FROM THE RABBI Steven C. Kane



Did you ever wonder why, if *Rosh HaShanah* is the beginning of the new year, we don't begin the new cycle of Torah readings for another three weeks? As a matter of fact, the end of the previous Torah cycle is not even imminent! When *Rosh HaShanah* begins, we will still have three more *parshiot* (Torah portions) to read. How can we begin the year and not begin the Torah?

The answer lies in the nature of all the fall holidays we have coming up this month. When we refer to this as "the holiday season" it is not just because we have so many holidays (Rosh HaShanah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot and Shemini Atzeret/Simchat Torah). It is also because the holidays are not separate events, but are each related to the others. Jewish law is called halacha in Hebrew, deriving from the word holech, which means "to walk". Halachah thus means "the pathway", and that is exactly what we will be traveling down with all of these holidays.

Since all beginnings are also endings, the holidays are not just the beginning of the new year, they are also a (very long) ending to the old year. They are a reflection of the joke that says: "while some people leave but don't say goodbye, the Jews are a people that say goodbye but don't leave!" That is certainly true of these holidays. We say goodbye to the old year on *Rosh HaShanah*, but we don't really conclude that goodbye until *Simchat Torah* three weeks later. How exactly does this "pathway" work?

Rosh HaShanah is a completely joyous day, but one that warns us that we need to spend the next 10 days doing some serious thinking about our lives. We rejoice that we have completed the past year, and celebrate the fact that we once again, in the words of the sheheyanu prayer, thank God for having been "kept in life, been sustained and are here for this moment of celebration". Yet in the midst of that celebration we take a considerable amount of time to reflect on the priorities in our lives and relationships, in particular contemplating and then taking steps to ask forgiveness for our sins and from those we have wronged. Part of the greatness of Judaism is the recognition that going through this process once a year is extremely important.

That though is only the beginning of this path we are to walk down. Like most important decisions, repentance and reflection cannot be accomplished in just one moment or day. Fully ten days after the beginning of Rosh HaShanah we come to Yom Kippur, easily the hardest day of the year on the Jewish calendar. Yet there is a sense of joy and celebration with Yom Kippur

too, because we are grateful to have the opportunity to be forgiven. The sound of the *shofar* at the end of the concluding N'eila service is perhaps the most joyous sound of the year. Yom Kippur is not however the end. It leads five days later to Sukkot, our holiday of joy. The rabbis connected *Sukkot* to *Yom Kippur* in several ways. First, they said that although the idea of personal judgement is complete on Yom Kippur, the judgement of the world for rain continues (metaphorically) on through the end of Sukkot, called Hoshanah Rabbah. Second, they taught that immediately after Yom Kippur one goes out and begins the building of their sukkah. Finally they saw the holding of the *lulav* to be similar to a person returning from battle, holding a scepter high in the air to signify victory. In this case our "war" has been with our mistaken values and mistreatment of others. We have been victorious in overcoming these personal obstacles.

The last holiday in the cycle is Shimini Atzeret/Simchat Torah. It comes at the very end of Sukkot. After celebrating and enjoying *Sukkot* for 8 days we are finally ready to begin the new year. Only then, after this long "saying goodbye and not leaving", is it time for the holidays to finish. We have indeed been walking down a pathway that began with the sounding of the shofar and concludes with reading the last parasha. Now we are ready to begin immediately with the reading of the first parasha of the Torah, "In the beginning", Bereshit. Our path has included gratitude for the new year, contemplation of our values, forgiveness of our sins, celebration of our "victory" and finally beginning the Torah once again. The holidays are now over and the hard work of life, the journey down the rest of this year's path, finally begins.

Judy, Arielle, Tamar, Elan join me in wishing all of you a *kitivah v'chatima tovah*, a year of health, happiness, and the joy of celebrating our "holiday season."

CANTORIAL NOTES Hazzan Jeffrey Shiovitz



It's funny how we often refer to the High Holy Days as early or late. I just had this discussion with my daughter the other day. Aren't they always on time? I mean, Rosh Hashanah always falls on the first day of the Hebrew month of *Tishrei*, the 10th day of *Tishrei* is always *Yom Kippur*, and the 15th day of *Tishrei* is always Sukkot. So, then how can the Jewish holidays be anything but right on time? Maybe, we are not ready by early September, or maybe we are too eager to wait until October? In Israel, it is not a problem. In Israel, time is marked by the Jewish calendar. In Israel, school vacations and government closings coincide with the Jewish festivals. The malls and shops are in sync, arranging displays to coincide with Jewish holiday themes. Time marches to the beat of the Jewish calendar. But let's be honest. It is a different story for us. The days of *Tishre*i tick by and the sequence of the fall festivals fold away, and all the while we struggle with the integration of the two calendars, striving to carve out the right time for celebrating Jewish life. That said, let's all agree this year to embrace the Jewish moments, and even agree this year that the High Holidays are right on time!

Now that we agree, here is one practical approach to synchronizing the secular and sacred, realizing that there is Judaism for every moment. Music and the festival melodies are linked to time in both obvious and subliminal levels. The Kol Nidrei is so profoundly linked to Jewish community that when Beethoven first heard it, he identified it with the Jewish community. When we hear the Avinu Malkeinu we can immediately imagine being in a synagogue on Rosh Hashanah surrounded by the community. Or, Ashamnu evokes the possibilities of forgiveness. Music and holiday melodies can help bridge the gap between our daily lives driven by a secular calendar and the Jewish souls striving to engage with Godliness and community both far and near for the moment, as well as the past and future.

