FROM THE RABBI Dina S. Rosenberg



There's a story about a man who was lowered down a deep shaft, lower and lower, until the darkness was so dark he could touch it with his fingers, the damp cold so damp and cold it seeped through his bones and made them shiver.

Finally, without warning, he hit the hard rock bottom.

When they pulled him back up, they asked, "So what did you find down there?"

"It was cold," he answered.

"What else?"

"It was dark," he answered.

"What else?"

"What else do you want?" he answered. "I hit rock bottom and it was cold, dark and full of dirt!"

"We know it's full of dirt!" they retorted. "It's a mine! Now, where are the diamonds?" He responded, "I was so focused on hitting rock bottom that I forgot to try and find the diamonds."

We are living in a world that is fractured, fragmented and very messy and sometimes all we can see is dirt. And there's no shortage of dirt in this world. God designed this broken world with the belief that through acts of tikun olam, repairing the world, humans will take all of the scattered pieces together and create a better, more harmonious, self-sustaining world. Effectively, God made us God's partners in the creation of heaven and earth.

Now that changes everything.

It means that as we enter into Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur, whatever business you've gotten yourself into, whatever chunk of this world has fallen into your lap, whatever sort of a person you are—it's all with purpose. You are being led to the places to repair your soul and the world.

It means we are not passive victims of a cruel, cold universe, but partners of its Creator, who breathes God's power into us so that we may comb through the very fabric of which this cosmos is composed, coaxing out its warm, inner life.

It means that this world is not some dark, ugly place from which to escape. It is a good world; so good that as great a mess as it's become, it's still worth investing everything we've got to fix it.

Often, the most brilliant, precious stones are to be found in the darkest, deepest places - then the dirt becomes almost irrelevant. All you see are diamonds.

The first place to look for those diamonds is in your own home. Then in your community. Once you can find them there, you'll see diamonds everywhere.

"G-d saw all that God had made, and behold it was very good (*Genesis 1:31*)." Let us be partners with God so that we too can look at our world and say, "behold, it is very good."

CANTORIAL NOTES Hazzan Jeffrey Shiovitz



As I begin my 43rd year as a Cantor, my 36th year here at CSI and this year's High Holiday season, I look back with great fondness. We have a relatively new *Mahzor* and it gives me more opportunity to study our traditions and liturgy. I have a special place in my heart for the *Kol Nidrei* prayer. Its melody and sacredness stir great feelings. I wanted to share one of my favorite articles from years past on the *Kol Nidrei*. Our *Mahzor* provides us with much to think about. However, *Kol Nidrei* continues to make me reflect on my childhood and adulthood. I hope you will be drawn back to a different era, as I am every year at this time.

The melody of *Kol Nidrei* became, over the ages, the best known and most moving of all the melodies of the Ashkenazic synagogue. Somehow it has the power to reach and to move even the most disinterested peripheral Jew. If one needed additional testimony that the words alone, no matter how elegant, are not enough for a Jew of prayer, they need only to step into a synagogue on Kol Nidrei eve, the holiest night of the year. Empty and deserted much of the rest of the year, it is now packed to overflowing. Impending judgment hangs suspended, mistlike in the air. All wait for Kol Nidrei. And then the Holy Ark is opened, all the Scrolls of the Torah are brought forth and the *Hazzan* begins to chant Kol Nidrei.

The notes shine like stars. In them you hear the heartbreak and the misery of the Jewish people: the pain and anguish of the bitter centuries. Your soul quickens and you sway in response as if pulled by some unseen string. For an instant the man in front of you is your grandfather, your zeide, wrapped in his white kittle, prayer book moist with his tears. He, too, is swaying – he to your tempo and you to his. You blink and it is over. You are back in the present. Unconsciously you touch the pages of your own prayer book and they, too, are moist. With whose tears? You glance at the words of the Kol Nidrei, enigmas in their Aramaic. So you look to the facing page, to the translation, and you are shocked. There is no poetry, no prayer, no majesty – merely a dry-as-dust ancient formula; a blanket, legalistic release from unfulfilled promises.

