

FROM THE RABBI Steven C. Kane



In the early part of the 20th century, Germany was considered to be the most cultured and advanced society in Europe. Great authors, poets and musicians were all a part of German culture. Most of the Jewish population of about 500,000 people were "modern Jews". Germany had been the birthplace of Reform, Conservative and Modern Orthodox Judaism, all responses to the attempted integration of Judaism and modernity in the most modern of European countries. Great Jewish thinkers and writers such as the historian Heinrich Graetz, the philosopher Franz Rosenzweig and the scholar Zechariah Frankel, (the founder of what was to become Conservative Judaism), were all German Jews. The Jewish community seemed to be fully integrated into German society.

Many Jews were soldiers in the German army and had fought in WWI. Following the loss of that war, economic disaster affected much of Germany, especially the hyperinflation of the 1920's due to the debt the war had caused. Thus in 1919 the exchange rate was 48 German marks to the dollar. It had risen to 330 marks a few tears later, and 7400 by the end of 1922. In early 1933 Adolf Hitler had become Chancellor of Germany and, blaming the Jews for both the loss of the war and the economic issues that ensued, he began to enact a series of anti-Jewish laws. Many Jews tried to leave Germany, though few countries would accept them. Polish Jews living in Germany were expelled, though Poland refused to accept many of them. Families remained at the German-Polish border, homeless and stateless. One such family, the Grynszpans, wrote to their 17 year old son Hershel who was living in Paris about the awful conditions they now found themselves. Hershel received the postcard in early November and despondent about his family, purchased a gun. Taking the gun to the German embassy he proceeded to assassinate Ernst vom Rath, a German embassy official (ironically vom Rath was opposed to the Nazis due to their treatment of the Jews).

Vom Rath died of his wounds on November 9, 1938. The assassination proved to be an excuse for Hitler to unleash German paramilitary forces against the Jewish community as German police and fire officials looked on and did nothing. During those two days about 7500 Jewish businesses and stores were attacked and many destroyed. 1400 synagogues were ransacked and broken into, with *sifrei* Torah, *siddurim* and other books burned and desecrated. Some 30,000 Jewish men were arrested and deported to concentration camps in Germany. Those days of destruction became known as *Kristallnacht*, the night of broken glass. It is now widely seen as the beginning of the Holocaust.

Most years our remembrance of the Holocaust is centered around *Yom HaShoah*, Holocaust Memorial Day in the spring. Since this year is the 80th anniversary of *Kritallnacht*, we will have a special memorial tribute to *Kristallnacht* on *Shabbat* morning, November 10th. One of our long time members, Werner Renberg, saw his father arrested that night, and 80 years later it is still fresh in his mind. We will honor Werner, who turned 90 this year, with a special *aliyah Shabbat* morning. Perhaps there is no better way to show the world 80 years later that Hitler failed, and to recall the "night of broken glass", than to celebrate Jewish life as we will do that day. I hope you can join us.

Becoming a grandparent has been one of the greatest moments in my life. As Robyn and I see Miriam Abigail grow day by day, week by week and month by month(5 months now), we marvel about life. We think about tradition and what is it that we should pass down to her and to our future grandchildren. Each Friday evening we have blessed our children and now we see Rachel and Yonah bless Miriam. It is one of our favorite times and traditions and I know that our children look forward to it.

Please don't read this article if you're standing up. There are so many things for which all of us rush around—we all try to do several tasks simultaneously—where does it end? If you have no time now, maybe you'll save reading this until Shabbat. In a world that pushes us unmercifully to move faster and faster, we need an extra guide to tell us, slow down, it's all right, save that project for later, just sit and talk with me.

When the opening chapter of the Torah describes God creating the world, six days are for building, and one is for rest. Read the text. God is not tired; God is not described as burned out. Rather, a part of the whole of the creative process is not creating. Part of the rhythm with which we function in our lives is to stop on a regular basis to consider from where we have come, and to where we are going. God stopped the work, as we are told later in the Torah, Shavat-rested, and *vayinafash*-recreated God's soul. This is God's basic tip for how to observe Shabbat. It's not so complicated. Let me share some other simple tips to make Shabbes special.

It's as easy as saying Yes ands No.

Say No to shopping. Say Yes to reading. Say No to laundry. Say Yes to intimacy. Say No to the quick stop at the ATM or mini-mart on the way home from shul. Say Yes to a family game of Banana gram or Scrabble or some other game everyone enjoys. Say No to housework. Say Yes to having friends for Shabbat Dinner. Say No to mowing the lawn. Say Yes to enjoying a walk. Say No to a follow-up call to a client. Say Yes to calling your mother.

