

FROM THE RABBI Steven C. Kane



On Wednesday night and Thursday, May 4th and 5th, we will celebrate the 74th anniversary of the founding of the modern State of Israel. It is quite meaningful to be in Israel when Yom Ha'atzmaut occurs. It is preceded by a very serious and solemn Yom Ha'zikaron (Memorial Day), sending the message to the entire population that it was only through the sacrifice of these men and women that the Jewish state was born. It feels like every person is out celebrating in some way shape or form. Some gather together to listen to or sing the classic Israeli music of the 40's and 50's, during Israel's early years. Others are singing the music of Israeli artists from the generation of the Six Day and Yom Kippur wars. Then there are those celebrating to music from the contemporary Israeli music scene, with songs similar in style to what one might hear in America.

In several places, including on many U.S. college campuses, that day will not be celebrated with song and dance. It will be a day of memorial and unrest, called *Nakba*, a commemoration of the "disaster" for the Palestinian people that took place with the founding of the State of Israel. At these commemorations there will be one common theme, that Jews do not have the right to a land of their own anywhere in Palestine, that is on all of the land "from the (Jordan) river to the (Mediterranean) sea."

Jerusalem, we have a problem. While the vast majority of Jews strongly believe in the right of Israel to exist, Jews who are younger, mainly in their teens and twenties, have begun to question this. Often it is because they have been exposed to these arguments on campus, and they don't have enough information or knowledge to respond. Another reason is that the rights of Palestinians are often linked to others who are oppressed (called intersectionality), and they feel that they should side with those supporting the Palestinian cause because we should always oppose oppressors, whomever they may be.

Many of us have children and grandchildren (and even friends) who fall into this category. How do we engender a love of Israel in their souls? How do we help them to understand the complexity of the situation regarding Jewish Israelis and Palestinians? How do we enable them to love Israel, while at the same time

being able to criticize it when it is wrong, without calling into question its very existence?

I want to make some suggestions which perhaps could be of help. The first is to acknowledge there are real problems that exist in Israel, just as there are in the United States. However, we don't call for the destruction of America (or any other country for that matter) when we feel it has acted unjustly. We fight to correct those problems, whether in the U.S. or Israel, working with like-minded people to do just that. A second suggestion is to open them up to the many organizations in Israel that serve like-minded causes, whether it be environmental issues, social problems or LGBTQ rights. They may well see a very different side of Israel than they think they already know.

There is one last suggestion I would make. I think, just as we emphasize speaking to survivors of the Holocaust while they are still here to tell their story, listening to people who remember what it's like to live in a world with and without a Jewish State is very important. I think that all of us should take advantage of hearing from such people, especially in private conversations. What was it like at the first *Yom Ha'atzmaut*, May 14, 1948? What did they do to celebrate? How did having a Jewish state change their self-image as a Jew? How might their life have been different had there been a Jewish state before 1948?

These issues about Israel that are raised by young (and some not so young) people today deserve to be taken seriously. When we do so, I have no doubt that we will continue to instill both a love for Israel and a respect for Jewish values in the vast majority of them. That would be a wonderful reason to celebrate.

CANTORIAL NOTES Hazzan Jeffrey Shiovitz



Between *Pesach* and *Shavuot* we count every day. Known as the period of the *Omer* because of a special offering of the grain harvest which was brought to the ancient Temple, it is one of the ways in which we connect the extraordinary events of *Pesach* and *Shavuot*. As we count down the 49 days, seven complete weeks, we are to feel the intensification of the meaning of the FREEDOM (from Egyptian slavery) to the fulfillment of our LIBERATION in the receiving of the Commandments whose revelation we recognize at *Shavuot*. After all, we did not simply escape from slavery, we became a people marked by the distinctive morality of the Torah. Each day is another step farther from "slavery," another step closer to the beauty of the Torah.

To me, the custom of counting each day of this period is a lovely one. While the words of the *b'racha* conform to the predictable formula of ".....asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav...." and therefore are not complicated, I think that the mood of this mitzvah requires a particular attentiveness. The prayer is placed between the personal recitation of the Amidah and the communal Aleinu. Traditionally, one was required to faithfully keep the count himself/

herself in order to be responsible for reciting the count for the community—such a big deal for such a small b'racha. I must say that it has become much easier to recite the b'racha and count the Omer today, as there are numerous websites that send a daily reminder via email or text with the day to be counted. As I recite the b'racha for counting the Omer, I like to sing the words in a somewhat elaborate way, suggesting the beauty and the mysticism of this custom of counting. I hope that by adding a special beauty to this small b'racha I can strengthen our common awareness of the coming of Shavuot, and the power of the Torah in fulfilling the promise of freedom.

My Latin teacher, Mrs. Abramson, urged us daily to open our eyes to see, not merely look; listen, not just hear; and take in the scents around you, not just smell. She was truly a passionate teacher who influenced me in so many ways. While she reminded us daily to pay attention to the world around us, she taught us that self-awareness was the first step in looking outward.

As we enter the month of May, a month associated with the goddess Maia, who oversaw the growth of plants, we also enter the Hebrew month of *lyar*, known as a month of blossoming, but also as the month of healing. This refers to 400 years of suffering in Egypt, followed by our freedom: now is the time to heal. Self-awareness and self-healing are critical to helping others.

If I am not for myself, who will be for me...