And then you understand the power of a song!

FROM THE PRESIDENT Mark J. Rosenberg



Each year on the High Holidays, we reflect on the past year and contemplate the future. This year, our community should also take time to consider CSI's past, present and future.

Over the last few months, we completed and celebrated one chapter of CSI's long history and began another. We welcomed Rabbi Rosenberg to our community and the pulpit. This new chapter, like all chapters in a book, moves the story forward while maintaining a connection to what came before. As authors of CSI's story, I encourage all members of our community to meet personally with Rabbi Rosenberg, share your connection and hear her thoughts.

With a renewed sense of energy, CSI is moving forward. New ideas and ways of doing things are being introduced, while at the same time, we continue the traditions that draw our community together and make it strong.

With the input of our members, changes are being made to the structure of services, including their length (shorter), some of the prayers we chant and the tunes we use, all with the goal of making services more welcoming to the entire CSI community.

A new focus on families has been instituted with immediate results. Over the summer, several families joined CSI and far more children enrolled in our Religious School than originally expected. As part of this focus, our family service on Yom Kippur will, for the first time, feature goats as a

way of teaching our families with young children about the rituals of the goats of Azazel from the Temple period. As the children whisper in the goat's ears their challenges from the past year, we look forward to hearing their giggles and new forms of connection to Yom Kippur.

At the same time, CSI remains committed to empty-nester and senior members. New adult learning classes will be introduced while many of the most popular classes and activities (Torah on Tap among others) will continue. In addition, we will introduce activities for adults and all generations that focus on Jewish spirituality that take place outside of the sanctuary, such as in nature and inside the home.

Over the past year, I believe that our community has come together with a renewed sense of purpose and determination, built on a foundation of kindness and respect, to strengthen our shul and our community. I am excited for what the New Year and this next chapter for CSI holds.

Wishing the entire CSI community and its extended family a happy and healthy 5784.



SECOND GENERATION SURVIVORS AT CSI



Ossining woman publishes 'Second Generation Holocaust Survivor Cookbook'

When longtime Congregation Sons of Israel (CSI) member Cheryl Katz retired, she quickly saw another avenue where her previous social worker group leadership skills were needed.

Ms. Katz noted that more than 20 second generation children of Holocaust survivors were CSI members. So, the Ossining resident volunteered to start a support group at CSI called "CSI Second Generation and Beyond."

"With the support of the Holocaust & Human Rights Education Center behind me, I volunteered to start a local group similar to one being run by Halina Rosenkranz at Westchester Jewish Family Services in White Plains," said Ms. Katz.

"I think it is important now that

"I think it is important now that most of the survivors are gone, to focus on the next generation. The children of survivors who have heard the stories of their parents and families (and) need to pass their stories and experiences on without breaking the chain as witnesses to the witnesses of the Holocaust," she continued.

For many years, Ms. Katz belonged to the "Second Generation Survivors Group" at Westchester Jewish Family Services, which had been started as group therapy for those whose parents had experienced psychological trauma and had passed it on to their children. She found that CSI members were not immune.

Ms. Katz explained, "Most members of the CSI group had not initially sought out help as they seemed to have adjusted well to their lives in America. However, they did welcome an arena to talk about shared issues and concerns. For some it was the first time they talked about their family experiences because there was such a warm understanding and supportive group. It took me six years to wrangle out some stories and to finally bring a book to fruition, in the form of a cookbook, which seems strange and is ironic because most of the survivors had little to eat and were starving during World War II."

When Fred Schulman, another longtime CSI member and a member of "CSI Second Generation and Beyond" brought a cookbook ("Holocaust Survivors Cookbook") containing stories and recipes from survivors around the world to show fellow members, it was agreed that the group should create a small, similar book with stories and Jewish recipes from within the Briarcliff Manor congregation. "It was then, I guess, I started gathering the stories as members talked to the group about their families." commented Ms. Katz.