This theme of time is highlighted on *Sukkot* with the chanting of Kohelet, in which King Solomon speaks of a time for everything. The Byrds sang these words in our time. There again we find music bridges time, creating lasting connections. Perhaps, you might think of a song for this High Holiday season. Maybe you can make Tishrei the month in which you listen to Jewish music or visit a Jewish music website. Share with each other melodies you are listening to and associating with the High Holy days. The melodies holistically integrate our calendars and bring into focus the reality that the holidays are on time and that we have time for the holidays. That is so, because music, while filled with rhythm and tempo, actually transcends time.

Let the sounds of Judaism build the bridge. Let music connect the near and far, past and present, and September/October and *Tishrei*.

CSI, a community of song, prayer and study, brings this alive and fosters connections. Our professionals and volunteers look forward to our time together this year, making CSI more special. Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur and Sukkot are only the beginning. Please try to make time for each other and CSI.

CSI Community Organic Farm

Regenerative Agriculture Rooted in Jewish Tradition

October 2019: We are well over the 2,000 pound mark of food production this year! Our first year was about a third of that amount.

Some of that produce is donated: CHHOP (Caring for the Hungry and Homeless of Peekskill) sent us a thank you note for our regular donations of organic produce to their food bank, Fred's Pantry. The organization serves up to 125 families and more than 400 individuals each week.

We have also had lots of wonderful summer flower arrangements, a few of which are pictured here. Some of the arrangements ended up on the tables of the restaurants that purchase our produce. A few arrangements decorated the Shabbat morning dessert table.

This summer produced a wide variety of tomatoes and don't forget about our heirloom garlic!

We're looking forward to a fall crop of squash, lettuce, bok choy, and micro greens. Eggplant and peppers are starting to be productive. The tomatoes and various herbs continue to produce for us. Our fall cover crop of pea and oat seed has been ordered and will be planted in the next few weeks.

Unfortunately, we have sad news to report about our grapes. In early September, the grape clusters were full and nearly ripe. But just a week later, when Aaron Stern visited to test the brix % (sugar level) of the fruit, he found the crop was decimated and most of what remained was raisin-like. Initially it was thought birds or bees had gotten to the crop, but on consultation with the vineyard manager at Double A Vineyards we think it was more likely a disease referred to as black rot which we thought we'd eradicated. Next year we will have to consider regularly spraying with a fungicide even if it means the crop will not be fully organic. Such is the life of a farmer. We will try again with the grapes next year.

Congregation Sons of Israel Governance

As we set new goals for the new year, I want you to consider this one: becoming a member of CSI's Board of trustees. The experience is fulfilling, challenging, and rewarding. I invite you to attend one of our monthly meetings on the last Tuesday of every month; check the CSI website for the dates and times of the meetings. A brief description of the various governing bodies of CSI is set forth below. Each of you possess unique talents and experiences that will contribute to CSI's continued thriving. Please consider volunteering.

Board of Trustees. The Rabbi and all past presidents are non-voting, ex officio members of the Board of Trustees. In addition, there are eighteen "at large" voting members of Board of Trustees and eight voting officers. Trustees are elected by the congregation at congregational meetings (typically held in June) to three-year terms and are staggered so that approximately one-third are elected every year. Trustees are limited to two consecutive three-year terms on the Board. Trustees come to monthly meetings, serve on standing committees, volunteer for ad hoc committee work, approve policies and actions of committees, recommend an annual budget and contracts, have a fiduciary responsibility to the synagogue, and perform many other duties to administer and manage the operations of the synagogue.

Executive Committee. CSI has eight officers who make up the Executive Committee and are also voting members of the Board of Trustees. They are elected directly by the congregation at even-year congregational meetings. All officer terms are for two years and there are no term limits. CSI has four "atlarge" vice presidents, though each has been asked to take on specific portfolios such as Fund Raising and Personnel. The Treasurer is responsible for managing the day-to-day finances of the synagogue, chairs the budget committee, and works hard to make sure that the congregation's financial needs are met. The Secretary of the congregation acts as a vice president and also is responsible for meeting minutes, voting, and seeing that certain official communications with the congregation occurs. The president is elected for a two year term and then serves an additional two years as Immediate Past President. The president presides over congregational and Board of Trustee meetings, chairs

the Executive Committee, calls such meetings, signs agreements and contracts on behalf of the congregation as approved by the Board, and serves on all committees except the Nominating Committee as a non-voting *ex officio* member. The IPP is essentially also a voting vice president and serves as an advisor to the president, chairs the Past Presidents committee when called, and serves as the chair of the Nominating Committee.

How are officers and trustees chosen? The Nominating Committee forms each year at the request of the President and is chaired by the Immediate Past President. This begins the process of finding and vetting nominees for Trustees and, in even years, for Officers. The Nominating Committee attempts to find volunteers who are committed to the wellbeing of Congregation Sons of Israel, represent our diverse demographics, and bring needed skills, talents, passions, and differing perspectives to the Board.

Board of Trustee Meetings. All CSI members in good standing may come and observe any Board of Trustee meeting, though if the meeting goes into "executive session" (typically at the end of a meeting) that portion of the meeting is restricted to trustees and invited guests only. If you would like to observe a Board of Trustees meeting, come to a meeting. Meetings start at 7:30pm and generally occur on the 4th Tuesday of the month, though are sometimes moved to accommodate holidays and schedule conflicts, so please consult the CSI calendar.

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
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
