FROM THE RABBI Steven C. Kane



We end the fall holiday season with Sukkot. The delight of going from the difficult nature of Yom Kippur to the joy of Sukkot is palpable. The rabbis regarded the *lulav*, with its long body, like a scepter that a warrior would hold returning from a successful battle. Indeed there is a wonderful feeling as one first grips the *lulav* and *etrog*, not just to fulfill the *mitzvah* of shaking them together, but simply the unusual idea that every year we take four different species of vegetation and include them in our holiday celebration. What a unique and fascinating custom!

There are two classic *midrashim* that I think of each year as I first take hold of the four species. The first relates each of them as a different part of the body. The arvei nachal (willow) are likened to lips, which their leaves resemble. The hadas (myrtle) has leaves that look like eyes. The lulav (palm branch) is likened to the spine, and the *etrog* as the heart. Each of these represents parts of the body for which we asked for forgiveness when we sinned with them during the past year. Now we use them for fulfilling a mitzvah! It's a lesson that reminds us that we both sin and sanctify the world with the same parts of our self. There is no part of us that is intrinsically holy or profane. What matters is how we use them.

The second *midrash* sees each species as representing different types of Jews. The *etrog* has a pleasant taste and beautiful scent and represents those who have both knowledge of Torah (taste) and do good deeds (smell). The *lulav* has a fruit (dates) that has taste, but no smell, representing those with Torah knowledge but short on good deeds. The *hadas* has a nice smell but no fruit to taste, likened to one who has many good deeds but little Torah knowledge.

Finally the *arvei nachal* have neither fruit nor a beautiful scent, and are seen as those who have neither Torah learning nor good deeds. However the *mitzvah* of taking the four species and shaking them in all directions can only be performed with all four held together. If one of them is missing then it is unusable.

This teaches us a profound lesson, especially today when all of society, including the Jewish community, seems split into different and often oppositional groups. It suggests that a community that only includes those who have "Torah study and good deeds," is not whole. Society not only has the possibility of being diverse, one which is not diverse is not complete. It must equally contain those both with and without Torah learning and good deeds.

In the end, learning from these two *midrashim* about the *lulav* and *etrog* increases our joy of *Sukkot*. They remind us that how we do what we do matters and that our *Sukkah*, and by extension our community, should be large enough to encompass many different types of people. It makes the transition from *Yom Kippur* to *Sukkot* all the more sweet.

Wishing everyone a Chag Sukkot Sameach!

I love the rhythm of the Jewish calendar. It gets to be demanding— Rosh Hashanah followed by Yom Kippur followed by Sukkot and the concluding days of friend's. Join us for lunch in the sukkah, come carry a Sh'mini Atzeret and Simchat Torah—but the fun is there. Did you forget? Did you forget the pleasure of a fall afternoon, stringing popcorn or cranberries or tacking up your Rosh Hashanah cards in the sukkah? (Did you forget the frustration of watching your sukkah blow down in the wind and trying to figure out how to restore it while it was raining? While we were living on the Jersey Shore many years ago this did happen to Robyn and me during a hurricane!) Did you forget the noise and chaos of Simchat Torah? Did you forget when the parts of your sukkah were finally put away, you felt a little less "fall" and a little more "winter"?

The rhythm of the Jewish calendar calls to us, telling us to let our emotions be guided by all these holidays. Sure, there are more days in shul, more meals with family and friends, more changed meetings, and work schedules to accommodate the schedule. But it's good to be told to experience all these occasions of renewal, looking back, looking forward, smelling the air, tasting the honey and wine.

Take care in the days ahead not to feel that the holiday is over. Be sure to visit CSI's sukkah or a Torah on Simchat Torah. The intellectual mood of the New Year is now behind us and we're concluding the holidays by feeling with our hands—the shape and smell of the *lulav* and *etrog*, the *Yahrzeit* candle we light on Sh'mini Atzeret, the Torah, velvety and elegant in our arms on Simchat Torah.

If the holidays are demanding, more so are the days after. When it is no longer a holiday, what will we celebrate? How will we come together? May the energy and celebration of these delightful holidays warm us throughout the winter.

FROM THE PRESIDENT Mark J. Rosenberg



A few Sundays ago, I attended the Back to School BBQ at CSI. It was wonderful. Despite the rain outside, 150 CSI members, Nursery School families and prospective members of all generations were inside CSI having a great time, interacting with each other and eating tasty hot dogs and hamburgers.

