words grow and great share the same the same root, בדול. According to the commentator, this was the moment that Moses realized that he could make a difference in the world, that he could create change. And, the commentator went on, "witnessed their labors" means that Moses stepped out of his selfishness and saw the suffering around him. In other words, when Moses recognized the suffering of others and realized that he could do something to alleviate their suffering, he became great.

This commentary made me think about how we all possess the capacity for greatness. As Shakespeare wrote in "Twelfth Night," "Some are born great, some achieve greatness, and some have greatness thrust upon 'em."

Very few of us will have the opportunity like Moses to make a difference by changing the course of history or influencing an entire people. However, we all can achieve greatness by making a difference in our community through acts of *Tikkun Olam*, *tzedakah* and volunteerism.

To me, one of the reasons why CSI is great is its longstanding commitment to *Tikkun Olam*. I also recognize the greatness of our members who donate so much of their time and resources to our community. Time and again, I am amazed by how CSI's members step forward when there is a need – a sick member of our community, the preparation of food to feed the unhoused, teaching a class, the organization of a program or event, donating to the *Kol Nidre* appeal (this year's was one of our best ever), are just some of the examples of our members' greatness.

As *Pesach* starts to appear closer over the horizon and we get ready to recount the story of the Exodus from Egypt, let us all think about new ways we can become great, that is, how we can make a difference, both as a community and as individuals.

FROM THE NURSERY SCHOOL DIRECTOR Naomi Elyachar



In my article in the most recent bulletin, I described some of the beauty and wonder that occurs every day in our 2's classes. This month, I wanted to do the same for our 3's program.

While our 2's are just beginning school the first time, learning school routines, and finding a place of comfort outside of their own home, our 3's enter school with increased comfort, confidence, and skills. There is an immense amount of learning and growth that happens during the three year old year. Our 3's classes build upon the wonderful foundation that began in the 2's. Children in our 3's love to take new responsibilities as they aain teachers independence. Our create classroom environment that serves as a holding container for the children to practice their newly developing skills. These children quickly learn to do their routines independently hanging up their coats, putting away their belongings, leading a classroom job, putting away classroom materials, and cleaning up after themselves. Our teachers understand the importance of creating spaces and structure that allow our children to easily understand what to do when. When they understand routines that may seem simple to us, such as where to put their placemats and water bottle after snack, this builds confidence in the children that helps them feel comfortable taking risks and trying new challenges.

Another key component of the 3's classes is that children begin persisting longer at activities. This means they spend more time engaging with their peers, using and practicing pragmatic language skills, and building important skills such as manipulating fine motor tools. One can see the noticeable difference in their attention span and level of engagement by viewing their artwork and corresponding documentation. While the artwork hanging on the bulletin boards is beautiful to look at, when you see the photographs alongside the artwork of the children engaging in creating these pieces, you can see that often multiple processes—cutting, constructing, tearina, planning, aluina, painting—go into the creation of one piece of work. For example, our students in the Tree Room recently created tree artwork by tracing, etching, painting, and printing. Our curriculum is designed to be immersive, so they did this alongside learning about trees and plants, reading related books, participating in treerelated movement activities, and tracing signs that said "I love trees" to hang up by their artwork.

3's teachers create classroom Our a environment with a wonderful balance of both care and nurture that also encourages skill development. They understand how to help our three-vear-olds become capable independent young learners who are curious, inquisitive, and risk takers. We love seeing the immense growth that happens in the three year old year at school!



Thank you to those who brought in coats for IFCA during January. When I brought the coats to the IFCA thrift shop at 2 p.m. on a Tuesday, I mentioned that there were some beautiful coats in the bags. A couple of hours later, I received this email: "You were right, the donations were great. I think we sold every one of them today. People were standing and waiting for them to go out." Thanks again!

On January 27th, members of CSI joined with Ossining Town Historian Joyce Sharrock Cole, students from the Roosevelt School in Ossining, and members of the Ossining community to build a replica of a Rosenwald School at the Bethany Arts Community Center. This room is part of a larger exhibit for Black History Month. Julius Rosenwald (a Jewish executive at Sears Roebuck,) in collaboration with his friend Booker T. Washington and the communities they served, built 5,000 schools for African American children in the rural South. The CSI Civil Rights Trip with Abbe Marcus, Robert Goldstein, and Rabbi Kane, visited one of these schools in Alabama last March. It was a memorable experience for all of us. 



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
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