We are taught in the midrash that when God created the world, it happened by God withdrawing into Godself to make space for the world to be. Likewise, by withdrawing from being so much out there, we can create space and time for new opportunities in our own universe. When we stop the noise of producing, we are finally able to hear the beautiful music of the voices of those whom we love, and the quiet songs of the world at rest. On a peaceful walk through the neighborhood, we can hear our neighbors' voices. In the guiet of an afternoon nap, we can hear the inner voice of our own joy, renewing itself in the space of ceased labors. In the space of a quiet afternoon, we can look with pride on who we are and what we will yet become.

Perhaps you will try one or two of these ideas and discover more of yourself and the beauty of Shabbat. Maybe you will pass some of these traditions down to your children and grandchildren. Try lighting candles or saying *Kiddush* or the *Motzi*. Make your own traditions. Perhaps you will like it! Shabbat Shalom!

We love to share the bounty of CSI's Community Organic Farm! Bette Slutsky recently prepared this gorgeous "Welcome" bag filled with our own farm's produce and fresh eggs from our chickens for a new member.

CSI and UJA/Engage Jewish Service Corp held a workshop on Engaging in Jewish Farming. They met on the farm to do some harvesting with children from the Ossining Children's Center. After harvest, they shared a healthful snack together.

Our crops ending in October include cherry tomatoes, garlic, potatoes, eggplant, peppers, herbs, beets, and squash. Coming up in November we'll have kale, swiss chard, and lettuce. We are also planting the cover crop seed for the winter to help enrich the soil biology. To purchase veggies, please stop by on Sunday mornings, or stop in the office during the week.

FROM THE PRESIDENT Steven Bender





In case you missed it, please enjoy USY President David Katz's Yom Kippur remarks to the congregation.

"I started fasting for Yom Kippur when I was five years old. I remember being in a chaotic room with hungry teachers and overfed toddlers. I definitely stood out. When I told the kids that I was fasting, they would gasp from surprise and tell me that their parents were fasting, but not them. They always sounded impressed with me. Comments like these from my peers boosted my ego: I felt more religiously conservative and more faithful to Judaism than my fellow five-year olds. In some ways, I obnoxiously identified more with the adults in the room than the kids. Today, looking back, I'd say my incessant need to follow the written complexities of Jewish Law derived not from a place of internal commitment, but rather of external pressure and a desire to impress. I wasn't fasting as an act of repentance, but because the grownups I loved and respected were, and I quite simply wanted to be like them. Even more than that, I was afraid of ever being slandered with the term "Bad Jew" by my peers. Bad Jew. It's a term we have all heard at some point, and maybe have even identified with. As I've matured and really come into my own ownership of my Jewish identity, I really do cringe when people mar themselves with these two words.

A less mature version of myself believed that a "Bad Jew" is a Jew who doesn't attend Hebrew School or services, gives little regard to Shabbat, doesn't fast on Yom Kippur, and cuts corners on rituals and everyday practices. Today, I don't think that makes someone bad—I think it is someone saying they are unsure if there is a seat in the community for them, and could use a little empathy. I don't think of myself as being Jew - ish . I'm a Jew, just like all of you here today. We cannot be bad or good at this; it is the core of who we are. I don't think this is an unique perspective, either. I've come to realize that many Jews, myself included, see Judaism as not only a religion, but as an identity. The quibble between "Jew" versus "Jewish" symbolizes this - saying one is a Jew implies their self-identification whereas saying one is Jewish implies they believe they belong to something else. We do belong to a greater community, but Judaism also belongs to us. We take this identity to our very core, and it's the foundation of any community we could ever build.

Our interaction with each other defines our Judaism. On Yom Kippur, the holiest day of the year, what brings me to fast and attend services? It is my personal reflection, my desire to be a better in the upcoming year, and a better member of our CSI community and global Jewish community. I can walk into any synagogue and know the same prayers as people whom I've never met before. That's amazing. We have a mutuality

millions of people worldwide and are responsible for being better Jews for the goodness of everyone. Now as I stand before you as a representative of my generation of Jews, I can optimistically say that our community involvement will continue to burn bright. In my current position as USY President, I have the privilege of experiencing and catalyzing these synapses that have kept us strong. Our chapter bubbles with teenagers the next generation of Jews - who are beyond eager to reach out to other Jews.

My neighbor and I are both USY Presidents in our region. My five-year old self would have chortled at the prospect of teenagers gathering voluntarily simply because of their shared Judaism, but I see the beauty it has created, the beauty that just engaging with each other as self-identifying Jews, as I stand up here. We are all fiercely individual members of the same tapestry, only sewn because we grew up under the same teachings and prayers. There's something quite magnificent about that."