Under the dedicated leadership of Men's Club President Charles Zweibach, who conceptualized and spearheaded the event, a team of volunteers and staff came together to plan and execute an occasion that could be enjoyed by all. These volunteers purchased, cooked and served the food, booked the entertainment (a magician who thrilled the kids) and staffed the activity tables and the bouncy castle. My heartfelt thanks goes out to Charles and all of the volunteers who helped to make the BBQ an overwhelming success. (Pictures on page 8).

As I stood at the back of the social hall and observed the goings on, I thought to myself, this is a community. People of all ages, who shared a connection with CSI, came together to put on the BBQ and to enjoy the festivities and, most importantly, each other. Seniors were staffing the bouncy castle and joyfully speaking with the preschoolers. Long-time members and Nursery School parents were sharing tables during lunch while other members were selling produce from the Organic Farm and assisting the children with arts and crafts.

To me, this is what a synagogue represents. It is a community. A community that not only worships together, but comes together for joyous occasions and supports each other in times of sorrow and need. A community that shares interests and creates outlets where those interests can be engaged, whether it is the study of Talmud, the love of Jewish music, drinking beer and discussing Torah, watching the Israeli national team play baseball or playing mahjong.

I find this sense of community particularly on display during *Shabbat* services when there is a baby naming or *aufruf*, joyous occasions that are celebrated by both family members and CSI

members, many of whom do not even know the families who are celebrating these life cycle events.

Over the past years, the sense of community at CSI seems to have weakened. This was exacerbated by COVID. I want to change that and reinvigorate the CSI community.

I am pleased to report that there is a team of CSI members who formed a committee to plan events that are attractive to Nursery School families. There is another team working on creating *chavurahs*, small groups of members who share similar interests who meet in each other's homes or other venues on a regular basis to socialize, learn, engage in cultural activities or do *tikkun olam*. Others are creating activities for families with children in elementary school and above. Personally, I would like to see more inter-generational activities, like the recent Welcome Back BBQ.

In another effort to strengthen community ties, we are expanding the *Mazal Tov* section of the Bulletin. This section, in addition to joyous life cycle events, will now include other happy occasions celebrated by members and their families, such as a graduation, a job promotion and other awards and achievements. During the High Holidays, as we focus on personal and spiritual renewal, we should also spend some time thinking about how we can renew and strengthen the sense of community at CSI. If you have any ideas or suggestions, please send them to me.

Tomato & Watermelon Salad

Ingredients:

- 4 to 6 large tomatoes, ideally heirloom varieties, cut into 1½-inch cubes
- 1 small seedless watermelon, cut into 11/4-inch cubes
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil
- 2 tablespoons sherry vinegar

kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste

FROM THE NURSERY SCHOOL DIRECTOR Naomi Elyachar



Over the course of the school year, classrooms learn about Jewish holidays and the values associated with them along with many other thematic topics that strike the students' and teachers' interests. While the topics exploration change as the weeks carry on, I like to choose and continue with one overarching theme for the entire school year. This shows that this one idea is very important, as it does not change from one week to the next, and we can continue to think about it in new ways throughout the year. Our theme this year is "hakarat hatov", which translates "recognizing the good".

As we go about our lives, we always have the choice to either notice the blessings in our lives or to take them for granted. Helping our students learn to appreciate the many wonderful things in our lives is a way to set them on a lifelong path of gratitude, mindfulness, and resilience. We talk about this theme when we gather on Shabbat, and throughout the week, the teachers support the understanding of hakarat hatov by naturally bring up the topic with their students. Teaching about hakarat

hatov as not only an important lesson, but a Jewish value, brings additional meaning to our students. Whether it is looking around and appreciating nature, sharing with a friend, or enjoying special treats on a birthday, learning that appreciating the nice things in our life is not only fun, but also a Jewish value, helps our students develop their Jewish identity while at the same time showing that even though we may be different from one another, many of our values are the same.

One way I am recognizing the good is by feeling very grateful to have begun this school year in a way that feels much more like it would have three years ago than it did last year or two years ago. There is more joy and ease and less worry and anxiety. I look forward to continuing to explore hakarat hatov with the nursery school students throughout the school year!





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
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