During COVID, she formalized interviewing members and getting written summaries of their stories. "The timing was also in congruence with the widening of the definition of 'survivor,'" Ms.

"Several years ago my father would not have considered himself a 'survivor.' His family fled before the Warsaw Ghetto was totally closed and ended up in Siberia. 'Survivor' was a term reserved for those with tattooed numbers who were in

concentration camps where murders were taking place in gas chambers like Auschwitz. These were mostly young adults capable of working while the elderly and women with children were separated out and were being gassed. These 'survivors' were given little food and hard labor in the expectation by Hitler that they would die of starvation and sickness, eventually and be replaced by others."

"Then the term was expanded to include those who were in other labor camps, such as ammunition factories, and to those who were in the ghettos or escaped into the woods or fought with the partisans or were in hiding or ended up in such places as Siberia or Shanghai or who had been wealthy, or not so, in Germany and other areas under Nazi control, who in the early years of the Nazis fled their homes and left behind their businesses and professions," Ms. Katz explained. "The Holocaust, with six million Jews murdered, was so vast and mind-boggling that I felt that local individual families' experiences, (and) some families known to us, would make it more understandable how Hitler used politics and one government to plan and carry out the attempt of a 'Final Solution,' the genocide of the Jewish people."

of the Jewish people."

Her self-published book is designed to include stories of the featured CSI members along with photos and recipes of Jewish foods, meant to emphasize that Jewish culture did not get totally destroyed and that survivors' children live on—and Hitler did not win!"

According to Ms. Katz, the future plans of the group include being available to talk and educate the community about the importance of being an "up-stander" and doing the right thing, to fight anti-semitism and make sure that something like the Holocaust and genocide never happens again to any group of people.

CSI RESETTLEMENT COMMITTEE UPDATE

Our two refugee families have made wonderful progress this spring and summer. Both families are now financially independent. It was not easy, both families came without jobs, limited English skills, no connections or network, and no obvious path to financial independence. CSI provided a huge initial lift financially and now, in a relatively short time, they have become self-supporting and have blossomed.

A lot of their success is due to the hard work, dedication, and generosity of our congregation and committee members. We've also had significant help from our community. This generosity has included a landlord who reduced the rent, free nursery school from CSI for both families, a music school that donated a guitar and lessons, donated cars, grants from WJCI and Open Arms, employers who took a chance on immigrants with no local references, a scholarship, and the list goes on and on. It has truly taken a village to help these families achieve their dreams.

Ashiqullah has completed his three month probation period as a new employee at White Plains Hospital and is now a member of the local 1199 Union. The family has a car and has become proficient at navigating Westchester. Little Mohammad, an American citizen, celebrated his 1st birthday in April and is now walking, climbing, running, and starting to talk. Abna has been attending full day preschool at Temple Israel Center. Her language is exploding daily. It is so exciting to see all the wonderful changes for this family.

Our volunteers continue their friendship and involvement with the family. Volunteers are still (18 months later) providing hours of ESL tutoring, health care navigation, lease negotiation, social opportunities, and welcoming the family into our community as our new friends.

She's been attending the 2's program at CSI and has made progress separating from mom, making friends, and beginning to enjoy camp. Both adults have NYS driver's licenses. Nikita is learning English with his CSI volunteer tutor through music and song lyrics. While studying John Lennon's Imagine, Nikita mentioned that he'd always wanted to play the electric guitar. Miriam and Mike Risko gave Nikita a guitar, amp, and chord chart, along with eight half-hour lessons and a full scholarship to their Rock Band Camp.

When asked how they felt about this opportunity, Andrii said, "We are very happy for such a gift for our son! He's been dreaming about this for a long time! He is very happy and satisfied." Katia added, "Thank you very much for those who are involved in this." Nikita just put his hands to his forehead and in a gesture signifying how mind-blowing this all is, said, "Wow!"

Finally, the CSI Resettlement Committee was recently recognized at the Jewish Heritage Awards ceremony by NYS Senator Pete Harckham. Rabbi Kane accepted the award on behalf of the committee.