And if not now, when? -- Hillel

I'm not suggesting we ignore the injustices in the world—and they are many. I'm saying how very important it is to heal oneself first in order to connect to our greater wholeness, *shleimut*. As Jews we embrace self-care, healing and wholeness. Each *Shabbat* we read the prayer *Yedid Nefesh*:

Please G-d, please heal my soul, please, by showing in the pleasantness of Your radiant light so that it will be strengthened and healed and will have eternal joy.

Sometimes to be whole means to become something new; sometimes to be whole is to release issues of the past. Healing is about refocusing how you live. To be self-aware is the ability to recognize one's strengths and challenges.

You are probably questioning why I chose to write this column. To bring it back to the teachings of Mrs. Abramson, self-awareness is the first step in looking outward. As we count the *Omer* each day, a time of spiritualism and for practicing the discipline of mindfulness, we can open our hearts to ourselves and to others. The counting of the 49 days between the second day of *Pesach* and *Shavuot* emphasizes the importance of each day, a time to reflect on who we are, how we are experienced by others and how we can become whole.

This year, we had the unique opportunity because of the way our spring break fell to celebrate Passover together in school before the holiday actually began and then again during the intermediate days of the holiday. Because we could celebrate together before the holiday, it was a bit easier to have food in school before the Passover cleaning of the kitchen occurred. In this sense, we were able to celebrate the spirit of the holiday without the complications of finding all kosher for Passover products. We sang our Passover songs, told the Passover story, and said the prayers. The children then sat down at tables to enjoy a Passover themed feast. They tasted hard boiled egg, parsley, and matzah—along with many fun dips, spreads and toppings to enjoy with their matzah. They ate for quite a while, together, as a whole school community. Throughout my time here as the school director, this day felt the most festive of all. The spirit of Passover is about celebrating freedom, coming together with family and friends, and welcoming in neighbors and "strangers." Even though it was not yet Passover, the feeling of the holiday could be felt throughout the room.

The other beautiful thing about this day was that for the first time since the pandemic, we asked parents to come in and help prepare the meal for the children. Helping in the CSI kitchen has been a memorable part of many families' nursery school years here. It has felt emptier and quieter in our hallways without their helping hands. It reminded me, also, that during my first years living in Westchester and as a parent at the nursery school, helping out at school functions was how I found my community here. To see many familiar faces and new parents in the kitchen brought back wonderful memories for those of us who have been here for the past few years. I look forward to many more opportunities for our families to continue to connect and form friendships here.

There is a short prayer that one says when one has completed studying a tractate of Talmud. (Some tractates might take only a few weeks to study, others might take years, depending on how long the tractate is and how long one lingers and debates and contemplates each passage.) When Rabbi Kane's Talmud class finishes studying Berakhot, we will say in Aramaic, "Hadran alakh Masekhet Berakhot, ve'hadrakh alan da'atan alakh Masekhet Berakhot veda'alekh alan lo nitnishi minekh Masekhet Berakhot velo titnashi minan lo be-alma ha-din ve-lo be-alma deati," which means, "We will return to you, Tractate Berakhot, and you will return to us; our mind is on you, Tractate Berakhot, and your mind is on us. We will not forget you, Tractate Berakhot, and you will not forget us - not in this life and not in the world to come."

And so it is with Jewish education. Even though the school year is ending, the learning and the relationships and the pride in accomplishment will not be over. The lessons will continue to resonate with our students. For those who will be returning next year, we will build on what you've learned this year, but even for those whose Hebrew school days are over, the friendships need not end, the pride in being able to daven in Hebrew, the relationships made between students and teachers and among students, the warmth of Jewish culture will echo in our students' lives always.

We still have so much learning to do, even before we end this school year. Our students have been learning, on an age-appropriate level, about the Holocaust (grades 3 through 7 recited mourners' kaddish together for those who perished) and about the modern State of Israel as we commemorate Yom HaZikaron and then Yom Ha'Atzmaut (Israeli Memorial Day and Israel Independence Day). From the dark days of Achashverosh's decree against the Jews to

Pharoah's slavery to the Holocaust, we have survived as a people because our children have carried Judaism forward. By providing a Jewish education for your children, you have become an invaluable link in the chain of Jewish continuity.

Our children will end the year with a class service in which the gimel (third grade) students will receive siddurim of their own with covers personalized by their parents, and an end-of-year event on the farm (weather permitting) in which we celebrate our (mostly in-person!) year together and congratulate our 7th graders and 12th graders. We hope to see our 7th graders back next year as Hebrew High school students, and we look forward to our 12th graders coming back to visit our congregation next year with stories of college and Hillel experiences or real-world living.

My family's Haggadah says, in discussing the children looking for the hidden afikomen, that our future is assured as long as our children continue to remember and search. I hope there is much that your children will remember from this year, and I hope they continue to ask questions and search for answers in the coming months and years. Thank you for welcoming me so warmly this year and for allowing me to get to know and to teach your children. I hope to see many of you in the coming months at other CSI events and services.



For your sake I created them all. See to it that you do not spoil and destroy My world; for if you do, there will be no one else to repair it."

(Midrash Kohelet Rabbah, 1 on Ecclesiastes 7:13)

Making our *Kiddush* more sustainable and encouraging us towards creating zero waste is a *mitzvah* that we can all participate in.




